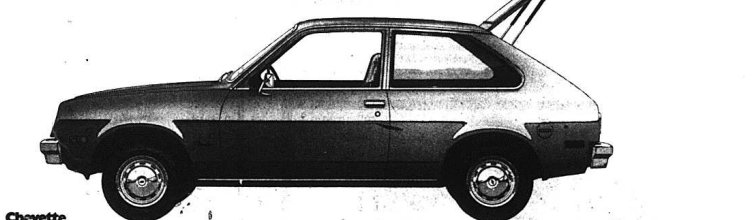

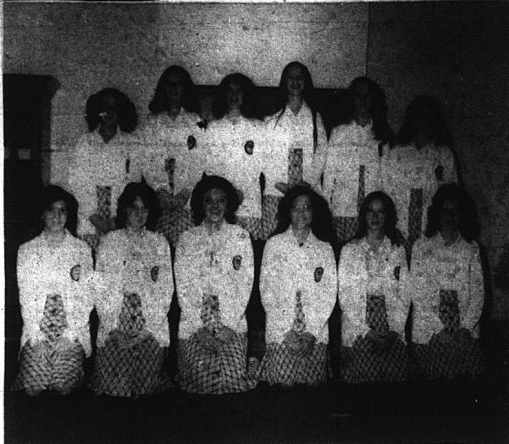

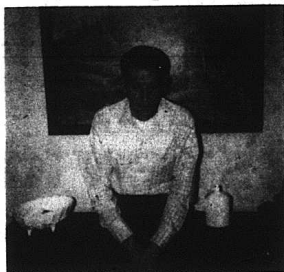

If you pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any 3-month calendar quarter, you must send a report of the wages and the social security contribution due on the wages to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter. A babysitter who comes to your home is considered a household worker. Wage reports and social

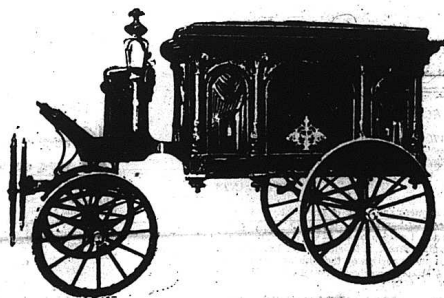
security contributions for the third quarter of 1975—July, August, and September—are due by October 31.

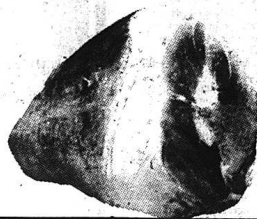

Mt. Vernon Firemen and Volunteers successfully fought the blaze which threatened at one point to engulf the white building at Mt. Vernon Elementary School last Wednesday night. Vernon Fire Department with preventing the fire from spreading to the classrooms on the right in the picture. These rooms are now being used, except for the one immediately adjacent to the furnace room, and can continue to be used since they are heated by a furnace of their own.

Fire Heavily Damages Four Classrooms At MVES

A fire broke out in the white buildings at Mt. Vernon Elementary School last Wednesday evening and left four classrooms unusable. Buford Parkerson, principal, said this week that the extent of the damage would entail a new roof, new ceilings, new wiring, a new furnace and heat ducts and new light fixtures for the rooms in addition to painting and general repairs to the rooms. The fire was reported to the Mt. Vernon Fire Department by Chester Hellard, who lives across the street, between 8 and 8:15 p.m. Mr. Parkerson later said that it was believed that a control gauge on the furnace malfunctioned causing the fire. Parkerson credited prompt and efficient effort by the Mt.

Vernon Fire Department and a fire wall between the furnace room and classrooms to the north with saving the building from being gutted. After the fire was extinguished, firemen were again called to the scene about 3 a.m. Thursday morning because the blaze had broken out again between the partition of the first and second classrooms on the south end of the building. At this point it was when the classrooms suffered the most damage from fire, smoke and water and in fact, all of the fifth grade textbooks were lost due to water damage. Mr. Parkerson had left the school's custodian, J.T. Lovell, at the scene after the earlier fire and Mr. Lovell discovered the fire before it had

gotten too great a hold and notified local firemen. Very little in the way of actual furniture was lost in the fire with a teacher's desk being the only item lost. Sup't. Parsons said Tuesday that the building was covered by \$40,000 insurance with \$3,500 on the contents. It is expected that repairs to the building will take anywhere from 60 to 90 days and three of the classrooms (all fifth grades) are presently being housed in the Catholic Church's Recreation Hall just up from the school. The other class which had to be relocated (a fourth grade) was moved into a classroom in the basement of the main school building.

