

Rockcastle Recollections

Some months ago we published in the Signal a series of articles outlining the histories of the Christian Churches in Rockcastle County. We had at first intended following this series with the history of the many Baptist Churches in the county but delayed in the hope that we could find some minister or lay member of some of these churches who could be much better prepared than I was to undertake such a history. A man eminently qualified for the task has long considered undertaking it, but finds his time so taken with a continuation of events and duties that he has had to give up the idea.

I am hoping that somebody associated with the Baptist churches of Rockcastle County will undertake a short history of the individual churches, to be published in ROCKCASTLE RECOLLECTIONS under his own name, thus becoming one of the co-authors of this book. If nobody can be found to undertake this job, will the individual churches help me to do it by writing or contacting me to give me information on the history of their own church? I am sure that practically all the Baptist churches in Rockcastle County have records of their founding and growth and the names of many of the ministers who have preached there in the past. It is not going to be possible for me to personally get around to all these churches, but if some one person from each congregation will send in the information available from the church records I will greatly appreciate it and will be able to give the churches due representation in our county history. This is true also of other denominations here in the county. I would like to see all faiths recognized but it will be impossible for me to do the work alone.

You will recall that several weeks ago I ran a good history on Newhope Baptist Church, so I will not need additional information on it. I understand that Seaford Cane Baptist Church was established in 1792. Who knows if it was established in Virginia as it later moved here, or was it established at its present location? If the latter, it will rate as one of the earliest churches in Kentucky and certainly the oldest in Rockcastle County, by a wide margin. Mrs. Charlie French has furnished me a very complete and comprehensive history of the Pine Hill Missionary Baptist Church covering the period from 1816 to 1974. Incidentally, I wrote that this association was formed in 1870, so a period of the first forty-five years of the association and its churches is lost to us. It is during that period that we are most interested in finding information on the subject. Can you help out? Much of such information with reference to the Primitive Baptist Church at Brush Creek is contained in a letter from Mr. W.C. Johnson, now nearing his one hundredth birthday, who wrote of his recollections of the time when the church house was a log building approximately sixteen feet square, with one door and one window (without glass) and split log benches. This old building served until 1889, when it was replaced by a frame building. 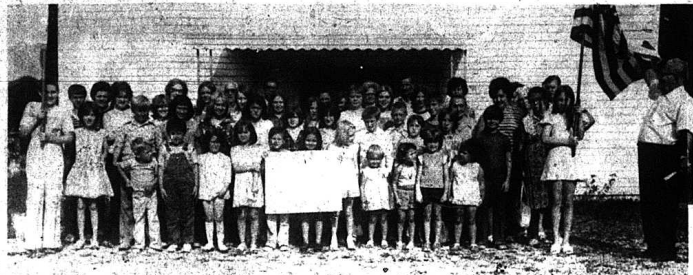

School Policy Set For Lincoln County Students

For the past two years the Lincoln County Board of Education has refused to negotiate contracts with bordering school districts to educate out of district students. Future on the part of Lincoln County to sign a contract prohibits bordering districts from receiving state aid to pay the cost of educating out of county students.

Last year nine (9) Lincoln County students attended school in Rockcastle County.

The following policy will apply to Lincoln County families desiring to educate their children in Rockcastle County

Schools

"Until such time that Lincoln County School officials agree to negotiate a contract on out of district students only children of Lincoln County families enrolled in Rockcastle County Schools at the end of the 1974-75 school term will be allowed to enroll. These students will be permitted to finish out their education here without paying tuition. New members of the immediate families will be permitted to enroll and finish school here without tuition charges. No new Lincoln County families will be permitted to enroll."

