SHORT ROWS

Gardening Tips from Extension Specialists at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture

Few things out of the garden taste better than a kettle of slowly-cooked, well-seasoned white half-runners or some other variety of green snap beans. Served up with boiled corn, sliced tomatoes or cucumbers, and wedges of good thick cornbread, the taste approaches the sublime.

The beauty of the green bean is that it can grow just about anywhere—in rows in the garden, on a trellis in a flower bed, on a string tied to the post of a sunny porch, or along a yard fence. It is, however, subject to blights, various diseases, and the ravages of the Mexican bean beetle, but most of these problems can be controlled with fungicides and insecticides.

The snap bean comes in two types—bunch and pole. According to UK Extension vegetable specialist C.R. Roberts, the bush type requires less space and reaches itself for the pot a few days sooner than the pole bean—usually in from 50 to 60 days from time of planting. The pole bean, that requires some form of support upon which to grow, requires about 65 days from seedtime to harvest and will usually bear over a longer period of time. Some gardeners lessen the work involved in securing and erecting supports by planting pole beans in their corn patches and letting them vine up the stalks.

Bush snap beans, Roberts says, require moderately fertile soil and should be

planted in rows 24 to 30 inches apart. Seed should be spaced 2 inches apart in the row and planted from 1 to 1½ inches deep. Pole beans should be planted in rows 48 to 60 inches apart and in hills about 36 inches apart.

Common beans are very susceptible to damage by frost and are not usually planted until after that danger is over. But some home gardeners often take chances on frost and make small plantings early in the season. If the frost stays away, well and good. If not, little harm has been done and the crop can be replanted. In Kentucky, snap bean plantings can be made with reasonable expectations of a satisfactory harvest up until August 15.

Since bean roots grow close to the surface of the ground, Roberts recommends clean, shallow cultivation. Deep cultivation is likely to cause injury by destroying the roots near the surface. Actually, as tests have shown, were it not for the necessity for weed control, bean cultivation would not be required at all. The tests showed that other than keeping the weeds from taking over and smothering out the beans, little other benefit resulted.

As the spores of the fungus causing rust and possibly other diseases are easily carried from sick to healthy plants at such times, Roberts says that cultivation should never be attempted when bean vines are wet.

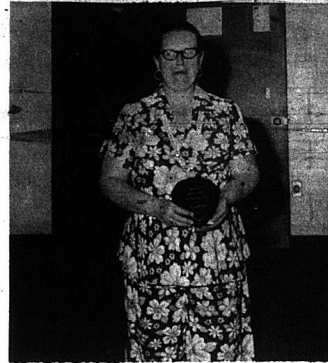

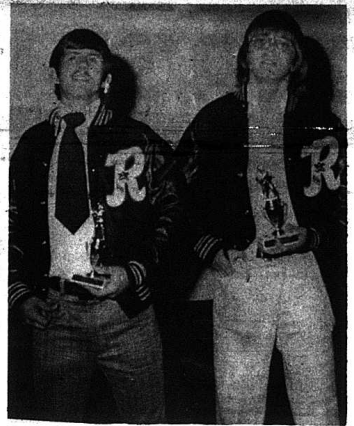

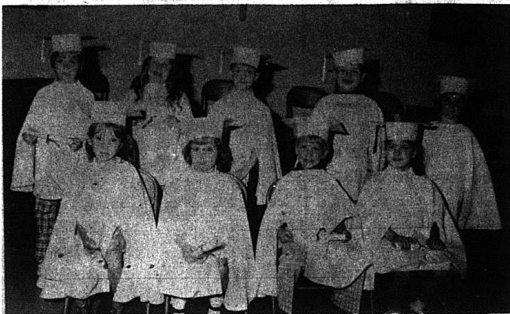

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Rogers Wins Senate Race In Light Voter Turn-out

Rockcastle Countians gave a 15-vote margin to Attorney John D. Rogers in the 15th Senatorial District and Mr. Rogers won the election in the district over his opponents, Leonard Hislop and Wayne VanHook.

