FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

Now that the pressing question of whether or not Kentucky will be able to keep a professional sports franchise has been decided and the Kentucky Colonels basketball team has clipped into its new absurdity, we can return to debating the really important and more timely issue of who's going to run for what in 1979. The answer is everybody for everything.

"I've never seen anything like it" one bureau chief told me the other day. "Everybody is going to be running." Unless the safe side of the coin is the resolutions are political inclusions, it seems likely he's right.

Obviously the race that causes most people to dawdle over their coffee is the contest for the Democratic Party nomination for governor. Since the editor insists on having space for other articles in this edition of the paper I'll stick to the Democrats and their never ending search for happiness in Frankfort.

If Governor Julian Carroll could hand pick his successor, and who says he can't, former State Senator Terry McBrayer Jr. would be working as his top aide. During the 1975 campaign, McBrayer served as Carroll's top political brain trust. When Carroll was unable to speak after a throat operation, it was McBrayer who carried Julian's message to the Democratic faithful.

At the recent state convention, McBrayer received the kind of treatment generally reserved for Dan Ford or Elton John. Reporters checking knowledge behind their notepads as McBrayer was escorted to the stage by four police.

McBrayer left his hot seat as Carroll's right hand man last year, but because of a split with the governor but rather due to a case of political genius. Among Democrats speaking favorably of McBrayer was Carroll's favorite, Carroll got the credit for accomplishments and appointments McBrayer got the blame when the axe came down.

McBrayer has not yet publicly announced his intention to run. U.S. Representative Carroll Hubbard has. It was no surprise.

Although Hubbard faces what most consider only token opposition in November, he has amassed a healthy political war chest. With Hubbard's fund-raising prowess in mind, the Carroll dominated General Assembly passed a law prohibiting a candidate from using money collected for one campaign on another. Hubbard listened on the telephone as the debate on the bill was held. It's likely he'll see lavish campaigns by Hubbard in the next two years regardless of his opposition. If any.

Hubbard has strong ties to East and West Kentucky. Bred in Ashland, educated in Lexington, Hubbard has a law practice in Mayfield. He is an effective campaigner with an efficient staff which never forgets the birthday cards and graduation notes. However, McBrayer supporters cautiously say Hubbard's early entry leaves him vulnerable for a longer period of time.

The secreted doesn't stop with Hubbard and McBrayer. Children designate John Y. Brown Jr. could also be tempted to run. Brown has strong ties with the national Democratic Party because of his successful fund raising efforts. Brown is smart, good looking, ambitious, and rich.

Jefferson County Judge Todd Hollenbach who was thrashed by Carroll in the 1975 primary always has his eyes open for higher office. Hollenbach behaved like a good soldier after his crushing. His behavior generally erased doubts his political career has reached a premature end.

Louisiana Governor Thoma Snowball could also enter the fray. Louisville Mayor Harvey Sloane likes to restore old mansions. Sloane, like Brown, could afford to renovate the one across the street from the Capitol.

There's no way Ford or Combs (Wendell and Bert) will get involved in this one," said the man in state government. "They'll just sit back and watch." Did someone say Wendell Ford?

discovered that the contract had been sold by the dealer to a financial institution. The financial institution claimed that it had purchased a valid contract and had no responsibility for fixing the refrigerator. It did, however, claim the right to collect payments on the contract.

This type of consumer complaint arises from a legal situation involving a "holder in due course." By having and holding the contract, the financial institution is the holder in due course and can collect on the contract. The consumer, however, has practically no defenses in this kind of situation and must often pay for products or services that do not work.

On May 14, 1976, the Federal Trade Commission issued a regulation which abolished the doctrine of holder in due course. Kentucky's General Assembly followed suit during their 1976 session. Under the new laws, an installment contract arranged by the seller and signed by the consumer, must contain language which states that the financial institution holding the contract is subject to all claims and defenses which the consumer could assert against the original seller. This gives the consumer some protection and leverage with respect to getting what he or she paid for, as well as not having to pay for defective products or poorly performed services.

These laws will not hurt the lines of credit of established and reputable businesses. Financial institutions are likely to think twice, however, about doing business with people or companies that indulge in questionable practices. Consumers should do likewise.

If you have a consumer complaint, write to the Attorney General's Division of Consumer Protection, Room 34, He Capitol, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

The office has found that it can most effectively deal with written complaints and encourages you to write when you have a complaint. However, if you have an emergency situation, call the consumer hotline. The number is 1-800-372-2960.

