LEAVING HEADSPACE AND CLOSING JARS

CLOSING JARS Leaving, the right amount of beadspace and putting the lids on jars correctly are two important steps in canning. Headspace gives the food into during processing in either the boiling water bath or steam beadspace. The seal is another all earner to follow carefully direct-ions for the type of lid you are using. Here are directions for closing jars with three different types of lids:

### Metal Two-Piece Lids

1. Wipe jar rim clean after jar is packed with food. 2. Follow manufacturer's directions for boiling or pre-heating lids. Put lid on, with sealing compound down against the jar rim. (Never re-use old lids.)

3. Screw metal band down tightly by hand. When it is tight, this lid has enough give to let air escape during processing.
4. Do not tighten screw band further after taking jar from canner. You could break
