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



central office building by acquisition of adjacent property to provide space for off-street parking.

4. A new three-bay garage on the grounds of the County High School and Vocational School.

5. Addition of instructional areas and parking space for the vocational school is recommended, when funds become available (Priority can be waived).

6. Extended planning should provide for construction of a 7-8th grade middle school in the vicinity of Mt. Vernon to house all Rockcastle County pupils of these grades.

Anyone interested in looking over this report may do so at the Office of the Superintendent in Mt. Vernon.

In other action, the Board approved and accepted a \$10,000 CETA grant which would provide fifty-five jobs for students. Mr. Parsons told the Board that the program covered student help as clerical, library, teacher, custodian, recreational, food service aides. Board of Education Receives Facilities Survey Report

The Rockcastle County Social District Facilities Survey Report was presented to the Rockcastle County Board of Education at their regular meeting Monday, March 4.

Mr. Daniel, Director of the Division of Administrative Services for the State Department of Education.

The report contains comprehensive background information on all the schools in the county and gives a report individually on the condition of each school building and the surrounding grounds.

The first priority in the report calls for the construction of an elementary school for a minimum of 750 pupils on a site South of Mt. Vernon and near Highway 176. This school to serve elementary pupils now

housed at Livingston and to relieve crowded conditions at Mt. Vernon Elementary School.

This priority recommendation followed a comment on the part of the Board which listed Livingston Elementary as an "interim operation with functional maintenance." Mr. Daniel explained to the school board members that this meant that due to the inadequacy of the building and grounds at Livingston, the present building there should only be maintained while in use with the idea in mind that the school would be done away with when the Board felt their bonding potential was high enough to construct the new building recommended in the first priority.

Following the presentation of the report the Board discussed the first priority listed and the general consensus of the members seemed to be that they would

have to protest vigorously the removal of the elementary school from Livingston entirely.

Of course, as Mr. Daniel explained to the Board, they do not have the right to disagree with any part of the recommendations. The only requirement being that it must be done within sixty (60) days and there must be recommendations prepared by the Board setting out their ideas using the same format as was used in the original Facilities Survey Report.

The other five priorities listed in the report are as follows:

- 2. Renovation of the older sections of Broadhead School and Mt. Vernon Elementary to bring them up to the best possible condition as permanent elementary centers.
- 3. Site expansion at the

Rogers Announces For Re-Election As Commonwealth Attorney

Clarence Perciful Found Dead; Coroner Rules Homicide

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell has ruled Homicide in the death of Clarence E. Perciful, 67, who was found shot to death in the basement of his home on Fairground Hill in Mt. Vernon by Buddy Cox and Gary Hansel.

According to Sheriff Manuel Shepherd, Mr. Perciful was shot twice in the chest and was found lying on his back. Coroner Dowell put the time of death at approximately Monday, February 24th.

Mr. Cox said that he and Mr. Hansel often checked on Mr. Perciful and were called Friday morning by a neighbor who reported that Mr. Perciful had not been seen since Monday. Mr. Hansel then went to the Perciful home and, failing to raise anyone, he returned to town and Mr. Cox contacted Mr. Perciful's son, who lives in Madison County, and told him of the problem. Mr. Perciful's son told the men to break into the home to look on his father. The men did so and found Mr. Perciful dead.

Sheriff Shepherd said there was no sign of forcible entry into the Perciful home and he also said that there were several guns belonging to Mr. Perciful were missing along with several other items.

Detective Sam King with the Kentucky State Police said Tuesday that it was difficult to decide what was missing since there was no definite way of establishing what was on the premises before Mr. Perciful's death.

An autopsy was performed in Corbin.

Mr. Perciful was born October 17, 1907 in Rockcastle County, the son of Mrs. Maggie Harmon Perciful of Broadhead and the late George Perciful. He was a retired Radio and Television Repairman; a veteran of World War II, a member of the National Rifleman's Association, a Kentucky Colonel and a member of the Baptist

Church. Besides his mother, he is survived by two sons, Cecil M. Perciful, 67, who was found shot to death in the basement of his home on Fairground Hill in Mt. Vernon by Buddy Cox and Gary Hansel, two brothers, Walter of Cumberland and Hugh of Frankfort; six sisters, Mrs. Lorene Hayes of Morrow, Ohio, Mrs. Jane Gentry and Mrs. Ada Russell, both of Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Hazel Donaldson of Oak

Ridge, Tennessee, Mrs. Glenna French of London and Mrs. Ann Mullins of Lansing, Michigan; six grandchildren and a step-grandchild.

