The Mt. Vernon City Council voted at its regular monthly meeting Monday night to approve the state's municipal aid program in the amount of \$6,393.00.

More than half a million dollars has been appropriated for a forestry incentive program of Kentucky.

The \$533,000 appropriated by Congress for the cost sharing program in Kentucky is being distributed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Services (ASCS) in cooperation with the Division of Forestry.

Ray Swatzyna, chief of management for the forestry division, which is encouraging landowners to participate in the program explained how to obtain the funds.

First, the landowner must examine the land and make specific recommendations on either tree pinatung or timber stand improvement. They might, for example, recommend the types of trees to be planted or the amount of pruning to be done.

The landowner, who must consider the landowner, who must collow the forester's secommendations, then earnies out the work and notifies the forester discommendations, then earnies out the work and notifies the forester inspects the area, a statement documenting the completed work and a list of expenses is sent to the county ASCS office. If the ASCS committee rules that the recommendations have been fulfilled and that the expenses are valid, the landowifer is sent a relimbursement. The cost sharing program is

check.

The cost sharing program is
significant for Kentucky, said
Swatzyna, because it encourages many landowners to plant
trees and make timber stand

The program's popularity
was evident even last year,

#### Rockcastle Recollections OJaha Lah

CREWS: Several years ago, when I acquired the old Crews Ferry Property, I made an attempt to discover something of the history of the Crews Fully, but was never able to learn much concerning them. I understand that possibly the first of the name to come to America was from Germany and apelled his name Cruss or Cruss. He settled in Pennsylvania in a place later known as Crews Valley - Crews being the English spelling of his name.

At an unknown date, he settled in Boonesborough where he married an Indian woman and raised a son, Andrew Jackson Crews, who became a close friend of Greene Clay, son of Cassius M. Clay, a controversial Eggen of Cassius M. Clay, a controversial Eggen of the Clay of Cassius M. Clay, a controversial Eggen of the Clay of Cassius M. He married Zobina Christopher in 1838 in Madison County, Kentucky and removed from there to Rockcastle County before 1850. Their children were: Haden, Mirram, Margaret, Kate, Belle, John, Cassius Marcellus, Ari Ida, Andrew, Whitfield, Jenny and Richard, Haden, the eldest, was a college man, teacher and poet. It is remembered in the family that he wrote poems for children, one of them being a favortie in earlier school books.

Haden Crews enlisted in the Civil War, contracted measles that settled on his lungs and was sent home to die.

Cassius Marcellus Crews was born in 1851 in a bouse located at the juncture of Garrard. Madison and Rockcastle Counties. He married Mary Francis Croucher, born 1854, in Rockcastle County. She was descended from a circuit-friding preacher named Croucher, who went to Virginia and met and married a Miss Flowers, from Bagiand, and brought her back to Rockcastle County. He had a daughter captured by the Indians and kept by them some time before being recaptured and brought back home. She could not adjust to civilized life and later returned to the tribe and married an Indian.

It is possible that the two Crews men involved in the suit at Bonneshorough were David and Thomas Crews, as the census report of 1890 lists them as living in Madison County. One of them is asid to have been a very wealth man, who had left the equivalent of 2590,000 in the Bank of England. A descendant of the family made three trips to England in an attempt to collect the money said to have been deposited. He was told by the bank that it would bankrupt the institution to pay the debt, with accrued interest. but that it would be paid if the proper papers could be produced, which apparently could not be done.

My interest in the Crews family centers largely around James Crews, 1897-1882, who built and for many years operated Crews Ferry on Rockstalte River above Lamers, Kentucky and just below the mouth of Horse Lick Creek. This ferry serviced the Madison Branch of the Wilderness Road, known at the time as Old State Road, over which there was an established stage coach route for a number of years. Crews also operated a tavern at this stand and in addition to a stable to take care of the horses for the stage coach line and horseback travelers, also maintained stock pens for the overnight accommodation of livestock and poultry being driven to southern markets over the Old State Road, which furnished an outlet for the livestock and produce "4" much of the Blue Grass region.

Elsewhere in this volume will be found a more complete account of James Crews and his Crews Perry. There was another and larger ferry of the same name in Madion County, probably owned and operated by David Crews. I have not been able to trace the immediate ancestors of James Crews and his brother, who is said to have been at one time interested with him in the operation of the ferry.

Their daughter married an early Rockcastle settler, Charles Redd, who built and occupied the ligh house near Mt. Vernon, later owned by Ernest Bullock. Their daughter.