Rogers came out of Rockcastle County with 205 votes; William VanHook tabulated 190 and Leonard Hislop got 111. George V. Carmine ran a poor fourth with 32 votes. Besides Rockcastle County, Rogers carried Pulaski County.

Democrats in Rockcastle County went with other voters in the state and gave Carroll a resounding 500 vote margin over Hollenbach; however, local Democrats went for Ewart Johnson for Lieutenant Governor over Thelma Stovall, the winner state-wide.

They agreed with other voters in their choice of a nominee for Secretary of State, giving Drexell Davis 192 votes to his nearest opponent, J.P. Sullivan's 63. However, in the race for the Attorney General nomination, Rockcastle County Democrats gave a clear edge to Arthur Samuel while he was not in the running state-wide. That race is still not decided between Anthony "Tony" Wilhoit, who tabulated 55 votes locally, and Robert C. Stephens, who got 92 votes in Rockcastle County.

For Auditor of Public Accounts, George Atkins carried Rockcastle County with 219 votes while his nearest opponent, Landon Whitaker, was tabulating 42. For State Treasurer, Frances Jones Mills received the approval of Rockcastle Countians with 329 votes and Ms. Mills also carried the election state-wide heavily.

Tom Harris, candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture, polled 239 votes in Rockcastle County and his nearest opponent, Bev Yeiser, Sr. tabulated 68. However, that race has been decided state-wide as of yet.

For Clerk of the Court of Appeals, Martha Layne Collins received 196 votes locally and was the only one to get the ballot for local offices was for

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Constable and Dennis Ray Chaney defeated Delno McClure for the office in the second district and C.L. York won over the fourth district over Barum Byrd.

The Republicans had a lot less to choose from on the ballot; but, Rockcastle County Republicans went along with the state and gave Robert E. "Bob" Gable a clear majority over his nearest opponent, Elmer Begley, Jr. Gabe polled 247 votes while Begley was tabulating 176 votes locally.

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They agreed with other voters in their choice of a nominee for Secretary of State, giving Drexell Davis 192 votes to his nearest opponent, J.P. Sullivan's 63. However, in the race for the Attorney General nomination, Rockcastle County Democrats gave a clear edge to Arthur Samuel while he was not in the running state-wide. 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Shirley Palmer-Ball won the Republican nomination for Lieutenant Governor and polled 160 votes locally while Bob Berry was polling 127.

All in all it was a pretty lackluster election with Rockcastle County Democrats managing only to turn out only 647 voters in the Governor's election and the Republicans were even worse off with a total of 588 votes cast in the heaviest voted race - that of the race for the 15th Senatorial District seat.

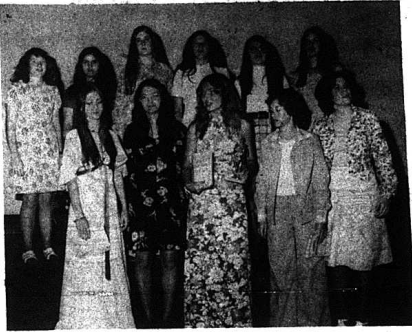

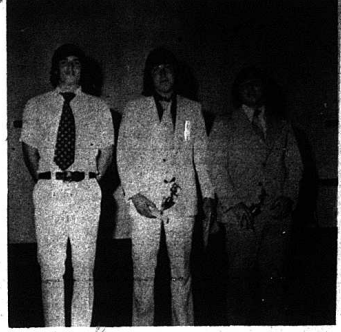

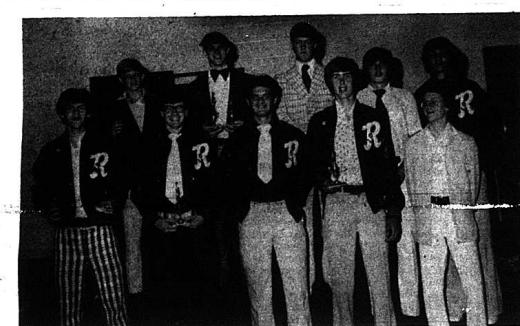

This year's primary elections present a dramatic case for some change in how political campaigns are financed in Kentucky.

