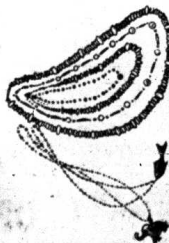

Local Vocational School Accredited By State Board

The Kentucky State Board of Education accredited Harry M. Sparks Vocational Education Center from July 1, 1976 to June 30, 1977. The State Board of Education has for a number of years accredited elementary and secondary schools in the state. However, the state's secondary and postsecondary vocational education schools were not accredited by the state board until two years ago.

To qualify for accreditation vocational schools and centers must meet minimum standards in 12 areas related to vocational education programs. Besides instruction itself, other areas that are evaluated include student

placement, administration, planning and community relations.

On-site visits are made to the schools at least every five years, but annual written reviews are made to assure that standards in all areas continue to be met.

State accreditation makes more federal funds available in the form of student loans and grants. The United States Commissioner of Education designated the State Board of Education as the body which evaluates post-secondary vocational education in Kentucky. Kentucky is one of ten states whose State Board is recognized as an accrediting agency.

Rockcastle Countians Complete Program At Berea

Six Rockcastle County students have finished an eight-week Upward Bound summer program at Berea College. They are: Sharon Thompson, Brodhead, Perry Riley, Conway; Arnetta Halcomb and Sadie Mink, Livingston; and Bobby McClure and Frances Foytner, Mt. Vernon.

Designed to help students explore themselves and the world around them through academic and labor responsibilities, Upward Bound is a supplement to the traditional classroom education system.

Each student chooses from language, history and science classes for high school credit. Work assignments were in broom-making, woodworking, and gardening. Besides spending eight weeks on the Berea College campus during the summer, they continue with regular meetings at Berea and in their home counties during the academic year.

The national Upward Bound director, David Johnson, made his first visit to Berea College's program last week. Johnson gave the program high praise, especially for the work activities in which the student "is learning to do usable things and come to grips with what he is."

Originated by Dr. Bill Best of the Berea faculty, the project, in its 11th year, is one year older than the national program which numbers 450 projects.

Students come from Clinton, Laurel, McCreary, Madison, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Wayne and White Counties.

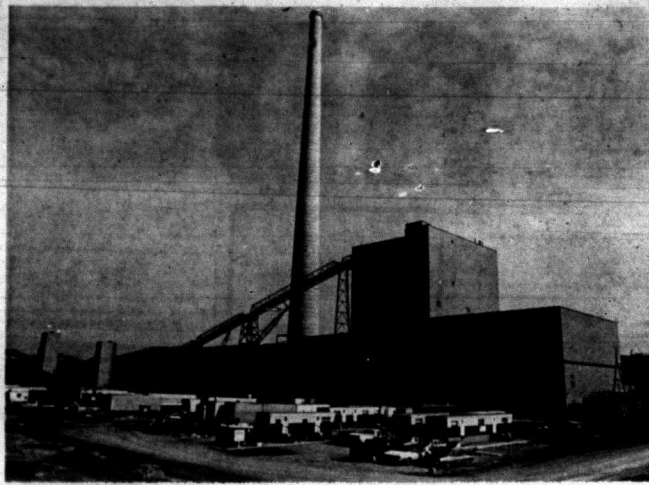

H.L. SPURLOCK POWER STATION

New Generating Station Completed Near Maysville

The completion of a new generating station near Maysville in late 1976 will add 319,000 kilowatts to the 18-member system serving electricity to 900,000 Kentuckians.

The new plant, the H. L. Spurlock Power Station, was dedicated on June 11, and is the third station in East Kentucky Power system. The William C. Dale plant at Ford provides 176,000 kilowatts and the John Sherman Cooper Station near Burnside has a 356,000 KW capacity.

On hand for the dedication were J. K. Smith, governor of the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation (FCF) in Washington; John Dollinger, president of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association based in Washington; Martha Layne Collins, clerk of the Kentucky Court of Appeals; and Kentucky Attorney General Robert Stephens. David Hamill, administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA), presented the dedicatory address. H. L. Spurlock, general manager of East Kentucky Power for 20 years until his retirement last July, gave a response to the naming of the plant in his honor.

Built in Mason County on a 569-acre site known as Charleston Bottoms, the new plant will be coal-fired and will burn coal mined almost exclusively in Kentucky. Actual construction of the station has been underway for nearly four years. Planning and purchase of equipment is now in progress for a second unit of 500,000 kilowatts at the Spurlock Station.

