

Rockcastle Recollections

NEW HOPE

New Hope United Baptist Church of Christ was organized on the first Saturday in July, 1863 in the old log school building which was used as both school and church house for a number of years. A part of the original document of organization has been destroyed, but still visible are the signatures of the members of the "Presbytery" signing it. The signers were William Durham and Steven Carpenter, ministers, and B. G. Chasteen and Elias Makiddy, deacons.

After establishing church rules and decorum, it was agreed to hold monthly meetings on Saturday and Sunday of each month. Saturday was to be devoted to the business affairs of the church and Sunday to religious worship. The old church records from its beginning to the year 1920 carefully account for all meetings over that period of time, except those for October and November of 1919, which were suspended on account of the flu epidemic which was sweeping the country. Church membership records, partly missing, would seem to indicate a membership of around seventy people from the beginning and through the years covered, membership held up extremely well. In 1927, there was a total membership of 237. In a total of thirty-three churches in the Laurel River Baptist Association, to which they belonged, only two, London and Salem, had bigger enrollments. It seems that for a number of years New Hope held membership in the Tates Creek Baptist Association but in 1891 joined the Laurel River Association and in 1901 the Association's annual meeting was held at New Hope.

It is not presently known just how long church services were conducted in the old log school house. In the early nineteenth hundreds the Big Hill Coal Company started operations in the area which brought considerable change and improvement. Several sizeable buildings were erected after the railroad had laid a spur to the mining operations, and one of these was the church designed to erect a two-story building. In 1910 they okayed a building thirty by forty feet, but it seems not to have been completely finished before 1920, as the minutes of some of the meetings of that year had to do with the purchase of lumber and other building materials. Some mention is also made in that year of a contract with the Oddfellows Lodge to rent the upstairs part of the building.

After a short and not too successful operation the original corporation pulled out and abandoned the property, after which the railroad company took up the tracks. It seems that a local group was organized that paid up back taxes and took over the property and had continued mining on a smaller scale, delivering by truck, for several years.

At a later date the two-story building was razed and the present church building erected, using parts of the old building in its construction.

For the first twenty-one years of its existence, B. G. Chasteen officiated as church clerk, W. H. McGuire held the clerkship for 1864 and in 1865 W. C. Chasteen was appointed to the position and held it continuously until May of 1899, when it was taken over by Joseph Wilson. He presided as clerk at all business meetings through 1917. In 1918 David A. Moberly was made clerk and was still performing such duties through 1920, when the records in my possession terminated. Some of the ministers, notably Bro. Dillard Parker, also served for long terms. It appears that Bro. William Durham was New Hope's first pastor and remained in that capacity until Brother Barnes was called in 1869. Brother Richard Moberly was chosen in 1874 and was succeeded by Bro. Livingston Hampton in 1878. Bro. Moberly and Bro. Hampton shared the pastorate in 1883 and until Bro. Moberly and Bro. Pleasant Hampton were called in 1897. Bro. P. Hampton and Bro. Simeon Holt officiated in 1888. Bro. P. Hampton and Bro. William Williams in 1893. Bro. P. Hampton and Bro. Dillard Parker in 1894. In 1891, Bro. Dillard Parker took up his ministerial duties at New Hope and continued without interruption until Bro. William Durham took over from 1910 to 1916. Bro. Sheridan Overbay was pastor in 1916 and 1917 when Bro. Parker came back for 1918 and 1919. Bro. Overbay for 1920 and Bro. William Durham was chosen for 1921, where our records end. From reviewing the above, it will appear that during the first fifty-seven years of the existence of the New Hope United Baptist Church of Christ, Bro. Dillard Parker served as its pastor for a total of twenty-one years.

In going over these old records, I find mention of other church congregations with which New Hope was frequently in contact. In many instances, they shared their pastor with one of these churches, since they apparently required his services for only one Sunday of each month. A reference to the Brush Creek Church seems to indicate that it was in existence as early as 1866. We would like to get the early history of that church, if at all possible.