For example, one candidate felt he had to spend half a million dollars, more than the rest of the gubernatorial primary four years ago, just to achieve the name recognition to become a viable candidate for Lieutenant governor.

Another candidate in the same race taps his personal finances for more than \$100,000. He hadn't intended it that way. He had hoped for a grass roots fund raising campaign with a \$100 lid on contributions, but the donations never materialized.

A candidate for governor spends more than three quarters of a million dollars in a campaign many people thought he could virtually sleep through and win.

Of course, no one, especially Gov. Julian Carroll, is going to relax that much in any campaign.

Carroll justifies his massive expenditures by saying the real difference is that he is reporting "all" his expenses, that he is paying for all his transportation, that all his campaign workers are on his campaign payroll.

However, this justification misses the point of responsible criticism.

In the end, those justifications only tell us that high spending was even higher than we thought before.

Reporting "all" of the spending is good, but it does not subtract from the impact of the high cost of political campaigns.

For Julian Carroll, it means he spent two or three dollars a vote for every vote he got in the primary.

For Wayne Rutherford, it means he has spent twice that much or more for every vote in his race for lieutenant governor.

There will be losers in each race who spent more than a dollar a vote.

It goes strongly against the grain of politics to seek to limit campaign spending for individual donations, and for every good reason.

Winners are generally quite unconcerned about the high cost of campaigning since they have or had no trouble raising the money themselves.

Those candidates with the strongest inclination toward reform of campaign spending are those who lost and were unable to come up with the funds they needed to run the kind of race they needed to run. If there is to be any reform, it will not be a simple thing to accomplish.

For example, it would be difficult to lower the lid on individual contributions without placing a lid on overall spending.

If the individual contribution ceiling of \$3000 were lowered without the total amount possible being fixed, it would likely only encourage more and more "laundering" of donations.

Without changing any of the financing laws now on the books, perhaps the best and quickest means to campaign spending reform appears to be simply paying more than lip service to the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance.

Properly staffed and funded, the Registry could go a long way toward curing election finance violations in Kentucky.

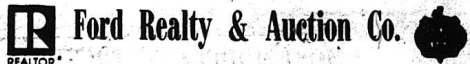

Miss Sharon Hurley presided at the guest register. Rice packets were distributed by Melinda Rowlette.

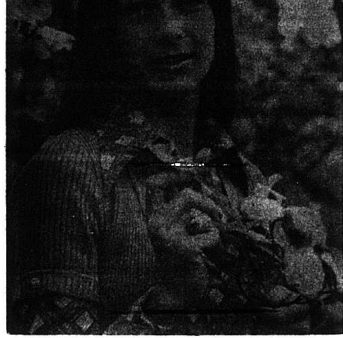

Rockcastle Recollections

Richard H. Collins in revising his father's History of Kentucky in 1874, states that Stephen Langford was one of the first settlers in the county and was then living at Mt. Vernon. In spite of this early appearance of the Langford family, it is one of the most difficult of all to trace, largely because there were two Stephens Langfords.

A few years ago I had a visit from a great-great grandson of one of them. He told me that they were cousins, one coming to Rockcastle County from North Carolina, the other from Virginia. My informant was descended from the North Carolina branch but seemed to be better informed on the Stephen Langford from Virginia. He knew, for instance, that he was the son of Robert Langford and the father of Henry Langford, whose son, Liberty, was the father of Tip Langford, long prominent in Rockcastle County politics. The other Stephen's father was a brother to Robert. They were two of the four sons of Thomas Langford, who came to America from Ireland at a date now unknown.

My informant stated that the North Carolina branch probably did not come to Rockcastle County before the War of 1812, which was his service. According to my records there was a Stephen Langford who enlisted under Captain (later General) William Smith under date of September 18, 1812. Since there was a Robert Langford enlisted at the same time I had always assumed that they were father and son.

