## County Agent's Notes

**Landscape Lesson For October**  
October is one of the grand months of the year in so far as the landscape program is concerned. It is the month when nature puts on the finest style

show in the world; it is the time when the home owner should plant bulbs of tulips, jonquils, crocus, etc., and it is the time when new plantings of shrubs, trees, and evergreen may be made, or the old planting reworked. Many sections of Kentucky will not have killing frost until later in the month, and the hybrid roses will have some of their biggest and best colored flowers.

In Kentucky it is possible to take drives and see some of the most beautiful landscapes anywhere on earth. The colors, shades and blends of the foliage are superb during October. Many

of the plants have attractive fruits hanging on the twigs and branches that add to the riot of color produced by the foliage. Even the native dogwood with its brownish leaves and scarlet fruits in clusters of two and three is probably better looking than in the spring when it is in flower. The fruits of the button bush, hazel-nut, elderberry and buck-bush are a few examples of the shrubs that have attractive fruits. The acorns of the oaks, horned fruits of the sweet gum, the balls of the sycamore, and the ban pods on the redbud are all examples of trees that have interesting fruits. The evergreens should not be omitted because the scarlet fruits on some taxus, the greenish irregular fruits on some junipers, and the berry-like fruits on the arbo-vitae should command the attention of every home owner growing some of these plants.

As one rides along the highways and admires the beauty of the hillsides, it should be realized that it is possible to transport some of this beauty home by selecting shade trees that have colored foliage in the fall. If a home-owner has a large lawn, a few Norway maples, Norway or Crispin King maples are used, they will have highly colored foliage in the fall.

**Bulbs**  
Every home should have some bulbous plants because they bloom so early in the spring. In fact, the crocus will flower in the snow in March. By using care in the selection of the varieties, it is possible to have prize

blooms of tulips, jonquils, and lilies. It takes just a few bulbs, planted in groups, to produce marvelous effects. Bulbs should not be scattered in front of evergreens or shrubs because they are lost when planted in this way. The bulbs come early in the spring and, after they have bloomed, annuals should be set among them to prevent bare spaces in the flower borders or beds. The annuals will grow and bloom and not injure the bulbs.

A person should not try to have too many bulbs but specialize, on a few carefully selected varieties of tulips or jonquils, and the garden will soon be known for its early spring bloom.

If plants are purchased to add to the planting already growing or if it is a new planting, the fall is an excellent time to do this because it is possible to get the best of the plants from the nurseryman where they have been growing all summer. If plants are being obtained from the woods or fence rows, now is a good time to move them and the selection is best in the fall.

Attention should be given to how the plants are set because well planted plants are in good condition to fix, and grow. When setting plants it is good to remember that poor soil is not made any richer by setting a plant in it. Good, live soil should be procured from a vegetable garden or tobacco field and used around the roots of plants at setting time if the soil is poor where the plants are to be set. The plants should be watered liberally when set, to melt the soil around the roots of the plants.

Your county agent will have copies of Kentucky Extension Circulars 371, "How to Plant Shade Trees," Leaflet 201, "Tulips"; Leaflet 198, "Planting Evergreens." These publications contain timely information about setting these plants that will be helpful.

**Things To Do**  
1. Keep the lawn clipped and, if possible, rake the clippings to remove the crabgrass seed that is maturing at this time.

2. Destroy the old flower stems as soon as they have been killed by frost.  
3. Many of the perennials may be moved at this time for rearranging or setting new plants.