Newspapers across the Commonwealth carry advertisements proclaiming special savings on items at local food stores. These advertised specials can mean real bargains for the food buyer who compares the advertisements and shop where the lowest prices are advertised. But what if an advertised item is sold out when the shopper arrives or it is almost impossible to locate in the store? Any question that has encountered this situation knows that it is frustrating.

It is not as well-known that the Federal Trade Commission's Consumer Protection Law, provides certain guidelines for the use of advertised specials by food retailers. You should be aware of these requirements.

For an advertised special to comply with the FTC regulations, four conditions must be met:

1. The grocery must have in stock an amount of the advertised item sufficient to meet the expected demand.
2. The advertised item must be conspicuously displayed to the store, for easy location by shoppers.
3. The advertised item must be for the period of the sale, be priced at or below the advertised sale price.
4. The advertisement must clearly state any specific restrictions on, limitations of or exceptions to the availability of the advertised item. These include limits, if any, on the quantity of the item each shopper may purchase, as well as the minimum amount of total purchases necessary to take advantage of an advertised special. Also, if the advertisement is made by a legal chain, it must indicate which of the chain's stores, if any, are not participating in the special.

Many food stores will give the shopper a "raincheck" on a sale item that has already sold out when the shopper arrives. If you find a sale item missing from the shelves, you should ask the grocer for a "raincheck" so that you can purchase the item at the sale price at a later date. The availability of a "raincheck" however, does not exempt the store from the requirement of stocking a sufficient amount of the advertised item in time for the special.

Getting the most for your food dollar is easy, if you make wise use of advertised specials. Compare the advertised prices and read the advertisement fully. Don't be a victim of "bait and switch" - draws into the store by sale price "bait" and the "switched off" to a higher-priced product because the sale item is already "sold out." If you

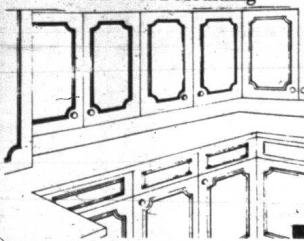

Pets of U.S. Presidents: TR's Menagerie

An unfortunate episode in history was the famous charge of the U.S. Cavalry Rough Riders up Kettle Hill at San Juan led by Lt. Col. "Teddy" Roosevelt.

Equally unforgettable to anyone visiting the White House grounds during his presidency was the surprising aggregation of various pet animals that

Roosevelt started an entirely new chapter in the history of White House pets at the turn of the 20th century when he became the nation's youngest President at age 42. He ushered in what has been called the "White House Pet-lood" in which the Executive Mansion was thrown open to pets of all kinds.

He included nine riding horses, two carriage horses, Algonquin—Arthur Roosevelt's calico pony, Pete, bull terrier, Salter Boy, Chesapeake retriever, Jack—Frank Roosevelt's terrier, Manchu—Alice Roosevelt's spaniel, and a mongrel, Rollo, a St. Bernard, Joshua, a budger, two pet cats, and his pony friend, Algonquin.

Another favorite was Skip, the bright little mongrel. Skip and his pony friend, Algonquin, developed a trick that always delighted the family. The pony would enter around the lawn and suddenly Skip would run up and leap on the pony's back. Algonquin would stop and try to vainly to shake the dog off his back. Kentucky Afield

Bill McLemore, the Western District fisheries biologist for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, feels that the number four sport fish in the Kentucky Lake area is the sauger.

This puts the sauger, as fish that has been mostly ignored in the past, up in some pretty fast company - right up there, in fact, with the black bass, the white bass and the crappie, and ahead of bluegill and catfish.

One of the reasons for the increase in popularity is sauger fishing, McLemore believes, is that the population of this fish is showing a steady increase and more and more anglers are discovering effective techniques of consistently catching sauger.

In case you're not familiar with the sauger, let me perform the introductions. The sauger is a near relative of the walleye, only smaller. The adults reach a normal size of between 10 and 15 inches, and 20-inch fish is approaching the trophy category.

Like the walleye, saugers make some might good eating - in fact, sauger filets are generally judged to be about the best around. Saugers live in all the

major drainage systems of Kentucky, and are residents of both lakes and rivers throughout the state.

Saugers will readily take both live and artificial baits but, like the walleye, they don't put up too much of a fight when hooked. Also like the walleye the main challenge in catching these fish is finding them. They are bottom-dwelling, school fish which seem to have rather definite ideas about where in a particular body of water they are happy and well-adjusted.

A most efficient group of sauger locators (and thus sauger catchers) are the members of the Kentucky Spoonpluggers Club of Hopkinsville. Their main weapon is, as the name of the organization indicates, a spoonplug. This is a funny-shaped spoon, but one which people stop laughing at once they see how it catches fish.