Another point of possible misunderstanding lies in the land office reports covering grants to Stephen Langford. Between 1791 and 1798 5,840 acres of land were assigned to a Stephen Langford, none located closer to Mt. Vernon than a 2,000 acre survey on Skages Creek. In 1812 another 2,000 acre grant located on Goose Creek was issued to a Stephen Langford. Then in 1819 began another series of land grants in the name of Stephen Langford, mostly in Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties. These continue through 1849. Since it seems unlikely that one man would be engaged in taking up land from 1791 to 1849, I am inclined to believe that grants on both the 1820 and 1830 census and I have no record of the 1840 and 1850 report. Although local tradition holds that the North Carolinian lived for several years in Rockcastle County, in the very old Langford house on Rockcastle River, destroyed in the cyclone of 1914, there are no census records to indicate that he ever lived in Rockcastle County. Descendants yet living remember many incidents of his life here, and there seems to be no doubt of his existence.

A long and careful search of land grant records in Frankfort might produce evidence that would help to straighten out the identities of the two Stephen Langfords where such confusion now exists, but that would take time which cannot be allowed for such search. We seem safe in assuming that the two men named Stephen Langford were living in Rockcastle County at two closely approximated periods of time; that is, "one from Virginia" as says before 1790 and "one up west tract" from before 1798, while the one from North Carolina did not reach here much before 1812 and took up many grants, many in the same area, up until 1849.

In the case of the 2,000 acre grant on Goose Creek, it was first bought that since it was registered in 1812 it might possibly have been taken up by the North Carolina Stephen, but a note from Jess Wilson, Director of Public Relations for Jackson County Rural Electric and himself an indefatigable researcher, tells me that he was discovered in the County Court Clerk's Office for Clay County, a deed for 800 acres of land transferred by Stephen Langford to his wife, from an old patent, to James and Hugh White, for the sum of \$45.00. Since the wife's name is Lois, the name of the wife of Virginia Stephen, there can be no doubt that he was the one to whom the Goose Creek grant was made. It is to be noted that this deed was executed in 1809, while the Goose Creek area which they had secured by purchase rather than by patent. The low price for which this 800 acre tract was sold is explained by the stipulation that it was claimed by someone other than the Langfords would not be liable for a refund of the money.

After many weeks of research we do not seem to be much closer to solving the mystery of which Stephen Langford did what. The problem is further complicated by the question of which of the three "Old Langford Houses" was the site of "Langford's Tavern" on the early Wilderness Road. Before our search is done we may find that all three served as taverns at one time or another, a matter to be more thoroughly gone into in the chapter on old houses.

Before we leave the subject of Stephen Langford there are others of that name to be noted. Probably the best known of these lives in Madison and at the time of his death had become very obese, weighing it is claimed by some, in the neighborhood of four hundred pounds. Prior to his death, he had requested that he be buried in a stone coffin and had such a coffin prepared and kept in readiness. It was so heavy that when it became necessary to take it to the cemetery two or more teams of mules were required to haul it. From the similarity of names one would infer that he was descended from one of the two Stephen Langfords concerned in this sketch, but nothing is certainly known of this.

A Stephen Langford, born in 1840, a son of William Langford, who was a son of Pioneer Robert and Nancy Newcomb Langford, had a brother, Mose, who married Eliza Brannan and was the father of a boyhood friend of mine named Stephen Langford.

It is told in the Langford family that the Pioneer Robert Langford and his wife, formerly Francis Head, for a while lived in the woods who ran like a deer when he saw anybody. They finally found him asleep in a hollow tree and captured him. They had to keep him chained two or three years before he became tamed enough to be allowed to run loose, but they were never able to capture him again. He was a small boy and his father killed his mother on a boat. He jumped off, swam ashore, and learned to live in the wilderness.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

PEPPER PRODUCTION WEED CONTROL* INSECT AND DISEASE CONTROL

Your plants should be to a good start by now. Your main concern now until frost will be to keep weeds, insects and disease under control.

WEED CONTROL:

If you are cultivating for weed control, cultivate very shallow. Deep cultivation will cut the pepper roots and keep the plant stunted. Root pruning will also cause the flowers to drop. Earth or dumd can be applied up to 2 to 3 weeks after transplanting. Cultivate to remove existing weeds before applying the emde or dumd.

