

Therefore, puble employees could merely refuse to work until their demands were met au, thereby, lawe our communities without the sad policy protection, does our schools and bring local government to a standstill. Furthermore, this bill would create another zur of state government and would require appropriations from the state for approximately a half million dollars over the sext bienum. appropriations it.

In conclusion, the ramifications of such a bill is so far reaching that its potential effect on state government at both the state and local level cannot be foreseen.


