David Owens goes after Estill County's ball carrier in Monday night's game. Coming to help out are Bobby Boring, No. 67, and Larry Welch, No. 77. Both Boring and Welch played fine defensive games for the Rockets. Three other Rockets were also in the right place at the right time with Earl Hammons, Shane Bullock and Robert Owens stopping an Estill county runner with open field to the goal line except for them. The Rockets have had a hard time this season with injuries to the team taking their toll and a tough schedule but they have, for the most part, played good consistent ball, a fact not reflected in their record.

Jerry Pensol, senior running back for the Rockets, drives for yardage against Estill County Monday night. Pensol was leading yard gainer for the Rockets but to no avail as the Rockets were defeated 41-0.

#### ROCKETS DEFEATED BY ESTILL COUNTY

The Estill County Engineers handed the Rockets a stunning 41-0 defeat Monday night on their home field. The Engineers, with 12 seniors on their team, dominated the game from start to finish. The Rockets lost the toss of the coin and Jerry Pensol kicked off to the Engineers driving a 60 yard kick into the end zone. Estill

was successful on their first drive but the Rockets were too and Estill took the ball on their next series and with 7 minutes and 53 seconds left in the first quarter, put 6 points on the board. The try for the extra points was no good. The Rockets and Engineers played on pretty even terms the remainder of the first half, exchanging a couple of fumbles with Carr and Boring recovering an Estill County fumble and

Welch recovering a Rocket fumble but a personal foul penalty against the Rockets late in the second quarter on a fourth down play by Estill County, which would have turned the ball over to the Rockets, instead gave the ball to Estill with a first down on the Rockets 35 yard line and with 3 minutes and 58 seconds remaining in the game, Estill County scores from the Rockets 35. Again the extra point try is unsuccessful and

the half ends with Estill in front 12-0.

In the second half, on the Rockets' second play from scrimmage, a fumble in the backfield turned the ball over the Engineers on the Rockets 30. But, the Rockets hold with the help of a holding penalty against Estill County and the Engineers are forced to punt. The Rockets wind up with the ball on their own 10 yard line and on the first play from scrimmage of this series, a fumble gives the ball to Estill County on the Rockets 5 yard line and with 7 minutes and 3 seconds remaining in the third quarter. Estill scores around end and this time, the Engineers place kick is good for a 19-0 score.

The Rockets took the kick-off and managed to get a drive going with the help of a free maak penalty against the Engineers; however, another fumble by the Rockets turned the ball over to Estill County on the Rockets 36 yard line. A long pass set up the next Estill score and they went over from the two yard line. A fake Snik and pass to a receiver wide open in the end zone made the score at this point 25-0. On the first play from scrimmage, the Rockets once again have trouble holding onto the ball in the backfield and Hackworth picks up the fumble and returns it 22 yards; however, an offside penalty against the Rockets makes it 1-15 for the Rockets on their own 18. The Rockets threaten heavily in the fourth quarter after Welch recovers a fumble for the Rockets on Estill County's 20 yard line but it was not to be as a Rockets pass is intercepted on Estill County's 30 and returned all the way to the touchdown. The point after was good and Estill County led it 34-0.

The Engineers scored once more with only seconds left in the game on a pass by the Engineers for the final 41-0 score.


She survived by seven children, 48 grandchildren and 17 great grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her husband, Horace C. Asay.

# Rockcastle Recollections

James O'Mara, whose mother, Mrs. Tom O'Mara, has been of much help to me in re-reading the early history of the town of Mt. Vernon, informs me that there were two complete companies organized in and around Mt. Vernon, known as the "Rockcastle Company" and the Meyers Company, taking their names from the men who organized them. He said that they marched from here to Camp Nelson for their induction and that about half the regular force of another company was organized here and marched to Camp Nelson where it was filled up to required strength with men from different sections of the country. Unfortunately, we do not have the rosters for any of these men. The only one we have discovered to date is that of Company D of the 49th Kentucky Infantry, organized and first commanded by Capt. John M. Cook, who after resigning his command on account of sickness was succeeded by William Carson, grandfather of Gus Carson, from whom my information was received.

So far as is now known, no Confederate companies were organized in Rockcastle County. The considerable number from this county

who saw service with the Confederate forces mostly crossed the line into Tennessee and joined up there. There were a number of them who joined up with General Zollicoffer's forces during and after the Battle of Wildcat Mountain.