INSECT CONTROL:

The pepper maggot, aphids (plant louse) and the European corn borer are the major insect pests to be concerned about. Using the proper materials, attaining good coverage of the material at the proper time are important factors in getting good insect control. Walk through your field every few days, look on the underside of leaves as well as the growing tops of the plants for signs of pest. Aphids (plant louse) are causing plants to show signs of wilt, spray plants with Thiodan using 1 to 2 pounds of 50 percent wettable powder or 100 gallons of water or 8-12 tablespoon per gallon of water. Thiodan will help to control most other sucking pests. For the European corn

borer, Sevins and Furadan are recommended. If sevins is used as foliar spray, you will need to begin application as soon as fruit set occurs and continue application every 7 to 10 days through September for good control. Apply at the rate of 2 to 4 pounds of 50 percent wettable powder per acre of 6 to 12 tablepoons per gallon of water. Furadan is a systemic insecticide that can be used to control the green peach aphid and European corn borer and must be applied to the soil and incorporated. It is taken up through the roots of the plant to give protection to the above ground parts. Furadan has an advantage over the use of Sevins because the performance of a systemic material is working for us before the insect becomes noticeable.

Furdan 10 percent granular should be applied to pepper ground in two applications. The first by side dressing 2 to 4 weeks after transplanting at the rate of 20 pounds per acre of 20 pounds per acre, and the second application 4 to 6 weeks later using 30 pounds per acre. Do not make the second application within 21 days of harvest. In the process of addressing Furadan, make sure it is thoroughly incorporated and not left exposed on top of the soil. Place Furadan in as near base of plant as possible without root pruning.

The major disease problems on peppers in Kentucky have been bacterial leaf spot, Tobacco etch virus, Southern Stem blight and blossom end rot. Anthracnose is a fungus disease that can become a problem some years. Bacterial leaf spot shows up as small spots on the lower leaves of the plants when there is prolonged periods of moisture. If bacterial leaf spot begins showing up on leaves, spray plants with fixed copper 53-83 percent wettable powder using 2 to 3 pounds per acre in 100 gallons of water or 2 to 3 teaspoons per gallon of water. Spray every 7 days and after each rain. Tobacco etch virus can be controlled by controlling weeds and aphids. Southern stem blight can be prevented by good cultural practices. Rotation is recommended so that pepper does not follow pepper on the same field. Early plowing of the soil will also help. Blossom and rot results from lack of calcium in the cells of the pepper fruit limiting of your soil and providing a uniform moisture level will help to prevent this problem. Anthracnose causes rot spots on the fruit and can be

controlled by timely sprays of zineb or maneb. Apply at the rate of 3 pounds per acre or 1 1/2 tablepoons per gallon of water.

ARMYWORMS IN CORN AND SMALL GRAINS

Farmers should be alerted to check their corn and small grain fields for Armyworms damage. Armyworms were found in the West Kentucky this week. Armyworms prefer low, wet areas covered by rank stands of grain. These dark green worms with white stripes on the sides hide under clods or in the center leaves of the plant during the day and feed mainly at night. Keep this habit in mind when surveying for this pest. Damage is more prevalent to corn planted no-till. The moths lay their eggs in the grass sod prior to no-till planting and after this grass is killed with herbicides the worms feed on the newly emerged corn. As far as small grains, more armyworms are generally found in barely than wheat. Although the armyworms is primarily a foliage feeder they also feed on tender kernels and frequently will cut through the stem a short distance from the head. Most of the larvae now being found in small grain are quite small which means they will feed at least another three weeks.

When there are as many as four worms/square foot then controls are justified.

CUTWORMS: Because of wet weather farmers should also be looking for possible cutworms infestation, especially in no-till corn.

For Armyworm control on smallgrains use Dylox, Toxaphene and Malathion.

For Armyworm control on corn use Sevins, Toxaphene, Dylox and Malathion.

Remember - read the insecticide container label!