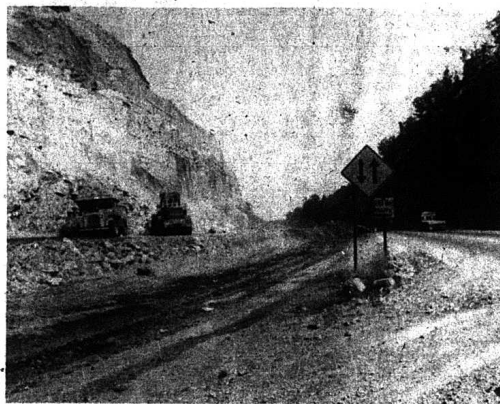

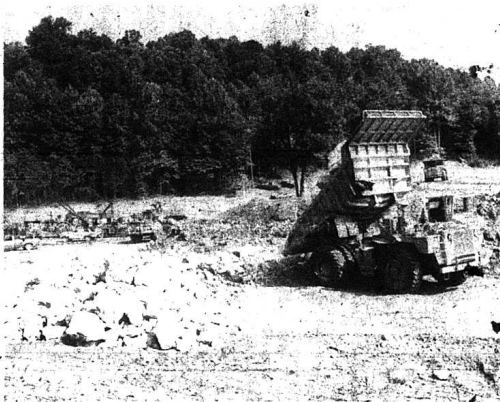
In addition to the beauty contest, this year's annual meeting of Jackson County RECC featured entertainment by Pee Wee King and his complete stage show.

Pin Oak Sawfly Is Culprit In Black Oak Defoliation

An insect known as the pin oak sawfly is causing considerable defoliation of oak trees at this time in Rockcastle and surrounding counties. Oaks in these counties have been turning brown for several days due to the feeding activity of this insect.

This is the same culprit that infested 300,000 acres in 1974 in Adair, Bell, Casey, Jackson, Laurel, Pulaski, and Rockcastle counties.

The sawfly feeds on the upper sides of leaves at the tops of trees. The many skeletonized leaves make the tree look blighted.

It is the larvae (caterpillar) of the insect that cause the defoliation. The larvae are small, slug-like and yellowish-green in color, and their head and legs are shiny black. This state of the insect feeds primarily on the lower surfaces of the leaves, leaving only the upper surface and a fine network of veins.

The Kentucky Division of Forestry is now conducting an aerial survey to determine the extent of damage.

Since defoliation usually occurs late in the season, serious damage to the trees is unlikely, however, growth loss is possible. Oaks growing on Southern exposures may become susceptible to root rot due to a reduction in vigor and the poor site quality on Southern slopes.

Malathion sprays can be used for control of the sawfly on oak trees that are used in lawns. Apply the material in July or August or when damage is first noticed.

DAIRY TIPS

LITTLE MANAGEMENT CHORES CAN DEVELOP BIG PROFITS

We've all seen the seeming paradox of two dairymen with similar size herds and equal land resources; one dairyman is obviously successful, with top production, excellent financial progress, and a high standard of living. The other dairyman is plagued with misfortune, has trouble paying his bills and notes as they come due, and has difficult time buying food and clothes for his family. This difference can often be explained by the attention given to seemingly little management details that are very important in successful dairy farm operation. The following examples will illustrate this situation.

FEEDING

The successful dairyman will have his forage tested and feed a grain mixture to provide necessary nutrients that his cows are not obtaining in their forage. The average dairyman guesses wrong and may lose potential production of 2,000 or more pounds per cow annually by not feeding enough protein. He may have milk fever or downer cows through mineral imbalance or inadequate levels of mineral feeding.

MILKING

The successful dairyman will wash each cow's udder with warm water and dry it carefully with a disposable paper towel. He will use a strip cup and handle the udder to spot

abnormal symptoms. The average dairyman fails to dry the udder or uses a dirty cloth. Her several cases of acute mastitis which get off control because he didn't realize anything was wrong until it was too late.

CALVES

The successful dairyman will make sure his calves either get-up and nurse or are bottle-fed colostrum within six hours of birth. He dips the navel in iodine solution at birth and 24 hours later. The average dairyman is too busy to follow these recommendations and loses heavier calves from his lost best cows due to scours that do not respond to treatment.

BREEDING

The successful dairyman will have an agreement with his veterinarian to check the herd monthly for any problems which might arise following calving or after breeding. The average dairyman decides this program is too expensive, and loses potential production due to unnecessary repeat breeding. He also loses two or three good cows each year, because he waited too long to call his veterinarian when trouble developed.

RECORDS

The successful dairyman will faithfully keep milk production, breeding, and health records on each cow. The average dairyman does not keep production records, and doesn't know which cows to cull. He has several cows in his herd at all times who aren't paying their feed costs.

The successful dairyman realizes that his help is an important part of his dairy operation. He asks them to work reasonable hours, gives them time off each week and a regular vacation. He consults them when making management decisions. The average dairyman loses milk production and has several cows ruined each year by careless milking and handling because he doesn't realize the value of reasonable working conditions. Often he has to get along without help during planting or harvest season because the dairy worker became dissatisfied and quit.