To add to our anecdotes of wartime days, we have a story from Gilbert Nelson concerning a young man named Richard Jupp who was substituted for a Mr. Rosenbaum, when he was called for service advertised that he would pay eight hundred dollars to any man who would serve in his place. This offer appealed to young Jupp, who had been thinking about joining up anyway, so he volunteered in Rosenbaum's place. Before the deal could be closed, however, he had to be examined and accepted for service by the nearest office. He passed his physical examination with flying colors but when he got the recruiting sergeant his age, 14, the sergeant said he wouldn't do at all, telling him that he probably couldn't lug a heavy musket around all day. He also warned him that he would probably be a lot of hand-to-hand fighting and a boy of that age would stand a good chance against a grown man, adding that if he was to hit a man he wouldn't hardly feel it. Seeing his chance at getting eight hundred dollars slipping, young Jupp hauled off and hit him so hard it knocked him across the room. The sergeant thought maybe he would do after all and forthwith signed him up.

After collecting the eight hundred dollars from Rosenbaum, he bought a mule and a sixty acre farm with it. His father agreed to farm it for him, save everything the farm made and turn it over to him when he got back to make a new start. He and another boy about his own age were drummer boys. One night, the Confederates made a surprise attack on their camp and the boys escaped by hiding in a nest of coveys. The recruiting sergeant in this cave for twenty-one days, living on bats and lizards and anything else that came to hand. At first, they were afraid the Rebels would discover them and after that danger was past, they would find their own way out and they would be shot as deserters. Finally, deciding they might as well die before a firing squad as starve to death, they hunted up their company and surrendered. As they had feared, they were tried as deserters and sentenced to be shot. They were lined up before the firing squad. Richard Jupp was so impressed by this turn of events and so grateful at escaping death, that he dedicated himself then and there to becoming a good soldier. When he enlistment was up, he signed on for three more years. He fought on through to the surrender and lived until 1890, dying at the age of 84. Up until then, he is said to have maintained that the recruiting sergeant was right when he said the Army was no place for a boy of 14.

Another Civil War story deals with James E. Acree, whose

brother offered him a horse and all necessary equipment if he would go with him to join the Confederate Army in Tennessee, but he refused and joined instead the First Kentucky Cavalry, under Colonel Woolford and took part in the Battle of Wild Cat Mountain, sometimes known also as the Battle of Rockcastle Hills. Later, at the Battle of Mill Springs, he witnessed the death of General Zollicoffer and always believed he was killed by the fire of his own men who were coming up behind him as he led his troops into a crossfire between the two armies. He remembered seeing Union soldiers pulling locks of hair from the General's head as souvenirs while he was still alive.

Later, Private James was captured and sent to Libby Prison, where the daily ration was a pone of cornbread per man, with sometimes a piece of horsemeat added. He said the guards themselves fared no better, as the Confederacy was by that time on greatly reduced rations for its own men as well as prisoners. A number of men, including Acree, were loaded on a train and started for Andersonville Prison. Believing that if they once got inside Andersonville, they would never get out alive, they started cutting through the wall of the boxcars they were in with an old pocket knife one of them had gotten hold of. Carefully concealing their work from the guards who came through the car on inspection, they finally cut a hole big enough for the smaller ones of their number to skin through. Acree being included. Traveling at night and hiding by day, they set out to make their way back home, living off the country that had already been swept bare by foragers in both armies. The highlight of their experiences was buying a rabbit from a negro boy. Starting to roast it over a burning brushpile, they became fearful they might be seen. Dropping the rabbit into a pillbox, Acree was carrying, they started to cross a stream to get into a more sheltered spot for themselves. Crossing the stream on an insecure log Acree dropped the pillow case into the water. Making a grab for it he caught the pillowcase by the bottom instead of the top, which spilled the rabbit back into the current, which rapidly carried it away. But it was by no means the end of his troubles. When he got across he had to fight the rest of the party for losing the only meal they had had a chance at in several days.

When Acree finally got home he had a hard time getting in the house. He was so dirty and raggedy, with hair and beard so long and bushy, that his wife did not recognize him and locked herself and children in the house behind barred doors. In spite of this experience he again enlisted in the army and served to the end of the war. His greatest satisfaction was that he never met or any battlefield the brother who had enlisted with the Southern army at about the same time he had joined forces with the North.

Making some farm business adjustments between now and the end of the year may help you save on your 1975 income tax bill.

Since tax management is a year-round job, one should always consider the tax consequences when making any farm business decision, says H. Lee Durham, County Extension Agent for Agriculture. There is little you can do to reduce the tax bite at filing time, he adds.

