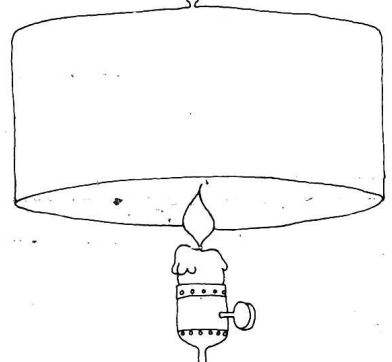

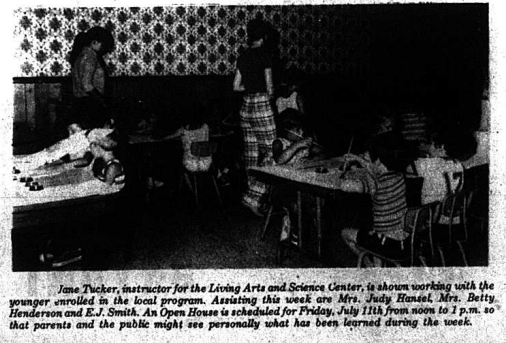

When the "program" budget was implemented for the first time in 1974 under then Gov. Wendell Ford it was touted as a major change that would bring a better understanding of how government and its myriad agencies were operating.

However, deeply concerned about what he considers a gross lack of accountability for tax money in the program budget format, Gov. Julian Carroll is already at work on the 1975-76 biennial document.

While aides indicate the governor is not opposed to program budgeting as a format, he wants to make some changes to see to it that somewhere down the line some individual can be called upon to account for the manner in which certain funds were spent.

The difficulty currently is taking place because so many programs cross division and departmental lines.

In the former budgeting methods, agencies were allotted certain amounts of money and could be taken to task for the use of that money.

The fly in that ointment was that while a certain individual could be pinpointed, it was difficult, if not impossible, to tell how much was being spent on certain specific programs. Many, many programs overlapped more than one agency.

In a way, the problem now is virtually the same as the earlier problem, just reversed.

While it is apparent that resolving the problem is many months away, Carroll has already been conducting informal meetings with key personnel, most frequently from the Department for Finance and Administration, in preparation for the drafting of a budget

document.

Carroll has indicated that he has a "unique" opportunity, as an incumbent governor running for a full term to get ahead start on his first executive budget, assuming he wins in November.

Drafting a budget has been a continuing problem for Kentucky governors, who take office little more than a month before their first budget is presented to the General Assembly, which, in turn, consistently describes its own lack of time to adequately analyze the chief executive's proposals.

Indications are that Carroll will be shooting for a very early delivery of the budget document to the legislature, and while there is certainly no legal requirement to do so, there are also indications he will be consulting with legislators somewhat in the drafting stages.

On a somewhat related subject, it now appears that Carroll is planning no major changes in Ford's reorganization of state government.

When Carroll first took office, there was a great deal of speculation that the massive Department for Human Resources, under whose roof a third of all state employees work, might be taken apart.

John Nichols, Carroll's press secretary, says that the changes have not been or will be made would involve changes recommended by the department and agency heads, most often in executive orders or regulations.

These might include such things as alterations in the chain of supervision in some areas, or hiring more personnel to process food stamp or

unemployment claims as necessitated by the economic crunch.

Nichols stated flatly that the governor has no plans for any major reorganization of any of the departments.

"Raise your hand, Todd" - Governor Carroll swears it was an unintentional slip of the tongue, but that's what he said when he introduced Jefferson County Judge Todd Hollenbach at recent ceremonies freeing the Kentucky Turnpike from tolls.

Only a few weeks before, Carroll had swamped Hollenbach in the gubernatorial primary by 150,000 votes, and Carroll's aides say the habit of asking people to raise their hands for recognition was just habit from the campaign trail.

HORTICULTURE FIELD DAY

Plan now to attend the 1975 Horticulture Field Days, The Fields Days will be held on Saturday and Sunday, July 26 and 27, in the Landscape Garden Center on the University of Kentucky Campus. You will have the opportunity to tour the Landscape Garden Center and see an extensive planting of annual flowers, trees, shrubs, vegetables, and fruits which are being evaluated for use in Kentucky. Included in these plantings is an All-American Annual flower trials as well as an All-American vegetable trials. For the indoor gardener there will be an exhibit of foliage plants with some of newer varieties. Bring along any questions about plant culture to ask College of Agriculture personnel who will be stationed in the Landscape Garden Center from 1:50 on each of two days. If you cannot make it to Lexington for the field days, plan to visit the Landscape Garden Center on weekdays or week ends throughout the year.

LATE SUMMER SEEDINGS

Late summer is a good time to seed many forage crops, such as cool-season grasses, alfalfa, and small grains. If you are planning to seed these forages follow these principles to increase your chances of success.

