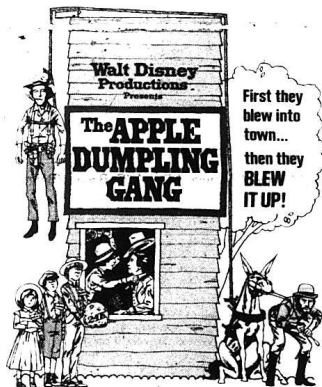

Rockcastle Recollections

BAPTIST CHURCHES

The first fully organized church to function in this area was not organized here, but in Virginia and was of the Baptist persuasion. It was long known as "The Traveling Church," so called because it had followed his pastor, Rev. Lewis Craig, from its old home in Virginia to a new location in what is now Garrard County Kentucky, just over the Rockcastle County line. Rev. Craig had previously made a trip to Kentucky in search of suitable lands to which to migrate. Incidentally, part of his holdings were located on Skeggs Creek in Rockcastle. After acquiring property to his liking he returned to Virginia and informed his congregation of his intention to move to Kentucky. So great was their affection for him that the entire congregation, numbering around five hundred, immediately decided to make the move with him.

After disposing of their property and making the necessary preparations for such a long and hazardous journey they set out in the month of February toward their new home. Until mid-December they struggled across a mountainous wilderness, a part of the way through Rockcastle County, facing the hazards of Indian ambush, wild animals and severe winter weather. They remained active as a church throughout the entire journey, stopping along the way to observe the Sabbath and conduct full religious services. On Gilbert's Creek, near Lancaster, they reached the end of their long and wearisome journey and there relocated their church. Two years later Rev. Craig and most of his congregation moved to South Elkhorn and established the first church North of the Kentucky River.

Among earlier workers in The Vineyard in the newly opened Wilderness of Kentucky were Baptists, Methodists, Presbyterians and Episcopalians. Probably the most active of all in the earlier days was Bishop Asbury, but in the way of establishing churches in the Wilderness more was accompanied by the Baptists than by any other denomination, in our county as well as elsewhere.

First minister to preach regularly in Kentucky was of the Baptist faith, Rev. Thomas Tinsley, who as early as 1776 was conducting services in Harrodsburg. First minister to locate permanently in Kentucky was another Baptist, William Marshall, who settled in Lincoln County in 1778. First Baptist preacher to set foot on Kentucky soil was Squire Boone, a brother to Daniel Boone, most famous of all early settlers in Kentucky. In 1776 Squire Boone performed the first marriage ceremony in Kentucky when he united Betsy Callaway, one of the three girls carried away from Booneborough by the Indians, and Samuel Henderson, brother of Col. Richard Henderson, proprietor of the Transylvania Company.

BRUSH CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

July 20, 1975 on the occasion of his ninety-ninth birthday, Willis C. Johnson, of Mt. Vernon told me of the old Primitive Baptist Church at Brush Creek which he had attended ninety one years ago. He could describe the old log church house, about sixteen feet square, with one window and one door and a fieldstone chimney put together with mud. There was no glass in the one window, which had a heavy-hewn shutter hung on hand-wrought iron hinges. The seats were of split logs and had no backs to them. The logs to these seats were wooden poles driven into auger holes in the bottom of the logs. This building was used until 18890, when a more modern place of worship was erected.

Mr. Johnson also remembered many of the early ministers of the Brush Creek Baptist Church. He recalled Bro. J.C. Newland, an elderly man living in Somerset. He would travel over almost impassable country roads leaving home on Friday and coming to Broodhead where he had no bed to sleep, arriving at Brush Creek on Sunday in time for the delivery of his sermon. At the conclusion of services, he would drive back to Broodhead, then on to Somerset on Monday. This was around 1870. Following Bro. Newland, the next regular pastor of this church was Bro. Abijah Anderson from Clay County, and after him Bro. J.N. Culton who Mr. Johnson remembers as filling the pulpit for forty years. In later years Bro. Culton was unable to travel from his home in Madison County to serve the church at Brush Creek, so for awhile the church was moved to Boone, Kentucky, for his convenience. After his death, the church went down for awhile but was later revived.

