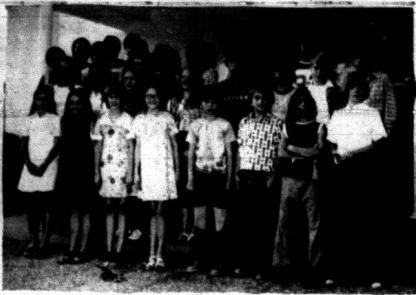


## VBS At Northside Baptist



**Down on the Farm**  
 By Roy G. Brown  
 Editor, The Farm  
 Cumberland, Pa.  
 "Again it is the time of year when our cattle are bothered with flies, horn flies, lice and others.  
 Flies, if not controlled by some method, can do serious damage to our cattle. They will not gain as much. Flies carry diseases and can be the cause of pink eye and later if not cured, infected cattle will become blind.  
 There are different ways and things to use to control flies. One way is to use a real good way to control flies. Fill a close mesh burlap bag with about 5 to 10 pounds of a good dust to each bag. To prevent dust from sifting through too rapidly, one bag should be placed inside another bag if they are porous. Back rubbers and others will work good also.  
 Any control method should be placed in a door, narrow gate or path that the cattle use regularly and placed at the right height to get the most effect to most of the body where flies bother.  
 With a few simple methods, very little time and not to much cost, we can save ourselves trouble and time and a few extra dollars DOWN ON THE FARM.

## City Council Makes New Proposal To Mr. Lair On Boat Dock

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted 3-2 in a called meeting last week in favor of making a new proposal to John Lair and his partners for leasing Lake Lovelie and its properties.

A proposal of \$3,200 had already been refused by Mr. Lair; however, Councilmen Conrad Parrett and Chester Hallard made another proposal for the same \$3,200 and included provisions concerning filter backwashing and no expense to the city, in the form of a 5-year lease. Before the Council, the motion failed to carry when Dennis Halcomb and Oscar Boland voted against it. Mayor Roland Mullins' deciding vote was "no," Councilman Halcomb then suggested a 5-year lease under the same provisions, however at a cost of \$2,500 annually. The lease would entail \$1,000 cash annually and \$1,500 in capital improvements for the first two years. After that, the cost would be

\$2,500 cash annually with Mr. Lair responsible for the cost of any further improvements and for the maintenance of improvements already made. Mr. Lair told the Council that he had an engineering survey of the area which calculated a \$4,500 - \$5,000 bill for movement of soil up from the beach area to the campsite as fill dirt. An additional \$2,400 would have to be spent for fencing and an office from which to operate the beach and camping areas, Mr. Lair said. On that note, Councilman Parrett repeatedly questioned the feasibility of swimming in the lake.

Conditions of the lease are that Mr. Lair will meet all Health Department regulations that are applicable; there will be no swimming in the lake; Mr. Lair will be responsible for capital loss encountered by Mr. Lair because of new EPA regulations and Mr. Lair will reimburse the city for filter backwashing. This backwash becomes necessary when movement of particles in the lake stops

up the filters through which the water passes.

Mr. Lair suggested to the Council that a 10-year lease under the conditions stated might be accepted; however, the Council declined a 10-year commitment. The motion, as stated, carried by a 3-2 vote with Mayor Mullins again holding the decisive vote. Mr. Lair took the proposal for discussion with his business associates.

In related business, the Council again reiterated that only original property owners in the lake area could dock their boats on their lots. This came following a question from a non-resident property owner who asked if he could leave his boat on property which he recently bought.

In other matters, the Council voted unanimously to tell the Mt. Vernon police to no longer turn the handles of parking meters to see if money has been left for additional time. Tickets will be written if the meter shows expired time.

## School Board Purchases New Equipment for Schools

A regularly scheduled meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education Monday night resulted in a progressive upgrade of facilities of the Rockcastle County High School and the school system overall.

The Board accepted and opened bids for roof repair at the high school. Successful bidder was Connors Roofing for \$8,840 for topcoat and repair to be approved by the architect. School furniture was also purchased by bids including a total of 223 new student desks and two teachers desks.

For the elementary schools, 160 tablet armchairs were purchased from Verco Corporation of Louisville at a total cost of \$2,492. In addition, the Board bought 16 open front desks and 16 stacking chairs from Verco at a cost of \$374. Two new teachers desks and 16 comb-type desks were bought from Central School Supply of Lexington for \$480. The remaining desks were purchased from Heywood Corporation.

