

Evans Hilton Appointed To Expedite Highway Planning

The appointment of a veteran state highway engineer "to expedite" planning for the relocation of Ky. 80 between Hazard and U.S. 23 in Floyd County was announced in Frankfort recently.

Evans V. Hilton, a professionally certified civil engineer of 30 years experience with the state's Bureau of Highways, was named by State Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts to serve as project engineer for the proposed 42.5 mile, four-lane road which, when completed, will link the Daniel Boone Parkway at Hazard with U.S. 23 at Watergap in Floyd County.

Hilton has been on the engineering staff of the Bureau of Highways' Division of Construction at Frankfort since 1975.

Prior to that, he has served as district highway engineer at Somerset (1969-1975).

According to Roberts, Hilton's chief duties in his new job will be "to coordinate and expedite the essential, pre-construction planning phases of the project which must be completed before any ground for the new road is broken."

"What that means," explained Roberts, "is that Hilton will be working full-time as a coordinator, problem-solver and engineering idea man between us and the five private consulting firms which will draw up the design, final right-of-way and construction plans on which the relocation of Ky. 80 will then be based."

After that, Roberts said, Hilton will remain on the job to coordinate the actual construction.

Contracts with the five consulting

firms have been signed, project work orders issued and the actual planning work begun, Roberts said.

"And in every case, our first progress report indicates that the preliminary engineering work already is from eight to ten per cent complete and proceeding on schedule," he said.

The first planning deadline falls due on June 30 of this year and grade inspection work is to be completed. The final deadline for all preliminary engineering work is January, 1978.

The five firms which have been contracted with the Bureau of Highways for the preliminary engineering work are:

Brighton Engineering Company of Frankfort which will be paid \$1,450,289 for overall design supervision of the project and preparation of the final preliminary engineering report.

H.A. Spalding, Inc., Hazard, which will receive \$1,125,000 for design engineering and right-of-way planning for 7.3 miles of the new road, extending from the end of the Daniel Boone Parkway at Hazard to the Perry-Knott County line.

Under a second agreement, H.A. Spalding, Inc. also will be paid an additional estimated \$269,500 for researching mineral and surface rights and conducting title searches along the entire length of the new road.

Haworth and Associates, Inc. of Frankfort - \$1,154,000 for design engineering and right-of-way planning between the Ky. 777 junction south of Langley in Floyd County to the U.S. 23-U.S. 460 junction at Watergap, a distance of 8.3 miles.

Hurst Roscoe Engineers, Inc. of Frankfort - \$2.9 million for design engineering and right-of-way planning between the Perry-Knott and Knott-Floyd County lines, including a spur to Hindman for a total distance of about 20 miles.

Johnson, Depp and Quisenberry of Owensboro - \$800,000 for design engineering and right-of-way planning from the Knott-Floyd County line to Ky. 777 junction at Langley, a distance of 6.2 miles.

The eventual cost of the road, to be financed with part of the state's severance tax proceeds, has been estimated at \$175 million.

Roberts said that the appointment of Hilton to serve as project engineer and coordinator between the Bureau of Highways and the outside consulting firms, although unusual, is not considered "out of the ordinary" given the special circumstances of the Ky. 80 project.

Those "special circumstances" were made clear earlier this year when Gov. Julian Carroll, while signing the bill that makes financing of the new road possible, stressed the great impact which a new Ky. 80 promises for the whole economy of Kentucky, Roberts said.

"With the demand for coal escalating as a vital means of helping our nation solve its growing energy problems, a new Ky. 80 will give us the sort of resource recovery road that has long been needed to speed up production on the Eastern Kentucky coalfields," the secretary said.

Hilton's assignment to work closely with the consulting engineers, and later with the contractors as actual construction gets underway, is a direct result of that "special sense of urgency and importance" which the governor has attached to the project, Roberts said.

Hilton, a native of Rockcastle County, is a registered professional engineer, a member of the Ky. Society of Professional Engineers, a member of the National Society of Professional Engineers and the Kentucky Association of Highway Engineers.

