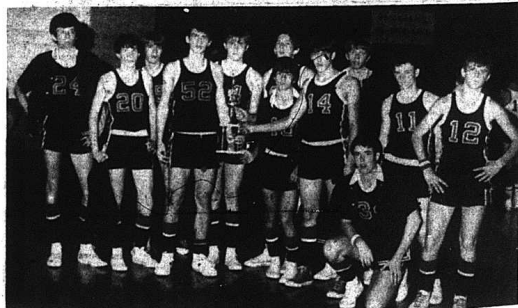
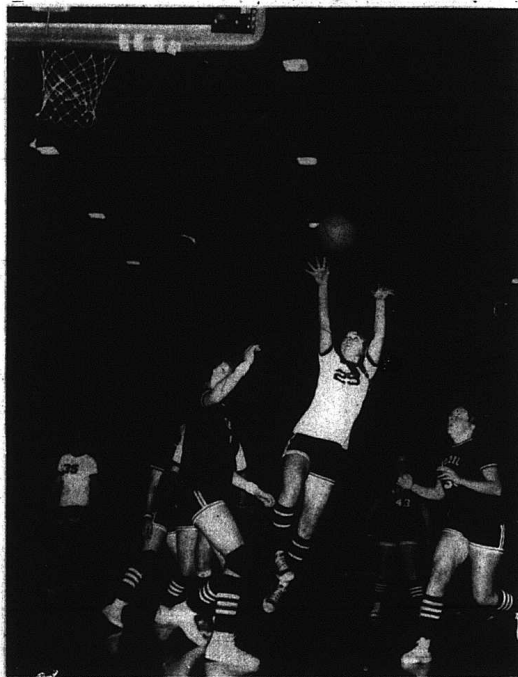

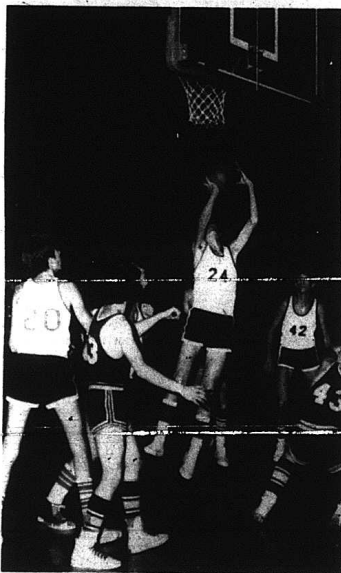

may be fishing during daylight until dark and never see another boat.

Generally by now, bass have moved into the more shallow waters, often feeding throughout the entire day, affording the fisherman a good opportunity to get that artificial lure within range as the bass patrol the shoreline.

Expert musky fishermen know this is the season for their kind of fishing and many float the musky streams, casing their favorite lures in much the same manner as do the bass fishermen.

And many musky fishermen, too, are finding Cave Run Lake an ideal spot for musky fishing. Cave Run, located in the Daniel Boone National Forest near Morehead, is the site of a musky stocking program by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and now with the cooler weather and water conditions should be right for limit catches.

This period, too, is ideal for those who like crappie fishing in the favorite lakes. Now the schooling crappies will be found around fallen treelaps, stump beds, channel dropoffs and other submerged cover areas.

Lively minnows fisheri around such areas will account for many fine strings of this excellent fish and they can be caught at night, too, by fishing under artificial lights in much the same manner as early spring white bass are taken.

Kenneth Lovell Fletcher, 20, of Mt. Vernon was pronounced dead on arrival at the Rockcastle County Hospital Saturday afternoon after becoming ill in the Rockcastle County Jail where he had been a prisoner since Friday night.

Fletcher was arrested late Friday afternoon by Constable Red Alcorn, assisted by City Policeman Dickie Collingsworth. Collingsworth said Tuesday that Alcorn asked his assistance in making the arrest because there was reportedly a fight going on at Carter's Trailer Park in Mt. Vernon. Collingsworth said he accompanied Alcorn to the scene where they did not find a fight in progress but did find Fletcher on the side of the road with a youth sitting on top of him holding him down. Collingsworth said that Fletcher did not resist arrest and was taken to the Rockcastle County Jail

where he was lodged and charged with public drunkenness. Fletcher was conscious but extremely drunk at the time of his arrest, according to both Collingsworth and the jail attendant. Collingsworth also said that Fletcher had a cut on his head at the time of his arrest.

Saturday morning, Deputy Jailor Clede Anglin took Fletcher to his home to get some articles of clothing and he later appeared before City Police Judge Virgie Sowder. He was then returned to the jail and Jailor Ivory Anglin said that later in the afternoon, Mr. Fletcher was standing at a commode in the jail vomiting when he fell backwards. James Couch, another prisoner, administered artificial respiration and the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service was called. Ambulance attendants adminis-

tered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation but to no avail.

Mr. Fletcher was born June 21, 1955 in Rockcastle County, the son of Mitchell and Nettie Carpenter Fletcher of Mt. Vernon.