The Board also opened bids on a new utility truck and accepted the low bid from Owens/Chevrolet of Stanford for \$3,575.72. The bids ranged from this figure to a high of \$3,763.00 from Bob Mullins Ford of London. Paul Miller Ford of Lexington refused to bid on the truck.

Instructional supplies were purchased from Central School Supply of Lexington for a total of \$3,041.00. The Board noted that, in the past, this company's products have not been of the high quality expected therefore the bid was accepted contingent upon the products being of satisfactory quality otherwise the Board reserved the right to declare the contract void.

A 10 percent salary increase was accepted for the school bus mechanics and maintenance men. During this discussion, the Board expressed its knowledge of the fact that these men are perpetually underpaid and this small increase, it was generally felt, was well deserved.

The Shriners annual trip to the Shrine Circus in Lexington was discussed and the Board agreed to allow this organization to use school buses on June 25th for the purpose of transporting county children to the Circus in Lexington. The Shrine Club will furnish gasoline and insurance for

the trip. The Board also approved the purchase of 4 or 5 good, used vans for use by the schools as long as the cost does not exceed that necessary for open bidding.

Cecil Tuttle of Mt. Sterling received a contract from the Board to furnish annual fee RCHS at a total cost of \$4,387.50. This amounts to \$7.31 per annual and was the only bid submitted.

Two depository banks were approved and are the same as last fiscal year. The Bank of Mt. Vernon will handle the Board open account under a \$295,000 bond and Citizens Bank in Brookhead will operate under a \$50,000 bond.

A GED certificate was also approved during the meeting for Thomas R. Foley.

Two other salary increases and other contracts were acted upon by the Board. Bessie Burdette and Pat Baker, secretaries in the school system in the main office, each received a \$240 annual increase and contracts were awarded to Richard Spoonamore to shingle the Livingston School roof at \$6.00 per square and J. Courtney Horton, CPA from Mt. Sterling, was employed to audit the financial records of the General Fund, Title I and RCHS at a total cost of \$1,125. An additional agreement was made to hire Paul Harper to help do repair work on various school buildings for \$2.50 per hour on a part-time basis.

## Charles Parsons Named To Educational TV Task Force

Charles Parsons, superintendent of Rockcastle County schools, has been named a member of the Kentucky Educational Television (KET) Task Force to set guidelines and advise on implementation of an equipment project for all 182 Kentucky school districts.

KET received \$1.1 million from the 1976 General Assembly to assist local schools in buying needed television reception equipment, including master antenna systems, television receivers and videotape equipment. The appropriation, which must be matched by local funds from each school district, includes \$500,000 for the first year of the biennium and \$600,000 for the second.

The Board also approved the payment of \$1,775 to Lawson Roofing Co. for repair work to the high school gym roof, subject to architect's approval.

Continuing contracts were approved for: Ruth Allen, James E. Bullock, Claudina Cash, Betty Lou Adams, John Hale, David Hansel, Glenda Jones, Gary Scott, Jess T. Pike, Glen Polly, E.J. Smith, Carol Ann Stewart, Glen Van Winkle, Florence Winstead and Virginia Hunt.

The School Calendar for 1976-77 was approved and enrollment will be on Monday, August 23rd. There will be a teacher in-service day on August 18th.

Several bonds by Norton Insurance Agency were approved for 1976-77 fiscal year at a cost of \$678,000. They were, as follows: Treasurers Bond - Lloyd Shultz - \$295,000.00, Roundstone School - Barbara Thacker - \$2,200.00, Livingston School - Ronnie Blank - \$2,000.00, Mt. Vernon School - Jerry Nunneley - \$3,400.00 and RCHS - Ronnie Cash - \$3,000.00.

In other business, the possibility arose of the board procuring the old state garage for school buses. All members agreed to leasing or buying it at a reasonable cost if possible.

Bids will also be opened at the July meeting for the construction of a school scorekeepers stand at the high school football field - a project which the board hopes to keep under \$2,500.

## Livingston to Receive \$2,614 For City Street Improvements

State Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts has announced that Livingston will receive \$2,614 to support its 1976-77 municipal road improvements program, beginning next July 1.

