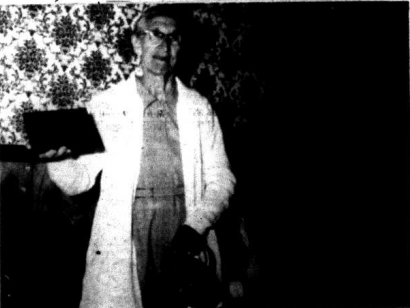

LAKE CUMBERLAND MEDICAL CENTER OPENS FRIDAY, MAY 14th

The Lake Cumberland Medical Center in Somerset opens and begins accepting patients this Friday, May 14, at 7 a.m.

Somerset City Hospital, which has served as a regional hospital in this area for 30 years will be terminating its operations as a hospital and all patients and services will be transferred to the new Medical Center in a three-day moving project this week end.

According to Elmer Crozier, executive director for the new hospital, the move, which has been in the planning stage for several months now, will take place in three steps. The first step is opening the Emergency Service on Friday, at 7 a.m.; Secondly, Saturday, at 7 a.m. the hospital will begin accepting patients for labor and delivery and the old facility will not accept such patients on that date. Patients already at the old hospital will be transferred by ambulance to the Medical Center on Saturday and Sunday, May 15 and 16.

As a precautionary measure and to cover any unforeseen emergencies which might cause adjustments in the above schedule, a special telephone number, manned 24-hours a day has been

installed and everyone who comes to Somerset for hospital services are urged to call first. The number to call is 879-SICK. Callers will be advised as to which facility to come to.

Come To 4-H Camp

Most 4-H'ers in Rockcastle County know about 4-H camp. But I'm sure there are some 4-H'ers and parents who want to know more about 4-H camp. Here's some questions I'll answer.

What's happening at camp? 4-H camp offers a variety of educational, fun and exciting things. Some of these things can be done at camp are swimming, boating, archery, hiking, sports, crafts, folk songs, nature and conservation studies, weavers and campfires.

Where is 4-H camp? The 4-H'ers from Rockcastle County attend the J.M. Filmer Memorial 4-H camp near Levi Jackson State Park at London, Kentucky.

When is 4-H camp? The regular camping session will begin at noon on Monday, July 8, 1976 and continue until Friday afternoon, July 9, 1976. Fourth graders have a special camp beginning on Tuesday, June 8, 1976 until Friday, June 11. There will be only nine and ten year olds at this camping session.

Who will be at the camp? The 4-H camp has a permanent staff consisting of a manager and instructors for the entire summer. 4-H agents from the counties attending the camp and teen counselors and club leaders will also be on hand to keep order.

Where do you stay while at camp? There are eight cabins for boys and eight for girls with twelve to fourteen in each cabin. Your cabin mates will be about your age and from Rockcastle County. An advisor will stay in each cabin. Each camper brings his or her own sheets, blanket and pillow as well as towel, wash cloth, soap, etc. 4-H'ers will be able to live in a cabin with their friends as well as with new friends from this county. There will be plenty of opportunities to meet youth from other counties. Learning citizenship and getting along with others is an important part of 4-H camp.

What does it cost to go to camp? The registration fee for 4-H camp is \$20. This includes three good meals a day from noon Monday through noon Friday, and snacks to keep you going between meals.

Also included in the fee is lodging, transportation, insurance, swimming fees and use of camp equipment. The craft items and souvenirs are purchased. The 4th grade camp fee is \$16, since they are at camp one day less than the older campers.

How do you get to camp? The 4-H council of Rockcastle County and the Mt. Vernon Lion's Club help provide transportation to and from camp. Parents are welcome to bring their 4-H'ers to camp and to visit the camp on parent's night (Thursday night) at the camp.

Who can go to camp? Any 4-H'er who wishes can attend the 4-H camp. The ages for regular camp are for fifth to eighth graders. Fourth graders can attend the special fourth grade camp or the regular camp with a brother or sister in 4-H.

SNACKS

Nutrition surveys indicate that as the years rolled by our food habits have changed quite a bit. Snacks have, for modern families, become the rule rather than the exception. Not many families sit down together for the traditional three meals a day. Smaller "mini-meals" or snack foods may be taking the place of regular meals. More and more of our food dollar is going into "empty calorie" snack foods which unfortunately replaces more balanced, traditional meals.

So what are we going to do? We must "make our snacks count" for good nutrition and health. So let's plan some of our foods to be "mini-meals" or "nutritious snacks" that taste good, look good, and are good for us instead of simply being a source of extra calories that puts bumps in the wrong places!

Plan to have snacks which help fill the Basic Four Requirements: the 4-4-2-2 way:

4 servings a day: Vegetables and fruits, a low calorie source of good health full of vitamins and minerals. Try these snacks: peanutty apples, peanut dip with vegetables instead of potato chips, hikers snack, friendship tea.

