### RECEIVES SURPLUS \$18 M.

Charles F. Hinds, state librarian, announced that the nearly \$18 million granted to the Kentucky public library system by Gov. Wendell H. Ford from surplus state funds would be used to meet inflationary price rises for library material and construction.

The money is part of more than \$30 million in surplus funds that Ford recently announced is available.

Hinds said \$196,500 will be used for books and materials purchased and distributed to 109 public libraries throughout Kentucky. The balance of the funds, nearly \$1.6 million, will be allocated for the construction of new or renovations of existing library facilities. According to Hinds, approximately 12 construction projects across the state will be assisted through the funds.

"Emphasis will be given to those projects demonstrating a definite need," Hinds said.

### ARTHRITIS CHAIRMAN ANNOUNCED

Mrs. Donald Hurst will head the 1974 Arthritis Campaign for the Kentucky Chapter of The Arthritis Foundation.

The announcement was made here today by Scott Davis, president of the Kentucky Chapter. He said the group has set a goal of \$700 for the local fund-raising drive.

"August 26th is the kick-off date for the 1974 campaign," Mrs. Hurst said. It will reach its climax with the annual door-to-door Arthritis Victory March on September 10th.

"Arthritis is more than aches and pains, it's living hell," Mrs. Davis asserted. It is America's most widespread chronic disease. Here in Rockcastle County alone, there are 1,300 people of all ages afflicted with this crippling disease.

The Kentucky Chapter is committed to helping these arthritis victims. It provides Patient Education through Public Forums and Free Literature, Professional Education, Rheumatology Grants at the University of Kentucky and University of Louisville, Rheumatism Diseases Laboratory, Louisville, and Clinics at St. Joseph Infirmary, Norton-Children's Hospital, and General Hospital in Louisville. Also two Clinics in Lexington - The arthritis Clinic in the Medical Center in Lexington and the new Veterans' Hospital.

Mrs. Davis called on all Rockcastle County residents and business firms to contribute to the upcoming arthritis campaign. "If we are to improve the quality of life for arthritis sufferers, we must raise the funds to upgrade medical care facilities and to support the vital research seeking the cause and cure of the Nation's No. 1 crippling disease."

## County Agent's Notes

### CORN SILAGE-TOP QUALITY FEED

Corn silage is becoming increasingly important as a source of food for livestock in our area.

There are several reasons why the production of corn silage is increasing.

1. Corn is an easy dependable crop to grow. 2. Corn silage is a high-energy feed with excellent palatability. 3. Corn silage is relatively inexpensive to grow.

Silage corn is being harvested much later than we once harvested it. Research shows us that to get top-quality silage, we should let the corn reach the dent stage.

If you own or operate a silage chopper, you can help those of us who are encouraging increased production of silage.

You can encourage your friends and neighbors who have never put up silage to try some this year. Why not offer to help them with this important job.

The following are a few basic rules for fine corn silage: (2) One of the most important rules is fine chopping of the corn plant. This is important for several reasons: First, longer cut silage does not pack as well in the silo and may result in improper fermentation and increased spoilage losses.

Second, it is more difficult to handle with many silo unloaders and conveying devices. Third, coarse chopping results in greater separation of coarse and fine material during feeding. A high percentage of waste can occur when cobs and coarse stalk sections are separated and left un eaten by livestock. This, in some cases, has led to low butterfat test problems in dairy

herds on heavy corn silage feeding.

(2) Not only is the length of cut important for good packing and handling, but the quality of cut is perhaps equally important. A good, clean cut can be obtained only if both the chopper knives and the shearbar corners are kept sharp and properly adjusted. Once the knives begin to dull, the chopper will tend to beat the plant material apart rather than cut it. This not only increases the power requirement, but accelerates the rate of dulling. Sharpening and adjustment become increasingly critical as the corn plant becomes mature - the fibrous material is more difficult to chop properly.

Recommendations found in the owner's manual should be followed closely to obtain the best job of chopping for each individual forage harvester.

**Powdery Mildew Disease can Damage Flowering Plants**  
 Powdery mildew disease often attacks such flowering plants as rose, phlox, chrysanthemum, dahlia, lilac and zinnia in the late summer or early autumn.

This disease develops on many different herbaceous and woody plants as a white powdery fungus growth on leaves, buds and tender stems, he says. Affected leaves usually turn yellow and drop early; flower buds fail to open or wither and die. Plants with a heavy development of mildew lose much of their ornamental value. Moreover, if the disease is not controlled, valuable plants may be greatly weakened or killed.

Sulfur can be used to control powdery mildew. The disease is highly sensitive to sulfur and to many compounds containing sulfur. Start control measures in mid-August, and continue spraying or dusting at 7-to-10 day intervals until late fall. All fallen leaves and dead annual plants also should be cleaned up and destroyed in the fall.

