Some months ago we published in the Signal a series of articles outlining the histories of the Christian Churches in Rockcastle County. We had at first intended following this series with a history of the many Baptist Churches in the county but dehayed doing so in the hope that we could find some minister of aymember of some of these churches who could be much better prepared than twas to undertake such a history. A man eminently qualified for the task has long considered undertaking it, but finds his time so taken with a combination of events and duties that he has had to give up the idea.

I am hoping that acomebody associated with the Bapitst churches of Rockentile County will undertake a short history of the individual churches, to be published in ROCKCASTLE RECOLLECTIONS under his own name, thus becoming one of the co-authors of this book. If nobody can be found to undertake this job, will the individual churches help me to do it by writing or contacting me to give me information on the history of their own church? I am sure that practically all the Bapitst churches in Rockcastle County have records of their founding and growth and the ames of many of the ministers who have preached there in the past. Vernon, can give me a lot of information on Ottawa Baptist Church and I hope he does.

Rev. Henry Parrott, of Mt. Vernon, has kindly turned over to me his collection of reports of the Rockcastle Baptist Association, covering the period from 1916 to 1974. Incidentally, I wrote that this association was formed in 1870, so a period of the first this association was formed in 1870, so a period of the first during that period that we are most interested in finding information on the subject. Can you help out? Much of such information on the subject. Can you help out? Much of such information with reference to the Primitive Baptist Church at Brush Creek is contained in a letter from Mr. W.G. Johnson, now nearing his one hundreth birthday, who wrote of his recollections of the time when the church house was a log building approximately sixteen feet square, with one door and one window (without glass) and split log benches. This old building served until 1889, when it was replaced by a frame building. Since there are few written records of this period in the life of our county churches, we must look to elderly men, like Mr. Johnson, with a sharp memory such as his, for such details as we are able to incorporate in this history of the county.







LITTLE MANAGEMENT CHORES CAN DEVELOP BIG

We ve all seen the seeming paradox of two dairymen with similar aizh erbei sand equal Jand resources: one dairy man is obviously successful, with top production, excellent financial progress, and a high atandard of living. The other dairyman is plagued with misfortune, has trouble paying his bills and nones as they come due, and has trouble paying his bills and notes as they come due, and has difficult time buying food and clothes for his family. This difference can often be explained by the attention given to difference can often be explained by the attention given to
semmingly little management
details that are very important
in successful dairy farm
operation. The following
examples will illustrate this
situation.

FEEDING

The successful dairyman will have his forage tested and feed a grain instruer to provide necessary nutrients that his cows are not obtaining in their forage. The average dairyman guesses wrong and may lose potential production of 2,000 or more pounds per cow annually by not feeding enough protein. He may have milk feever or downer cows through mineral imbalance or inadequate levels of mineral feeding.

The successful dairyman will wash each cow's udder with warm water and dry it carefully with a disposable paper towel. He will use a strip cup and handle the udder to spot

abnormal symptoms. The average dairyman fails to dry the udder or uses a dirty cloth. Her has several cases of acute mastitis which get out of control because he didn't realize pecause he didn't realize anything was wring until it was too late.

The successful dairyman will make sure his calves either will make sure his calves either get — up and nurse or are bottle-fed colostrum within six hours of birth. He dips the navel in iodine solution at birth and 24 hours a liert. The average dairyman is too busy to follow these recommendations and loses beifer calves from his two best cows due to secure that do not respond to treatment.

BREEDING

The successful dairyman will have an agreement with his veterinarian to check the herd monthly for any problems which might arise following calving or after breeding. The average dairyman decides this program is too expensive, and loses potential productiond due to potential production of the control of t

the successful dairyman realizes that his helpers are an important part of his dairy operation. He saks them dairy reasonable hours, gives them time off each week and a regular paid vacation. He consults them paid vacation. He consults them when making management decisions. The average dairy-man losses milk production and has several cows ruined each year by careless milking and handling because he doesn't realize the value of reasonable working conditions. Often he has to get along without help during planting or harvest esseen because the dairy worker became dissatisfied and quit,

CROP RAISING

The successful dairyman knows which grain varieties have performed best in his area. He cuts his hay before it becomes too mature for best qu'ality. The xervage dairyman neglects these management details and ends up with low yields and poor quality feed.


