

They entertained relatives . . Aunt Eliza and Uncle Peter and the cousins who arrived on Christmas Eve on their big bobsled, sleigh bells ringing.

The penal code limits the use of guns to certain types of felonies such as morter, use in making an arrest present law allows the

armed tobbery, armed assault or anythme commone's life (gazin, including the officer's) is endangered.

Many are concerned this may mean police officers may be subjected to abuse and danger. Noting that policemen will still be allowed to protect themselves and others, Bayes said he is not sure the changes will cause the problems others expect "By and large, the police in

this state are reluctant to use deadly force. Policemen are like other people and respect human life," he said.

A definite problem Bayes expects police to encounter is determining mental states when charging a person with a crime. With few exceptions, no crime has been committed under the code unless the suspect acted with one of four newly defined mental states. When making an arrest, an officer must determine if a crime was committed intentionally, knowingly, wantonly or recklessly.

The confusion arises as a result of the language defining the mental states. "Intentionally" and PUIZZLE.

In addition to the listings, the manual also explains situations that may help officers interpret the law. The definitions of mental states are accompanied by examples to help officers determine which applies to the specific incident he is facing.

The catalytic converter reduces harmful carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons in your automobile exhaust to harmless carbon dioxide and water. This means less air pollution for all of us.

The ability of this catalytic converter to perform is seriously impaired by even small amounts of lead, which is a common ingredient in "fegular" and "premium"

Because the manual is pocket-sized, policemen carry it with them. This gives them an easy reference point until they become familiar with the new penal code, Bayes cap. Most of these cars also have a special gas filler pipe which is compatible with — and only with — a special nozzle on all unleaded gas pumps. This is to prevent leaded gas from accidentally being pumped into your car's

the new penal code, Bayes said.

He thinks it will take several years before police and critzens become totally familiar with the penal code. As with any solher law, the penal code will be subject to changes. This courts will be asked to interpret various provision. Bayes said, adding that he also policemen to request changes as they see how the penal code can be realistically applied on the streets. He described the code as a "tremendous improvement in the law," and whose advantages "far outweigh the disadvantages."

Urges that Xmas cards emphasize the Christ

A noted historian of the Southwest, an archivist of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of a city in the Far West, puts the blame of some of the world's disor-ders on the secular nature of many Christmas cards

of many Christmas cards.
"Over two and one half billion cards are distribut-ed annually in the United States. If more of them were religious and carried messages that would ap-peal to thoughtful, even non-religious adults, these cards would help bring peace on earth," he de-clares.

The priest exhibited one card, printed in Germany and mailed in New York December 24, 1908, to a student of a Boston seminary, as an example of an attractive early Christmas card which also was re-

The card, like an ordin-ary postcard, pictured a rather stylized angel with wings, a palm frond which

perhaps was meant to symbolize peace on the order of an olive branch, and an upraised arm. Between the wings appeared the star of Bethlehem and the words, "in terra pax," or "peace on earth."

The angel, emerging from a cloud, was peering down upon a village, with the church the most prominent structure visible

inent structure visible.

The historian pointed out that sending cards probably started in the early Victorian era. Sir Henry Cole, an art dealer and publisher, sent the first one, in 1843. It was a card designed by a well-known artist of the period. John Calcott.

New Data System Used By Kentucky Telephone Co.

The London Office of Kentucky Telephone Company has begun to use a new data system to record customer bill payments, adjustments and service requests. The goal of service requests. The goal of the new system is to provide a more accurate and up-to-date

more accurate and up-to-date telephone bill.

One of the major advantages is to reduce the mail lag time between the local business office and Continental Telephone Service Corporation's Data Center in Merrifield, Virginia. Presently, the gap bata Center in Merrifield and the information is sent by mail to Dulles can be as much as a week, but the new system significantly speeds up the posting of payment information to the customer's account.

Another improvement is

that service requests can be processed overnight into the computer. Under the old system typing 80 service requests took an entire day, and the old service requests took an entire day, and to be entered separately into the computer. The new procedure cuts the time for doing 80 service requests down to three hours, and posts them into the computer overnight.
