"SNOWBALL FIGHT IN THE WHITE HOUSE" by Louise Littleton Davis. Based on the writings of Mary Donelson, describes the party her great uncle, President Andrew Jackson, gave for the niece and nephews living with him on his last Christmas in the White House.

"YOUR FIRST PET AND NOW TO TAKE CARE OF IT" by Carla Stevens. Instructions on caring for some animals that make good household pets such as gerbils, birds, mice, guinea pigs, hamsters, cats, dogs, and fish.

"THE GHOST OF GRANNOV MOOT" by William MacKellar. Davis rejects the German shepherd he is given to replace his beloved collie, but feels strangely responsible when the new dog runs away and is suspected of becoming vicious sheep killer.

"CONTROLLING YOUR WEIGHT" by Barbara Benninger. Advice on eating habits, calories, diets, exercises, and incentives such as clubs and camps for controlling weight.

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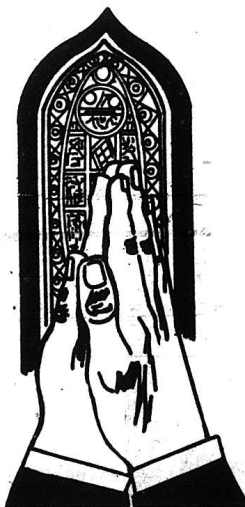

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

### Gardening Tips from Extension Specialists at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture

About 433 years ago while on his third voyage to the New World, French explorer Jacques Cartier planted some cabbage seed in his garden plot in Canada. The crop thrived and along with discovering the St. Lawrence River, Cartier introduced this fine vegetable to North America.

Every home garden should have a few cabbage. It is an excellent source of vitamins C and good when cooked sprinkled with salt and eaten raw, or served up in salads.

Cabbage is not difficult to grow and can be set out in spring even when there is still danger of frost. It can be grown from seed in from plants purchased from garden supply stores. In a home garden where only a few plants are needed, however, it will usually be more convenient and a lot less trouble to buy cabbage plants than to grow them.

Cabbage does best when the soil is moist and fertile and to make it rich enough. UK Extension vegetable specialist C. F. Roberts recommends 2 pounds of 10-10-10 fertilizer for every 100 square feet of garden. Space plants 18 inches apart and row to row 36 inches. Set the plants as early as possible in April, spacing them about 2 feet apart and do not cultivate too deeply. Since rows of the cabbage grow within 2 inches of the surface of the soil, only shallow cultivation is needed. Sufficient cultivation should be done to keep

down the weeds while the plants are small. After the plants are half grown, cultivation is not important at all unless the weeds become troublesome.

For an early crop of cabbage, Roberts recommends Market, Prize or Market Tender. Both varieties mature in around 75 days and both are excellent for eating. These varieties transplanted in April mature for the range around mid-June or early July.

Cabbage has many insect enemies and is subject to several plant diseases. By planting early in the spring, damage from these pests can be minimized. Because of the voraciousness of insects like the cabbage looper, Harlequin bug, imported cabbage worm, and others, late cabbage is much more difficult to raise.

Cabbage is ready for eating or making kraut when the heads feel solid to the touch if permitted to remain in the patch after they reach this stage the heads often take a second growth and burst. If this happens they must be used immediately, or they will rot.

Cabbage will remain green and crisp for a week or more if placed in the crisper section of the refrigerator. Sometimes it can be kept for several months stored away in a cool, moist basement.

Cabbage was in general use 2,500 years B.C., and, according to some botanical authorities, was worshipped by ancient Egyptians. It is, indeed, a historic vegetable.

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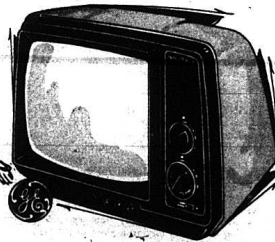

# Rockcastle Recollections

John Lutz

**CREWS:** Several years ago, when I acquired the old Crews Ferry Property, I made an attempt to discover something of the history of the Crews Family, but was never able to learn much concerning them. I understand that possibly the first of the name to come to America was from Germany and spelled his name Crus or Cruse. He settled in Pennsylvania in a place later known as Crews Valley - Crews being the English spelling of his name.

At an unknown date, he settled in Boonesborough where he married an Indian woman and raised a son, Andrew Jackson Crews, who became a close friend of George Clay, son of Cassius M. Clay, a controversial figure in the American history. Andrew Jackson Crews, for some reason now unknown, was raised by a family by the name of Shearer. He married Zobina Christopher in 1838 in Madison County, Kentucky and removed from there to Rockcastle County before 1850. Their children were, Haden, Miriam, Margaret, Kate, Belle, John, Cassius, Marcellus, Art Ida, Andrew, Whitfield, Jenny and Richard. Haden, the eldest, was a college man, teacher and poet. It is remembered in the family that he wrote poems for children, one of them being a favorite in earlier school books.

Little Drops of water,  
Little Grains of Sand,  
Make the mighty ocean,  
And the pleasant land,  
Little Words of Kindness  
Little deeds of love  
Make this earth an Eden  
Like to that above.

Haden Crews enlisted in the Civil War, contracted measles that settled on his lungs and was sent home to die.

Cassius Marcellus Crews was born in 1851 in a house located at the juncture of Garrard, Madison and Rockcastle Counties. He married Mary Francis Croucher, born 1854, in Rockcastle County. She was descended from a family of the name of Croucher, who went to Virginia and met and married a Miss Flowers, from England, and brought her back to Rockcastle County. He had a daughter captured by the Indians and kept by them some time before being recaptured and brought back home. She could not adjust to *wild life* and later returned to the tribe and married an Indian.