Results Tabulated On Lake Linville Question

The response to our questionnaire of the last two weeks concerning the Mt. Vernon City Council's action in banning gasoline motors from Lake Linville, was quite good with 250 persons submitting their opinion. Readers were asked to voice their opinion in one of three ways: (1) Lake Linville should continue to be operated as it is at present with no restrictions as to the use of gasoline engines. (2) In support of the Council's action in banning gasoline engines from the lake and (3) A compromise should be worked out providing

for all types of recreation on the lake which would insure boaters' safety and a quality water supply. Of the three, the compromise opinion was the most popular, polling 105 votes in its favor. The second "opinion-getter" was the one in support of the Council's action with a late-surge of votes Tuesday afternoon putting it up to 99

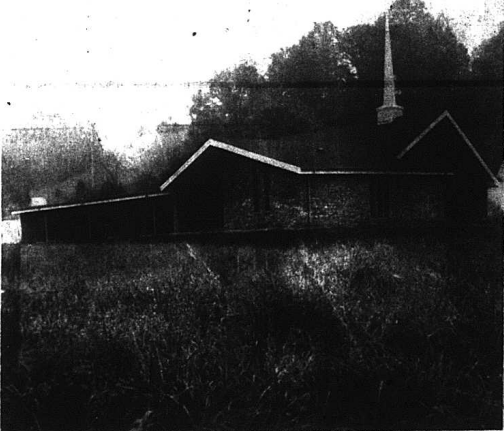

Conservation Essay and Poster Contests announced

It's time again for the Conservation Essay Contest and the Conservation Poster Contest. The topic for the contests this year will be "Land-My Community's Heritage: Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow."

The contests are sponsored by the Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times in cooperation with the Kentucky Department of Education and the Kentucky Association of Conservation Districts.

The poster competition is open only to elementary students in grades one through five. The Essay Contest is open to students in all grades, but they are not allowed to enter both the essay and the poster contest during the same school year.

A special reference tabloid on Land has been distributed to the schools for use by students and teachers. If, for some reason, your school has not received copies of this reference material, contact your local Soil Conservation Office. For Rockcastle County, this office is located on the second floor of the County Courthouse.

The winning essay and poster from each school should be submitted to the superintendent's office by December 1st. A special committee will be chosen to determine the county winners from among the school winners.

There will be \$4,050 in Savings Bonds awarded to winners of the essay and poster contests. The writer of the top essay in the state will receive a \$500 bond. The second place essay winner will receive a \$300 bond and third place will earn a \$100 bond.

The state winner in the poster contest will be awarded a \$100 Savings Bond. The second place poster winner will receive a \$75 bond and the third place award will be a \$50 bond.

The three state winners in each contest, their parents and teachers will be guests of honor at the newspaper's Annual Farm Awards Luncheon in Louisville next March. Prizes will be awarded at the luncheon.

Each essay contest winner in the state's 121 Conservation Districts will receive a \$25 bond and a wooden plaque from the Louisville daily newspapers. District winners in the poster contest will receive a wooden plaque. Certificates will also be presented to the District winners and runners-up in both contests.

In addition to the state awards, the Rockcastle County Conservation District will present awards to the second and third place Rockcastle County winners in the poster contest. The Rockcastle County Conservation District will present these awards at an awards banquet in February or March of next year.

The District would like for every Rockcastle County student to enter either the essay contest or the poster contest. Remember, the essay contest is open to school students. The poster contest is open only to students in grades one through five.

questions and answers

Q. My husband is severely disabled and we think he's eligible for supplemental security income. I've heard that disability claims take a long time to process, and we need money now. Is there some way we can get some money to help us while he's waiting on his claim?

A. Under the law, a person who is found to be presumptively disabled and is otherwise eligible can get supplemental security income pay-

ments for up to 3 months while he waits for the decision on his disability claim. An applicant can be presumed disabled if he has one of the following conditions: loss of two or more limbs; loss of a leg at the hip; total deafness; inability for bed confinement; stroke; cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, or muscular atrophy; diabetes with the loss of a foot; Down's Syndrome; or severe mental deficiency. When your husband applies for supplemental security income, the people in the social security office will tell him if he can get presumptive disability payments.