Now is a good time to estimate your expected income and tax for this year's farm business. Your 1974 income tax return can serve as a comparison to do this. Depending on what your calculations show, it may pay to postpone some income until next year or make some expenditures now rather than next year.

### MR. AND MRS. JACK PIKE VISIT RUSSIA

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Pike of Lexington, Ky. have recently returned from a pleasure cruise of THE BLACK SEA. Among the most unusual countries they visited was Russia. Mrs. Pike will be remembered by her friends and relatives in this area as the former Peryda McWilliam.

Mr. and Mrs. Pike flew from New York City to Athens, Greece where they boarded the M. S. Jupiter, a Greek ship line. Their first port of embarkation was Varna, Bulgaria, then on to Constanta, Romania, where they spent these two countries appear very similar, in as much as they produce miles and miles of grape vineyards, and wine is much easier to obtain than water. They still use horse and buggies and also donkey driven carts. The elderly women do hard construction work while the husbands supervise them.

Even though Mr. and Mrs. Pike have traveled half way around the world, she said that in Russia the people are exactly as we have always pictured them, grim, sad and unfriendly. When our ship docked in Yalta, there were thousands of Russians on hand just wate to us disembark, as if seeing Americans was a day of celebration. They did not wate to us or smile, being separated by a long heavily guarded Mrs. Pike added, that she had brought some small trinkets from America which she had planned to give to some of the children as a friendly gesture, since she could not speak Russian, but we were not allowed near them, nor they near us, even to smile.

However, the outstanding highlight of the entire cruise was the day we visited the Palace and saw the actual room and table where the historical Yalta Conference was held. I stood with great pride and with tears in my eyes looking at the portrait of Franklin D. Roosevelt there with Stalin and Churchill and others signing the famous document. (We were told that our group would be the last Americans to view the portrait.)

We were not allowed to go shopping alone in Russia, and only once could we shop for 10 minutes with a guide. Before our ship sailed to Russia, we were required to fill out a declaration of anything in our possession that was made of gold (gold rings, watches, how many, etc.) and also how much money we carried with us. They were not interested in diamonds or other jewels, only gold. Some of the men in our group wondered if the Russians would count the gold in their teeth.

From Russia, we sailed to Istanbul, Turkey, and on to Athens, Greece. Here I might object as an over-enthusiast, only one of these countries have air conditioning, even in the most elegant hotels or restaurants, you cannot get borrow, or steal, or lose water. All of the water is bottled, and is always safer to drink wine than water. We spent part of one day touring a small part of Asia, we had no

after estimating your year's income, you may want to buy some items - such as supplies, feeds and fertilizer - now instead of waiting until after the first of the year. Make needed repairs to machinery, buildings, and fences, too, before the year's end. And pay any large bills before January 1. You may also want to buy breeding livestock and make

major purchases such as machinery before the end of the year. This may allow you to get more investment credit and additional first-year depreciations.

Consider delaying sale of certain farm produce until after the first of the year. You may want to hold some of your tobacco, corn or livestock for early 1976 sale.

If your income is considerably above the average of the last four years, look into the possibility of "income averaging" when your tax return is filed. Your tax consultant or an agent of the Internal Revenue Service can supply details on averaging income over a

four-year period. If your estimates show this year's income to be lower than usual, shift the paying of some farm expenses into 1976. You can also sell all 1975 crops before the end of the year.

If this year's farm business is operating at a loss, consider taking advantage of the "net operating loss" provision of the tax law. This recovers taxes paid in prior years and allows you to establish the amount of loss that can be carried forward to offset income in future years. Contact your tax consultant or an Internal Revenue agent if you think this provision might apply to your business. Whether your 1975 income

is higher or lower than usual, consider putting some money into a "tax-sheltered" retirement program. A recent law allows a self-employed person to set aside, for retirement purposes, \$1,500 or 15 percent of his net income, whichever is less. This amount is not counted as taxable income until the time of retirement. Your insurance agent or banker can provide information on this tax law provision.

