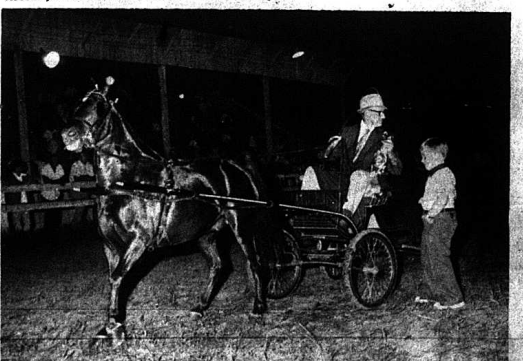
Mr. Saylor said that the stolen car was apparently wired by the thieves.



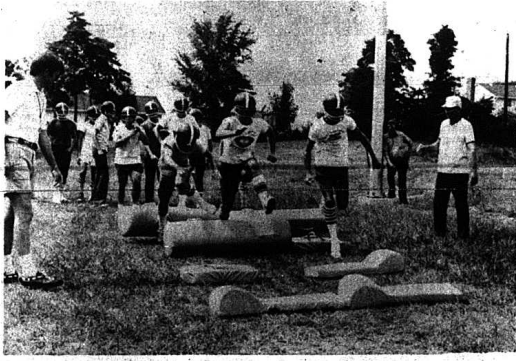

## FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

Gov. Julian Carroll made what appears to be a firm commitment last week to have the state assume at least part of the \$4 million in fees Kentucky students are required to pay each year.

His contention, as outlined in a letter to Dr. Lyman Ginger, was that when fees are required as part of the instructional program, those fees should be paid by the Department of Education.

But what about textbooks? Are not these materials required as part of the instructional program?

At the outset, it must be clear that Carroll made absolutely no mention of free textbooks in his letter to Ginger.

However, a source close to Carroll said it would be a "logical extension" of the arguments in the letter to assume that Carroll is interested in a free textbook program.

In fact, the source said, the key factor is whether or not the money can be found.

The figure would be substantial. The textbook committee has estimated that free textbooks for grades 9 through 12 would cost the neighborhood of \$5 million a year. Pupils in the first through the eighth grades already receive free textbooks.

To provide all new textbooks for the final four grades this fall would cost in excess of \$7 million, according to textbook committee estimates.

The existing free textbook program is budgeted at \$3.4 million, a figure one education department official described as barely enough to scrape by on and only then because of a supplemental allocation from the Gov. Wendell Ford.

Based on these estimated costs, then, the total figure for an all-grades free textbook program and free instructional fees would be somewhere between \$10 million and \$15 million.

The decision making on this subject could become moot later this year.

A little known suit was filed early this year in federal court in Kentucky that could eventually require the state to provide free textbooks and free instructional fees for all students in public school.

The suit, coming out of Knox County, was filed in the late Judge Max Swindler's court, Eastern District of Kentucky, but is now scheduled to be heard next month before Federal Judge Pierce LeVely.

In essence, the suit says poor families are discriminated against because of the cost of fees and books.

The suit contends that because of the fees and the cost of textbooks, beyond means of some families, students who cannot afford them are unable to compete at the same level as their classmates and often must drop out of school.

Some families in Kentucky can attest to the burden of fees and books at the start of each school year but it remains to be seen whether the court will determine discrimination against the poor.

Suffice it to say that there are many Department of Education officials who believe the court will find that the state must provide these things if an equal educational opportunity is to be provided for all Kentuckians.

It is also worth noting that the governor's office is aware of the suit and its possible consequences.

And it seems reasonable that both the governor and the Department of Education would like to know as soon as possible if textbooks and fees can be included in the next biennial budget, and, further, if they have to be included.

ORDINANCE NO. 316

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO THE AREA OF SAID CITY.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The city of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, desires to annex the following unincorporated territory to the now existing boundaries of the City of Mount Vernon, to-wit:

Traet No. 1, beginning at a present corner of City limits, said point being a corner to John D. Henderson, David Gregory and Estill Bullock; thence with line of Bullock, North 53 degrees 00 minutes West, 670 feet to point No. "C" on City map and corner to James Lambert, thence with line of Lambert South 31 degrees 00 minutes East 12 feet to point in present City limit line; thence with the line of present City limits, due east 780 feet to point of beginning.