4 servings a day: Bread and cereals, good energy source along with minerals and B vitamins. Try these snacks: Pizza quickie, granola.

2 servings a day: Meats, fish, poultry, eggs, peanut butter, beans, protein for all body growth and repair. Try these snacks: peanut dip, peanutty apples, hikers snack.

4 servings a day: Milk - a great source of protein and calcium needed for bones and teeth. Try these snacks: Cocoa mix, pizza quickie, shake-up snack sauce, granola with milk, granola sprinkled on ice cream.

P-Nutty Apples - reminds you of a candy caramel apple! Core and slice apples crosswise. Spread with peanut butter and top with another slice. Another time - spread with cheese spread.

Peanut Dip - use celery strips, carrot strips, cauliflowerettes.

4 slices bacon
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1 teaspoon grated onion
1 teaspoon mustard
1-2 drops hot sauce

Mix peanut butter and milk well and add remaining ingredients. Crumble bacon in.

Hikers Snack - don't limit it just to hikers. It's great for parties too!

Mix: 1 cup salted peanuts, 1 cup chocolate chips, 1 cup raisins.

Pizza Quickie: Toast bread on one side in oven on cookie sheet, turn and

add a slice of American cheese, 1 to 2 spoons of tomato sauce, a sprinkle of Parmesan cheese and a dash of oregano. Return to oven till bubbly.

Granola - make your own; it's better! Mix: 3 cups oatmeal, 1 cup wheat germ, 1/2 cup coconut, 1 box sesame seeds. Mix 1/2 cup honey, warm syrup or molasses and 1/2 cup oil. Stir mixture together. Bake on large cookie sheet at 200 degrees F. for 45 minutes stirring often. When cool, add 1 cup any nuts and 1 cup any dry fruit.

Shake up Snack Sauce: Combine one 3/4 ounce pack of vanilla instant pudding, 1 1/2 cups chilled evaporated milk, add 3/4 cups cold water in a quart jar with a tight lid. Seal and shake briskly for 1 to 2 minutes. Add 1-8 ounce can crushed pineapple. Cover and shake till blended. Chill 10 minutes. Serve over fresh or canned fruit or on cake.

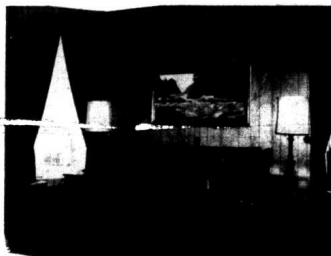

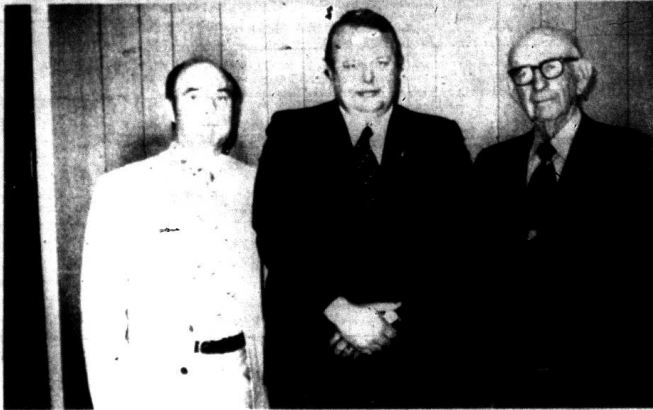

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Livingston Man Charged In Drug Arrests

According to state police reports, an intensive four month investigation culminated last week in the arrest of three persons on drug charges by local authorities.

Two of the arrests were made during raids conducted by the Kentucky State Police Narcotics Section, Laurel County Kentucky State Police units, Laurel County Sheriff's Department and London city police.

An undercover investigation into the drug charges in Laurel County began in January of this year. Information concerning the local problem was given to Narcotics section by all of the law enforcement agencies.

All of the raids were executed on search warrants issued by Laurel Circuit Judge Robert H. Helton, Jr.

At 2 p. m. Wednesday, officers raided the residence of a juvenile on West Ky. 80 from London and found approximately one and one-half pounds of marijuana. The youth was arrested on three counts of trafficking in marijuana and lodged in the Laurel County Jail. He has filed a \$1,000 appearance bond to appear in Laurel County Juvenile Court. The same afternoon, at 4 p. m., officers conducted a search at the residence of Jimmy and Arlene Mitchell, Route 5, London in the Sublimity city area of Laurel County. A quantity of marijuana and other drugs were confiscated during the raid. The officers also found an illegal sawed off shotgun at the home.

Mrs. Mitchell, 42, was arrested at the scene and charged with trafficking in marijuana and TCP. The woman was released from the Laurel County Jail on her own \$10,000 bond when her husband, Jimmy, 33, apparently shot himself at Lily Thursday afternoon. He died Friday in a Lexington hospital.