Of the total amount allocated, \$1,384 was identified as new money. The balance consists of previously allocated funds remaining unexpended from last fiscal year.

According to Roberts, the city will use the money to provide for blacktop patching along Walnut Street.

Similar allocations to other communities also are being announced locally.

The municipal road aid program was established in 1973 to assist incorporated communities - and eligible unincorporated urban areas - meet the costs of maintaining and improving their city roads and streets.

It is financed under a formula which provides that one-half percent of the tax collected on each gallon of motor fuels sold in Kentucky be set aside to support municipal road aid programs. Allocations to eligible communities are made once annually, on a fiscal-year basis.

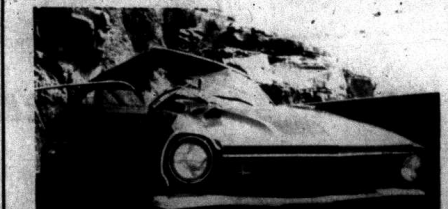

## FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

By Ferrell Wellman

The headline seemed to jump off the front page of the newspaper in the small Central Kentucky city—LOCAL FARMER IS SLAIN.

Journalists, politicians and sociologists have been telling us for years that crime is draining the lifeblood from our great cities. It's responsible for making ghost towns of our metropolitan areas—after dark. However, in the seventies, crime doesn't stop at the city limits. Rural America is playing an alarming game of catch-up. Crime, especially non-violent crime, is a growing menace in Kentucky's small cities and rural counties.

Preliminary crime figures for 1975 have been released by the Kentucky State Police. The report is disturbing. It indicates larceny is Kentucky's biggest problem. Larcenies increased by nearly 22 per cent over the previous year. Larceny is also increasing at a faster pace outside of Kentucky's largest urban area, Jefferson County, than it is in it.

Breaking and entering is Kentucky's largest second most common criminal offense. The number of break-ins jumped by more than 17 per cent last year. The State Police figures reveal shockingly high increases in robbery, assault, and auto theft. The number of murders outside of Jefferson County also increased last year. Unfortunately, of the 70 thousand crimes committed outside the Louisville area in 1975, only about one in five was cleared by an arrest.

No one in state government seems to know why the crime wave is spreading to our rural areas. Kentucky State Police Commissioner Trust Ricks, a respected veteran law enforcement officer, says if he knew the reason for the growth of criminal activity, his troopers could do something about it. Presently, the best his department can do is provide additional manpower in areas where it's most likely an offense will be committed.

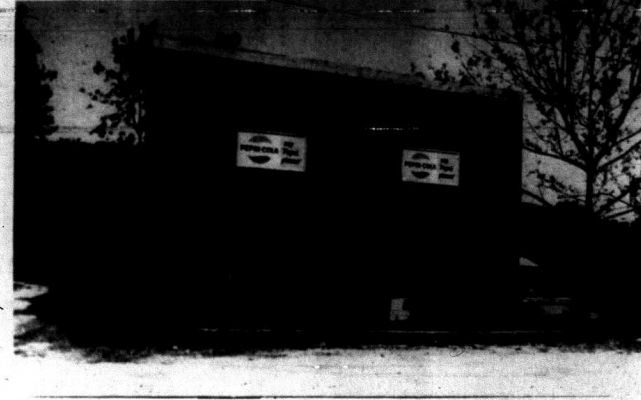

is overseeing the unique experiment through a five-year joint venture with Oliver Winery in Bloomington, Indiana. The vineyard, located at Falcon's Fossil Fork job site in Breathitt County, is believed to be the first ever grown on reclaimed surface mined land.

William Oliver, owner of Oliver Winery, is making the wine from over three tons of grapes harvested last summer.

If the grapes produce good wine, the project could have significant impact in Kentucky where a small-winery bill was passed by the 1976 General Assembly making it legal to operate a commercial winery in the state.

Grapes could conceivably become an important new cash crop for Kentucky farmers.

The vineyards are one of several experiments by Falcon Coal Company to demonstrate economic uses of land after surface mining," said J.L. Jackson, president of Falcon Coal and executive vice-president of the firm's parent company, Falcon Seaboard Inc., of Houston, Texas.

Oliver, a law professor at Indiana university, said he is getting "favorable comments" from those who have sampled the wine thus far.