Mr. Johnson states that this church belonged to the Tate's Creek Association, which at that time had a membership of seven churches. This was one of the older of the many such associations that flourished in the early religious history of the state. Tate's Creek Association, to which many of the earlier Baptist Churches belonged, was formed in 1783 and sometime before 1830 a dissident five anti-mission churches had drawn off and formed themselves into the Tate's Creek Association of Predestinarian Baptists. It was probably the latter group to which this church belonged.

The exact date of the organization of Brush Creek Baptist Church is unknown but it was some time before 1855. Uncle Johnny Swinford and James Anglin are mentioned as builders of the church house. It is not definitely stated whether it was the first or the second building with which they were concerned, but it was probably the first. The building erected in 1889 still stands and is now in use by the Church denomination.

Once again, I am calling on members of the various Baptist

Churches in Rockcastle County to help me give due notice of them in the county history. Since the churches in Mt. Vernon and Broodhead and other larger centers will be easy to contact, my principal concern is with the older and smaller Baptist Churches in more remote sections. D. Graves of Sand Springs speaks of several old churches in his part of the county. It is but natural to assume that many of them sprang up in the early days when so much of the travel into Kentucky was along the course of Skeggs Creek. On his list is Mt. Pisgah Baptist Church, which stood on a ridge south of a place he calls High Dry, later Cromer's gasoline mill site, Blue Springs Baptist Church. A post office was located in this old church house for awhile. The post office was named for Wm. Hansford; Old Skeggs Creek Baptist Church, built before the Civil War, near WABD, Ky.; Old Buffalo Baptist Church. The four just named all were built of logs, with only the Buffalo building being replaced. Who can tell us anything about these old churches? Have they completely disappeared or have they been reorganized? I've moved to new locations?

This space in next week's Signal will be devoted to the history of Union Baptist Church, at Red Hill, the story of which has been remarkably well told in a pamphlet written and published by A.D. Ponder. Estle Bullock, one of the deacons of this church, was presented me with a copy of this booklet which I have found extremely interesting.

It is hoped that we may soon acquire a history of the Scaffold Cave Baptist Church, which is probably the oldest church in Rockcastle County and among the oldest in the state.

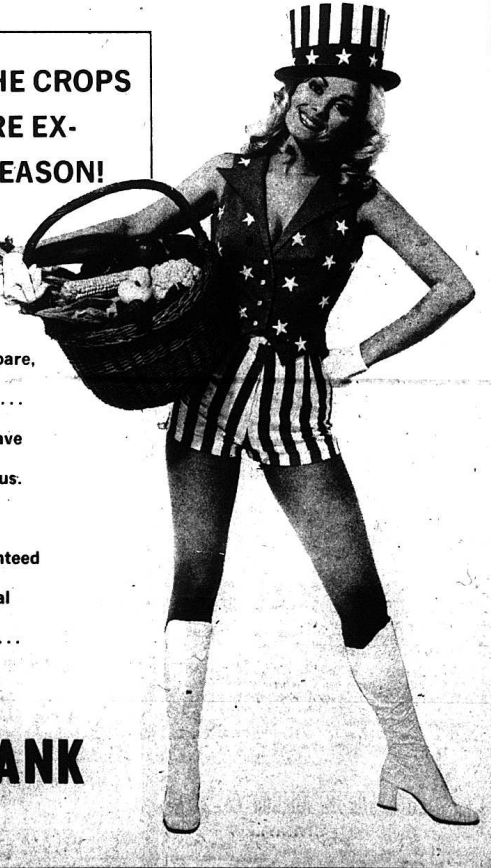

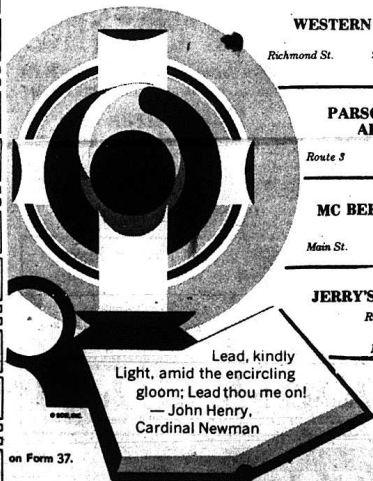

Beef burger barbecue and other food was served during the good rain that was most welcome as it was needed.