Besides his parents, survivors are his maternal grandmother, Annie Carpenter of Route 4, Mt. Vernon; his maternal great grandfather, Jerry Kirby of Route 1, Mt. Vernon; six brothers, Eddie B. Fletcher of Mt. Vernon, Deed Fletcher of Lockland, Ohio, James, Jack, Joe and Floyd Fletcher, all at home; six sisters, Mrs. Louanna Barron of Route 1, Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Clede Scott of Mooresville, Indiana, Mrs. Mary Brock of Lockland, Ohio, Mrs. Theima Wright of Hartwell, Ohio, Mrs. Linda Rhy of Route 4, Mt. Vernon and Miss Jean Fletcher at home; three nephews and eight nieces also survive.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, December 3, 1975 at the Cox Funeral Home Chapel with Bro. James Nicely officiating. Burial was in the Sand Springs First Church of Jesus Christ Cemetery.

## Extra Road Money Allocation Discussed At Fiscal Court

Members of the State Highway Department met with the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court Tuesday to take the Magistrate's recommendations for projects to be included in the Rural Secondary Road program for the coming year. The men also discussed with the Court the special allocation which has been given to each county in the state for improvement projects on county roads.

D.J. Garland told the Court that Rockcastle's share of the monies would be over \$26,000 and the county would have to match this money with approximately \$71,000 giving them about \$45,000 with which to improve a road in the county. Mr. Garland stressed that the money had to be spent on an improvement project (blacktopping, repairing bridges, etc.) as opposed to a maintenance project. On question from Magistrate Ernest Mason concerning the installation of guard rails around Lake Linville, Mr. Garland said that this would be considered a maintenance project.

Mr. Garland also told the Court that the extra money which the county would have to come up with to match the \$26,000 could come from their Rural Secondary road funds, if they wished. These funds are being increased next year and Rockcastle's share will be \$118,444 rather than the \$98,918 they now receive. However, Mr. Garland also said that the program had been changed so that if the county wished to put a new road on the program then one of the roads now on the program would have to be dropped. In other words, no new roads can be added to the program.

The only stipulation in using the federal allocation, Mr. Garland said, was that any road improved must be twenty feet wide from shoulder to shoulder and any bridge repaired must be 24 feet wide.

The men asked the Court to decide as quickly as possible on a project on which to waste the funds since the application approvals will not be made county-by-county but rather by districts as a whole.

The Magistrates attempted to decide on a project at the meeting but, after some discussion, the two projects which seemed the most needed were improvement to the Ford Hollow Road, in Magistrate Boone Cromer's district, and to the Cove Branch Road in Magistrate Ernest Mason's district. Magistrate Cromer made a motion that the Ford Hollow Road, which has some 180 residents along it according to the magistrate, be improved with money from the project.

County Judge Hubert Thacker seconded the motion but none of the other magistrates were willing to cast a vote for or against it. Magistrate Ernest Mason then made a motion that the funds be used for the Cove Branch Road and it was seconded by Magistrate Bill Wren. However, once again, no other magistrate would cast a vote on the measure and no final decision was made as to which road was to be improved.

Each magistrate did make recommendations for projects to be included in the Rural Secondary Road Program for the coming year and these recommendations were as follows:

District 1, Magistrate Chester Whitake - CR1298, Freedom School Road - grade, drain and traffic bound macadam and CR1329, Old Rocky - grade, drain and traffic bound macadam.

District 2, Magistrate Boone Cromer - CR1173, Beech Grove School Road - Relocation, grade, drain and traffic bound macadam and CR1254, Wabbl Poplar Grove - resurfacing.

District 3, Magistrate Sherman Sargent - CR1287, Carl Brown Road - grade, drain and traffic bound macadam, CR1354 - Mt. Zion Road, grade, drain and traffic bound macadam from church to lake and CR1386 - Bowling Ridge Road - resurfacing.

District 4, Magistrate Bill Wren - CR1056, Old State Road - grade, drain and traffic bound macadam; CR1059 Stevens Road - grade, drain and traffic bound macadam and CR1356 - Flat Gap Road - grade, drain and traffic bound macadam.

District 5, Magistrate Ernest Cromer - KY1004, Brush

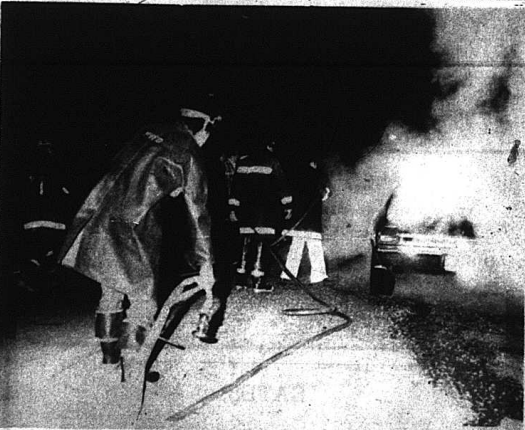

Another factor that allows objects to be combined is texture. The walnut desk and chair also have texture in common, the texture of walnut is opengrained as opposed to the fine grain of cherry. Pottery and burlap also have texture in common.