A rare American Chestnut tree has been discovered on a farm near Mt. Vernon. Dr. Louis Shain, Forest Pathologist in the Department of Plant Pathology at University of Kentucky, right was here Tuesday to measure the tree and take sample cuttings back to his laboratory for inspection. The tree measures 17 1/2 inches in girth which Dr. Shain said was the largest living American Chestnut tree in Kentucky which he has seen. The tree has some blight on it, Dr. Shain said. The fungus Endothia Parasitica wiped out the American Chestnut trees in this country in the early 1900's after it was introduced in New York supposedly on a load of logs from Europe. It is carried by wind-blown spores. The tree is 90 feet high and had a good crop of chestnuts on it this season. There are a number of sprouts around the trunk of the original tree which are also infected. Dr. Shain was unable to say how long the tree would survive the blight. Also in the photo is Judy Ferrell, Technician to Dr. Shain.

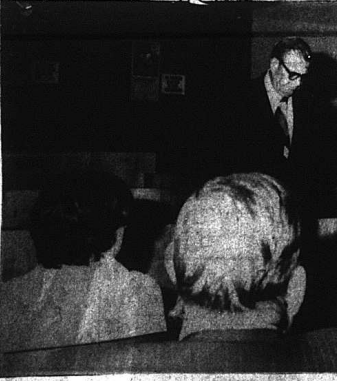

Mr. George Spoonamore, Stanford, was elected to a two-year term as district director on the American Dairy Association of Kentucky Board of Directors.

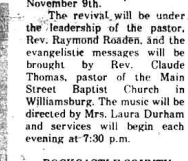

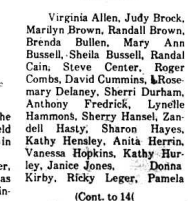

## FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

A recent conversation with Gov. Julian Carroll brought to light an interesting explanation of Carroll's high-speeding primary campaign earlier this year against Jefferson County Judge Todd Hollenbach.

"I started out thinking John Y. Brown was going to run against me and we couldn't afford less of a commitment," Carroll said. By the time Brown pulled out for good, it seems, Carroll had already made the heavy financial commitment for his campaign, including contracts for consultants, advertising, and the works.

There were some other reasons for the high cost, like having a long campaign and carrying the Democratic party headquarters staff on the campaign payroll.

But, in the end, it looks like Todd Hollenbach got Julian Casika best shot by default, which is not going to make the judge feel any better about the drubbing he took last May, on the other hand, Carroll's remark is quite a compliment to John Y. Brown, the Louisville chicken tycoon.

Brown tested the waters for the gubernatorial primary, even so far as retaining some professional help from Washington, but eventually pulled back. Carroll's appreciation for Brown's strength, to the tune of a million-dollar campaign, seems to enhance Brown's future.

Carroll's suspension of the state workers in support for doing a parody of a letter

from the governor encouraging participation in the state Savings Bond program has caused a terrific backlash. The governor claims he was not upset that the three poked fun at him, but what they had poked fun at a good program, and mostly, had done it on state time and using a state copying machine.

However, most state employees read it as "The governor can't take a joke." It is among state workers that Carroll's action has had the most serious effect. Reports in many sections of the state indicate state employees are terribly upset by the incident.

While the backlash is not confined to state workers by any means, it is among that group that Carroll has apparently cost himself some votes.

Reinstatement of the workers last week may help appease those who questioned the governor's action. Democratic State Auditor Mary Louise Foust and the Republican who wants her job have developed a cozy political relationship of late.

Pt. Mitchell's Dick Combs is renting Miss Foust's recreation all van for his campaign, at a rate Combs says is saving him thousands of dollars.

Combs declined to find anything wrong with Miss Foust's operation of the office, contrary to advice he was getting from his supporters.

He has also asked Miss Foust to stay on the office and pledged to her he will continue her policies, according to Miss Foust.

In turn, Miss Foust has been "telling my friends," as she puts it, that she would like to see Combs in.

Miss Foust lost a primary bid for the Democratic nomination for the governor, running far behind Gov. Carroll and Hollenbach.

## HOME LINE

### TO KEEP WARM AND SPEND LESS-INSULATE YOUR HOUSE

Much as a low burning fire drives a felloe out to the woodpile, a drafty house and high fuel bill can drive you to the neighborhood of a poor man and spending less this winter.

You don't have to be a pro to put in your own insulation. Both the batt and loosefill types are easy to install. The perfect time to weather proof a house is when it's built. But not everybody does.

Most get up through the roof. So, insulate the attic first. Then insulate the sides with batt-type insulation and sheathing board.

If you insulate your attic floor between the joists, use either batt-type or loose-fill insulation. Blow-in insulation, sometimes called "pouring wool". The loose-fill comes in bales or big bags and is easy to use.

Put up a heavy asphalt saturated or coated building paper or polyethylene first, overlapping it and taping it together with masking tape. Then pour the insulation six inches deep. Loose fill insulation is the cheapest kind you can buy, and it works just fine.