Wettable sulfur at 2

tablespoons per gallon or Karathane or Miltex at 2 teaspoons per gallon can be used as sprays. Although dusting is less effective than spraying, dusting sulfur (not flowers of sulfur) can be used.

Some ready-prepared, all-purpose garden sprays and dusts contain sulfur or other compounds effective in controlling powdery mildew. The package label should state whether or not the material will control mildew.

**Chemicals Available to Control Suckers on Tobacco**

Burley tobacco growers know that topping tobacco plants at the proper time is necessary to increase leaf weight. Along with topping, growers must also consider methods of sucker control.

Suckers can be removed by hand or controlled through the use of chemicals. Two types of chemical sprays-systemic and contact-are available for controlling suckers.

The systemic chemicals are absorbed by the plants and move inside the plants to the active growth regions. The systemic contain maleic hydrazide as the active ingredient. When used at the proper rates, the systemic do not kill suckers, but stop the growth of the sucker buds.

When using systemic control, top tobacco when half of the plants have one flower open. Any suckers present should be removed when the plants are topped.

Several formulations of maleic hydrazide are on the market. Since they have different concentrations of the active material, they must be applied at the rates recommended on the label. Higher-than-recommended rates will not improve sucker control and may cause residue problems.

Contact chemicals kill the young sucker buds on contact. When using a contact chemical, top tobacco when plants are in the button top to early flower stage. A contact material can be applied immediately before or after topping or within two days after topping. Suckers longer than one inch should be removed

before spraying.

The contact chemical must be applied as a coarse spray so that it runs down the stalk and kills the young sucker buds. The spray occurs quickly and if no rain occurs within an hour after spraying, the suckers should be killed.

During prolonged periods of high temperatures and humidity, contact chemicals can cause loss of lower leaves because of stem rot. This problem may be worse if higher-than-suggested rates or improper concentrations are used.

A University of Kentucky leaflet entitled "Sucker Control Chemicals for Burley Tobacco" is available from your local county extension office.

## USDA Official Calls For Full Crop Production

"It should not be necessary to ask farmers to idle land in 1975," Kenneth E. Frick told farm leaders here today, in reference to Government programs for wheat and feed grains.

Last July, Secretary of Agriculture Earl B. Butts announced the lifting of all acreage set-aside (idling) provisions for 1974 programs. Frick said the current grain production and demand outlook indicates a need for continuation of a full production policy in 1975.

"There are two main reasons we should be able to continue our hands-off policy in farmers' production plans," according to Frick. Administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"First of all, we plan to keep the Government out of the commodity business, and leave stocks in private hands," Frick told members of the National Association of Farmer-Elected Committeemen. "This will result in less Government interference in farm markets, lower cost to taxpayers, and greater dependence on the marketplace, not Government, by farmers for their incomes."

"Second, the high demand for U.S. agricultural products at home and abroad will continue." He indicated current projections for U.S. farm exports were probably low.

"The U.S. is no longer the world's residual supplier of farm products. We have the best exporting system and the world's most efficient farm production. As a result, we have become the most dependent of food and fiber supplier. There is no reason why we cannot maintain our role as the world's number one agricultural supplier."

"The efficiency and productivity of the American farmer has also allowed us to sustain our domestic and

world humanitarian role," Frick added.

Frick noted that Federal costs have been greatly reduced as a result of market-oriented farm programs. "Because of reduced payments for programs and for storage of Government-owned stocks the farm program share of the USDA budget has been reduced from about 40 percent to an estimated 5 percent for the current budget."

He noted that farm efficiency has been helped to ways by the "about in farm policy." "Farmers have the freedom to choose the crops they feel they can grow best for the most return," Frick said, "and full production farming allows for economies of volume."

Among the other options for 1975 programs Frick discussed with the farm group were commodity loans made to farmers for interim financing and the Government's sales policy for government-owned stocks acquired under the programs.

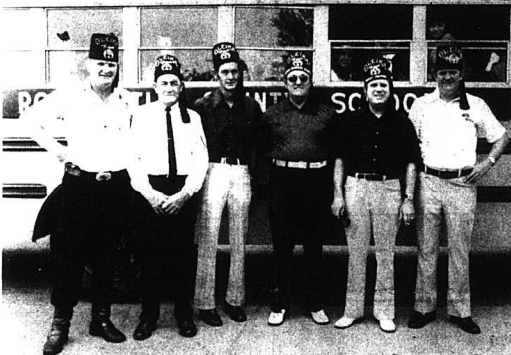
Frick said Government planners are discussing the possibility of setting the sales price for Government-owned grains at 115 percent of the target price for the commodity involved. Target prices are prices established by law as a basis for payments to farmers, should average market prices fall below prescribed target levels.