It is noticeable that throughout the earlier years of the New Hope Church very few members were brought up for correction or any sort of disciplinary measures, but beginning in the early nineties hundreds of the records of many of their monthly meetings bear notice of charges preferred against unruly members, who were generally given until the next monthly meeting to explain any alleged misconduct and present their defense. Apparently their defense had to be a good one and not many of them got by the exclusion from membership.

Principal offenses charged against the feminine element of the congregation involved dancing, while most of the men seem to have been brought up for drunkenness, although swearing, theft and gambling were sometimes made a part of the charges against them. One very busy week of purging the membership included the meeting of February 3rd, 1920, when seven members were excluded from membership on the charge of Disorderly Conduct, no particulars given.

Records consulted for this history of the early days of New Hope Church were furnished me by Mr. Welkie Ballinger, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, to whom they are being returned intact. I have also enjoyed going through them and have learned much of the condition of Rockcastle County and its citizens in the period during and after the War Between the States. I even got a trace of some of my ancestral Coffeys, many of whom were members of the New Hope congregation. One of which was included with those excluded. Another, Aushan Coffey, made up for it by long years of service as Moderator and Deacon.

I might not find room in the book for all church records up to date, but I do hope some member of the present New Hope congregation can fill me in on the principal happenings of the church since 1920 and its present status. A rural congregation that can raise and hold a membership in excess of some of those in much larger communities deserves a lot of credit that they have not gotten to date.

Finance and Administration and the Department of Revenue recently announced that the state's general fund receipts for the first five months of the fiscal year totaled \$323,676,572. This figure represented a 6.6 per cent increase over the same period last year. Road fund receipts of \$165,185,520 were up 7.9 percent from last year.

ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATION TO BE ENACTED - A regulation giving the state Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection control over certain construction and modification projects will become effective January 11, 1974. The regulation will require that developers show that their projects will not interfere with air pollution standards in the area where receiving a construction permit.

County Loses Suit

On Friday, December 28th, 1973, the circuit judge, Lawrence S. Hall, ruled against Rockcastle County on the suit which had been brought by Rockcastle County Public Defender and Clara Mae Jones. The Court agreed with the plaintiff that Rockcastle County was required to pay for transcripts of testimony taken at examining trials if the person charged with a crime was a needy person as defined by Kentucky Revised Statutes 31.100. The Court also ruled that Mrs. Jones was entitled to be paid by the County for the

copy of a transcript which she had provided to the Commonwealth Attorney at his request. This suit was filed after the Fiscal Court and the county judge, Charles C. Carter, refused to pay bills submitted to them for these items. While on other cases were involved at this time, the ruling indicated that the County will be obligated to furnish needy persons with free transcripts in the future.

Since the County lost, it was also ordered to pay the court costs in this action.

Contest Winners Announced for County

The three county winners in the Conservation Essay Contest and the Conservation Poster Contest have now been selected. In the Essay Contest the first place winner was Tony Saylor, a student at the Mt. Vernon Elementary. In second place was Miss Elaine Brown, a student at Brodhead Elementary. We would like to thank each of the 1,175 students who wrote essays and each of the 150 students who prepared posters for this contest. We congratulate each school winner and we especially want to congratulate Tony Saylor and Dora Ann Gilbert who were the county winners in these contests. Tony's essay and Dora's poster have been forwarded to Louisville for judging in state competition. We hope they come out number one in the state competition, too.