Cost of the Spurlock plant project will total \$125 million and will include 110 miles of related transmission lines. Financing is being provided by REA in Washington, the FCF and six major insurance companies.

Of the total cost, nearly \$11 million is being spent for pollution-control equipment in the plant. Ronald Rainsom, East Kentucky General Manager, reiterated that the Cooperative "will continue to equip all our plants with the best and most efficient proven equipment."

VOCATIONAL TEACHERS MEET WITH BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY

On August 12-13 vocational teachers and administrators, representatives from business and industry and visitors from both in state and out will meet at the Holiday Inn North in Lexington to discuss the Kentucky Appalachia Vocational Staff Exchange Project.

The purpose of the conference is three-fold, according to Pat White, project director for the Bureau of Vocational Education. 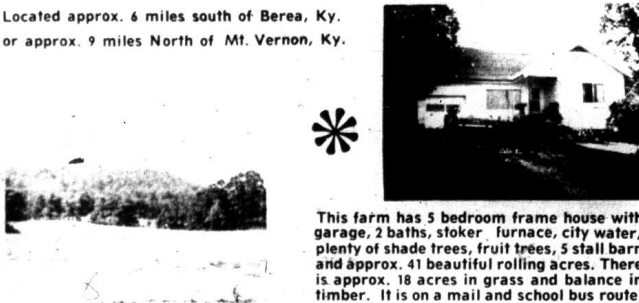

One Man Dead, Two Injured Following Shooting at Red Hill

State police and local law enforcement agencies are investigating a gun battle Sunday night in the Red Hill area that left one man dead and two others wounded. Killed in the shooting was William Drew who lives at Red Hill. Wounded were Arthur Jones and Ronald Maupin. Jones received a gunshot wound in the left eye and Maupin suffered head injuries.

According to investigators, the three men were ambushed at a small secondary road while out of the area. As shooting broke out, they attempted to drive their vehicle out of the area but slid into a ditch. Jones and Maupin got out of the car and ran to the home of C.W. "Wally" Phillips of Red Hill asking for help. Mr. Phillips was not at home

but his grandson drove the two men to Patten A. Clay Hospital in Richmond where they were treated and released. Mr. Drew's body was discovered Monday afternoon on a back road in the Red Hill area by State Police. Information supplied by Jones and Maupin.

Drew was an eyewitness to the alleged murder of Coy Phillips last year. George Drew (distant relative) is slated to stand trial Thursday, August 12th for that murder. Coy Phillips, a Major in the U.S. Air Force, was the son of C.W. Phillips to whom home Jones and Maupin went seeking help.

During the course of Monday's investigation, an active still was found approximately 1/4 mile from the scene.

shotgun shells, each of a different caliber were found. In addition, a piece of a shotgun buttplate was discovered a short distance away from Drew's body. Drew suffered numerous lacerations and abrasions.

An autopsy performed on Drew Tuesday determined that he had bled to death from a shotgun wound in the left arm, above the elbow. Numerous shots were apparently fired in the battle because buckshot was scattered over the scene. The incident apparently took place between the hours of 10 p.m. and midnight Sunday.

Trooper Greg Ennis and State Police detectives James McWhorter and Joe Gossett are presently investigating the shooting. No arrests have been made at this time.

Mr. Drew was born January 25, 1929 in Rockcastle County, the son of Lillie Isaacs Drew and the late James Drew.

Besides his mother, he survived by three brothers, Ernest and Hansford Drew, both of Cincinnati, Ohio and Bennett Drew of Florence and three sisters, Mrs. Pearl Genton of Newport, Mrs. Elvin Callahan of Milton, Indiana and Mrs. Ethel Mallicoat of Cincinnati.

School Board Meets; Accepts Bids Gets Ready for Opening of Schools

At the last regularly scheduled school board meeting Monday night, before the beginning of the school year, some bids were bid and final preparations were made for opening day. Bids were opened and accepted for materials consumed during the course of the school year.

Milk bids were the first to be opened and since both Southern Belle and Chappell's Dairy quoted identical prices it was decided that some milk would be purchased from each. Chappell's will serve Roundstone and Livingston Schools and Southern Belle will supply the other county schools. The price quoted was 9.45¢ per 1/2 pint carton. This represents a cost increase of approximately 1/2¢ over last year.

