





The prominent part played by Spout Springs in the history of Mt. Vernon is not to be overlooked. D. N. Williams and other settlers have said that the Spout Springs, with their never failing supply of pure water, were the principal reason for many newcomers settling here in the first place.

The first strictly commercial venture in Mt. Vernon was made possible by Spout Springs, which furnished water for McGall's Tanyard, located just below the springs and making of their copious flow to fill the long row of tanning poots, remains of which were still visible only a few years ago. They also furnished power for a grist finil and possibly a natural grading factory, the foreruner of a much larger one located near it at a later date and

The Springs were long the social center of the settlement and the scene of many picnics, Muster Days and political rallice. Within my own recollection they were the gathering place for farmers on their Saturdays discrence ovidist to towe. But it is, not auditively became solely responsible for a definitely modern advance in social development for the community. In that year, according to Fred Baker, Mt. Vernon became the only town in Eastern Kentucky to have a commercial swimming pool. Fred, together with Bentley Barks, B. H. Parsons, R. A. Sparks, Fred Owens, R. H. and F. E. Miller, F. L. Durham and R. L. Langford set up the Mt. Vernon Amusement Company, each investing one hundred dollars. For this original investment, plus four hundred dollars more, they installed a concrete-walled pool, fed by the Springs. Since there was a constant flow of water, no purifying equipment was necessary. When the water in the pool got muddy, as it generally did following every rain, the pool was drained and cleaned out. It usually took about a week to fill it again.

The venture was not an unqualified success. Youngsters still visited their old swimming holes along Renfro and Roundstone Creeks and Rockcastle River, and there were not enough ladies and adults accustomed to the idea of swimming to make the pool apaying proposition, at the small charge of twenty-five cents per person, fifty cents if a rented bathing suit was included. One of the proprietors made the suggestion that maybe folks who didn't want to get in the pool would come to watch those who did, and a small grandstand was exercted to accommodate them, at a nominal admission charge. This handled the end of the venture, many of the lady patrons declaring that they would not go in swimning exposed to public gaze.

Prior to this attempt at a more formal watering place, the principal center for bathing was a fairly deep hole in Renfro Creek, just above the bridge which carried U.S. 25 across the stream. This spot was officially known as Red Bridge, the Bridge having been painted that color soon after its erection by the road-building crew. A few weeks later this same young man created further diversion at Red Bridge when he built a high pole scaffold in the edge of the water, planning to dive from it in some sort of a religious test he had conceived. When ready to jump, he shouted "Here I come, an' I want some of you good brothers to ketch me jest before I go under." Unfortunately, none of the "good brothers" made a move to do so, and the dive from such a height rammed his head into the blue mud at the bottom of the stream and he was almost drowned before being rescued. That was his final appearance as a high-diver, but his other idioxyncrasies kept him in the public eye for years to come, and some of them will be related as we go along.

After all their difficulties in pursuit of the pleasures of bathing, it is interesting to note that in the early 1940's there were more private awimming pools in the town of Mt. Vernon in proportion to population than in any other town in Kentucky. Swimming and diving tesfins by soingsters developed in the excellent public pool at the local Cedar Rapids Recreation Center have brought home most of the trophics and ribbons for which they have contended with teams from communities around the country several times bigger than their own, and we now hays students going through college on swimming scholarships.
