

THE 17 YEAR LOCUST

If you have it, you'll know it. If you don't have it, be thankfull? This peet started emerging from the soil last week in some of the parts of the state where it was present in 1957. Their presence is made known by their high prithed 'song' they can be seen flying among and resting on the trees. Since the adults do not feed, their only damage to fruit frees and others, such as Oaks and Maples, is caused by the egg laying slits in the twice smade by the females. This injury is often so heavy that many of these twigs are killed back for a foot or so.

The locust adults are around for four to six weeks; hence several Sevin sprays are needed.

FILLING A TREE'S CAVITIES

Ants are attracted to the sap from wounds in trees. If one of your shade or fruit trees or an ornamental shrub has such a assortment of happy ants, the U.S. Department of Apreulture suggests you clean out the area containing the wound. Clean it down to the sound, hard wood, then treat the exposed wood surface as follows. Shellac the bark and the wood meet. Carry the shellac estating about an inch to the exvity. Paint the interior of the cavity from the shellacked adge inward, which coal tar creosote. You may fill the cavities or leave them open, but you should examine them at you should examine them at oned to repeat the treatment.

PYTHIUM SOFT ROT HITS TOBACCO PLANTS AFTER SETTING

Pythium Soft Rot, a disease which hits tobacco plants about a week after setting, caused problems in a number of Kentucky Tobacco fields last year. The disease causes tobacco plants to suddenly wilt and die, according to J. H. Smiley, extension tobacco specialist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Smiley says that when plants affected, by the disease are removed from the ground, they have a soft, watery rot the buried stem. In fields where the disease is present, some plants may die each day for week or two.


The disease is caused by a soil-borne fungus, and is more of a problem when the weather is cool and damp after setting. Smiley says it is more likely to occur where the decay of cover crops or other organic matter is and complete.

Home Line FREEZING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES AT HOME

Frozen fruits and vege-tables spice year 'round menus with garden fresh flavor. But the nutritive value and quality of these fruits and vegetables depend largely on the treatment before freezing, storage tem-perature and method of cooking Most fruit can be frozen satisfactorily. Select sound, ripe fruit

Select sound, ripe fruit which is slightly riper than for canning but not soft or mushy. Tree or vine-from fruits can be considered from the control of the cont

Some fruits, such as peaches, apricots, apples and pears, discolor easily.

Ascorbic acid (vitamin C) is available in tablet, crystalline or powdered form. Use '\(^1\) teaspoon of this per quart of syrup to prevent this discoloration.

ation. If you don't want to pack the fruit in syrup, sprinkle dissolved ascorbic acid over fruit just before adding sugar. Use 'h teaspoon in 'h' cup cold water to each quart of fruit. Some special commercial antidarkening preparation of ascorbic acid are now on the market.