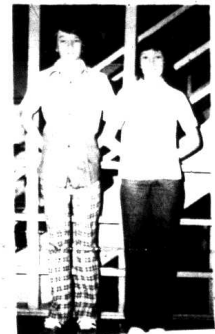

County's 1976 Tax Assessment Is \$64,994,355; Up Almost 6 Million

Rockcastle County's tax assessment for 1976 is \$64,994,355 according to the first recapitulation released recently by Property Valuation Administrator Robert Cromer.

Mr. Cromer said Tuesday that this figure will probably change slightly when the final figures are released at a later date.

This year's assessment shows a \$5,976,128 increase over 1975's assessment of \$59,018,227. The biggest part of the increase came in the Real Estate - Residential category which jumped \$2,479,660.

The assessment breaks down as follows with last year's figures in parentheses: Real Estate-Residential, \$18,673,070 (\$16,199,410); Farm Land, \$22,870,715 (\$21,474,563); Commercial and Industrial Property, \$5,869,125 (\$5,348,425); Oil Rights, \$5,000 (same) and Mineral and Timber Rights, \$111,790 (\$57,900) for a total real estate assessment of \$47,528,700.

Tangible Property - Motor Vehicles, \$8,763,070 (\$8,047,073); Aircraft, \$21,000 (same); Watercraft, \$124,800 (\$117,630); Merchandise Inventory, \$1,601,125 (\$1,444,995); Professional Trade Tools, \$403,690 (\$405,420); Drilling, Mining and Construction, \$58,880 (\$39,200); Mobile Homes, \$1,298,500 (\$1,214,000) and other tangible personal property, \$3,965 (\$21,980) for a total tangible assessment

of \$12,275,030 (\$11,311,797).

Also included in the total assessment is \$238,995 for manufacturer's KSP ACTIVITY REPORT FOR APRIL.

The London Post of the Kentucky State Police report that the activity of the post for the month of April, was as follows:

There were 1,114 moving hazardous violation citations written; 983 other violations written; 965 motorists were issued warnings for faulty equipment; 251 motorists were assisted; 211 accidents were investigated; 114 motorists were arrested for driving while under the influence of intoxicants; a total of 135 criminal investigations were made by the London Post troopers resulting in 68 criminal arrests; 10 stolen vehicles were recovered and 14 safety programs held.

The activity for Rockcastle County during the same period was as follows. A total of 104 motorists were issued citations for moving hazardous violations; 104 motorists were given citations for other violations; 63 motorists were issued warnings for faulty equipment; 36 motorists were assisted by local troopers; 16 traffic accidents were investigated; 13 motorists were arrested.

Not included in the total assessment is \$3,076,825 for stocks, bonds and other tangibles for which the state only collects tax at the rate of \$2.50 per thousand dollar assessment. Bank shares were this year assessed at \$1,707,635 as compared to last year's \$1,396,455.

Mr. Cromer also said there was new construction in the county in 1975 totaling \$1,294,200; the Homestead Exemption lessened the tax rolls by \$3,520,135 as compared to \$5,107,850 last year; there are 102,225 acres under fire protection; \$135,606 acres of farm land and 7,030 registered motor vehicles in the county.

A committee will be going to work sometime in the next few weeks on what is probably the most conglomeration of laws on the books laws that affect the bulk of the population yet generate little interest among the public at large.

They are the municipal statutes, the laws city governments must live by, and with in conducting the day-to-day affairs of the government closest to the people. Inconsistencies, antiquated laws, poorly written statutes, separate laws for seven different types of cities based on populations for legislative whims and even occasional contradiction are among the problems the commission must face.

Nobody considers it to be an easy task. The commission will be charged with revising the bulky body of law in hopes of making some sense out of what is now an unintelligible mess. It is possible that even some constitutional changes will be recommended.

For all problems the commission faces, they will be as nothing compared with the problems will be faced by the fruit of the commission's labor.

Whatever the result, it must go before the General Assembly, perhaps in 1978 and the potential for explosion is high.

For decades the legislature has been writing special legislation for almost every community in the commonwealth. What is proposed is not just a cessation of special legislation but virtually wiping the books clean and starting anew.

