### CAMPING FEES RAISED

Overnight camping fees at two of the Daniel Boone National Forest's major recreation areas have been raised, according to Robert K. Stromider, the forest's recreation staff officer. He explained a portion of the fees are used to operate and maintain the recreation areas.

The nightly fee at Koomer Ridge campground, adjacent to the Red River Gorge Geological Area, was raised by a dollar to \$3 per night. It is off Kentucky 15, near Slade, and can accommodate 54 tents or trailers. Visitors are advised to arrive early on Fridays, said, since the campground is filled to capacity most summer weekends.

Twin Knobs Recreation Area on Cave Run Lake will cost \$4 per night for a single unit and \$7 for a double. The 120-unit campground is south of Morehead, off Kentucky 801.

Campers have free use of the adjoining beach and bathhouse but a \$1 per carload fee will be charged for day visitors who want to use the beach facilities, according to Stromider.

Rockcastle, the forest's only other fee camping area, will retain its \$2 per night cost. The 38-unit site southwest of London, Kentucky.

Most of the forest's other camping and picnic areas, which do not charge a fee, are open for the recreation season. Visitors should contact the local district ranger's office, or the supervisor's office in Winchester for information about specific areas.

## County Takes One-Year Option on 92-Acre Industrial Site for \$165,000

At Tuesday's meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, the Court approved a one-year option on 92-acres belonging to Clyde Payne on US 150. The farm is to be used for an industrial park and purchase price is \$165,000. Judge Thacker was authorized to sign the option on behalf of the county and to borrow \$2,000 to bind the option with the money to be repaid from the county's coal severance tax money.

In other business, the Court voted to increase funds for deputy hire for County Court Clerk Clifford Bales from \$12,500 to \$18,000 per year. Mr. Bales had requested the increase verbally last month but at that time, the Court did not take action. The request was approved by the Magistrates subject to obtaining an opinion from the Attorney General's office as to its legality.

Representatives of the Department of Highways met with the Court to discuss two matters. One was the Energy Road Fund program from which Rockcastle will benefit to the tune of approximately \$10,000. The Court was told that this money was being allocated to the coal producing counties and that it was up to the State to drive over roads in the county being used to haul coal over and to make recommendations to the Court. If the recommendations do not meet with the Court's approval, then they are free to make their own recommendations but the final decision is made in Frankfort.

The two roads recommended by the Department of Highways for grading and patching were Ky 1004 beginning at U.S. 25 and going to Ky. 1912 (Orlando and Ky 1249 beginning at Sand Springs and going to Hwy. 80). The Court accepted these recommendations.

The Court was also asked for a decision concerning the use of the county's Off-Systems Federal Road Aid Program and were represented with three bridges, the three which need work badly. The three bridges are at Cupps Chapel, Pleasant Run and on the Stevens Road in the Clear Creek section. The Magistrates felt the only fair way to make the decision would be to draw from a hat for the bridge to be repaired and this was done with Cupps Chapel being drawn. The cost of this project is approximately \$43,500.

In other business, the Court approved the county's general budget for the 1976-77 fiscal year and approved a cost-of-living salary increase for the Magistrates from \$260 per month to \$300 and for the County Treasurer from \$175 per month to \$215.

## Hospital Holds Dinner Meeting

The Rockcastle County Hospital Board of Directors held a dinner meeting last Friday night at the Rockcastle Steak House and during the meeting, two young men who will begin the practice of medicine and dentistry shortly in Mt. Vernon were introduced.

Dr. Finley Hendrickson, a native of Brodhead, will be opening a Family Practice here July 1st and Dr. Andrew K. York will begin the practice of Dentistry here sometime the latter part of June.

Also during the meeting, representatives of the Central Kentucky Blood Bank spoke concerning the establishment of a blood program in Rockcastle County.

Mr. Mary Burke told the group that the Blood Bank is a non-profit organization which serves 40 counties and 35 hospitals, including the one in Rockcastle County. Ms. Burke further said that it had been projected that residents of Rockcastle County will use 454 pints of blood in 1976 and that contributions from local residents are needed to offset this demand.

A mobile blood drawing unit will be brought to Rockcastle County some time soon and donations of blood will be solicited. By donating a pint of blood, a person can guarantee for one year the blood needs for himself, his immediate family, his parents and in-laws anywhere in the United States. More information on this program will be forthcoming at a later date.