CROP RAISING

The successful dairyman knows which grain varieties have performed best in his area. He cuts his hay before it becomes too mature for best quality. The average dairyman neglects these management details and ends up with low yields and poor quality feed.

SUMMARY

This is not a complete list by any means, but it illustrates some potential income that is lost by dairymen each year by seemingly average performance. When the feed to milk ratio is favorable an average dairy farm can absorb these mistakes and make a fair profit. In times like those that prevail now, only the dairyman who follows the best management practices available and tested. The dairyman must check whether he is willing to pay the price of success.

PESTICIDES

Kentucky farmer Beware of telephone solicitor to purchase cure-all pesticides. We are presently having a rash of incidents where false claims regarding pesticide performance and cost are resulting in sad situations for some. Remember, put your stock in a reputable dealer - they are in business to help you. And, these professionals don't have to ponder their product over the telephone or give the farmer gift incentives.

BELLE PEPPERS

Bacterial leaf-spot of peppers has been detected in commercial plantings in Rockcastle County. Recent humid, rainy weather with temperatures up to the high eighties has been favorable for bacterial leaf spot development. Sprays of fixed copper bactericides are recommended at the first sign of bacterial leaf spot disease in the field. A new bactericide called Nabac (Kalo Laboratories) has recently been cleared for use on peppers and may have limited availability this season. This chemical has not been tested in Kentucky, but has been shown to be as good as fixed copper chemicals in some tests from other states. Contact the County Agent's Office for a copy of "Guide for Chemical Control of Vegetable Disease 1975" - PPA-2.



Remember when we had to go to the barn before daylight to feed the horses or mules which ever we had so they could eat and then be ready to harness and go to the field to plow when it would really be too cold and had to work. Then in April the corn land would have to be worked over several times to get it in condition to plant. Planting then would consist of laying off plow and one row corn drill. That was a big improvement over the hand job planter used earlier.

Back then corn would have to be plowed 3 or 4 times and hoed. Today we wait until corn planting time. Go out to the grass field, spray to kill grass and weeds, apply fertilizer, plant

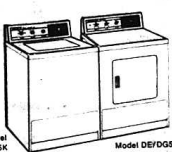

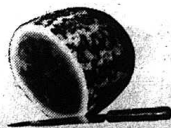

HOW TO PREVENT BOTULISM POISONING FROM HOME CANNED FOODS

Each canning season, the botulism bogeyman hovers somewhere along the edges of our consciousness. And he's scary.

Regular spoilage in our home-canned foods we can handle - the bulging lid, the faulty seal, the off-odor, the off flavor, or mold. We throw the food away where pets and people can't get to it, we scrub and sterilize the jar, and we promise ourselves to be more careful in our food preservation practices next year.

But botulism is something else. You can't see it, you can't smell it, you can't taste it. You

can't tell it's there without some scientific apparatus to help. But it can kill you just the same.

So what you do is boil all home-canned vegetables at least 10 minutes before you eat them, and before you even taste them. If you want to use home-canned beans in a cold three-bean salad, for instance, boil them 10 minutes first and then cool them down for the salad.

Safety from both botulism and spoilage in your home-processed foods depends on following good canning directions to the letter and using good-quality, fresh garden produce.

Approved home canning methods raise the temperatures of fruits and vegetables to high-enough levels long enough to keep them safe from botulism and free of spoilage. Proper processing techniques include pressure canning those low-acid vegetables, which means every thing except tomatoes and pickled vegetables. (And just

sanding some vinegar won't do it - 'ev have to be really pickled.)

Botulism is a type of food poisoning, a toxin produced by clostridium botulinum spores. These spores are found in soil, air, and on raw foods. The spores themselves are not dangerous, they won't grow or produce deadly botulinum toxin in the presence of air. A high-acid content in food also discourages their growth. But if they are not destroyed by heat, they can grow without air in sealed jars of low-acid foods.

Since lots of first-timers are canning this season, and since it's part of the human condition to make a mistake now and then. Boil your own home-canned low-acid vegetables at least 10 minutes before serving. And if you're eating at the home of friends, be sure they know the score, too, on preventing the possibility of botulism poisoning from their home-canned foods.

Doesn't the extra boiling time hurt the nutritional content of the vegetables? It can cut down on such nutrients as Vitamin C, but the safety factor overrules any loss in food value.

If you need more information on home canning and food safety, come by the County Extension Office for pamphlets and books.