He also said the Government was considering a change in provisions to offer loans for a twelve-month period only, with no loan extension or "reset" as has been offered in the past. "The rescaling of production under loan represents a non-decision on the part of farmers in marketing their crops," Frick said.

Frick said he expected complete farm program provisions could be announced soon, early enough for farmers to have time to plant for 1975 production.

## Rockcastle County Is A More Active Market

Rockcastle County proved to be a stronger market than most in the past year, according to a nationwide survey of business, just released.

Its relative strength was manifest in the rising level of family income in the area and in the amount of consumer spending in local retail stores. The findings are contained in the new, copyrighted report, entitled "Survey of Buying Power," issued by Sales Management, a marketing publication.

It shows how much was earned and how much was spent in communities in all parts of the nation.

The amount of disposable cash that Rockcastle County families had left, after providing for their personal taxes, was above average.

Their net income in the year amounted to \$27,599,000, compared with the previous year's \$20,631,000.

Just what this net income was equivalent to, on a per-family basis, is indicated by the median locally, \$5,729 per household. Half the families earned more than this and half earned less. It was higher than the median in many sections of the country.

With their bigger incomes, local residents had more money than usual left for discretionary spending, despite the effect of inflation, which cut into the purchasing power of people all over the country.

Not everyone was in a spending mood, however. Some were hesitant and cautious, preferring to hold back until the problems of inflation, energy shortage and the like simmered down.

Most consumers, on the other hand, had a different outlook than that and were less constrained in their spending. Their attitude was that inflation was not going to subsidize for a long time to come and that it was better to buy now rather than wait until later when prices would be still higher.

The net result was that retail sales in Rockcastle County reached a grand total of \$118,624,000 as against the prior year's \$14,349,000.

Preliminary figures for this

year indicate that the sales slump that was feared has failed to materialize thus far. Consumers, who contribute 60 percent to the gross national product, have not gone into hiding. Neither have they gone all out in their spending.

Mrs. Harris will lead local volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like Cystic Fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis and bronchiectasis.

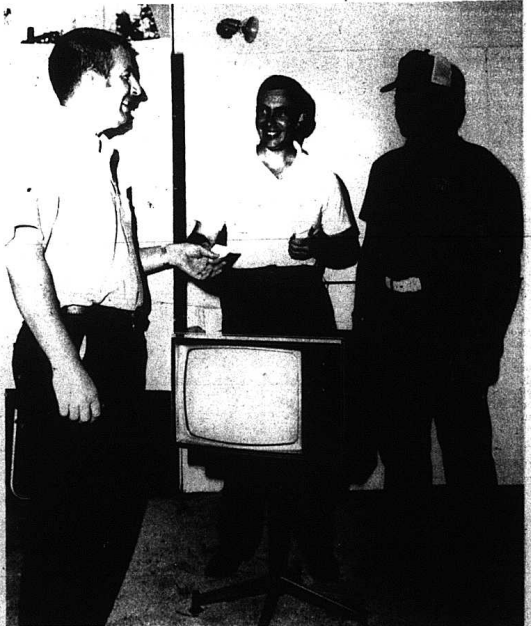
The Breath of Life Week will be September 8-14, with a door-to-door drive scheduled during the week.

Approximately one of every 1,500 babies is born with Cystic Fibrosis, which is still incurable. C/F is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons, or a total of ten million Americans, is a symptomless carrier of this gene.

Current research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers, as well as a cure for C/F and better methods of treatment for all lung-damaging diseases.

Because of improved treatment developed through re-

## Frankfort Watchline

From someone who should know, we got word the other day that former Democratic Party Chairman J.R. Miller has been in touch with Jefferson County Todd Hollenbach on the subject of Hollenbach's possible candidacy for governor next year.

But from someone else who keeps up on such things, we hear that Hollenbach was as much as anything else to be a sure bet for Lt. Governor and that rumors like these might encourage Julian Carroll to embrace him as a running mate. But, we don't think that'll happen. And one thing is sure, to us at any rate, Miller's dislike of Carroll had better not blind him to the fact that the lieutenant governor is pretty much unbeatable, at least in terms of the Democratic nomination for the state's top office.

And, we think that Carroll could even beat Hollenbach in Jefferson County.

Lake Miller, Hollenbach's stock as a force in Kentucky-wide Democratic politics has declined, particularly since the 1974 session of the legislature. The big-city county judge drew a losing hand in his bid to use the rhubarb over the so-called "mountain amendment" to his benefit last February and March... an effort to scuttle Wendell Ford's Senate ambitions. Ford's own version of sharing coal-lax excesses with the mountains won out and the governor's praises are being sung in the valleys and in the hills, now that some of the money has already been mailed out.

Ford had already told Hollenbach to forget the Senate, that he had made up his mind to run. Miller was at a subsequent meeting of top Kentucky Democrats and is said to have been less than enthusiastic about the idea.