Those present were also treated to an up-to-date report on the hospital's status and on their efforts to obtain a 32-bed Extended Care Facility. Hospital Administrator Henry Hoskins was introduced by Board Chairman Bill Bailey and Mr. Hoskins gave a brief report. He said that the Certificate of Need had been approved on the first level and that now approval was being awaited from the state and that this was expected to be forthcoming sometime within the near future. After this approval has been obtained, Mr. Hoskins said, the next step will be to obtain financing in the form of a \$200,000 loan from Farmers Home Administration to construct the facility. Mr. Hoskins said the money would be repaid from operations over a 40-year period at 5 percent interest and would not cost the county any thing. The facility is expected to be opened in 12 to 18 months from the time construction is begun hopefully sometime in the 1976-77 fiscal year.

Mr. Hoskins also told the group that the 32-bed facility is expected to relieve some of the need for the 100 care facilities (the present hospital), thereby

providing more beds for patients in need (Cont. to 14)

# A Tribute to Chief Clifford Pittman Has Faithfully Served City For 35 Years

Check on your television any night between the hours of 8 and 11 p.m. and chances are you will see a glamorous, exciting and usually devastatingly handsome officer of the law fighting crime and arresting vicious murderers. Seldom, or never, shown is the everyday drudgery of the beat cop who must write parking tickets, check doors to see if they are locked and generally enforce the "little laws" that almost everyone breaks at one time or another.

So, this is a tribute, specifically written for Mt. Vernon Chief of Police Clifford Pittman, but a tribute to all the same to all "beat cops" who are responsible for all laws - not just the top ten criminals on the FBI list.

Look for a moment at Clifford's face and you will see one on which many suns have shined. One which is a living history of our town. This is the face of a man who has contributed 35 years of faithful service to Mt. Vernon - a man who took the job as policeman in Mt. Vernon in 1942 when outlaws were plentiful and destruction commonplace. Clifford, as he is affectionately called by all, took the job at that time because he was too crippled to farm. A mule team had broken away with him and fractured several ribs as well as puncturing and collapsing one lung.

How many people would have had the raw courage to take a job such as he did in his physical condition. The answer is obvious, a very rare individual and Clifford is that.

Near the end of World War II, in 1945, Clifford suddenly became the sole protector of human rights in Mt. Vernon. Ed Gross had quit and Clifford patrolled the streets alone from 7:00 until "Old 21" rolled through. This amounted to nearly 15-hour shifts, entirely too much for one man and McKinley Arnold was hired to assist Clifford in his duties. At this time, Clifford became Chief of Police, a position he has held almost 30 consecutive years with both conscience and pride. It is believed that Clifford, at 78, is one of the oldest, if not the

oldest, active police officers in the state.

For many years, Clifford could be found each morning and afternoon in front of the Mt. Vernon Elementary School, regardless of the weather, helping children safely across busy U.S. 25. Clifford fulfilled this duty and was a familiar and welcome sight to school children for years, until only a short time ago. In recognition of Clifford's faithful service, the children at Mt. Vernon Elementary School dedicated the 1974-75 School Annual to him in recognition of his years of service.

The most serious injury Clifford has ever inflicted on anyone has been using a blackjack. Otherwise, he used his fists and once great physical strength to subdue law-breakers. One of those professional wrestlers who was arrested in Mt. Vernon. A number of men tried to hold the man and Clifford, although seriously cut and contused above the eyes, didn't use a firearm but a blackjack and the man lived to spend the night in jail. Had it been a policeman with a lesser measure of patience and constraint, the man would never have wrestled again.

Clifford's face reflects other things too, the sorrow of a son lost in World War II, his pride in three other sons (one Air Force, one Marine and one an Army Ranger). A man with great measures of pain and pride.

So, next time you get a parking ticket on your car, remember, you are the one who broke the law. Remember, the man who put that ticket there was not a professional wrestler, conscientious, faithful officer of the law, a man who was born and raised in Rockcastle County and a man who has given 35 faithful years to you - to Mt. Vernon. A man who has practiced patience and constraint and who has witnessed great pain and disappointment in his lifetime. But at the same time, a man who has much to look back upon with pride and satisfaction.

A man who continues to serve us all.