1. Test the soil and apply necessary fertilizer and lime.
2. Prepare firm weed-free seedbed.
3. Use good quality seed of a recommended variety. Certified seed assures you of high quality.
4. Seed early and cover seed lightly.
5. Inoculate all legumes at the time of seeding.

Moisture is usually a key to success or failure during establishment. You can increase your chances of success by having the seedbed prepared and seed ready, after an inch or so of rain and as soon as you can get on the field, seed. This practice will insure that enough moisture is available not only for germination but for the newly germinated seedlings to get off to a good start.

TOMATO

Tomato plants in many parts of the state are heavily infected with early blight disease caused by *Alternaria solani*. The growth of this fungus is favored by warm, humid weather. Many growers, observing the 5 day waiting period following the use of zinc-maneb (Dithane M-45, Manzate 200) and other maneb fungicides, are not continuing with fungicide spray schedules now that tomatoes are being harvested. If the tomato-plant remains bright, continued fungicide applications are advised. Bravo, Dyrene, and Fixed copper fungicides can all be used through harvest.

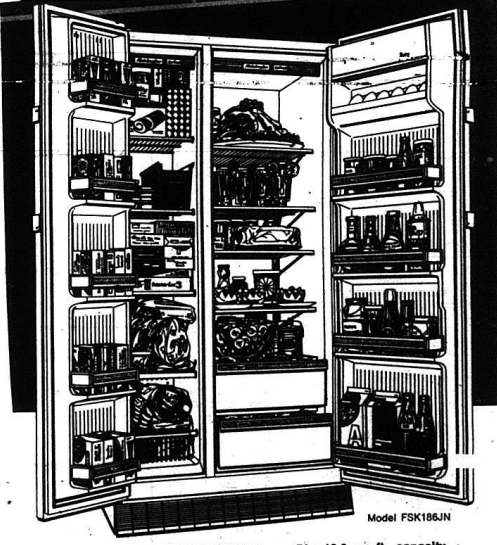

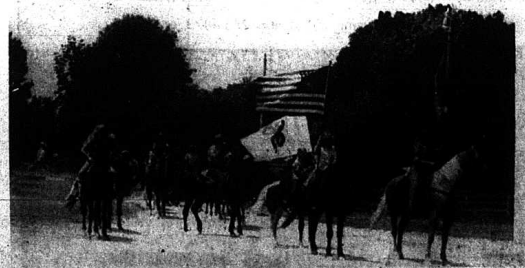

Souvenir Taking To Be Stopped

Each year hundreds of pieces of the puzzle drift away to amateur collections, junk boxes and dozens of other private places. Already several pictures of the past have been lost through unknowing or deliberate vandalism by the thousands of visitors to the Daniel Boone National Forest, including the Red River Gorge.

Forest Service officials who manage the 25,600-acre geological area intend to crack down this vacation season on visitors who damage or remove articles from the historic sites and cliffs. Arrowhead gatherers, by digging for artifacts from the past Indian cultures, are liable for a \$500 fine or imprisonment. The statute behind the Forest Service program is the American Antiquities Act. For more than 70 years it has been illegal to excavate or destroy any historic ruin on Federally controlled land.

Several sites in the Gorge, homes to past Indian tribes, are already disturbed. Vandals have removed or defaced several clues to the cultures. The Forest Service officials at the Daniel Boone National Forest ask visitors' cooperation in preventing further damage to the natural and human history represented in the Red River Gorge.

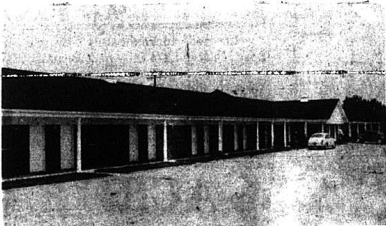

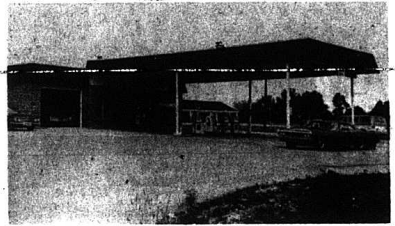

EMERGENCY SHELTER HOMES

The Department for Human Resources has a need for an emergency shelter home. This can be a private home where teenagers and younger children are placed on a short-term emergency basis.

The children could be dependent, neglected, needy, or abandoned, waiting for placement in foster homes. They may be teenagers who have committed minor offenses and are awaiting court hearings and disposition. However our great

est need is a home to shelter runaways, until their parents come for them.

Emergency shelter would usually last for a day or two, rarely more than a week. The need for emergency shelter varies, but probably on an average of two or three children a month would be placed in a home.