Southern Tire of Somerset will be supplying tires for the schools' vehicles at a cost of \$80.89 for 12 ply tires and \$67.22 for 10 ply tires. However, factory increases in the cost of tires will be absorbed by the school district and tires will not be delivered. Southern Tire bid was the only one under consideration for the contract.

R.H. Hamm made the low bid for gasoline and petroleum products for the schools' vehicles as well as for heating oil. Gasoline will be supplied at a cost of 38.5¢ per gallon for regular, 41.5¢ per gallon for unleaded and 43.5¢ per gallon for premium. Mr. Hamm's bid on heating oil was 39¢ per gallon and 36¢ per gallon respectively for #1 and #2 oil. No bids were submitted for anti freeze but Mr. Parsons informed the board that some was available from last year.

Of all bids considered for hauling coal, Jackie McCure was the lowest. Mr. McCure agreed to haul coal from Barbourville and Manchester for \$4.90 per ton and from Sinder for \$3.75 per ton. Following this decision, Roddy Enterprises at Sinder was presented the contract for supplying coal at a cost of \$32.50 per ton. It was agreed however that the contract would be contingent upon proper performance of the contract which was burned in the school building. This was necessary because last year some coal was unsatisfactory. A test

burn of the coal will be conducted before the final purchase agreement is made. Garbage disposal and pest control contracts received some discussion because of a certain amount of dissatisfaction last year in the pest control area. Rockcastle Sanitation received the contract for all county schools for garbage disposal. Low bidder for pest control was Laurel Pest Control who was awarded the contract for their services. Lexington Exterminators bid \$5 higher.

Kerr's Bakery was awarded the contract for baked goods. However, because of complaints last year concerning stale bread, orders this year will be made the day before usage. Kerpas must agree to make deliveries at the schools' convenience.

Bus drivers, substitute teachers and coaches for the school district were hired. Few additions were made to any of the lists. There is some question as to whether drivers 65 and over would be allowed to continue driving. It was decided that if there is no state regulation against this and if insurance is available they would be allowed to continue driving this year. John Hale was added to the Livingston Coaching Staff - others are the same as last year.

Substitute teachers hired for 1976-77 include: Lucille Carlotta, Nancy Russell, Renee Burdett, Elizabeth Mullins, James Lucian Rowlett, Beulah E. Black, Bertie B. Rice, Edna Fain, Jeannine Cummins, Martha Barnett and Trina Forbis. It must be stressed that all persons who wish to be considered as substitute teachers must register with Mr. Parsons. The pay scale this year for substitute teachers will be \$35 per day for teachers with 10 years experience and \$30 per day for teachers with less than 10 years and \$20 per day for teachers with no experience. Emergency substitutes will be \$15 per day. Other personnel hired include: cooks, school nurse, recreation aides, vocational aides and were rehired. Title I aides were rehired subject to receipt of sufficient funds. In addition to those following adult education teachers were

hired: Verja Scott, Jerry Mink, Florence Winstead, Bessie Burdett and Pauline Mullins.

In other business, the board approved the building of a scorekeeper's stand at a cost of \$6,000. The structure is being built by Willie Hellard of Livingston. Also, the board decided to purchase paper supplies from A.B. Dick of Lexington because supplies tested from Central School Supply were not acceptable. Payment was approved to Karr Roofing Company of London for roof contract at RCBS with 10 percent withheld pending architect's approval. The total cost was \$7,956.00. Bids will now be accepted for new roofing on the Roundstone Elementary School.

The board also approved the new school tax rate of 39.6¢ per \$100. Out of a total budget of over 2.2 million dollars, only \$280,901.57 will be supplied by the Rockcastle County taxpayer. The remaining 2 million is supplied by the state indicating probably the highest return on any money invested anywhere.