## ROCKCASTLE COUNTY AWARDED CONTRACTS

Two contracts, totaling \$206,872 for road improvements projects, Rockcastle County were awarded in Frankfort, recently.

The contracts were announced by State Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts, working with some 70 other contract awards totaling over \$6.9 million. The awards followed a bid letting held at Frankfort by the state's Bureau of Highways in May.

One of the two contracts awarded in Rockcastle County went to Allen Company, Inc. of Winchester who bid \$163,150 to surface about 6.8 miles of Mt. Vernon Richmond Road (US 25) from north of Roundstone Bridge to the Madison Court line.

The second contract - which calls for approximately \$43,722 for seal treatment along the shoulders of I-75 for a distance of about 8.1 miles - was awarded to Missouri Petroleum Products Company of St. Louis. Their bid for the contract was \$58,689.

Other major contract awards included:

\$402,528 to a Paris contractor to surface 16.5 miles of Georgetown-Williamstown Road (US 25) in Scott County.

\$281,304 to an Elizabethton paving firm to surface 11.8 miles of Glasgow-Burkesville Road (KY 90) in Barren County.

\$271,226 to a Springfield company to surface 13.3 miles of Williamsburg-Corbin Road (KY 26) in Whitley County.

Roberts said that nearly all of the contracts awarded dealt almost exclusively with surfacing needs on the state's primary and secondary road system.

Owen surprised his head slowly. "Yes, I'm Owens. No, I'm really shocked we lost the seventh district as badly as we did. I thought we would win in Fayette County, too."

Owen was the Kentucky campaign chairman for Ronald Reagan's effort in the state's first presidential primary. On the last Tuesday in May, he wasn't a happy man, standing almost alone in the Reagan state headquarters in Lexington's Phoenix Hotel. Owen could not conceal the disappointment he was feeling.

"It has really been fun, or at least it was until tonight. I've met some new people. It's been an interesting experience." Owen was a gentleman until the end. Later in the night, he would congratulate the Ford forces for a job well done.

Early in the campaign, Owen predicted Reagan would capture 60 percent of Kentucky's popular vote closer to election day. Owen would change his prediction to 55. Reagan got only 47 percent.

Those who dabble in Kentucky politics said the GOP primary would be close. Few were willing to say publicly Ford would win. The President did not think he would win. The White House considered Kentucky a longshot. Why should we think the President would win?

Reagan's Kentucky forces had organized quickly. It was evident at the Republican state convention when Reaganites captured 26 of the party's 37 delegates to the national gathering in Kansas City. Ford could muster only eight.

Former Kentucky Governor Louie Nunn had jumped on the bandwagon.

He promised to study the proposed cutbacks at the Blue Grass Army Depot.

Finally, the Ford forces got organized. Ford state campaign chairman Hal Rogers says Rep. Tim Lee Carter of the fifth district was the man who possibly made the difference. Ford carried Carter's fifth by 9,000 votes.

Election day weather benefited the President. Described as a "primary for the masses" by a Reagan worker, election day proved Ford's people were the most enthusiastic. Farmers in Western Kentucky needed the clear, dry day to set tobacco. Many didn't vote. The low turnout could possibly explain Ford's narrow margin of victory in what is generally considered the state's most conservative area. An area made to order for Ronald Reagan.

Rogers says the Ford campaign spent \$72,000 in Kentucky. Owen claims the Reagan campaign spent less than \$50,000. Regardless of who spent the most, the President's Kentucky victory coupled with his win in Tennessee put a dent in Reagan's Sunbelt Strategy. Reagan was counting heavily on winning big in the states in the South, Mid-South and Southwest. In two, he fumbled near the goal.

Most fishermen like to make night fishing a dusk-to-dawn affair. While most activity seems to take place after midnight, it's a good idea to be on the lake before dark to find a good location, anchor the boat at both bow and stern, get the rods rigged, the lanterns flared up, and so on.

To find the depth at which the white bass are feeding, lower a baited hook to the bottom and retrieve it slowly toward the surface. When a fish takes the bait, count the number of turns of the reel handle it takes to bring him up and you'll have a good idea of how far down to fish.

Either spinning or bait casting tackle is suitable for this type of fishing and the most popular hook is a number four or five Aberdeen. Two or three inch minnows are the usual bait. Some other helpful items are two anchors and plenty of line, warm clothing, rain gear, an extra light and several gallons of coffee.