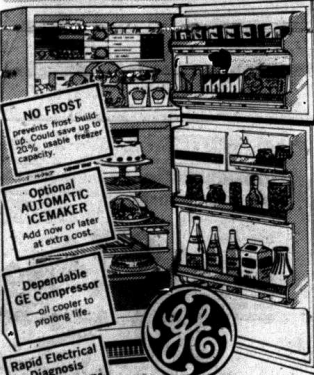

Vernon, Rockcastle County, Kentucky, to the highest bidder, at public auction on Saturday, September 25th, 1976, at the hour of eleven o'clock a.m. or thereabout, the following described real property located in Rockcastle county, Kentucky, on the waters of Roundstone Creek, near Sinks, and more particularly bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a gum, black oak and

## School Enrollment Is Up; Livingston Has Largest Increase

County School Superintendent Charles E. Parsons has announced the enrollment figures for Rockcastle County Schools at the end of the first month.

According to the figures, 23 more students are enrolled for the 1976-77 school year than last year for a total of 3,194 as compared to 3,171 last year. Livingston Elementary shows the biggest gain of 26 students with a total enrollment of 385. Next are Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County High School, each with 15 more students than last year, for enrollments of 799 and 901,

respectively. Blue Springs Elementary gained 4 students and shows an enrollment of 56 and the Homebound program is up by 1 to 14 enrolled. Two schools showed a loss in enrollment. Brodhead has enrolled 612 students as compared to 635 last year, for a difference of 23, and Roundstone Elementary has 427 students as compared to 444 last year.

Brodhead Elementary shows the best percentage of attendance record at the end of the first month with 98.2 with Livingston next at 97.6.

## Federal Grant Approved For Child Care Project

A \$983,175 federal grant has been approved to continue the development child-care project which serves youngsters in this county and 14 others.

Congressman Tim Lee Carter reported the Appalachian Regional Commission awarded that amount on Sept. 14 to the Kentucky Youth Research Center in Frankfort.

The money will provide fifth and final year support for a program which makes center-based services available for children aged three to five years in Bell, Breathitt, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Lee, Leslie, Letcher,

Perry, Rockcastle, Whitley and Wolfe counties. Children up to three years of age in Knott County are provided similar but home-based services.

Services available to the children include day care, meals, health screening and follow-up, educational stimulation and referrals to appropriate agencies when needed.

Total cost of the project for the year is \$2,085,848. In addition to this ARC grant, federal funds totaling \$629,587 and \$473,086 from local sources will be provided to pay the full cost.

## "Speedier Justice" Offered Says Judge John D. White

Judge John D. White of Manchester, one of Kentucky's 14 new Court of Appeals judges, says he thinks the new appeals court will offer people the commonwealth a speedier justice.

White, who was appointed as a Third District judge last month by Gov. Julian Carroll, discussed the operation of the new court, and his expectations for it in a recent interview. The judge thinks a

quicker disposition of appeals cases will be the most significant improvement of the new system over the former system.

Under the court reform article approved by voters last November, White expects the time necessary for an appeals decision will be cut by half. Previously, two years was an average time for disposition of most civil cases. White says now he is "sure in 7-10 months there ought to be some kind of decision."

The judicial article streamlines the appellate process in sort by cutting down on the length of a lower court decision and file statements and briefs. White noted that Court of Appeals judges have no control over cases being appealed to them until preparatory work—attorneys have 120 days for such work—is completed and the case is ready for consideration by one of the three-judge panels.

White and the other judges will serve on the panels on a rotating basis. The panels will hear arguments in the seven judicial districts in the state.

Under the old system, cases were considered in Frankfort.

Another significant improvement under the new system cited by the judge is that "the exposure of attorneys in oral argument in every case will tend to give better satisfaction." White explained that attorneys and their clients should feel they have had full recourse to the law under the new setup.

Under the former system, oral arguments seldom were permitted because of the backlog of cases waiting for the appellate judge's consideration. Also, there were only seven Court of

## FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

By Carol Wellman

Corrections Commissioner David Bland unbuttons his bow coat and leans against the rail which separates the courtroom from the jury box. Kentucky Justice Secretary Jack Smith, looking slightly out of place in a rural courthouse with its tailored plaid suit, stands by an open door. Twenty local officials take their seats. Another 'Corrections Forum' starts. Bland and Smith say they want to hear how the people feel about the state's prison system.