Two objects can be combined when they are of the same style. Style can be defined as formal, semi-formal and informal. A Danish Modern Chair and an Early American sofa upholstered in velvet could be combined with a camel back sofa upholstered in velvet because they have a formal style in common as well as the common fabric of velvet.

Round shaped flowers, such as zinnias or dahls, could be arranged in a round pottery bowl because they have a round shape or line in common.

A pair of tall candlesticks and candles could be used on one end of a mantel with a tall Early American clock because they have vertical line as a common factor.

Low horizontal pictures could be combined with a horizontal book case because they have horizontal line in common.

Size and scale are also important in combining objects. A smaller scale chair calls for a smaller table to be combined with it. A large overuffed chair looks even larger when a small table is combined with it.

Age is another factor that may allow two objects to be combined. Two antique pieces of furniture could be combined because they both have the patina of aged wood. Two new objects could be combined for the same reason.

Weight or bulk is another item to consider in combining

problem in design. To make this problem easier to solve remember to look for a common factor between two objects. Weight is another factor that factor may be color, texture, style, line, size, age, scale, weight, finish or a common material.

To illustrate this, we will take some examples. An amber water glass with a china or pottery plate that has a circle of leaves or flowers in gold have color in common and could probably be combined.

A walnut desk could be combined with a walnut chair seated with cane because they have the brown color of walnut in common.

Two objects sometimes are combined because they are of a common material like glass, marble, wood, cloth, cane, metal and others.

Decorating Creatively

Be creative in your decorating-put yourself into it. What are some easy ways that you can be creative and put your personality and individuality into your home?

One of the first ways to be creative is to choose colors that you like and that have meaning for you and your family. Colors are often meaningful to us according to the experiences that we have had with them since childhood. Blue, blue-green, and yellow-green may have meaning to some because they are restful and like the sky, grass and water.

For other people, red, yellow and orange may express their personality better because they are cheerful and stimulating.

Other contrasting color combinations may be more expressive of your personality. If you like casual furniture and casual styles, texture may help you express yourself. Enough textures like shag carpet, tweed fabrics, brick, stone and pottery may help you to express yourself.

You can also express more formal styles of decorating with texture. The texture of velvet, tapestry, swigs, satin, smooth woods, silver and glass may express your decorating ideas.

Your choice of pattern can also be expressive in decorating. Large patterns, if in great value (light and dark) contrasts or in bright colors, can be dramatic. They are best in large rooms.

Patterns with little value contrast or in softer colors may be quieter and fit into the background for furniture and other furnishings.

Pictures, wall hangings, lamps, pottery, colored glass, decorative boxes, plants and candles can all give an individual touch to a room and help it to express you and your family. The way you combine these can also express creativity.

Another way to be creative

in decoration is to use an object or a material in a non-traditional way. For example, fabric that is usually used for draperies or table furnishings may be framed for a picture or made into a wall hanging.

Another example of non-traditional use of an object is using a rug for a wall hanging. The rug may be hooked, shag, woven or Indian.

Sharp edges - Toys of brittle plastic or glass can easily be broken exposing dangerous sharp cutting edges. Wooden, metal and plastic toys sometimes have sharp edges due to poor construction.

Small parts - Tiny toys and toys with small removable parts can be allowed or become lodged in a child's windpipe, ears, or nose. The squeakers in some squeeze toys can be removed and possibly swallowed. The seams of poorly constructed stuffed dolls or animals can break open and release small pellets that also can be swallowed or inhaled.

Wrong toy for the wrong age - Toys that may be safe for older children can be extremely dangerous in the hands of little ones.

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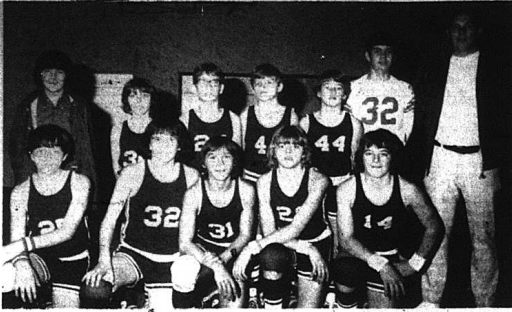

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We know the issue isn't simply electricity; it's enough electricity. And all of our customers could suffer from a power shortage. Imagine doing your job with inadequate or unreliable electric service.

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And that takes large amounts of money, money we have to borrow at today's high interest rates. Add that to our increased operating costs and increased costs for the raw materials we must have to make electricity. The result is an electric bill that's higher than most people are used to.

A nation that runs on electricity can't afford to run out of it. That's why we must plan and build now so you won't be faced with a shortage of electricity ten years from now.

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