"It's not a great wine, but it is above average," Oliver said. "It will take years of experimentation to get the wine from this vineyard as good as it can be. I would expect us to make much better wine next year."

Three wines have been produced from the grapes: Aurora sweet, Aurora dry, and Cascade red.

On hand to taste the wine at a special wine tasting party at Spindletop Hall in Lexington will be:

Ruth Ellen Church, wine and food editor of the Chicago Tribune; Warren Sublette, president of Sublette Winery, Cincinnati; and vice president of the American Wine Society (AWS); Charles and Dorothy Vitaliano. Mr. Vitaliano is the founder of the Indiana chapter of the AWS and a former regional vice president of AWS.

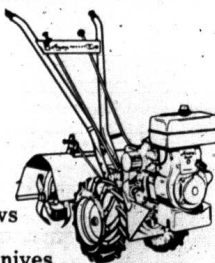

# Rockcastle Recollections

After the visit of Dr. Walker in 1750 the next white man whose name became connected with the history of what is now Rockcastle County, was Herry Skaggs, who in 1765 came with one of the first group of professional hunters to explore these wilderness hunting grounds. These hunters made their way through this part of the Wilderness as far as present Crab Orchard, Kentucky, spending considerable time in the vicinity of Rockcastle River while passing through. It is said that on this trip Skaggs discovered the creek which bears his name and also the well-marked buffalo trace that followed along its banks toward central Kentucky. In fact, it seems likely that they used this trace to find their way to the hunting grounds at Crab Orchard.

The story is told that Skaggs was following a single buffalo through the canebrakes along the south side of Rockcastle River in an attempt to get a clear shot at him when the animal made a certain turn down the bank of the river that disclosed an unsuspected crossing place of this stream. This was probably in the neighborhood of Horse Post or further up the river near the location of the present tourist attraction of Ft. Squoyah, near the confluence of the Rockcastle River and Little Rockcastle. After affecting the crossing, Skaggs continued to follow the buffalo down stream to the point where Skaggs creek empties into it. Here the trail turned north and led on across Rockcastle County to the head of Negro Creek, so called because a negro slave was killed there in an Indian attack on an early party of settlers. Continuing down Negro Creek to where it, with other stream forms the headwaters of Dix River, the buffalo trace led off toward Crab Orchard, as previously indicated. This trace thus became the first definitely named and established trail across Rockcastle County, with the exception of the ancient Watauga Trace, the first into Kentucky from the south.

After Skaggs and his companions, the next white visitors of record were Isaac Lindsey and four hunting companions from South Carolina who on a hunting expedition along Rockcastle River discovered a remarkable rock on the side of the river, near what is now Livingston, Kentucky, one of the three principle towns in Rockcastle County. Because this rock in appearance reminded him so much of an ancient castle he gave it the name, Castle Rock and the name of the river flowing by it Rockcastle River. Until he changed the principle towns in Rockcastle County. Because this rock in appearance name it has been known as Lawless. The name soon caught on and in all early journals and reports it is mentioned as Rockcastle River, as it is still known today. When the county was organized in 1810 it was named for this river at the suggestion of an early settler, William Henderson.

By this time individual hunters and small groups of surveyors were beginning to creep into this area on their way to the more fertile and attractive acres of Central Kentucky. The large group of hunters, later officially

designated Long Hunters, were here by 1760 and at about the same time Daniel Boone and a small hunting party followed their way through Great Saltpetre Cave, the Wilderness which he had visited once before and was to visit again and again until he came to be better acquainted with Kentucky than any other white man. It was on one of these trips that his brother-in-law and hunting companion, John Stuart, was killed by the Indians near Great Saltpetre Cave. Thus the first white man killed by the savages in Kentucky was slain in what would later be Rockcastle County.

Of the 1769-70 famous Long Hunters, three of them later came back to Kentucky to establish homes here in Rockcastle County. These were James Dycart, who after returning south following the hunt had served in the Revolutionary Army, reaching the rank of Colonel, Valentine Harmon and John Baker. Dycart and Harmon, who were close personal friends, had adjoining tracts along Skaggs Creek. Baker, who in 1796 discovered Great Saltpetre Cave, lived with his family for many years in the neighborhood of the cave and now lies buried on his former homestead.