Charles Holmes was Corrections Commissioner. He was liked by most people in Frankfort, but in the spring of 1975, the criticism of the bureau reached its zenith. 'Chuck' Holmes, once the most accessible of state officials, buried himself in the bowels of state government. Finally, Holmes became inaccessible to Secretary Smith. When that happened, Holmes was fired.

In an effort to change the bureau's public image, Commissioner Bland is starting a tour which will take him to all of Kentucky's 120 counties in the next 12 months.

At the Central Kentucky court house, Bland listens patiently as the County Attorney calls the corrections system a joke. Another local official complains that federal penal standards are being shoved down the throats of the states. A third says too many prisoners are early parole.

Bland tells the group the state's prison population is 45% over capacity. He promises to double the number of prison industries available to inmates. He says idleness in the prisons must end. The local officials have doubts, but they're impressed that the top man in Frankfort has traveled to their town to hear them out.

The next stop is a county with a state prison. The questions and comments are more specific and pertinent. What will be done for young adult and special need offenders? Will test for parole officers be increased? Will a new maximum security prison be built? Bland and Smith take an hour to

answer the questions before moving on to the next county.

There is no suggestion that won't be considered, Bland says at every stop. There is nothing in the system that cannot be changed. He's sincere.

The Bureau of Corrections is developing a facilities development report. It will include recommendations on what to do about prison overpopulation. The report will be ready in early fall.

Bland wants to assign a probation and parole officer to each inmate on arrival at an institution. He wants Citizen Advisory Committees for all prisons. The committees will be composed of residents surrounding the prison.

"I am committed to making this bureau work," says Bland. Secretary Smith likes to quote the Chinese proverb that a journey of a thousand miles starts with a single step. That step has been taken.

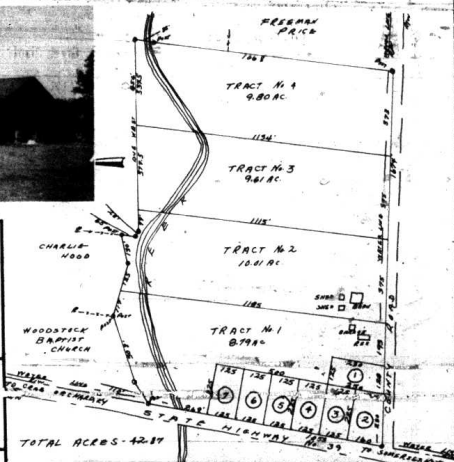

You are cordially invited to tour the recently refurbished Mahan-Brown-Bowers House located at 1020 Main Street, Williamsburg, Kentucky. Four times a Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, September 23, 24 and 25 from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m. The house will also be open for tour on Sunday afternoon, September 26, from 1:00 until 6:00 p.m.

The Georgian style mansion was built in 1910 by Southeastern Kentucky master builder and student of architecture, Sam Eastley. It was built for Williamsburg banker and coal man, S. E. Mahan, on property formerly owned by Dr. A. Baltiff, one of the founders of Cumberland College. The Mahan-Brown-Bowers house served as home for the A. V. Brown family, South eastern Kentucky coal people, for several decades. While owned by the late Dr. Daniel Bowers, the house was the scene for many gatherings of the oil rich from Florida, Texas, and California. Although he served Williamsburg as a general physician during the years he occupied the house, Dr. Bowers and his partner, the late Paul Emshier of London were known all over the United States for their success in the oil business throughout Southeast Kentucky and Northern Tennessee.

The first thing one will see as he approaches the house will be the Corinthian columns which are carved of cypress. From the columns, ones eye is quickly brought to the profuse use of leaded glass in the entrance and windows of the mansions main rooms.

The entrance hall, with parlors on each side, will quickly show one visiting the house the late Mr. Eastley's taste for classic architecture in the main staircase and the use of twin arches, also worked in cypress.