Funeral services were held Monday, March 3rd, at the Cox Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Buford Herring officiating. Burial was in the Elmwood Cemetery.

Fiscal Court Rescinds Coal Mining Tax

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to rescind its motion (made at the February meeting) to impose a licensing fee on coal mined in the county. The Court did so after the receipt of an Attorney General's opinion which stated that the tax could be interpreted as an excise tax and that while the Legislature could impose an excise tax it (The Legislature) was prohibited by the Constitution from delegating authority to impose such a tax to a county.

Also during the meeting, the Court accepted the settlement of County Judge Hubert Thacker. Judge Thacker reported total income of \$10,711.95, comprised of \$9,600 in salary and \$1,111.95 from fees for 1974. Sheriff Manuel Shepherd also made his settlement with the Court which was accepted. Sheriff Shepherd listed total income at \$17,766.34 with expenses of Gasoline, \$3,064.58; Salaries, Deputies, \$6,300.00 and \$1,815.42 and net receipts over expenses of \$7,086.09.

and then to gradually pull ahead for the win.



Art Exhibit At UK

An exhibition of work by Arturo Sandoval, SKY GRIDS AND OTHER CONCEPTS WILL OPEN AT THE University of Kentucky Art Gallery in the Fine Arts Building, Rose Street on Sunday afternoon, March 9. The reception, open to the public, will be from 1-5 p.m.

The artist creates sculpture from lures, mylar, acrylics, vinyls and polyethelene; he combines these materials with fabric netting, silk-screen and machine sewing to create a quilted surface which is penetrated by light to expose internal layers. The materials, their surfaces and shapes, interact with light - reflecting and absorbing it to give the works an ever changing three dimensional quality. Sandoval's preoccupation with light is reflected in the names of his pieces as well - "Sky Wall," "Red Sky," "Massed Clouds" or "Sky Grid."

There are ten large pieces in the exhibition. One, forty feet by seven feet, will be free hanging and suspended across the full width of the Gallery; another, fifteen feet by fifteen feet, is designed to be viewed from below.

In several national invitational shows at such institutions as the Museum of Contemporary Crafts in New York City, the Krannert Art Museum at the University of Illinois and the Egz N Eye Gallery in Los Angeles. He has been the recipient of awards from the St.

Louis Artist's Guild, the Evansville Museum, and the Illinois State Museum and he has a long list of one man shows to his credit. At present he is head of the weaving program at the University of Kentucky.

The Gallery will be open Monday through Friday 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, 1 p.m. - 5 p.m. The exhibition will run through Friday, March 28th.

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



Rockcastle Recollections

JOHN LAIR

COCKS - COX: William Cocks migrated from England to Pennsylvania at a date now unknown. He was a stone mason by trade. He married Mary Jolly, and they were the parents of eleven children: Christopher, John, Jim, Dave, Andy, William Henry, Jane, Emma, Lucy, Priscilla, and Mary.

William Henry Cocks, who brought the family name to Rockcastle County, was born in Venango County, Pa., in 1842. He had little education, but was a skilled mechanic. His brother, Christopher, came to Hansford, Kentucky, to drill an oil well. After drilling only two hundred feet, he was bitten by a rattlesnake, which affected his health so that he had to return to Pennsylvania. William Henry who was twenty-four years old at the time, was sent from Pennsylvania to finish drilling the well, taking it down to nine hundred (900) feet, when it was abandoned as non-productive. In making the journey from Pennsylvania, he came by train to Nicholasville, Kentucky, then the nearest rail point to Mt. Vernon. Coming across to Crab Orchard, he boarded a stage coach there and came to Mt. Vernon, going from there to Hansford on horseback. This was in 1866.