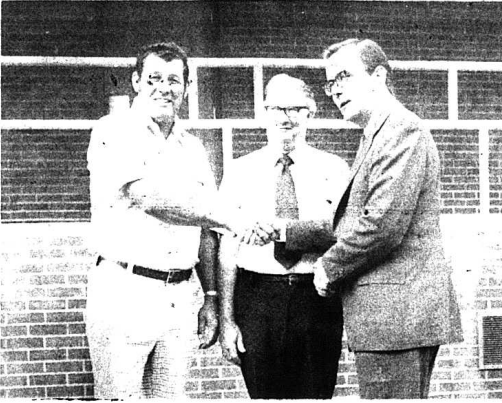

DEER HUNT AT ARMY DEPOT

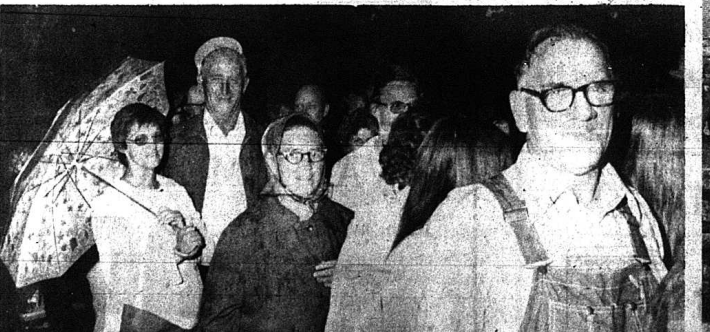

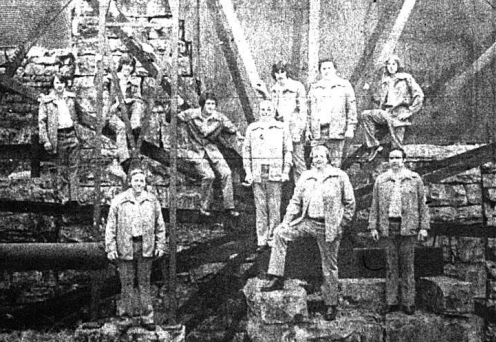

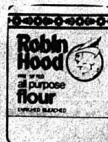

FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

Our nation's founding fathers gave us a government of three powers, supposedly balanced among the executive, the judicial and the legislative.

One might wonder, if perhaps, the framers of Kentucky's constitution might have had something in mind other than a true balance of power.

Certainly, intended or not, the chief executive of the Commonwealth has in his grasp an awesomely large share of the power.

With the legislature in session only 60 days every two years - it has been said by some that two days every 60 years would be enough - it is entirely up to the governor how much power the legislature shall have, how much of a share in the decision-making process, how much of a check they will be allowed to have.

Then, too, the General Assembly has a tendency to abdicate what power it does have to the chief executive.

Gov. Julian Carroll has taken an interesting task which seems to fall in line with his avowed intention to help the legislature become stronger, to involve them more in decision-making.

But does it really? Of late, Carroll has taken to describing certain issues and their solutions as a matter of public policy which should be decided by the General Assembly.

Collective bargaining for public employees is one of the most visible of these selected issues.

What conclusions can be drawn from such a stand? I. Carroll has decided to

involve the legislature in the decision-making process.

2. Carroll has shifted the balance of power completely over, forcing the legislature into a position of strength.

3. Carroll has taken a steaming hot political potato and tossed it into the hands of the legislators who can probably handle it better since they have to appeal to a smaller constituency whose views on the issue may be more sharply defined.

If point one is correct, then why does Carroll just describe certain issues as matters of public policy? Point two is an incorrect conclusion.