If you plan to run your boat at night, make sure that the lighting conforms to regulations. Running light requirements are rather specific so if you're not sure, better check with the Division of Water Enforcement, Department of Transportation, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

If the fishing gets really hot, don't get carried away and forget that the daily and possession limit on white bass is 60 per person. That's a lot of fish, but when conditions are right, limit or non-limit strings aren't unusual for the night fisherman.

After being up all night, that's also a lot of fish-cleaning to be done before finally hitting the sack. But any confirmed night fisherman will tell you this kind of fishing is worth losing sleep over.

White bass fishing around Kentucky is about to enter the second phase of its yearly cycle. The fish are returning to the main lake after their spawning runs into the headwaters and tributaries and they're hungry.

The most productive angling method to take advantage of this post-spawning feeding spree is night fishing. By shining the rays of a lantern or other artificial light into the water directly beside the boat, the fisherman attracts schools of bait fish. This in turn draws in the white bass, and the angler is set for the night of fast action.

The best areas of the lake for this type of fishing are usually along a deep bank off a point or beside a hogback. The secret of success is attracting the bait fish. Usually an overcast or moonless night is better than bright moonlight, since the darker conditions seem to cause the bait fish to concentrate around the lights more readily.

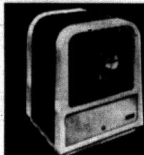

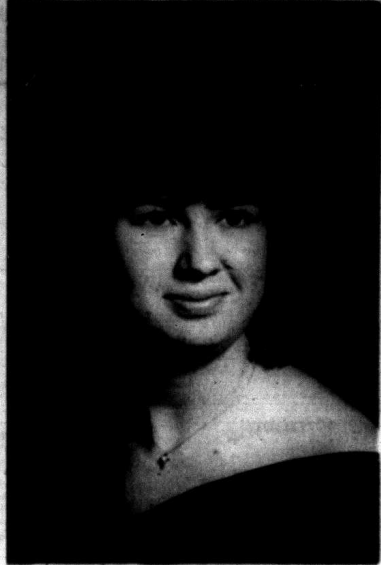

# County Agent's Notes

## FEED PRODUCTION SUGGESTIONS

The combination of 1976 spring temperatures and low moisture during

April and early May has resulted in first harvest yields and one-half or less than one-half of the normal for most of Kentucky. Assuming normal weather during the remainder of the growing season, the following suggestions, although not new, are offered for helping farmers increase their feed supply.

1. There is still time to plant corn for silage. Those farmers who have harvesting equipment or can get custom chopping done, should consider this one of their most productive alternatives. Finely chopped, tightly packed corn silage stacked on the ground and

properly covered with black plastic will almost always keep well. Use upright, trench or bunker silos, to the extent available, before resorting to stacks.

Fertilization of grass-legume fields with lime, phosphorus and potassium will increase summer and fall production if soil test and field history show these to be needed.

5. Bluegrass and fescue fields can be fertilized with nitrogen (P and K also if needed) in August and stockpile growth for grazing during fall and early winter.
4. Millet, sudangrass and/or forage sorghums may be planted for either

summer grazing, hay or silage. Yield of 4-7 t/a can be expected from this group of plants when properly managed.

5. Soybeans have in the past been used for hay in parts of the state. Close drilled seedings at the rate of 1 1/2 bushels of inoculated seed per acre and cut at early pod should yield about 2 tons of hay per acre.
6. Ryegrass or small grains should be seeded on all fields which can possibly be grazed or pastured, are properly grazed (rotational, restricted, stippled, etc.) fertilized, and clipped as needed to control weed and seed heads.

should provide excellent fall grazing. This assumes enough fall moisture for germination and growth of the seedlings.

7. Plans should also be made for using residue remaining following grain crop harvest.
8. Bermudagrass yields can be greatly increased through fertilization. Nitrogen can be applied now and after each cutting or grazing period to increase total production.
9. Pasture on hay field should be managed especially this season to insure that we utilize as much of the forage produced as possible. Greater utilization can be expected when pastures are properly grazed (rotational, restricted, stippled, etc.) fertilized, and clipped as needed to control weed and seed heads.