Spoonplugs come in series of different sizes, and the depth at which the lure travels is largely determined by the size. Since saugers are bottom fish, it follows that the depth of the water you're fishing will determine the size of spoonplug you tie on.

The spoonpluggers have found that a depth finder is an indispensable tool. Right now, they're finding saugers on the first ridge to the west of the main channel in Kentucky Lake. In about five to seven feet of water. They will locate this ridge with depth finder, mark it with buoys, then troll both the east and west side of the ridge until they locate the schools of sauger. If they find a particularly productive spot, they'll sometimes stop and cast the area thoroughly.

Other sauger fishermen are finding the Kentucky Barkley Canal a good place for sauger fishing. They will drift with the current, using a trolling motor to keep the boat traveling at exactly the same speed as the current, and fish straight down with live minnows.

Tailwater fishermen below both Kentucky and Barkley dams have their own sauger-fishing techniques. Boat fishermen will use a reel resembling a large automatic fly reel clamped to the gunwale or a seat of the boat. No rod is used and on the business end of this unlikely looking rig is a three-way swivel with a large, cigar shaped sinker attached to one eye of the swivel and a minnow-imitation "stick" bait on the other.

This rig is trolled upstream against the main flow of the current, the fisherman holds the line in his hand and imparts a sweeping motion to the lure. When a sauger is hooked, the fish is brought in hand over hand, with the reel taking up the loose line.

A little later in the year, bank fishermen in the tailwaters below both dams will take sauger on live minnows or by casting do-jigs.

Tailwater fishermen in the eastern part of the state - at Lake Cumberland, are also having some good sauger fishing at this time of year. Again, minnows and jigs are the favorite producers. There are also very productive sauger hotspots all along the Ohio River, with the swift water just below dams good places to try.

Around the state, many sauger are taken "by accident" - that is, by anglers

fishing for bass or crappie, but you should catch one, keep fishing because there's probably a school nearby.

And if you do get into a school of sauger, remember that the daily limit in Kentucky is 10 fish, with a possession limit of 20 after two days or more of fishing. There's no size limit on sauger and no limit on the fun and good eating this fish can provide.

Your Social Security

Social Security Increase In Checks Delivered in July

A cost-of-living increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to social security officials here.

The increase will amount to 6.4 percent for most people getting social security payments. The cost-of-living provision was added to the social security law in 1972.

"People getting social security checks don't have to do

anything to get the higher payments," a spokesman said. "The increase will be added automatically."

The increase is based on the rise in consumer prices from the first 3 months of 1975 to the first 3 months of 1976.

With the cost-of-living increase, average social security retirement payments to retired workers will go from \$210 to \$224 a month. Average social

security disability payments to disabled workers will go from \$228 to \$242 a month. Average social security survivors payments to widowed mothers or fathers with two children in their care will go from \$479 to \$510 a month.

Social security pays monthly benefits to over 32 million people. The payments are funded by social security contributions from employees, employers,

and self-employed people.

Employees and employers contribute 5.85 percent each of the first \$15,300 of yearly earnings from jobs covered by social security. Self-employed people contribute 7.9 percent. "These figures remain unchanged," the social security spokesman said.

The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

At this time of year, some Kentuckians are likely to be called on by a local or itinerant door-to-door pest control salesman. Our office has received letters from consumers who complain that they spent hundreds of dollars on pest control and are still plagued by what they have termites, beetles or other insects or bugs, don't panic or rush into signing a contract. Warning that your house may fall down within a week, or that every other home in the neighborhood has termites and they are moving your way, may be

nothing but scare tactics to make you sign a contract without thinking. An offer of a discount "today only" is another tactic designed to convince the consumer to sign a contract which may be much more expensive than other competent and a valuable companies. Before you do anything, get the opinion of at least two other pest control companies as to whether or not there is no problem. If the companies do not agree, or if you have doubts as to whether or not you have insects, write to the Director, Pest and Noxious Weevil Control, Department of Agriculture, 105 West Second, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. Their inspection team may be able to help.

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NOTICE

Requirements For Licensing

All dogs six months of age or over are required to be licensed on or before July 1 of each year.

All dog owners shall apply to the dog warden in each county in which he lives for a license for each dog owned or harbored by him.

The Department of Agriculture shall supply all license tags to each county which when issued shall be affixed to a collar furnished by the owner and kept on the dog at all times.

The license fee for both male and female dogs is \$1.50.

Any person operating a kennel may in lieu of obtaining a license for each dog, apply to the dog warden for a kennel license. A license fee of \$10.00 is required to keep ten dogs or less; a fee of \$15.00 is charged to keep more than ten dogs.