After 1770 Boone made another visit to Kentucky, passing through here in 1774 over Skaggs Trace to warn surveyors in Central Kentucky of an expected Indian uprising, then in 1778 he was back with a crew of around 30 axemen engaged in cutting a path to Boonesborough. Although he did not follow Skaggs Trace, turning north at Hazel Patch to begin his new road, still it was an Indian attack on Rockcastle County, indeed the gateway to the interior of the state for visitors coming in through Cumberland Gap. Incidentally, Boone did not name Cumberland Gap nor did Dr. Walker, although both have often been credited with doing so. Dr. Walker named only Cumberland River. The gap and the mountain range both acquired their names in association with that of the river. In his report Dr. Walker refers to it as "Cave Gap, on account of the large cave which has its opening in the gap."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LIVINGSTON, KENTUCKY, ESTABLISHING A GARBAGE AND TRASH COLLECTION SYSTEM AND PROVIDING FOR THE FINANCING THEREFOR.

WHEREAS, the City of Livingston, Kentucky, has no garbage disposal system and the unregulated private disposal of garbage and refuse has created a health hazard and.

WHEREAS, the health and welfare of the citizens of the City of Livingston, Ky., is promoted through the establishment of a regulated system for the collection and disposal of garbage and refuse.

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person owning property or residing in the City of Livingston, Kentucky, to permit the accumulation of refuse and garbage in, about or upon premises owned or possessed by him within this City.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of refuse or garbage within the corporate limits of the City of Livingston.

Section 3. The City of Livingston will provide for the weekly collection of refuse and garbage as set forth in this section.

a. The collection will be made on Monday of each week until changed by the Board of Trustees.

b. All refuse or garbage to be collected will be placed in containers near the curb or edge of the road. Suitable containers will be garbage cans, metal drums, trash bags, etc.

c. No business or residence shall exceed five cans, drums or trash bags per week.

Section 4. Each residence and business shall be provided with collection service. Each residence shall pay a service fee of two dollars per month and each business shall pay a service fee of five dollars per month. In the event the service fee is not paid by a tenant, the owner of the real property will be responsible for said service charge. If the residence or business is receiving city water, the fee will be added to the monthly water bill is payable. If the residence or business does not receive city water, a separate bill will be sent, payable on the tenth day of each month. The city, at its option, may enforce the payment of said service fee by terminating city water service.

Section 5. Any person violating Sections one and two of this ordinance shall be fined not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense. Each day shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be effective upon its publication.

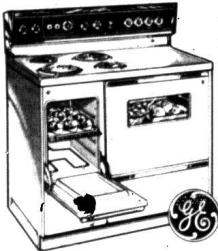

### Blue Angels To Appear In Lexington June 12 and 13

Blue, on blue should capture the sight of thousands when the U.S. Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron, the Blue Angels, perform precision aerobatics during Lexington's Bluegrass Air Show, June 12 and 13.

Officially formed in 1946, the Blue Angels mission is to demonstrate the quality of the men and equipment of the Navy. During their 29 years of conducting aerial demonstrations, they have electrified over 122 million spectators around the world. Six McDonnell Douglas A-4F Skyhawk II's serve as platforms for the Blue Angels who perform a prescribed sequence of maneuvers while flying at speeds approaching the speed of sound. The Skyhawks are a part apart from the Grumman F4F Hellcats first used by the original Blues. Demonstration flights in 1946 culminated with a simulated shooting down of a training aircraft painted with a "Zero." This routine was eventually dropped but the tight diamond formation flown by the original pilots became the trademark of the Blue Angels.

Admission charges for the Bluegrass Air Show amount to \$3.00 per adult and \$1.00 for children under 12 with all proceeds going for charity. The Navy "Blues" are only a part of the week's festivities. Flight demonstration teams from all over the country plan to knife the airways over Lexington's Bluegrass Air Field.

LIFE EXPECTANCY FOR MEN AND WOMEN

There are almost 52 per cent more women than men in the United States.

In 1970, there were only 94.8 men per 100 women. Males start out with a numerical advantage. There are 105 boy babies born in the United States for every 100 girl babies. But males have a higher mortality rate than females at all stages of the life cycle. So at the age of 65 and over there are 3 million more women than men in the United States.