The family that provides an emergency shelter home should be mature, emotionally stable who are capable of supervising and meeting the needs of children and who relate to teenagers.

The Department for Human Resources will pay each approved emergency shelter home for taking care of these children.

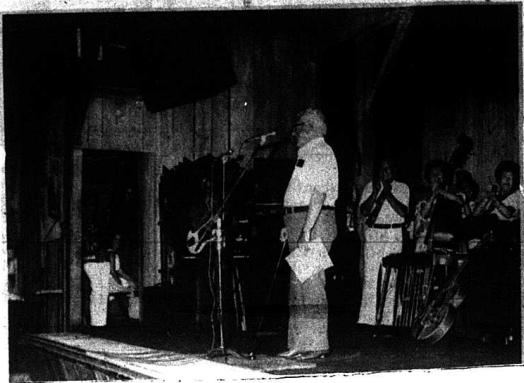

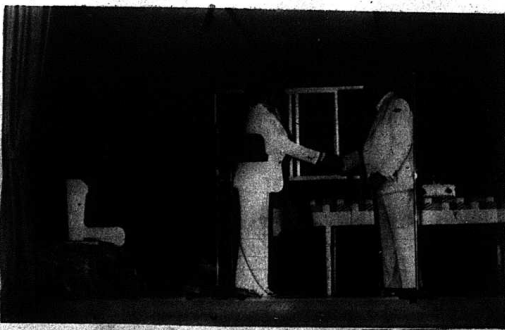

Rockcastle Recollections.

By: John Lair

WOOD

Progenitor of the principal branch of the Wood family in Rockcastle County was Samuel Wood, born in South Carolina in 1756. He served seven years in the 3rd South Carolina Regiment during the Revolutionary War and in 1790 came to Rockcastle, settling on Indian Creek, near present-day Booneville, in Owsley County, Kentucky.

Samuel and his wife, Elizabeth, had two sons, Samuel, Jr. (1790-1825), who married Rebecca Wilson, and John (1791-1855), who married Darkey Abney. They were the parents of Joseph Wood (1825-?), who married Martha, daughter of James D. Pennington. Joseph and Martha's children were: Cynthia Ann (1862-1877), who married J.J. Berry; Catherine (1847-1881), who married T.J. Mink; William (1849-1909), who married Elizabeth French. They lived at Roundstone, Kentucky, and among their children was J.A. "Bigge" Wood (1872-1932), well known to many Rockcastle citizens. John (1833-1875) died early and was not married; Mary (1855-1910) married William Hayes; Henry Hugh (1858-1929), who married Eliza Stewart. They had two sons, Thomas and Alfred; Susan (1862-1967), who married Ike Dooley; James J. (1865-1905), who married Ida Jones; Joseph C. "Chris" (1869-1956), who married Blanche Jones, a sister of the wife of his brother, James J. Wood. After the death of his first wife "Chris" he was married to Sally Swinford.

STEWART

Many of the Stewarts of Rockcastle County are direct descendants of Alexander Stewart, head of one of the more prominent and affluent pioneer families of Kentucky. He was born in Scotland, about 1756 but came to America in time to serve in the War of the Revolution from 1777 to 1778, in the 2nd Virginia Regiment. About 1786 he moved his family from Pinecastle or Washington County, Virginia, to Flat Rock, Kentucky, in Knox County, a part of which county was taken into Rockcastle County at its formation in 1810.

Alexander Stewart seems to have been a man of some prominence in his day and was able to purchase, for cash, a considerable boundary of land near Flat Lick. From 1810 to 1805 he served as Justice of the Peace for Knox County. It is believed that Alexander's father, William, was the third son of James, the fifth Earl of Galloway.

Alexander Stewart's children were all born in Virginia. His wife, Catherine Sheets, was believed to have been his second wife and was probably the mother of his children, who were as follows: Peggy (1877) married an Edwards; Charles (1801) married Susannah Arthur; Isaac (1782-1867) married Elizabeth Wyatt; Anna, married James Alsop in 1805; Euphemia, married John Cullen in 1809; Polly, married John Wyatt in 1810; Elizabeth married Christopher Walker in 1813; William (1783) married Polly McDuff in 1824.