Earlier in the year, a pound bag of marijuana was allegedly purchased in Laurel County by undercover agents of the Kentucky State Police Narcotics Section from Livingston City Judge James Everaole, 33.

FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

Gov Julian Carroll stands to gain, perhaps quite a bit, from his endorsement of Jimmy Carter in the May 25 Democratic presidential preference primary.

However, even in this heavily Democratic state, somebody has more to gain than the governor, and that someone is former Gov. Louie B. Nunn. Until recently, despite much talk about the campaign of Ronald Reagan and Kentucky being "Reagan Country," few observers gave Reagan much of a chance to win the nomination in Kentucky on the Republican side, much less nationally.

That has changed, obviously, and, in fact, it appears from this vantage point that Reagan has a good chance of beating Ford in Kentucky May 25, perhaps soundly.

Unless President Ford can derail the Reagan steam engine sometime between now and May 25, and how strange it seems to talk about an incumbent being in the underdog, the challenger position. Reagan can almost certainly top a victory here.

If he does, and even more so if he can pull off the Republican nomination this summer, Louie Nunn will be the big winner in Kentucky, no matter how Reagan fares against the Democratic nominee who will almost certainly be Carter.

Almost everyone now believes that Nunn is gunning for another run at the governor's chair. If he were able to put

together his still considerable popularity and strength within the party and the prestige of having given Reagan a big boost toward the presidency, Nunn could again be a strong contender to the Frankfort throne.

For the governors to get back on their feet in the next governor's race, they are going to have to have somebody like Nunn or some very new, young face. Nunn would be formidable opposition for almost any Democrat. Certainly it would be more of a race than the last debacle for the GOP here.

Kentucky's two Republican congressmen appear to be in good position to win re-election this Fall, despite what promises to be concerted Democratic opposition for Rep. Gene Snyder in the Fourth District and the touch of scandal for Rep. Tim Lee Carter in the Fifth District.

Snyder appears to be in better shape now than he did two years ago, against Kyle Hubbard, who, in the end, could not budge him.

Carter is getting a lot of bad press out of some apparent problems with his expense records for travel back to Kentucky.

Few would give his chief Democratic challenger much of a chance, though.

Sources here say that college professor Charles C. Smith of Williamsburg will have only token support of the party, even though he promises to run a vigorous campaign as a Democrat in a GOP District. The reasoning: Carter is too entrenched to warrant spending great efforts against him and Smith is not a "party" Democrat.

None of the incumbents in this party are in jeopardy in their primaries.

An error has recently been called to my attention by Pike County Judge Wayne Rutherford, who tells me the state error in saying he convicted only three of the nearly 300 truck drivers cited to his court last year for weight limit violations.

Rutherford is absolutely right. The conviction rate was much higher than that. However, Rutherford suspended fines for all but three of those convicted.

Asked how he could justify even bothering to convict truckers when, in almost every case, the fines were suspended, Rutherford said he did so out of "respect for the law."

As Rutherford notes, it wouldn't be right for those drivers to think they could be cited before his court and not be convicted, after all the work the inspectors do in the field. Enough said.

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ROCKCASTLE RECOLLECTIONS

It is noted that quite a number of Rockcastle men were engaged in hauling supplies during the Civil War. They constituted a definite branch of the service and performed a valuable service necessary in carrying on the war. It is a matter of historical record that, in many cases, the success of a military venture has depended largely upon the way the supply service was handled.

In my extensive research on Dr. Thomas Walker, the first white man to visit this section of the county, I learned that he, in connection with Benjamin Franklin, had been employed to furnish supplies to General Braddock's army on the march and that the general had been seriously delayed in starting his expedition by the fact that Franklin was unable to secure wagons and horses and

drivers to move the necessary stores and supplies to support the troops as they moved forward. Inefficiency of wagon trains, also greatly hampered colonial troops during the Revolutionary War and it is noted on later applications of Revolutionary pensions that many of them saw service in the wagon trains. In the case of a family of my own ancestors, two older brothers had enlisted in the line while a younger brother was turned down on account of his age. He begged to go along, reminding the recruiting officer that, even though he might be too young to carry a musket, he did know how to drive a team and was taken into service in that capacity.

One of the best known army teamsters of Rockcastle County was William Arnold, who lived to a very old age and was the "Uncle Bill" who used to delight in telling us boys of his experiences. He made many trips through Mt. Vernon on what was known as one of the principle North-South highways of war times and was used by both the Confederates and the Union forces for moving troops and supplies. It

was Uncle Bill who told of the swamping of the corduroy road through the swampy land surrounding Mt. Vernon, a story which was fully confirmed when the old logs of the road were dug up from a depth of several feet below the surface when the new Christian Church building was being erected. I believe it was Uncle Bill that first told us of the tradition that Union General Nelson later met his death in connection with the laying of this road. It seems that General Nelson in having out one of the soldiers engaged in the work used such offensive language that it later brought about his death in a personal gun battle with another Union officer some time later. I have not yet attempted to verify this story.