1970 the number of elderly women increased twice as fast as the number of men 65 and over. In a quarter of a century from now (about 25 years) there may be only 66.3 men per 100 women.

What the statistics mean. Perhaps you have purchased auto insurance for your teenage male driver. You paid more for the policy than you would for a daughter of the same age. Males are a greater risk than females. Young men 15-19 are killed in traffic accidents nearly three times as often as are young women 15-19. For those 20-24 years of age, the rate is nearly five times as great for young men as it is for young women.

Some other interesting items. Women, on the average, outlive their husbands by eight years. This means that loneliness is a much greater problem for elderly women.

Parents are more apt to lose a young son than a young daughter. Children are more apt to have grandmothers than grandfathers, and increasingly more great-grandmothers as well.

Many wives will outlive their husbands by 5 to 15 years. Women take better care of themselves. They have fewer accidents. They are quicker to seek medical care. They find it easier to admit they're tired and need rest. They succumb to all major diseases for less often than men.

Older women without husbands. About 2/3 of all women over 65 years of age have no husbands, yet they have little opportunity to marry because more than 2/3 of the men over 65 are still married. In other words, there are now about 8 million unmarried women over 65 years in this country and only 3 million unmarried men over 65.

What is the solution to the problem? Dr. Margaret Mead suggests that women should marry men about eight years younger than themselves.

Dr. Theodore Rubin suggests the following ways in which the wife can help her husband live longer (the men will love this):

Be careful with criticism. Teach him to relax. Help him to be a good father (don't put all the punishment off on him). Encourage him to take a vacation (at least with the wife, of course). Permit him to feel tired. Urge him to go to the doctor when necessary (and make sure he eats the right foods - go easy on the rich, heavy "poison foods").

Don't let the statistics discourage you. Start making plans today for a happy summer holiday.

of your trousers. This treatment is effective only if there are no high weeds, or if you are not sitting or lying on the ground, or sitting on a log.

Otherwise, apply the repellent to your arms and legs. If they are not covered, and to all openings in your clothing - those that are buttoned, zipped, or otherwise fastened - the cuffs and waistband of trousers or slacks; the cuffs (or armbands) and neckband of blouses and shirts; the hem and waistband of skirts; the neckline, hem and cuffs, sleeve hems, or armholes, of dresses; and on your socks or stockings, both above and below the tops of your shoes.


**FOR FLEAS**  
Deet is the most effective repellent to use against fleas. Apply it to exposed skin, as for mosquitoes and to your clothing by the spraying method. Deet remains effective on clothing for a week or more.

You can also protect yourself against fleas if you appear or spray deet on your socks and the legs of your trousers.

## County Agent's Notes

### CATTAL CONTROL NEEDED TO KEEP PONDS USEFUL

Cattails, a tall growing plant that "looks pretty" in farm ponds, actually is one of the biggest plant nuisances of a farmer.

Uncontrolled cattail growth eventually can choke out a fine pond and make a pond nearly unusable.

Here's how to control them, according to James Herron/UK Experiment Station weed control specialist:

1. Pull them out by the roots when they first appear in a farm pond. If allowed to stay these plants will develop extensive root systems and be harder to eradicate.

2. Use chemical killers if desired. One is Dalapon, in 100 gallons of water for large areas, or approximately 8 tablespoons in one gallon for small areas.

Spray on the plants, wetting the foliage thoroughly as the material kills by absorption through the leaves and stems down to the roots.

Amino triazole is similar to Dalapon. Use about 4 tablespoons in a gallon of water for small areas, 5 to 7 pounds in 100 gallons of water for large areas. Be sure to wet the foliage thoroughly.

Extension Leaflet 229, "Control of Cattails in Ponds," lists needed directions for cattail control. It is available at county agents' offices.

### FOR CHIGGERS

To protect yourself against chiggers apply repellent to your clothing and to exposed skin on your arms and legs. The repellent does more than keep chiggers from biting; it kills them.

Barrier method: The simplest way to apply repellent for chiggers is in a spray that contains a general-use repellent.

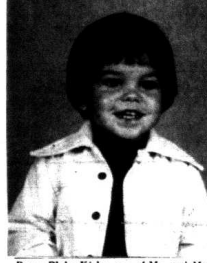
You can protect yourself from chiggers by spraying the repellent on the top of your socks and on the bottom