It would seem logical to assume that if Carroll describes something as a matter for the legislature to decide, he would obligate himself to either sign the resulting legislation or let it pass into law.

In response to a query, Carroll made it very clear this is not the case. He reserves the right, granted as a part of the balance of power, to veto any legislation put before him.

Then there is point three. Robert Gable, at least, might pick at one on a multiple choice test.

Point one - the idea of involving the legislature - can raise a whole line of speculation concerning the balance of power - in this state.

Unless a governor is willing to communicate and compromise with the General Assembly, can the legislature ever really be a force in meaningful legislation?

Unlike the federal branches, where a veto-proof Congress is at least possible, Kentucky could never have

veto-proof General Assembly, at least under the present system.

The way things are set up here, the legislature has ended its statutory session before the governor, as a rule, ever has to worry about signing or vetoing the vast majority of the legislation.

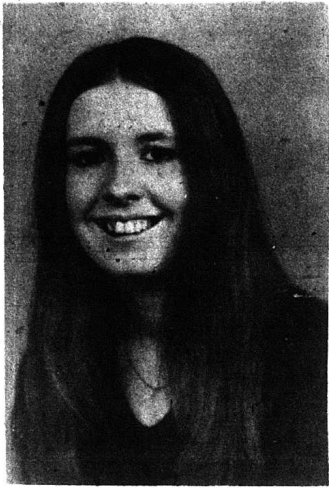

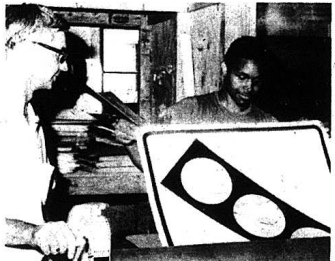

RIGHT FREEZER CONTAINERS MAKE A BIG DIFFERENCE

Cold air in your freezer is super-dry. Unless the foods there are protected by tightly-closed containers that are moisture-proof, this air will seep in and dry them out. In the process, they will lose much of their good flavor, color and nutrients.

This is why you should use only packaging materials that are recommended for freezer storage. Don't use plastic or waxed-paper bread wrappers, cottage cheese or milk cartons, because they won't give food the necessary protection.

Plastic freezer containers with tight-fitting lids are excellent. They come in pint, 1 1/2 pint and quart sizes. They are reusable.

Polyethylene freezer bags are popular, too. Some people use them alone, and others like to add a cardboard outer box for extra protection and easy stacking. You could save those cottage cheese and milk cartons to use as a outer cover for freezer bags.

There are dual-purpose glass freezer and canning jars with wide mouths and tapered sides. Don't use ordinary "one-trip" jars - the kind you buy mayonnaise, peanut butter and other foods in. These packer's jars haven't been tempered to withstand extreme hot and cold. In addition, they often have a narrow mouth, which means you need to allow extra head space for expansion of food during freezing and that you have to completely thaw food before removing it.

Sheets of moisture-vapor-resistant polyethylene and heavy aluminum foil are suitable for meat, fish, or poultry. Here again, protective cartons may be used as an outer cover.

Coated freezer wrap is also available in rolls. With a special air-tight fold, this is suitable for meat, poultry, and fish.

No, it's not okay to can with ordinary grocery jars. (But if you're going to do it anyhow, be

careful!)

"Is it okay to can and pickle fruits and vegetables in mayonnaise jars or other grocery jars?" asks the desperate home gardener with vegetables ready to be pickled and no Mason jars available.

"No, it's risky business to use anything other than sound, chip-free home-canning jars." We realize that many people are going ahead and using the grocery jars anyhow in an effort to save those fruits and vegetables they've worked so hard to grow.

"It would be better to freeze them or dry them, but freezers are expensive and hard to come by, unless you just happen on a good deal on a used model."

Here's why it's chancy to use ordinary jars. Regular canning lids are not designated to give an airtight seal on these jars. There's a good possibility the lid won't seal because the jar necks are too short for the bands to screw down tightly. Failure of an airtight seal can lead to food spoilage.