After his work on the well was finished, he went to work for James Smith, also a native of Pennsylvania, who opened a three-story mill building on Skages Creek, near Hopewell, Kentucky. (Could the settlement have been so named to express hope that the well might prove successful?) The first floor of Smith's building was occupied by a planing mill and a great mill, the second floor by a sawmill - probably an old-time "sash" mill that had either to use a saw pit or be elevated some distance above the ground - and the third floor housed a woodworking shop in which young Cocks was employed. Smith also owned a blacksmith shop nearby, which he later sold to Cocks. It was largely at a blacksmith that Cocks was later so successful, proving to be one of the best wagon makers in Kentucky. The last wagon he turned out in his shop in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, is housed with my horse-drawn vehicle collection at Genoa Valley, along with the old horse-drawn vehicle collection of the Cocks family in the undertaking business.

William Henry Cocks took as his wife Matilda Jones, born daughter of Ezekiel and Eliza Gentry Jones. She was born on Chestnut Ridge in this county in 1848. She was 13 years old when the Civil War began. In the meantime, her father had moved with his family to Mt. Vernon. One day she was visiting friends on Chestnut Ridge and the line of the family was across a bridge on the old Livingston Road. She was standing out in the yard, just inside the fence, when a Captain rode up and asked for a drink of water. After she had given it to him, he took off his sword and handed it to her, saying, "If there ever comes a time that you need this use it." She had the sword for several days and had to take it home but she finally did, and it is still cherished among the treasures of the Cocks family since Ezekiel Jones, a great deal, and since he had no sons, his three daughters were accustomed to doing the farm work, Matilda being the leader. She learned early to drive a

team, plow, and cut and haul logs for firewood. She plaited shingles to make horse collars, using bark for thread and thorns for awls. With ancestry such as this, the descendants of William Henry and Matilda Cocks have always been able to take care of themselves under all circumstances.

Children born to William Henry and Matilda Jones Cocks were: William, who married Lola Whithead; Robert, who married Bessie Hook; Edward, who married Mattie McPerson; Mattie, who was never married; Grace, who was never married; Claude C., who married Amy Proctor. William and Lola Cox were parents of Herbert, Richard F. Robert Earl, Grace Annette, Geneva and William H. Cox. Robert and Bessie Cox's family consisted of Clyde Vernon, Lillian, Nellie, Lee, Nina, Robert Houk, and Charles Burdette, Jane Elizabeth and Raymond, who lived only one day. Edward and Mattie Cox had two sons, Edward and Henry. Claude and Amy Cox were parents of James, John and Dorothy.

The family of William Cox, son of William Henry Cocks, has for three generations conducted a successful undertaking business at Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and for a part of that time had their own casket factory, in the basement of the building now occupied by the Mt. Vernon Signal and the offices of Attorney William Gregory. A son, Richard F. Cox, was for years engaged in the undertaking business in Grayson, Kentucky. Another son, Robert Earl, married Bonnie Nicely. Their son, Albert Norman Cox, became president of Midway College at Midway, Kentucky.

Robert and Edward Cox for many years operated a dry goods store in the Cox building on Main Street in Mt. Vernon and in the other half of the building, Claude C. Cox established the county's principal hardware store, which is still owned and operated by his son, John Cox, who is also Chief of Mt. Vernon's Fire Department.

All the children of William Henry and Matilda Cox were born at Hopewell, with the exception of Claude, as they got older and entered school, they changed the family name from Cocks to Cox, claiming it was easier to spell that way.

PROCTOR: Our history of the Proctor family in Rockcastle is by no means complete but according to records James Proctor and his wife, a former Miss Brannaman, came here from Pennsylvania well before the setting up of the county and he was, in fact, the first

Miller elected here. With his wife and two small children, David and Anderson Granville, he settled in the Cove community, in a one-room pole cabin without door or window shutters.

At that time the nearest store to their home was in the settlement around Logan's Station, which later grew into Stanford, Kentucky, and the trip to and from the store involved a three-day journey. When James Proctor found it necessary to make such a trip, his wife and two small sons were left alone in their cabin, with only an

FOOD CLIPS

Crushed, unseasoned ready-to-eat cereal flakes, or packaged cereal crumbs may be used in place of bread crumbs or flour as a coating. Season the crumbs with your favorite herbs for a real taste-changer.