Not that the former party boss has anything against Ford... they may not agree on all issues but Miller has every reason to be proud of Ford's success and promise. It's simply that he and Carroll have a chemistry problem that dates back to Carroll's decision to run for lieutenant governor with Bert Combs in 1971.

But, more recently, Miller's prolems with the Federal Government Accounting Office with certain campaign fund reporting practices would seem to have diminished his influence as a Democrat decision-maker. But only time will tell about that.

Miller said that he wanted out of the party job to go back to Western Kentucky and do what he does for a living... oversee rural electrification in that part of the state. But then there were murmurings that Miller was so dissatisfied with the shape of the Democratic ship of state that he would even run for governor himself if Carroll was the only candidate trotted out.

It looks now, however, with both Carroll and Ford denouncing, without blaming, the fund-raising and reporting developments to which Miller's name has been linked, Miller has his hands full with other things.

And, it would appear that Judge Hollenbach, if he wants to move forward in the party, had better be satisfied with seeking, along with several others, the blessings of Carroll and settle for lieutenant governor for the time being.

Though we still believe that Greenup House member Terry McBrayer has the inside track on the nomination for second spot on the ticket, (everytime we say that, we get letters) there's a formidable crowd out there with similar ambitions... people like Tom Ward, Ed Hancock, Thelma Stovall, Jim Gray, Ho Stephens and Ewart

Johnson... well, we'll see.

A LESSON-With the recent announcement by Wendell Ford that he's for forcing all space-leasing contracts the state undergoes to be bid competitively, we're hoping he's leaving the days of friends being favored at taxpayer expense are numbered.

And we hope the acquittal of All-American moving company executive Jim Creech of criminal charges of falsely billing the state for hundreds of thousands of dollars carries a lesson for someone high in state government.

Franklin Circuit Judge Henry Meigs did not direct the verdict because there was no wrongdoing... but because the state could not prove its case. And the judge turned his stern gaze at the state's way of doing business... at the contracts between Creech and the state.

Yes, the deals were made between Creech and the Nunn administration, the early ones at least, but Ford reviewed and canceled many contracts when he assumed office... contracts totaling \$5.6 million were stopped in highways alone in the early days of the Ford administration.

Now, Mr. Bureaucrat, this question: If your wife had done as shabby a job on the household budget as you did in keeping records of that monumental move of state agencies into the Capitol Plaza, wouldn't it be grounds for divorce? What bugs us most is the indifference with which the taxpayer is treated... and how much of this goes undiscovered? JN

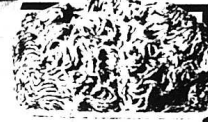

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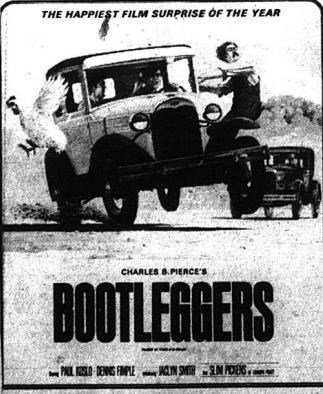

### Down On The Farm

Today we are on the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Bradley Saylor on Ky. 461 at Wabd. The last stop of the Forage Dairy Field Day. The first stop on the tour was on the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy H. Mink. Our purpose was to observe Forage Test Plots that were seeded at the same time and the same way on both Tommy and the Bradley Saylor farms, March 8, 1974.

The second stop on tour was at the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Long at Ottawa where we saw a good dairy operation. Albert and Sylvia were milking 21 cows at that time and have 36 cows on the farm. They sell

manufactured milk and also grow 2.1 acres of tobacco along with hay and other forage crops.

On the tour, to point out and explain the Forage Test Plots, were Kenneth Evans, University of Kentucky Agronomy Department and Ed Smith and Bill Plunkett, both from the U.K. Engineering Department and H. Lee Durham, Rockcastle County Extension Agent.

The test plots were made by a new machine developed by the University of Kentucky and John Deere Company which renovates, seeds and sprays a four-inch strip where seeded to kill existing grass. These plots were compared with plots in the same field done the conventional way by disking or a field tiller. Upon conclusion of the

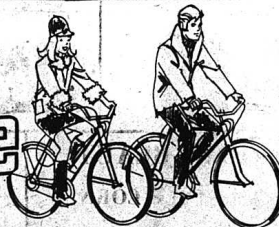

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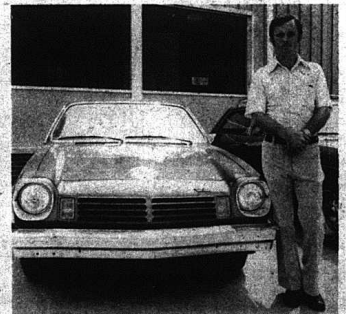
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