Traet No. 2, Beginning at present corner of City limits at point No. "117", said point being in north right of way line of Poplar Street and corner to Denver Miller; thence crossing Poplar Street and with line of Jop Bussell, South 22 degrees 00 minutes West 140 feet to post corner of Bussell and Buck Cromer; thence, with line of Cromer, South 63 degrees 30 minutes East 50 feet to post; thence South 22 degrees 00 minutes West 124 feet to point in center of Locust Street; thence with center of said street South 63 degrees 30 minutes East 158 feet to point in present City limit line; thence with said line, due north 1190 feet to point No. "0" on City map, as recorded in Book 2, page 17.

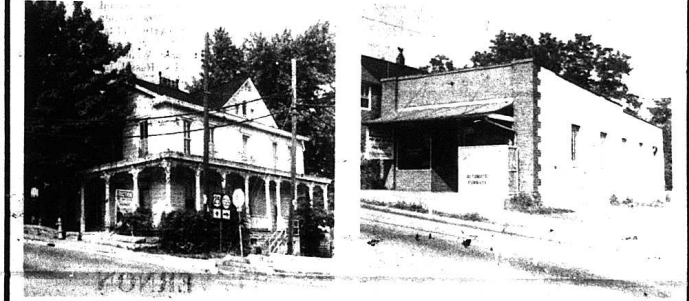

Since we're in the very middle of a very hot summer. Everyone knows that the homemaker is trying for good meals which won't tire her out or send the temperature as 120 degrees in the kitchen. And since most males who seem so capable become incapable when house work is concerned, I thought someone may be interested in a few of these recipes.

Here is one for cole slaw that you can make and by increasing the items will last endlessly.

**Cole Slaw Frozen**

1 good size head of cabbage Put one tablespoon of salt over this or send the temperature as 120 degrees in the kitchen. And since most males who seem so capable become incapable when house work is concerned, I thought someone may be interested in a few of these recipes.

Now in a small saucepan, mix the following: 1 cup vinegar, 2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon celery seed. Let come to a boil. And boil exactly one minute. Let cool.

Squeeze water from the cabbage and throw away. Add vegetables all together. Pour syrup over them. Fix in small medium, large serving, cover and pop in freezer. When wanted for eating is ready after 5 minutes of sitting at room temperature.

**LEAVING HEADSPACE AND CLOSING JARS**

**Budget Casserole**  
2 cups macaroni  
1 can condensed celery soup  
1 can condensed mushroom soup  
1/2 lb. grated cheddar cheese  
1 green pepper cut in small pieces  
1 small can mushrooms sliced and drained  
1 onion chopped  
1 small jar pimento cut into small pieces (optional)  
2 cups or more if wanted cubed cooked chicken or tuna  
1 pint milk

Leaving the right amount of headspace and putting the lids on jars correctly are two important steps in canning. Headspace gives the food room to expand and also leaves space for the liquid to bubble up into during processing in either the boiling-water-bath or steam-pressure canner. Without this headspace, some of the food might be forced out of the jar with the air, causing a deposit of food on the jar rim and ruining the seal. Check your canning instructions for the correct amount of headspace to allow for each fruit and vegetable.

Combine all ingredients in casserole. Refrigerate overnight. Bake in 350 degrees oven for 1 hour. Serves 6. While this is baking add some other thing to oven and save energy.

3. Place glass lid down on jar.
4. Partly seal by putting upper ball in place. Leave lower ball up.
5. Immediately after taking from canner, completely seal by pressing down lower ball.

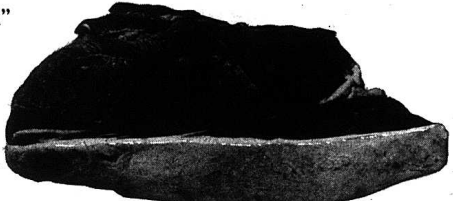

## Miss Dick Participates In Berea College Program

Alicia Dick has been studying wildlife biology. She was one of 49 high school seniors participating in the intensive, four-week, college level program at Berea College. Alicia is the daughter of Ms. Glens Dick of Route 4, Mt. Vernon. She will be a senior this fall at Rockcastle County High School.

