





Water pipes freeze and burst every winter. But don't let this happen to you. Weatherize this happen to you. Weatherize this happen to you. Weatherize this happen to you press for permanent protection, according to a University of Kentugky Extension housing specialist. You can use insulation taping to tubing made especially for water pipes. You can even wrap them layers of old newspaper, tying the ends shut, if need be - then cover the newspapers with pilastic.

Or-you can wrap them in but insulation.just tie the insulation around the pipes.

Or-you can wrap your pipes with special plug-in-lectrical heat the pipes.

Or-you can wrap your pipes with special plug-in-lectrical heat tapes. These are thermostatically controlled and can'be turned on in very cold weather. They work beautifully off for long periods of time.

For upright pipes in cellar crawl spaces, you can circle pipes with overlapping tarpaper or crawl spaces, you can circle pipes with overlapping tarpaper tubes about six inches in diameter and the tubes closed

with a string. If your pipes are horizontal ones you can do this also — but it is more difficult because they're usually close to the ground.

If your bouse has a drafty—cellar or crawl space, the sudden drop in temperature could cause freezing when you might not expect it. If you cut down on the draft, you can save a lot of problems — and energy.

The longer the extra — cold weather lasts the more likely it was the pipes thaw.

The olonger the extra — cold weather lasts the more likely it burst. So, if the weather report is "for more of the same," you'd better start thawing your pipes. Wrap the pipes with rags and be sure the faucet is open so steam can escape. Start with the faucet and work back, or pressure building-up could cause an explosion in the pipes. If you have to call a plumber, her will probably thaw the pipes with a special heat cold for the faucet freits steeped in