Lack of heat treated glass is a second reason for steering clear of used grocery jars. They are more susceptible than standard canning jars to sudden changes in water temperatures or to a cool draft of air on a jar just removed from the canner. There's the danger that they will break in a boiling water bath or pressure canner.

Even with these kinds of warnings going out, some people are doing it anyhow. Food specialists can't with a clear conscience condone the practice. They can only say be careful in handling the jars, extra careful about sudden changes in air and water temperatures; extra careful about getting a proper seal; extra careful to check for signs of food spoilage when you open the jar; extra careful to boil the low-acid vegetables 10 or 15 minutes before eating them - even if they look and smell perfectly all right.

There's a shortage of regular lids and rubbers, too. Then you really are stuck, because there's just no way you can re-use old lids or rubbers safely. Using an ordinary screw-on lid from a grocery jar is a no-no, too. Once a jar is opened, that lid won't give an airtight seal when re-used.

Why the depleted supplies

of canning jars and lids? Didn't EVERYONE know about the big push this year on home gardening?

Yes, they knew, but production of canning jars was slowed up or halted by a shortage of soda-ash, one of the major ingredients used in their manufacture. A shortage of steel can be blamed for the lack of canning lids on store shelves.

And let's face it, NOBODY really knew the demand for food-preservation supplies would be this big.

NO MORE CANNING JARS OF LIDS? THEN FREEZE EXTRA TOMATOES

If you run out of jars and lids before you run out of tomatoes, freeze them. Frozen juice is excellent. Stewed tomatoes make a good-enough frozen product, useful in sauces, soups, and casseroles the rest of the year. They won't have that same fine flavor as canned tomatoes, but freezing certainly beats letting them go to waste.

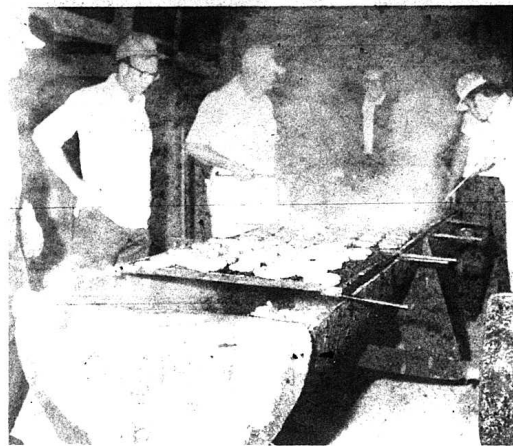
Here's how to prepare the stewed tomatoes. Wash, trim, and peel firm ripe tomatoes. Cut in quarters and simmer in their own juice until tender - about 10 minutes.

Place pan containing tomatoes in cold water until they cool down. Pack into containers, leaving 1/2-inch head space for pints and 1 inch for quarts. Seal and freeze.

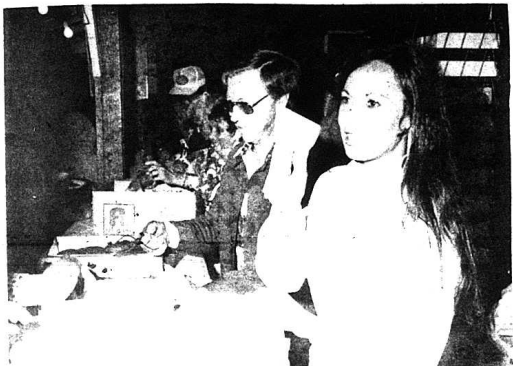
To freeze juice, follow the directions for stewed tomatoes, but don't peel them. Simmer tomatoes in their own juice about 5 minutes. Press through a sieve or food mill. Cool the same way you did the stewed tomatoes. Pour into containers, leaving 1 1/2-inch head space. Seal and freeze.

If you like, add 1 teaspoon salt to each quart of juice or tomatoes before freezing.

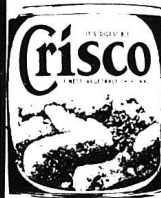