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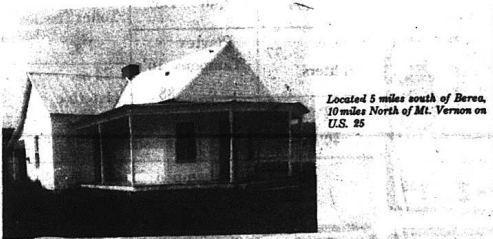

It requires dedicated and conscientious individuals to administer its use in preserving our way of life and

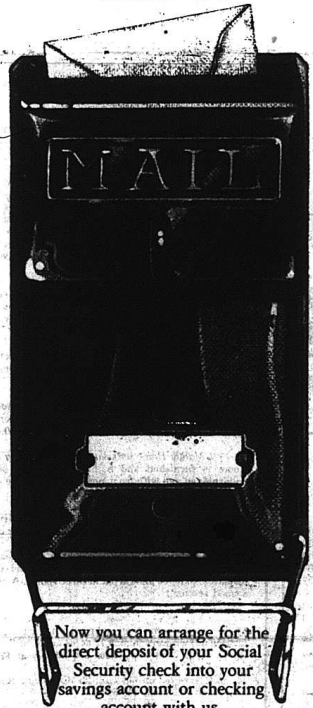

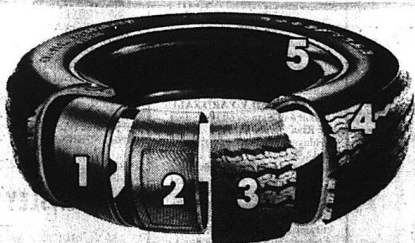

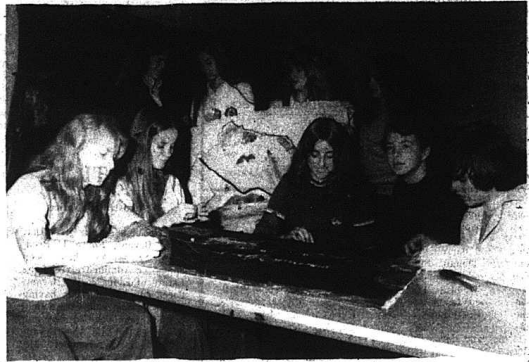

HOMEOWNER'S BEWARE--PIPES DO FREEZE!

Water pipes freeze and burst every winter. But don't let this happen to you. Weatherize your house now! You can insulate your pipes for permanent protection, according to a University of Kentucky Extension housing specialist. You can use insulation taping to tubing made especially for water pipes. You can even wrap them in layers of old newspaper, tying the ends shut, if need be - then cover the newspapers with plastic. Or you can wrap them in batt insulation, just tie the insulation around the pipes. Or you can wrap your pipes with special plug-in electrical heat tapes. These are thermostatically controlled and can be turned on in very cold weather. They work beautifully as long as the electricity isn't cut off for long periods of time. For upright pipes in cellar or crawl spaces, you can circle pipes with overlapping tarpaper tubes about six inches in diameter and tie tubes closed with a string. If your pipes are horizontal ones you can do this also - but it is more difficult because they're usually close to the ground. If your pipes freeze - open faucets wide. This gives expansion room to the frozen water and it may keep the pipes from freezing. If you're going to be away from home, turn off the water line to the house so you don't have a flood when the pipes thaw. If your house has a drafty cellar or crawl space, the sudden drop in temperature could cause freezing when you might not expect it. If you cut down on the draft, you can save a lot of problems and energy. The longer the extra - cold weather lasts the more likely it is that your frozen pipes will burst. So, if the weather report is "for more of the same," you'd better start thawing your pipes. Wrap the pipes with rags and pour hot water over the rags and be sure the faucet is open so steam can escape. Start with the faucet and work back, or pressure building-up could cause an explosion in the pipes. If you have to call a plumber, her will probably thaw the pipes with a special heat coil or torch.

FOOD CLIPS

Dried fruits staged in tightly closed containers will keep well at room temperature for several months, (during hot humid months, however, they should be refrigerated). Did you know that most fresh, raw, unweetened fruits contain fewer than 100 calories per serving? Need Vitamin A? Serve Cantaloupe or Apricots. Dried apricots are a concentrated source of Vitamin A. You should know - pitted sweet cherries cost more than unpitted ones - but, are more convenient to use. Canned clingstone peaches usually cost less than freestone peaches. Roll crumb cheese balls in chopped walnuts or pecans - arrange with fresh fruit for a nutritious and attractive dessert. Remember - cracked or solid eggs may contain harmful bacteria. They should only be used in foods that are to be thoroughly cooked, such as baked goods or casseroles, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture nutritionists. Handle dry ice "with care" Be sure the room is well ventilated when you use it. Never touch dry ice with bare hands. Using home canned vegetables and home canned meats? Be sure to boil them after opening and - before you taste them. Heating usually masks any odor of spoilage - more notice. Home canned meat or poultry should be boiled 30 minutes in a covered pan before

tasting. If meat develops the characteristic odor of spoiled meat - destroy it without tasting. Stuffing fresh- or thawed meat, poultry or fish? Put the stuffing in lightly - without packing - to allow heat to penetrate more quickly. *****