It is possible that the two Crews men involved in the suit at Boonesborough were David and Thomas Crews, as the census report of 1890 lists them as living in Madison County. One of them is said to have been a very wealthy man, who had left the equivalent of \$250,000 in the Bank of England. A descendant of the family made three trips to England in an attempt to collect the money said to have been deposited. He was told by the bank that it would bankrupt the institution to pay the debt, with accrued interest, but that it would be paid if the proper papers could be produced, which apparently could not be done.

My interest in the Crews family centers largely around James Crews, 1807-1862, who built and for many years operated Crews Ferry on Rockcastle River above Lamer, Kentucky and just below the mouth of Horse Lick Creek. This ferry served the Madison Branch of the Wilderness Road, known at the time as Old State Road, over which there was an established stage coach route for a number of years. Crews also operated a tavern at this stand and in addition to a stable to take care of the horses for the stage coach line and horseback travelers, also maintained stock pens for the overnight accommodation of livestock and poultry being driven to southern markets over the Old State Road, which furnished an outlet for the livestock and produce of much of the Blue Grass region.

Elsewhere in this volume will be found a more complete account of James Crews and his Crews Ferry. There was another and larger ferry of the same name in Madison County, probably owned and operated by David Crews. I have not been able to trace the immediate ancestors of James Crews and his brother, who is said to have been at one time interested with him in the operation of the ferry.

A James Crews, whether this man or another, married Jalia Lovins, whose family lived around Lamer. Their daughter married an early Rockcastle settler, Charles Reid, who built and occupied the big house near Mt. Vernon, later owned by Ernest Bullock. Their daughter, Jalia Reid, married a Dr. Cooper, who established practice in Livingston, Kentucky and whose office I visited often as a child. His brother-in-law, Dr. Reid, who grew up around Mt. Vernon, was a surgeon with the Seventh Cavalry, a part of which met its fate with its commander, Lt. Colonel George A. Custer, at the Little Big Horn. There is a story, as yet unauthenticated, of how Dr. Reid escaped being present at this battle and sharing the fate of his comrades. I recall that Dr. Reid had sent home various mementos such as bows and arrows, an Indian headdress and buckskin jacket, which Dr. Cooper kept on display in his office. Another possible connection with the Crews family was that my wife's grandfather was in some way related to them and used to make visits to them in both Rockcastle and

Madison Counties. Many older members of the Crews family lived in Madison County and many are buried in the old cemetery at Seaford Cane. I understand that a number of the family name also settled in Jackson County but have never been able to find from which group James Crews was descended. The more detailed story concerning him, previously alluded to, will be found to be among the most interesting in this book.

**PEARL:** First of this name to come to America was a sea captain from Bristol, England, who came over in 1748. His son, William Pearl, came from France County, Virginia to Crab Orchard, Kentucky around 1780. His son, John Pearl, was born in 1777. The wife of William Pearl, Sr., probated in 1800, lists 10 children of whom William, John and Henry were the three oldest in order named.

John Pearl was a stockman and trader, driving horses from Kentucky to Virginia for purpose of sale. At one of the roadside taverns at which he generally stopped, he met his future wife, Sarah Crosby Kerr, daughter of the proprietor. Her parents were much opposed to the match, looking with such disfavor upon a migratory horse trader that they disinherited her.

John Pearl built his cabin and raised his family on Hazelpatch Creek, on a location included in Rockcastle County, until that portion of the county was cut off and included in the boundary of Laurel County at its formation in 1825. His home was on the original boundary line of Rockcastle when it was surveyed in 1810. John Pearl had come from Crab Orchard with his brother William to what is now Laurel County to bury the victims of the Indian massacre at McFarland's Defeat. His home was so impressed with the country that they later returned and purchased 12,000 acres of land on which to make their future homes. William settled somewhere along Rockcastle River and John at Hazelpatch, as previously noted. His home was on Hazelpatch Creek, a short distance north of Old U.S. 25 near the spot where Boone's Road left the earlier path that led to Logan's Fort, the present Stanford, Kentucky.

William Pearl had married Elizabeth Alkman in Lincoln County in 1796. They had several children, most of them moving west to California and Texas. John Pearl and his wife, the former Sarah Crosby Kerr, were parents of 10 children, many of whom remained in Laurel County at its formation in 1825. His home was the eldest son, George Granville Pearl, born at the old Hazelpatch home, in 1817, became an attorney and for 12 years served as Circuit Judge in an area covering a large part of Eastern and Southeastern Kentucky. He also served 6 years as Commonwealth Attorney and was a member of the Kentucky Legislature.

While Judge Pearl's parents were living on Hazelpatch Creek, his mother's sister, Annabelle Kerr, came to live with them bringing along her personal slaves. Twenty-four of them were living at the time of her death when she willed them to her nephew, Judge Pearl. It is likely that from someone in this group was descended the negro boy, Tom Pearl, later hanged at Mt. Vernon, being one of the three men legally hanged in the history of Rockcastle County. His former owner, a Judge Pearl, was in the title living on the old Charlie Lovell Farm near Burr in this county.

Judge Granville Pearl was married twice. His first wife was Miss Sarah E. Slaughter. There were no children. He next married Elizabeth Adams, daughter of Willis and Helen Hyatt Adams of Mt. Vernon. Their children were John, Helen, Sally, Christopher and William.

The Landrum family of Mt. Vernon were partly descended from the Perais, coming down through a daughter of the original settler, John Pearl, of Hazelpatch Creek.

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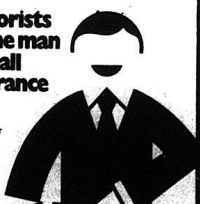
