Some gardeners lessen the work involved in securing and eracting supports by planting pole beans in their corn patches and letting them vine up the stalk.

The tests showed that other than keeping the weeds from 'taking out the beans, little other banefit resulted. As the spores of the fungus causing rust and possibly other diseases are sailly carried from sick to healthy plants at such times, Roberts says that cultivation should never be attempted when been vines are wet.





For example, one candidate felt he had to spend half a million dollars, more than the test, of the general primary four years ago, just to achieve the name recognition to become a viable candidate for lieutenant governor.

Another candidate in the same race tass his personal

Another candidate in the same race taps his personal finances for more than \$100,000. He hadn't intended it that way. He had hoped for a grass roots fund raising campaign with a \$100 lid on contributions, but the donations never materialized.

Of course, no one, especially Gov. Julian Carroll, its going to relax that much in any campaign.

Carroll justifies his massive expenditures by saying the real difference is that he is reporting. Saying for all his transportation, that all his campaign workers are on his campaign workers are on his campaign payroll. However, this justification misses the point of responsible criticisms.

In the end, those justification only tell us that high spending was even higher than we thought before.

Rockcastle Recollections

Richard H. Collins in revising his father's History of Kentucky in 1874, states that Stephen Langford was one of the first settlers in the county and was then living at Mt. Vernon. In spite of this early appearance of the Langford family, it is one of the most difficult of all to trace, largely because there were two Stepheng, Langfords.

A few years ago! had a visit from a great-great grandene of one of them. He told me that they were cousins, one coming to Rockeastle County from North Carolns, the other from Virginia. My informat was descended from the North Carolina branch but seemed to be better informed on the Stephen Langdord from Virginia. He knew, for instance, that he was the son of Robert Langdord and the father of Henry Langdord, whose son Liberty, was the latent other than the contract of the state of the contract of the contra

My informant stated that the North Carolina Stephen probably did not come to Rockcastle County before the War of 1812, in which he saw service. According to my records there was a Stephen Langford who enlisted under Captain (later General) William Smith under date of September 18, 1812. Since there was a Robert Langford enlisted at the same time I had always assumed that they were father and the same time I had always assumed that they

In 1812 another 2,000 arcs grant located on Goose Creek was issued to a Stephen Langtord. Then in 1819 begins another series of land grants in the name of Stephen Langtord, mostly in Pulaski and Rockeastie Counties. These continue through 1849. Since it seems unlikely that one man would be engaged in taking up land from 1971 to 1849, I am inclined to believe that grants issued from 1824 were to Stephen Langtord, son of Robert, and those issued between 1824 to the other Stephen, the one coming to this county later and hailing from North Carolina. Yet we are told by our North Carolina informant that this Stephen Langtord once owned 18 arcse of land where Mt. Vernon now stands and later willed it to his daughter, who married a man named Anderson, but he did not know the date of such transactions.

he did not know the date of such transactions.

A most surprising fact is that no Stephen Langford shows on the census reports of Rockcastle County after 1810, and the name of Robert Langford does not appear until 1930. Benjamin, Mary and Stephen Langford are shown in Licoth Rockcastle County, after 1810, and the name of 1790. In the second census, 1800, Mary is shown still at the same location, all others are absent. There is the possibility that the Virginia Stephen died after the 1810 census and before that of 1920. The name of his wife, the former Lois Mullins, still appears on both the 1820 and 1830 census and I have no record of the 1840 and 1850 report. Although local tradition should that the North Carolinan lived for several years in Rockcastle County, the theory of 1974, there are no census records to indicate that he every lived in Rockcastle County. Descendants yet living remember many pricidents of his life here, and there seems to be no doubt of his existence.

It is confusing to note that this deed was executed in 1809, while the Goose Creek area which they had secured by purchase rather than by patent. The low price for which this 600 acre tract was sold is explained by the stipulation that if it was claimed by someone with a prior claim the Langfords would not be liable for a refund of the money.

After many weeks of research we do not seem to be much closer to solving the mystery of which Stephen Langford did what. The problem is further complicating by the question of which of the three "Old Langford Flouses" was the site of "Langfords Tavern" on the early Wilderness Road. Before our search is done we may find that all three served as taverns at one time or another, a matter to be more throughly gose into in the chapter on old

Before we leave the subject of Stephen Langford there are others of that anne to be noted. Probably the best known of these lived in Madison and at the time of his death had become very obese, weighing it is claimed by some, in the neighborhood of four hundred pounds. Prior to his death, he had requested that be buried in a stone coffin and had had such a coffin prepared and kept in readiness. It was so heavy that when it became necessary to to haul it. From the similarity of names one would infer that he was descended from one of the two Stephen Langfords concerned in this sketch, but nothing is certainly known of this.

A Stephen Langford, born in 1840, a son of William Langford, who was a son of Pioneer Robert and Nancy Newcomb Langford, had a brother. Mose, who married Ella Branaman and was the father of a boyhood friend of mine named Stephen Langford.

They had to keep him chained two or three years before he became tamed enough to be allowed to run loose, but they were never able to break him from capturing and eating wild animals, run. 

Your plants should be to a good start by now. Your main concern now until frost will be to keep weeds, insects and disease under control.

WEED CONTROL:

If you are cultivating for weed control, cultivate very shallow. Deep cultivation will cut the pepper roots and keep the plant stunded. Root pruning will also cause the flowers to drop. Eniske or dyraid can be applied up to 2 to Juwesha after remove existing weeds before applying the enide or dymid.

Fursdan has an advantage over the use of Savin because the performance of systemic material is working for us before the insect becomes noticeable.

Furdan 10 percent granular should be applied to pepper ground in two applications. The first by sidedressing 2 to 4 weeks after transplanting at the rate of 20 pounds per acre. Do not make the second application 4 to 6 weeks later using 30 pounds per acre.