There is no way legislators will find it easy to decide on a new body of law for the cities, even though without fail, every one of them will admit the need for change.

Because those laws affect individual citizens even more strongly than for example the penal code and some areas are likely to be hot and some local politicians are likely to be angered. Neither is an appetizing prospect for a legislator to face.

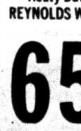

Get them at your County Extension Office. . . . Four Free Booklets Tell How to Preserve Food

You can start doing your homework now on the latest food-preservation techniques by picking up four free how-to-do-it publications at the Rockcastle County Extension office. Waiting for you there are the detailed instructions on canning, freezing, and drying food, and making jams and jellies.

"Written by UK specialists in foods and nutrition, these publications are based on U. S. Department of Agriculture research and recommendations," says Cheryl Witt, County Extension Agent for Home Economics.

Home canning of fruits and vegetables (Circular 440), describes the equipment and the methods used for canning. Both depend on the type of food you are canning.

Fruits, rebarb, tomatoes and pickled vegetables may be safely processed in a boiling water-bath canner," according to Mrs. Witt. But most vegetables all except tomatoes and pickled vegetables must be processed in a pressure canner with an accurate gage, and the canning circular tells why.

It explains that to be sure these low-acid canned foods are safe to eat, they must be processed at a higher temperature than the 212 degrees F. reached in your boiling water-bath canner. Pressure canning is the only way currently known to kill spores of the bacteria that cause deadly botulism toxin to develop in canned low acid vegetables and also in canned meats, poultry and fish.

The circular gives detailed directions for preparing fruits and vegetables, filling jars, closing jars and using the two different canning methods.

It also tells how to store canned foods and how to prevent or detect food spoilage. Yield charts are included in both the canning and freezing circulars. For example, one bushel of fresh peaches yields 18-24 quarts of canned peaches.

"Home Freezing of Fruits and Vegetables" (Circular 826) describes the correct methods and temperatures to keep the food value, natural color, flavor and texture of your garden produce. It gives step by step directions for freezing each fruit and vegetable.

The circular reminds you, too, that the quality of food taken out of the freezer is no better than that of the product before being frozen. To get high quality results, you must use good methods and packaging materials.

The third publication, "Home Drying of Fruits and Vegetables" (H.E. 3504) gives step by step directions for drying fruits and vegetables: sun drying, oven drying and using a commercial or homemade dehydrator.

A fourth publication, "Jellies, Jams, Preserves, and Mayonnades" (Circular 447) tells how to make these old-time favorites. It also has recipes for fruit butter and conserves, and for no-cook jams and preserves to store in freezer or refrigerator.

"When you stop by to pick up your free copies, browse through the stack of other publications we have," Mrs. Witt suggests. "We have leaflets and how-to-do-it lessons on almost any subject you can imagine." The Rockcastle County Extension office is located in the Courthouse in Mt. Vernon.

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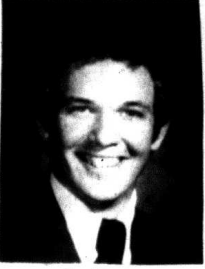

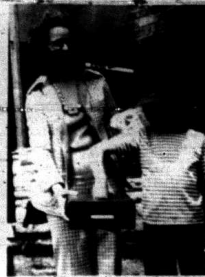

Rockcastle Recollections

Among Rockcastle natives to make a name for themselves beyond the county borders was Rev. J. J. Haley, born in Rockcastle County March 18, 1851 and dying in Cynthiana, Kentucky where he is buried. He was directly descended from Barnabas Haley, one of three brothers who came from Ireland to America at an early date. He was the only one of the three who came to Kentucky. One went to Ohio and the destination of the third one is unknown. The slab covering his grave in the old Scaffold Cane cemetery gives his name as Barney B. Haley, born 1753, died 1801.