The program was sponsored by the National Science Foundation. Students were selected for high ability from those nominated by their high schools, primarily from eight southern Appalachian states.

The program provided an academic course for college credit, a work experience in conservation, and an experience in college living. Students stayed in the dormitories and studied with the regular Berea College faculty.

And it was fun. There were field trips to the Cincinnati Zoo, the Cave Run State Fish Hatchery, and the Kentucky Wildlife Center in Frankfort, where quail, wild turkeys, and pheasants are bred.

Red River Gorge was visited, and the students learned of the area's unique plant life which comes from distant wildlife regions and is not found anywhere else nearby.

They went to the Bald Rock area of the Daniel Boone National Forest and saw a forest management research area, a wildlife sanctuary, virgin timber, and the site for a power-generating dam and lake.

There was hard work. Students combed the Berea campus, learning to identify every tree and shrub. In their classes, they studied everything from edible wild plants to noxious weeds to soils.

Students at Berea pay no tuition but all work at least ten hours a week. The wildlife biology class was no exception. They did conservation work in the Berea College forest. They bridged a ravine, and built steps up to the bridge. They completely relocated 1,000 feet of trail on the steepest part of East Pinnacle. The old trail had become badly eroded.

Two other intensive programs for high school seniors were held on the Berea College campus this summer, in astronomy and industrial technology.

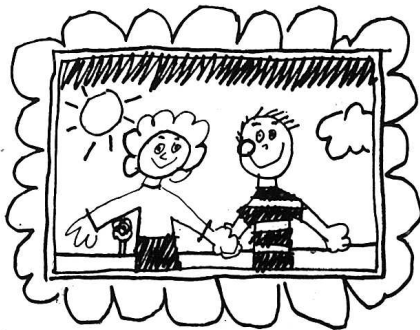

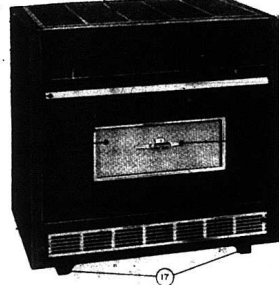

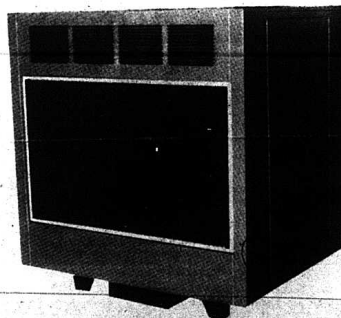

**FIELD DAY AT UK'S LANDSCAPE GARDEN CENTER SET FOR WEEKEND OF JULY 26-27**

Are you interested in vegetables, fruits, flowers, trees, or shrubs? If so, you should plan to visit the Landscape Garden Center at the University of Kentucky during the weekend of July 26-27. These are the dates of this year's Horticulture Field Days, which are sponsored by the UK College of Agriculture.

The Landscape Garden Center is located just south of Cooper Drive in Lexington, and is open to the public throughout the year. However, the Horticulture Field Days come at a time when many of the plants in the center are at their seasonal peak. UK PERSONNEL FROM THE Departments of Horticulture, Entomology, and Plant Pathology will be on hand from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. during the field days to answer questions about plants and to provide information about the center. Also,

for indoor gardens, there will be a special exhibit of foliage plants, with some of the newer varieties included in the exhibit.

The Landscape Garden Center is used in evaluating plants, especially some of the more recently-introduced varieties, for use in Kentucky. The center helps home gardeners, florists, nurserymen, and bedding plant growers to choose the best varieties of plants to grow. It provides an opportunity for UK horticulturists to check out the performance of plants so that they can make recommendations to Kentucky gardeners. It also helps UK horticulture students learn to identify and grow new plant varieties.