Rice may be cooked in a flavorful liquid such as equal parts of tomato juice and water or even fruit juice to acquire an entirely different appearance and taste. For a good taste combination - raisins or nuts or olives added to your rice dishes.

Over-cooking is the problem if your pasta seems soft and unappetizing.

If you haven't tried "oatmeal bonbons" you have missed a tasty goodie. Add one cup of rolled oats to a bonbon

recipe and shape into one inch balls. They come out more like cookies, but delicious!

If your cereal has lost its crispness, you might restore it by heating the cereal (in a shallow baking pan) in a pre-heated oven at 350 degrees Fahrenheit for about 5 minutes. If you allow cooked cereal to stand exposed to the air, a rubbery film quickly forms on the surface and looks unappealing. If you cover it and keep it hot in the top of a double boiler (over hot water) it'll retain its creamy consistency.

Want to vary the flavor of cooked cereals? - cook them in milk or with raisins, dates or other cut-up dried fruits. Did you ever try dairy eggnog in place of milk and sugar on your cooked cereal?

Chicken and turkey are excellent sources of high quality protein. They also provide iron, thiamin, riboflavin and niacin. Most country game hens, roasting chickens and capons have enough fat to brown well at a moderate roasting temperature.

If poultry is to be broiled or roasted in pieces - split it down the back and out into halves through the breastbone.





KY. COUNTIES TO GET AN ADDITIONAL \$800,000 FOR JOB ASSISTANCE.....

More than \$800,000 will be distributed to Kentucky counties to provide additional aid to the jobless under the federal Emergency Jobs and Unemployment Assistance Act.

C. Leslie Dawson, secretary of the Department for Human Resources (DHR) announced that twenty-one counties will share in the funds. This will include designated areas in Louisville with populations of 10,000 or more in a well-defined area and with a high unemployment rate.

According to Dr. Norman Willard, Commissioner of the DHR Bureau for Manpower Services, the funds are being made available by the U.S. Department of Labor following re-identification of those counties with unemployment rates above 6.5 percent of the work force.

Originally, the Labor Department announced that Kentucky would receive some \$3.1 million for public service jobs. However, in the "rush" by the U.S. Department of Labor to get the funds to participating states, unemployment figures for one month were used. When final allocations were made, a three-month average was established, resulting in Kentucky's original allocation being adjusted downward by more than \$2 million. The latest funding allocation announcement is not part of that original cut, according to Willard.

Gov. Julian Carroll immediately asked for a clarification of the cut and restoration of the funds and sought the help of Kentucky's congressional delegation to get the money restored, but no official word has been received from Washington.

When allocations were first determined under the act, certain counties were grouped together and an average unemployment rate was obtained for determining allocations. For the new funds, allocation is based on a rate of 6.5 percent unemployment or higher, making 21 counties

eligible. The new allocations, to be divided in proportion to the individual county's rate of unemployment, will go to the following.

In the Stanford area, Casey, Lincoln, Rockcastle and Russell Counties will receive \$99,429.

Stanton area, including Breathitt, Lee and Powell will receive \$57,798.

The Mayfield area, including Ballard, Carlisle, Fulton, Graves, Hickman and Marshall Counties, will receive \$162,408.

In the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program, the counties of Breathitt, Carter, Clay, Elliott, Leslie, Magoffin, Morgan and Perry will receive \$166,466.

And in Louisville, an additional \$381,040 will be allocated.

Dr. Willard noted that these are preliminary figures and applications will have to be made.

HI TRAUMA CART BOUGHT WITH BAKER MEMORIAL FUNDS

Berea Hospital has announced that the \$2122 given by members of the community to the Dr. John Baker Memorial Fund has been used and exhausted by the purchase of an

The Hi Trauma or crash cart was purchased from the Kaufmann-Goodwin Company in Ohio and contains a monitor, defibrillator, a cardiac board, an IV stand as well as containing various emergency medications.

The entire Hi Trauma Cart is activated by one plug which permits all the equipment including the suction machine to be operable at the same time if necessary.

The Cart is stocked with 12

drugs for specific use in a cardiac arrest and 28 other drugs for other emergencies such as respiratory and allergic reactions. Also contained on the cart are various intravenous solutions, tracheotomy trays and various supplies that would be required to be used by physicians sustaining life.