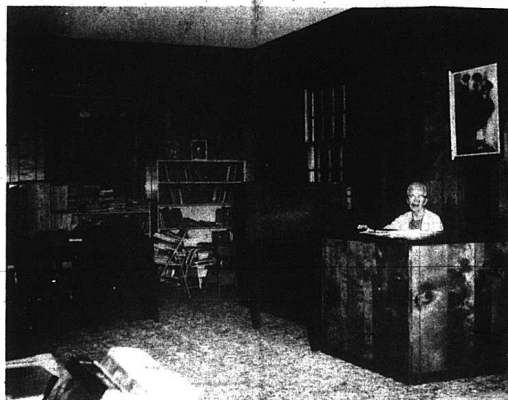
MOORE PARTICIPATES:

Proposal number two - that of beginning and ending school thirty minutes later, garnered 293 votes and Proposal Number Three - beginning and ending school one hour later, got 264

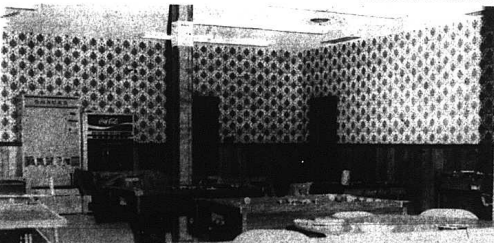

Been hearing so much lately about something called legislative independence here in the Capitol City, we've finally given in. Our curiosity wins out. Okay, folks, we know we shouldn't ask but, legislative independence... what is it? Independence from what? From the governor's office? Who are they trying to kid?

Oh, we're for the concept. How refreshing it would be to watch sixty days of lawmaking here without each step carefully weighed in terms of how Gov. Ford would react to it.

And we're not talking about just the veto sledge. If Kentucky's legislators are eager to participate in the budgetary process (which is where the

governor applies the heaviest cut up on the third floor) why don't they just do it? If they don't like the way something is budgeted by the governor's folks, why not just change it? Legislative independence may not be all that elusive after all. It may be something the lawmakers can just reach out and grab.

That's the philosophy that's been preached for years by Danville Democrat Joe Clark, the House Chairman of Appropriations and Revenue. He preached it not long ago again at the wind-up of the pre-legislative Conference at Kentucky State College.

Trouble was, it was the windup and there just were not enough there to hear it.

But here's what's realistically wrong with this independence thing: It's not the force of a governor's winning personality that the lawmakers are wary of... it's the heft of his political hammer. "Vote for this or no roads for your district... vote for that or forget about coming back next time... vote for these things or..." And the threats can keep up with the number of administration measures there are to vote on.

That's the way it works. That's the way governors who didn't have majorities in the legislature were still able to sway lawmakers.

So what's it going to take to acquire real, honest to goodness legislative independence? Who knows? We may never have it. But the only possibility rests with the 138 men and women we send here each biennium having enough guts to send some of the governor's emissaries back to the first floor with firm and simply "no's." But don't hold your breath.

Guess it's all not so bad. It's the system our government was built on... political bartering. But when the entire direction of government berating emanate from one source, from an individual... whether it's the governor or a party boss or whomever - when it's one man speaking where 138 voices ought to be representing three million Kentuckians, that's something else again.

There now. We've vented our spleen.

TIT FOR TAT - Here's an angle we never thought about until one young, rather angry, refreshingly candid legislator mentioned it the other day.

Governor Ford, impelled by the energy crisis, is talking about the need for the legislature to grant him unprecedented power to make changes in the budget for the next two years as he sees fit... in the lawmaker's absence.

"No snap," says the young fellow we were talking to. "It was plain," he continues, "that Governor Ford was not in support of, and was in fact against the proposal for annual sessions of the legislature."

"Now he wants us to give him new powers in the most critical areas of state government. If we were compelled by law to come back here each year for 45 days, he wouldn't need these powers. We could solve those problems yearly."

"But he didn't support the idea... it was beaten. Now I'm afraid Governor Ford should

seriously consider the likelihood that he won't get the power he seeks... that maybe he'll just have to call us into special session when he has some money problems he can't handle.

How about that? And this guy's a Democrat, too.

HELLOOOOOOO! - You've heard, of course, that efforts are afoot to move Press Row, here, somewhere else. No doubt to the back end of Woodford County, if some had their way. So, if subsequent Watchlines have the hint of a hollow echo about them, it'll probably be because they were written from the bottom of a pipe shaft in the bowels of the Capitol Building, basement.