A son of Barnabas, John Haley, and his wife, Matilda Hayes Haley, were the parents of ten children, all of whom intermarried with many of the best families in the county, especially the daughters. Nancy married W. L. Cook; Matilda married R. D. Cook; Rhoda married Uriah Albright and mothered twelve sons and daughters, to each of which she and her husband gave a slave. Samantha married Albert Fish, a prominent ancestor in the numerous Fish dynasty. Mary E. married David N. Williams, an early settler in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and the ancestor of several of the principle men of affairs in the county. Mary Elizabeth married A. W. Stewart, one of the county's most progressive and affluent farmers.

Of the three sons of John and Matilda Haley, Granville married Elizabeth Cornelison. One of their daughters, Eliza Frances, married Jacob Greene, of Illinois, whose uncle, William, was one of Abraham Lincoln's closest friends in early life as well as when he occupied the White House. The

remaining son, J. J. Haley, is the subject of this sketch. He married a Miss Clark, on April 13, 1874 and they left the next day for Sidney, New South Wales, where he was to enter upon a career as missionary which lasted for more than eleven years.

As a young man of 18 he had gone from his home near Wildie, Kentucky to the University of Kentucky to take up a four year course in the liberal arts, also attending the Bible College and finishing up as an editor of the collage paper. Later in his career he was editor, or assistant editor of the Australian Christian Watchman, Christian Evangelist, Apostolic Guide, New Christian Quarterly, Christian Oracle and Christian Century. During his preparatory years he also attended Northwestern Christian University.

Upon actively taking up the ministry he preached for one year in the state of Mississippi before being selected by the widely renowned Rev. McGarvey himself, to go to Sidney as the American Evangelist. He and his bride started on their strange and exciting trip to the Southern Hemisphere the day following their marriage, going by way of San Francisco, arriving in Sidney after a stormy voyage of approximately a month and a half. He remained in Australia and New Zealand about eleven years, preaching with marked success in three Capital Cities, being two years in Sidney, two and one half in Dunedin New Zealand and six years in Melbourne. At the beginning of his work in Melbourne he preached for seven months in the large auditorium of the Academy of Music, having a seating capacity of 2,500 which was often

insufficient to accommodate his audience. He also held a pastorate in Liverpool, England, and upon returning to America held pastorates at San Francisco, Midway, Kentucky, and for the latter years of his life in Cynthiana, where he was buried. His wife, who preceded him by many years in death, is buried in California. One child survives them: Mrs. Olin Chiles, now living in Lakeland, Florida, who is the mother of U. S. Senator, Lawton M. Chiles.

Many of the older Haleys are buried in the old Scaffold Cane Cemetery, mostly in graves covered with a flat marble slab on which are engraved the dates of birth and death, in many cases being almost obliterated. Not long ago I made an extensive search for the names of Arch and Bill Haley who figured so much advantage in the story of the Cave Spring fight described elsewhere in this book. I was unable to find any trace of them and was told that their graves were there, but that they were buried under their real names rather than "Arch" and "Bill" which were really assumed.

It seems strange indeed that the bloodlines which produced a famous minister such as J. J. Haley and the many good and honorable citizens of the name which lived out peaceful and useful lives here and elsewhere could produce two such villainous characters as the "Arch" and "Bill" of the bloody encounter at the long ago picnic at Boone Springs Cave.

The first of the Cress family to come to our attention was James Cress, born in Wythe County, Virginia, of German stock, in 1810. In 1825 he married Celia Mink of Rockcastle County, and they settled in Lee County, Virginia, where he died in 1877, his widow surviving him until 1911. A son, D. M. Cress, was born in Lee County in 1844 and served for almost two years as a Union soldier during the Civil War. In 1865 he settled in Rockcastle County with his wife, the former Mary Bloomer. He became a very successful farmer and stockman and was well known and respected the county over. He died at Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, in 1896. Following the death of his first wife, in 1869, he married Mary Francisco, also of Rockcastle County.

His children by his first wife were: Thomas J., who became an attorney, dying in Monticello, Kentucky, in 1904; George W., who became a railroad brakeman and was killed by a train in 1896; William R., who spent thirty years in the legal profession, during which time he served a term as county judge of Wayne County, having from 1902 to 1906, formerly served as county attorney from 1897 to 1901. In addition he became widely known as a farmer and cattle breeder, having at one time one of the leading herds of Holstein dairy cattle in Kentucky.