It was Uncle Bill Arnold who later told of seeing a big brass cannon rolled into the pond that then occupied the spot back of Col. Barnett's store. Apparently this was done to prevent its falling into the hands of the enemy when one army was vacating their campgrounds in that area. It was later told by John Ramsey and other citizens that to their knowledge the cannon had never been taken out and is apparently now covered by several feet of dirt which later filled the swamp and covered the springs which once fed it.

Another interesting story of an abandoned brass cannon came from a Confederate soldier who told of helping to push it into a deep hole in Rockcastle River before the Confederates started their retreat from the Battle of Wildcat Mountain. In the years which followed, many fishermen reported seeing the barrel of this cannon when the water in the river was especially clear. Apparently what they saw was really a sycamore log half submerged in the mud at the bottom of the river, because only two or three years ago one of my contributors to this history happened to mention that her grandfather, Robert Stewart, who also served in the wagon trains, was employed after the war was over to help remove this cannon, which they hauled through Cumberland Gap to Tazewell, Tennessee, and from there it was shipped to Roanoke, Virginia.

As a matter of interest to readers who have delved into Civil War history on a national scale, here are a few unusual things I have run across in my research. To show how families were divided over the issues of the war, I consider the following: President Abraham Lincoln had four brothers-in-law who were in the Confederate army. Henry Clay had three grandsons with the Union army and four with the Confederate forces. George B. Crittenden, of Kentucky, had one son who was a major general with the Yankees and another son who was a major general with the Rebels. Frederick Hubbard, of New Orleans, was a Confederate soldier, while his brother, Henry Hubbard, was in the Union army. They had not seen each other for seven years until at the Battle of Bull Run both were wounded and carried to the same first aid hospital, where they were accidentally placed side by side. General George B. McClellan, the Confederate Ranger, slipped into Alexandria, Virginia, and captured Col. D. H. Dulaney of the Union Army. Mosby's guide for this expedition was French Dulaney, the son of the officer he captured. General Phillip St. George Cooke, of the Federal forces, had three daughters. They all married generals. One wore the blue, the other two the grey-including General Stewart. One of Cooke's sons was also with the Confederate army and did not speak to his father until several years after the

war was over. Stonewall Jackson, one of the most famous of all leaders of Southern troops, had a sister, Laura, who declared for the Union. She offered her services as an army nurse, saying she would take care of wounded Union soldiers as fast as Brother Thomas (Gen. Jackson's real name) would wound them.

This started out as an article on Rockcastle County Army supply Wagons, but seems to have gotten off the track somewhere along the line. There is more to be said on the original subject and we will try to get it all together in a later article.

My apologies to Linda Ramsey Ashley for having omitted her name from a recently published list of Rockcastle natives with a published book to her credit. Certainly I am not unmindful of her ability as a writer, since she has made several noteworthy contributions to the mass of history of Rockcastle County now in the making. Her recently published account of the Mt. Vernon Christian Church is an excellent piece of work, well researched and well written.

YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR FHA "FIX-IT" LOAN

A rural homeowner who needs fixing up may be eligible for one of two "fix-it-up" loans from USDA's Farmers Home Administration. The two FHA programs are the home repair loan and the home improvement loan.

Home repair loans may be used to remove health or safety hazards by repairing roofs, providing water and waste disposal systems, installing screens, windows or insulation or other steps to make the home safe. Home improvement loans may include similar purposes, but can go further by bringing the home up to minimum property standards and making changes for the convenience of the family such as adding a room, remodeling the kitchen or otherwise modernizing the house. The family's income is the key to the type of loan for which they may qualify.

For instance, families with a very low income may borrow up to \$5000, to remove health hazards; a family with a somewhat higher income can borrow up to \$7000, to improve their home. FHA County Supervisors will help families determine their eligibility and the type of loan best suited to their needs and incomes.

For more information on the home repair and improvement loan programs, contact The Farmers Home Administration Office located in Stanford, Kentucky in the Farm Bureau Building, Monday-Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. There is a representative in Mt. Vernon on the first and third Monday of each month in the Farmers Home

Administration sub office in the Board of Education Building from 9:30 until 12:00 noon.

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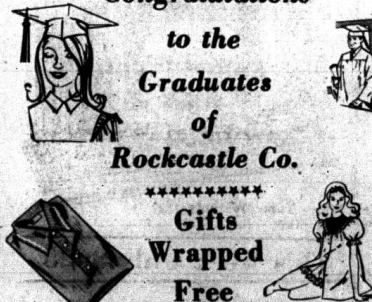