### SEEDING ALFALFA THIS FALL

Take soil samples now. If lime is needed put it on right away. By June 1 to 15 start summer fallow to keep weeds down and hold moisture in the ground. Find a source of the seed variety you want to buy the seed early. Seed alfalfa and a grass together for top yield and quality. Sow the seed by September 1 if possible and not later than September 10.

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# Home Line

## QUICK BAKING AND COOKING HINTS

1. Keep cake from sticking to the pan by wrapping a towel dipped in hot water around it when it is removed from the oven.
2. Spread honey over slices of pound cake, toast in the broiler for a few minutes, and serve with powdered sugar.
- Try using orange juice instead of water in making a sponge cake.
4. When using new tins, first butter them and put in a moderate oven for 15 minutes to avoid burning the cake.
5. Powdered sugar sprinkled liberally on waxed paper used to wrap loaves will prevent frosting from sticking to the paper.
6. If the cake sticks to pan, and could break, hold the pan over a low flame for about 5 to 8 seconds. The cake will come out intact and in perfect shape.
7. Leave layer cake 10 minutes, loaves 20 minutes, and angel and sponge cakes one hour before removing from cake pan.
8. Sprinkle a cake plate with powdered sugar to prevent cake from sticking.
9. If cake is frosted, rinse knife in hot water before using to slice.
- In warm weather, keep chocolate candy in the refrigerator, but wrap it in aluminum foil so it will not turn white.
11. Popovers will pop better if sprinkled with a little water before placing it in the popper.
12. Allow cheesecake to remain in oven an hour after baking to prevent dropping.
13. Make cheesecake with a ginger snap crust and top with cold canned peach slices.
14. When shaving chocolate, use a vegetable paring knife for quick, easy results.
15. If low on milk, use cold coffee when making fudge.

16. Remove soft or sticky cookies from the sheet by simply greasing the spatula. A few slices of bread in the cookie jar will keep soft cookies that way longer.

Slices of apple or orange in the cookie jar help mellow and moisten cookies. Remove the fruit in a day or two. Keep the cookies covered tightly.

19. Bake cookies lightly and remove from the oven when slightly undercooked. They will finish baking on the hot pans as they cool.

20. Mix crushed strawberries in vanilla custard and top with whipped cream.

### WATERGATE SALAD

- 1 box (3 oz.) pistachio pudding
  - 1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple, undrained
  - 1/2 cup chopped nuts
  - 1/2 cup miniature marshmallows
  - 1 container whipped topping
- Mix pudding in pineapple, add nuts and marshmallows. Fold in whipped topping. Can be chilled or served immediately.

### OLD FASHIONED COCONUT PIE

- 3 beaten eggs
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1/2 stick melted butter
  - 1 pinch salt
  - 1 pinch flour
  - 1 cup coconut
- Mix all ingredients together and pour in unbaked pie shell. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes, lower heat to 350 and continue baking until inserted in center comes out clean or about 30 minutes long.

### TORTILLA CHIP SALAD

- 1 head lettuce
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/2 teaspoon each onion powder, garlic powder and chili powder
- 2/3 cup water
- 4 tomatoes, cut in eights

- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 8 ounces fresh spinach
- 3/4 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne red pepper
- 4 drops red pepper sauce
- 1 can (14 oz.) kidney beans, drained
- 1 pkg. (8 1/2 oz.) tortilla chips
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 1 tablespoon pickle relish

Wash lettuce and spinach, tear into bite-size pieces. Chill in large one hour. Cook and stir ground beef in large skillet until brown, drain. Stir in seasonings, water and kidney beans, heat to boiling. Reduce heat, simmer uncovered 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cook 10 minutes.

Combine greens, tomatoes, tortilla chips, cheese and onion in large salad bowl. Mix mayonnaise, chili sauce, and pickle relish, toss gently with salad mixture. Pour warm beef mixture over salad, toss gently. Serve immediately. 8 servings.

## Down on the Farm

The American Revolution ushered in a new era of freedom from political oppression and tyranny with the birth of our nation in 1776.

Just 55 years later a seemingly insignificant but highly important event in the new nation's history marked the beginning of another kind of Revolution, one destined to free most of mankind from enslavement to the soil.

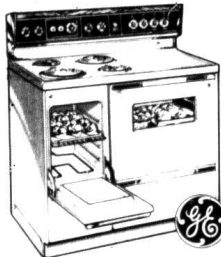