John Martin Cress was born in Rockcastle County in 1873, a son of Deart M. Cress, who was married three times and had thirteen children. In 1896 John Martin Cress married Susie Smith, of Rockcastle County, a daughter of J. J. Smith and his wife, the former Ann Hank, born in Rockcastle in 1845 and

died in 1912. They started housekeeping in a log cabin, moving later to a one-room house near Crab Orchard, Kentucky, where he farmed as a renter. By hard work and strict attention to business, farming and dealing in livestock, he soon rose above his early poverty and after eighteen years was able to acquire a good farm in the rich agricultural section of Boyle County. He was able to improve his holdings until his farm was rated one of the best in Boyle County. His stock buying activities took him into many of the counties surrounding his home and he made many trips into Rockcastle County, where he had many friends. He was considered an expert judge of livestock in general but his chief interest was always in cattle. Some of his descendants seem to have heired his talent, along these lines and have, generation after generation, successfully follow the cattle trade.

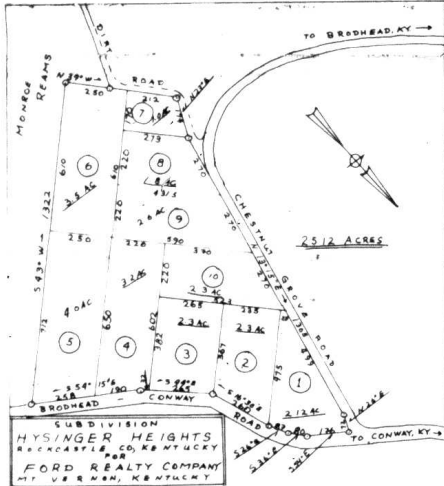

County Agent's Notes

TOMATO-EARLY BLIGHT

Early blight disease is regularly the most damaging disease of tomatoes in Kentucky. The disease appears first as spots on the leaflet. They are circular to angular, dark brown to black, and range from the size of a pin point up to about 4 mm in diameter. Concentric ridges often form in the leathery-appearing necrotic tissue to produce a characteristic target-board effect. When spots are numerous, the infected leaflet, yellow, and dies prematurely. The leaves wither up and droop or often drop off. The disease begins on the lowest leaves and gradually works up the plant.

Commercial tomato plantings are at a stage of growth where fungicide spray programs should be started. Many of the commercial tomato plantings throughout the state have been injured by frost. The early blight fungus *Alternaria solani* will tend to attack these dead and injured leaves first and once it becomes established it can begin attacking the rest of the plant. Fungicides such as Bravo, Dyrene, Manatec 200, Dithane M-45, and othone can be applied at 7-10 day intervals and give good control. If the weather is especially rainy, sprays can be applied at 5-7 day intervals. Follow instructions on the label and observe waiting days to harvest.

Price support eligibility on tobacco depends on proper insecticide usage. 1975 was the first year the use of Endrin and Toxaphene were included in the same category as DDT and TDE in establishing ineligibility for price support on tobacco.

Mr. Homer V. Yonts, Executive Director of the State ASCA Office, has stated that random sampling to tobacco will be conducted in the marketplace this year to check on possible residues of DDT, TDE, Endrin and Toxaphene.

Tobacco growers who use DDT, TDE, Endrin and Toxaphene are no longer eligible for Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) price support loans on their tobacco crops.

Before the County ASCS Office issues the 1976 tobacco marketing card, the producers will be asked to certify whether any of these pesticides were used on the tobacco after it was planted in the field. False certification is a violation of federal law.

Corn Insect Picture... cutworm and flea beetle damage seems to be slowing, but armyworm activity is starting to increase. Corn plants are being attacked at an earlier stage of growth by armyworm this year, so early detection and application of insecticide is essential. Recommended chemicals include Toxaphene, Methyl Parathion, Nodrin, Sevin, Furadan (furrow pop) Dylax, and Malathion. Check by your County Extension Office for rate information available in the Ent-16 publication.