You can insulate the attic floor of a typical four- or five-room house for about \$50 to \$75. If you want the attic to be used as a storage room, staple blanket or batt insulation between the rafters. Some stores where you buy insulation will loan you a stapler. They want a refundable deposit, but it's worth it.

Overlap edges of insulation and be sure it's a snug fit all over. If it's loose, so that warm air won't have a place to leak out. Pretend any hole is the stopper pulled out of a bathtub full of water, and you'll get the picture of how warm air escapes. If the vapor barrier (always placed towards the inside of the house) gets nicked or torn patch it with tape. Floors over an unheated cellar or basement need insulating, too. If you don't insulate your floors, you can put layers of newspapers or tarpaper down to seal off air leaks, and then put linoleum or rugs on top of them. If your interior walls are in bad shape and need replacing, tear the plaster, etc. off and staple batt or blanket insulation onto the indoor surfaces of all outside walls. If you're run out of money, you can cover insulated walls temporarily with fabric or with large sheets of cardboard (such as big packing boxes flattened out).

As for importance of a vapor barrier, here's how

Extension Agricultural Engineers explain: The warm moist air in your house will travel until it hits a cold surface and then it condenses. When loose-fill insulation is in a wall, the moisture will go through the warm interior wall, and through the insulation until it hits the cold sheathing or siding of the house. There it condenses and starts the destructive processes of decay, paint blistering and peeling.

If you have aluminum siding over old wood siding, the poured or blown-in insulation lets moisture pass through until it is trapped by the siding. So it condenses inside your walls and causes rotting, making a worse problem than if you had just plainwood siding.

A vapor barrier on the living area side of the insulation keeps warm, moist air inside the house. If you use pour-type or blow-in insulation, one or two base coats of aluminum or other vapor-proof paint on the inside wall surfaces can serve as a moisture barrier.

Another point worth mentioning is that of keeping warm and that's fluffed up like cotton candy won't do much good. So don't get gypped. Thickness is not the only measure of effectiveness; the insulation has to have enough density and weight, of material too do the job. New standards tell the amount of insulation needed, by weight and number of bags, for a given area.

Putting up storm windows and doors, as well as caulking around drafty window and door frames and where baseboards meets walls, makes a big difference, too. You can make your own storm doors and windows by covering screens with heavy, clear plastic. Or use plastic to completely cover your windows. Staple or tack it to the window frame through strips of cardboard or wood so the plastic won't get torn.

Kentucky's hunters need to shape up—physically, that is. A sportsman who is confined behind a desk for most of the year, or who is out of shape for any reason, may have his long-awaited hunting trip spoiled by fatigue and sore, aching muscles.

Even the hunter who has already got in some dove and squirrel hunting should not be complacent about his physical condition, since generally little physical exertion is required in pursuing these species. Later trips for rabbits, quail, waterfowl and grouse can be much more demanding.

This is particularly true of grouse hunting, which occurs in the Mountainous regions of Eastern Kentucky, where an entire day may be spent climbing steep ridges and scrambling over rocks and logs in quest of the elusive ruffed grouse.

If you are over 40, any exercise program should begin with a visit to your family doctor for a good physical check-up. Then a daily exercise program, particularly for the legs and back, should be followed faithfully.

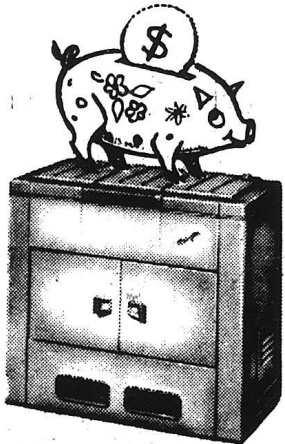
And while the hunter is getting in shape, he should not forget that his hunting dog also is probably out of condition. Even a good dog won't be able to endure over a few hours of hunting after a summer of inactivity unless he gets some pre-season exercise.

A trip to the vet is also in order, both for a physical check-up and for necessary booster shots and worming. With proper pre-season conditioning, both you and your dog will be able to put in a full day of hunting come November.

This is also a good time to make sure that your guns are in top safety condition and to start getting your shooting eye back in shape by practicing on some moving targets. Many of the sportsmen's clubs throughout the state have both trap and skeet ranges. If you are not a member, now would be a good time to join, not only for the shooting facilities but for the fellowship with others who share your interests in the out-of-doors.