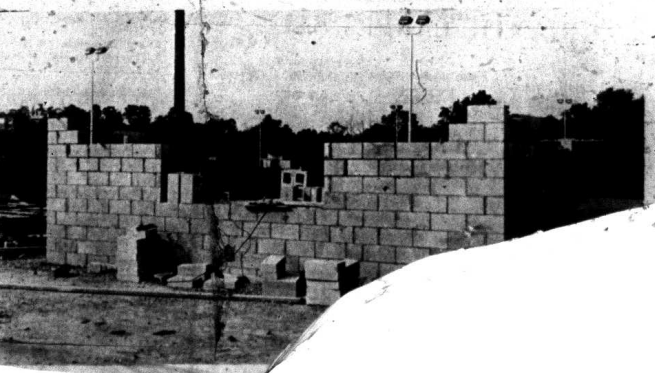

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FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

Kentucky's Energy Commissioner leaned forward in his large blue chair in the ninth floor office in the Frankfort Capital Plaza. Commissioner Damon Harrison had talked about the problems in meeting the demands for energy before. His answers came quickly.

"I'm not concerned about 1990 or the twenty-first century. I'm confident coal liquefaction, gasification, solar energy, and nuclear power will be developed sufficiently to take care of our needs by then. What scares me is the next 12 to 15 years. This is going to be a period before we're able to develop or develop advanced sources of fuel. This is going to be a time of shortage.

"I don't think we want to use all of our fossil fuels. I believe the people want to save some of them for the future generations, but we're just using natural gas too rapidly. We've reached the point where natural gas can no longer be used for space heating. It should only be used for purposes dealing with human welfare needs.

Energy Commissioner Harrison knows the natural gas shortage is here. He says Harrison will tell anyone who listens the supply of natural gas will never again be as plentiful as it was in the sixties.

The state's major suppliers of natural gas are preparing for the most drastic cutbacks in their histories for the winter. Louisville Gas and Electric will shut off major users for a longer period than ever before. For the first time, LG&E's curtailment plan will briefly include some schools, shopping centers, smaller plants, and office buildings which had not been included in previous curtailment programs. An LG&E spokesman flatly states that will be the last winter his company will face with full storage tanks of natural gas.

In Central Kentucky, where the natural gas shortage has been severe for several years, Columbia Gas has a 20 percent curtailment plan. Western Kentucky Gas has announced expanded curtailments.

Past conservation programs, which have been successful in protecting jobs. Ironically, an expanding economy with its increased production puts greater demands on natural gas. Statewide conservation will be needed to protect Kentucky workers from being laid off as a result of a shortage of gas. Last winter Kentucky was able to get added supplies of natural gas because of a slump in the chemical industry in the south. This year, the industry has recovered and that source of extra fuel is no longer available.

Why Jars Don't Seal

If you use sound canning jars, good quality canning lids, up-to-date methods and the proper processing time, you shouldn't have trouble with jars not sealing.

When a jar doesn't seal, it is probably for one of these reasons: you used off-standard jars (such as one-trip jars from the food store), you used "maverick" jar lids (some of the new off-the-shelf brands have not yet passed rigid performance tests), old lids, used jars or rusted and dented screw bands; you used a jar with a nicked or cracked sealing edge; you didn't wipe the sealing edge clean; you didn't screw the band tight enough against the sealing edge before processing; you didn't process the jars of food for the recommended time.

You can take care of the problem and reprocess the jar of food right away, or you can refrigerate it and eat it within a few days.

Canning Cabbage

Don't can cabbage, broccoli or Brussels sprouts. Safe canning calls for using a pressure canner, and in the process they get mushy, and the flavor gets stronger than you might like. Most canning manuals don't even give processing time for these vegetables. Freeze them instead.

Cabbage, however, is good made into sauerkraut or used in pickle recipes, and can then be safely processed in a boiling water bath canner.

Freezing Corn-On-The-Cob

If you have the freezer space, tuck some corn on the cob into it for a special treat next winter. Choose the best ears you can find; wash pump-tender kernels and the sweet milk. Husk, remove silk, wash, and sort ears according to size. Heat them in boiling water 7 minutes for small ears, 9 minutes for medium ears, and 11 minutes for large ears. Cool the ears of corn promptly and very thoroughly in cold water and then drain. Park into freezer containers. Freezer bags are especially handy for ears of corn. Seal and freeze immediately.

Freezing Peaches

These varieties of peaches are good

for freezing: Comanche, Glohaven, Golden Jubilee, Redhaven, Sunhaven and Elberta. If you buy peaches from a market where they know the variety for sure, they can probably tell you if it's a freestone or clingstone variety. Or cut one open and find out for yourself. Freestone peaches usually make a better frozen product.

To keep peaches from darkening, freeze them in a light sugar syrup to which you have added 1/2 teaspoon crystalline ascorbic acid for each quart. If you are freezing them "dry" with or without sugar, add ascorbic acid crystals or powder according to the directions on the package.