Isaac and Elizabeth Wyatt Wood had a son, William, (1814-1891), who married Sarah Branaman, daughter of Abraham and Elizabeth Putt Branaman. Around the year 1818 he moved from Flat Lick, in Knox County, to a farm on Clear Creek near Wildie in Rockcastle County, near the home of his wife's parents. They built a large three-story home which was the show place of the entire area. Being a Southern sympathizer, he sold mules, food and supplies to the Confederate agents. Just before his death he married his second wife, Mary Rice. His children by his first wife, Sarah were: James Madison (1841) who married Molly Campbell; Mary Elizabeth (1845-1889) who married Fleming Butner; Augustus "Gus" Washington (1847-1943) who married Mary Albright. This was "Uncle Gus" Stewart, one of the more prosperous and well-liked citizens of Rockcastle County. He was an ardent sportsman and with "Uncle Henry" Branaman ran down and killed the last wild deer killed in Rockcastle County, after a forty-eight hour chase with their deer hounds which ended near the headwaters of Renfro Creek. "Uncle Gus" and his wife had the following children: Anna who married Tom Carr; Tom who married a Miss Tully; John W. who married Edna Brandenberg; Mary who married James Adams. Other children of William and Sarah Branaman Stewart were: William Salem (1851) who married Elene Keeler; Isaac "Ike" Abraham (1854) who married Kate Brinley; Leander Thomas (1856-1916) who married Lucy Martin. Their daughter, Sallie, married Hess Parsons. Their son, William, married Sadie Parsons. Their son, Gibson, married Beulah Lewis. Other children of William and Sarah Branaman Stewart were: Sarah Ellen who married Walter Higginbotham; Eliza Susan, who married Henry Hugh Wood. They had two sons, Thomas J. (1894) and Alfred M. (1896). The crossing of the bloodlines of these two

strong pioneer families in this instance resulted in the founding of a financial dynasty unusual anywhere in the U.S.A., which will be dealt with more fully in the biographies of Tom and Alfred Wood and Thomas' son T.J. Wood, Jr. The William Stewart listed above as a son of Leander Thomas Stewart and Lucy Martin Stewart, has acquired much of the original William Stewart farm property on Clear Creek and has expanded it into one of the most extensive and successful farm operations in the county. In this he has been greatly assisted by his two sons, Wayne and Kenneth Stewart. Wayne, who married Ruby Harmon, established a feed and farm supply store and agriculture consulting service in Mt. Vernon which is largely patronized by the farmers and dairymen of the county while Kenneth, who married June Wyler, in addition to being closely involved with his father in the acquisition and development of farm lands near the original Stewart holdings, has built and is operating a fertilizer plant at Mt. Vernon. These two boys, both college trained, have contributed largely to the growth of agricultural and livestock interests in Rockcastle County.

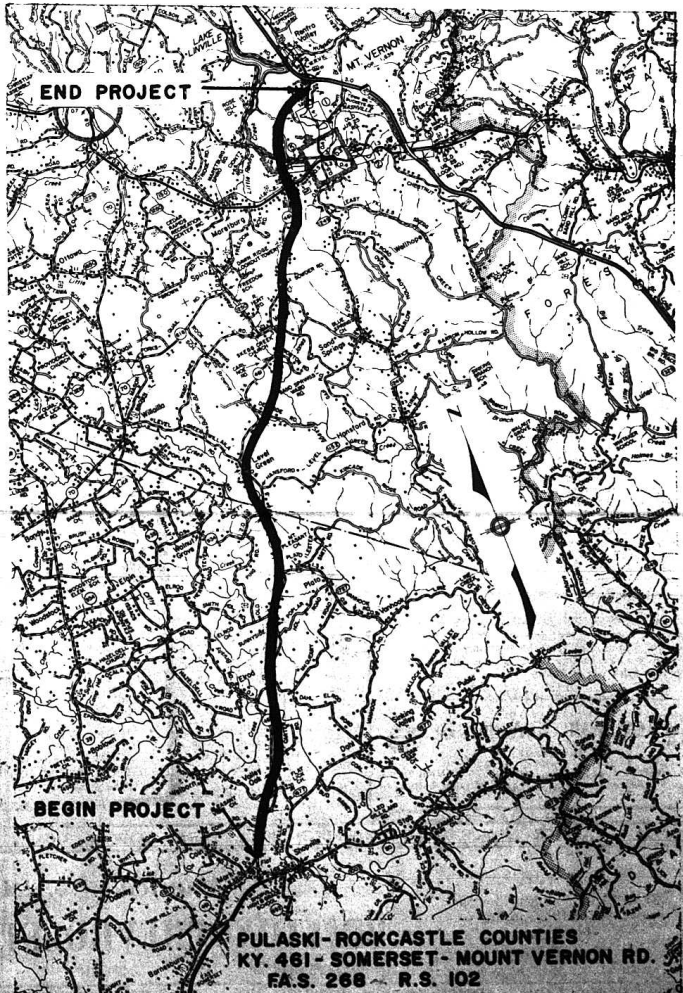
The Draft Environmental Statement will be available for reviewing and copying at the Highway District Office in Somerset, Kentucky after July 10, 1975.