Included in the plantings at the center are the All-American annual flower trials and the All-American vegetable trials. These contain official test entries from the American Selections (AAS) program. Profit organization made up of representatives of the commercial seed industry and educational institutions. The AAS entries are not currently

available for home planting, but some may later be named and introduced by various seed companies.

The center contains some 400 woody ornamental plants, including trees, shrubs, and vines. It contains the American Iris Society Region 7 trials, and it also contains model vegetable gardens and vegetable variety trials set up by UK horticulture students.

The Landscape Garden Center can be reached by turning south off Cooper Drive a short distance east of the Cooper Drive-South Limestone intersection. A special entrance off South Limestone will also be open during the field days.

**SUMMER ANNUAL GRASSES CAN PROVIDE EXTRA FEED DURING DRY WEATHER**

If dry summer weather is causing you to run short on feed for your cattle, you should consider seeding in some sudangrass, sorghum-sudangrass hybrid, or pearl millet. This suggestion comes from Garry Lacefield, Extension forage specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"The summer annual grasses will do well in dry weather," says Lacefield. "If managed properly, they will produce a lot more summer feed than cool-season grasses such as fescue and bluegrass. And they will continue to grow and provide feed until frost."

Lacefield says high soil fertility is important for sudangrass, sorghum-sudangrass, and pearl millet. Lime should be applied if the soil is high in acidity. These crops respond well to nitrogen, and 60-100 pounds of nitrogen per acre should be applied when they are seeded.

You will need to prepare a good seedbed before seeding one of these crops. The seedbed should be similar to one prepared for corn or soybeans. The seed can be broadcast or planted in rows, and seeding rates recommended by the seed company should be used.

These crops can be grazed when they reach a height of 15 inches. With sufficient moisture, they should reach this height within a month. There is a danger to cattle of prussic acid poisoning when sudangrass and sorghum sudangrass are grazed before they reach the 15-inch height.

Lacefield suggests using a rotational or strip grazing system for the summer annual grasses. The best system for a particular farm will depend on the number of cows and size of area to be grazed. The system should be set up so that an area can be stocked heavily and the growth grazed down to a height

of about 4-6 inches a week. Then the cattle should be moved to a new area. After an area has been grazed, it should be allowed to grow back until the plants again reach a height of 15-18 inches.

The summer annual grasses are best-suited for grazing, but they can also be harvested for silage. They should be cut when they reach a height of 15-18 inches. The plants are thick-stemmed, and Lacefield recommends using a conditioner when cutting them for hay.

You can increase the production of these grasses by applying 40-60 pounds of additional nitrogen per acre after each grazing or cutting. The amount of nitrogen you should apply depends on the price of the nitrogen and the amount of feed you need.

Sudangrass, sorghum-sudangrass, and pearl millet are all similar in feeding value, according to Lacefield. Pearl millet does not recover as rapidly after cutting or grazing, but there is no known danger of prussic acid poisoning, a condition which can kill cattle. Lacefield has the following management suggestions:

1. Graze these crops only when they are at least 15 inches tall.
2. Do not graze these crops during and shortly after drought periods when growth is severely reduced.
3. Do not graze wilted plants or plants with young tillers.
4. Do not graze for two weeks after a non-killing frost.
5. Do not graze after a killing frost until plant material is dry.
6. Do not graze at night when frost is likely.

7. Feed hay from these crops only after it has been properly cured, and do not feed silage until after it has been in the silo for six to eight weeks.

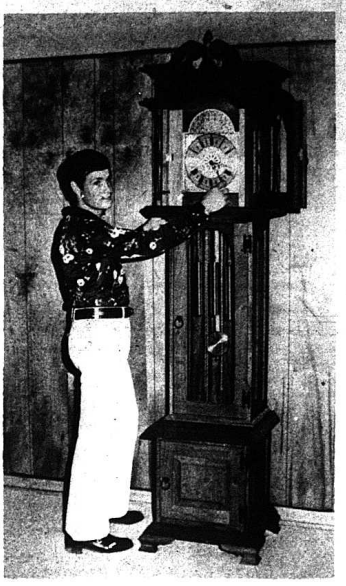