Freezing Eggplant

Yes, you can freeze eggplant satisfactorily. Wash, peel, and cut into slices or cubes. To help keep it from darkening during freezer storage, dip it into a solution of 3 tablespoons of lemon juice to 1 quart of water. Blanch in boiling water for 4 minutes, then cool under cold running water. Dip into lemon-juice-and-water mixture again.

Pack eggplant "dry" in freezer container, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Another way to freeze eggplant is in your favorite casserole recipe, but don't plan on keeping it for more than 2 months in your freezer.

What To Do If Jelly or Jam Is Too Soft

Did a batch of your jam or jelly turn out too soft? If so, it may be because you didn't stick closely to your recipe, either in measuring ingredients or in cooking time.

Whatever the reason, you can probably thicken it by recooking, according to the directions given here. But do only 4 to 6 cups at a time.

To remake with powdered pectin: measure the jelly to be recooked. For each quart of jelly measure 1/4 cups sugar, 1/4 cup water, and 4 teaspoons powdered pectin. Mix the pectin and water and bring to boiling, stirring constantly to prevent scorching. Add jelly and sugar. Stir thoroughly.

Bring to a full rolling boil over high heat, stirring constantly. Boil mixture hard for 1/2 minute. Remove jelly from the heat, skim, pour into hot containers, and seal.

To make with liquid pectin: Measure the jelly to be recooked. For each quart of jelly measure 3/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, and 2 tablespoons liquid pectin. Bring jelly to boiling over high heat.

Quickly add the sugar, lemon juice, and pectin and bring to a full rolling boil; stir constantly. Boil mixture hard for 1 minute. Remove jelly from the heat.

skim, pour into hot containers, and seal.

To make without added pectin: Heat the jelly by boiling and boil for a few minutes. To help you decide how long to cook it, give it the following "refrigerator test." Pour a small amount of the boiling jam or jelly on a cold plate. Wait 10 to 15 seconds. The temperature of your refrigerator for a few minutes. If the mixture jels, it should be done. During this test, remove the mixture from the heat so there is no chance of overcooking.

When your refrigerator test tells you it's done, remove it from the heat, skim, pour into clean hot containers and seal.

Starting: To avoid having to reprocess jam in your boiling-water-bath canner, store it in the refrigerator and eat it up within several months. You don't need to refrigerate jelly until after it is opened.

stitches, this left a bulge clear around Mr. Lowman's body.

Mr. Johnson went on to relate that there were no hospitals so he did not know where Mr. Lowman went to recuperate yet he did recover and was able to do most any kind of work thereafter.

Mr. Johnson said, "I have worked with him (Mr. Lowman) many times and many days hauling cross ties and saw logs which require plenty of lifting." Mr. Lowman would press his right arm against his side and hold things in place and related the story of this operation to Mr. Johnson himself. "I am sure this is a true story for it was told to me by both Mr. Lowman and Dr. Davis," Mr. Johnson said.

Mr. Johnson expressed curiosity as to whether there is another person who knew about the operation performed in the county by Dr. Davis and the lady living nearby who assisted him.

I have been asked several times if Dr. Davis was ever Superintendent of Schools in Rockcastle County," Mr. Johnson said. "In my opinion, he was, I was too young at that time to understand such things. Sometime in the early part of the 19th Century, a few things happened which impressed my mind; the greatest thing was the old schoolhouse of that day and year - which was an old-time hewed log house with two windows - one on each side which consisted of two logs cut half in two with iron bars for hinges on which hung a door for each window bolted with straps of iron across and bolted on the inside on which hung 4 and 5 inch thick shutters. The seats were made of split logs with

wooden pegs to stand on which stood very high. Me being small, my feet jacked about a foot, touching the floor. The reason I believe Mr. Davis was Superintendent of Schools is because one day Mrs. Lizzie Barger of Berea informed us that the Superintendent of Schools was Mr. Davis. We looked out and saw him coming and he came in and sat down by me on that tall seat. He attracted my attention by taking hold of my knee and leg and giving it a shake occasionally. Mrs. Barger introduced him as Mr. Davis, the Superintendent of our Schools. This is the only evidence that I have that he was Superintendent of Schools in Rockcastle County," Mr. Johnson concluded.