For the tour, the house will be furnished. Come and spend an afternoon in one of the beauty spots of the world, Southeast Kentucky in the fall of the year, in one of the prides of Williamsburg, the Mahan-Brown-Bowers House.

# Rockcastle Recollections

What would later be Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, probably had its beginning with the settlement of Stephen Langford, sometime prior to 1790. It was long believed that the old house later known as the McVernon House torn down a few years ago, was his original home but it is now thought that his first home was much smaller than the landmark house, probably erected some after 1800. There is considerable argument as to whether he himself built it or bought it from a previous owner.

Whoever first established his home here was influenced principally by the presence of Spout Springs. To the pioneer looking for a homestead, a good water supply was of some importance and one of the first things looked for. This was generally in the form of a good spring, flowing from a source of considerable depth to insure its coolness. The biggest prize of all was an ever flowing spring that would not run dry during hot, dry, summer weather. Old Spout Springs met this requirement in a most satisfactory manner and has continued to do so through all these years. Other settlers soon heard of this excellent water supply and a few more cabins went up in the vicinity with the passing of time. Later, Spout Springs was to furnish water for the settlement's first actual commercial venture. Rev. James McCall's yard, and much later the stream for which it was the headspring turned the wheel of Bryan's "cracking old mill" down near where it flowed into Kent's Creek.

The early settlement of Mt. Vernon did not show promise of amounting to much until the main road to the interior of Kentucky was changed from Skaggs Trace over to the new cut-off that passed through the Mt. Vernon settlement on what would later be the Wilderness Road. This was in about 1792, and the evening of November, 1793, Andre Michaux, the noted French naturalist then traveling in the United States, in company with twelve other people spent the night here in Langford's Station. With the opening of this cut-off, most of the travel towards central Kentucky came this way, with settlers in increasing numbers dropping off the trail to make their homes in this country. Other parts of the area were

also being settled and by 1810 this was the principal cluster of cabins in what was on that date organized into Rockcastle County, with a population of 1,731 people.

As elsewhere on the Kentucky frontier, living conditions among early settlers in what is now Rockcastle County were primitive to an extent of which we of today can hardly conceive. Coming over broken, broken trails on foot or on horseback, families were unable to bring along anything other than hand tools, cooking kettles, and similar small articles. Furniture, such as looms and spinning wheels, although highly essential had to be left behind and the necessities of life after reaching the end of the journey.

We have done considerable work on the new museum for Kenton Valley. I believe I have mentioned before that the only items to be displayed in it will be things made by the pioneer, himself, used in making a living and raising a family. The building is practically complete and many of the articles already secured with which it is to be furnished.

If we are to believe oldtimers, our own grandparents and great grandparents included, they were really down to the bare essentials. Most families, but not all, owned an iron kettle or pot which served as their principal cooking utensil. Most meats were boiled instead of fried, and where boiling water was not possible, meat was roasted on a spit over an open fire. Corn meal batter was spread on the surface of a wide board, smoothed down as well as possible with the tools available. The board was then propped up on the hearth before an open fire, where reflected heat from the fireplace soon cooked the bread to the desired turn. Sometimes the batter would be spread on the back side of a bread iron, which could easily be handled without the cook getting too close to the heat from the coals. This was known as a hawkeye, and the name, though not the method, persists to this day. The much larger cake, baked on a board, was often prepared for hunters to break into convenient pieces for carrying, along with them on long trips away from home. This was known as a journey cake, a name which was soon turned into Johnnycake, and it often designated, MeasMeat and bread being the principal supporting diet of the

pioneer, but could sustain on this alone, although he soon learned to vary it with other items.

For traveling light, hardy hunters, and Indian fighters depended largely on parched corn. They had a practice of drying venison or bear meat and while the practice never reached the perfection of the "sawyer" of later Westerns outdoorism it was useful to a certain extent. Dried fruit of any kind available also served well as pocket rations. In spite of the fact that it was too bulky for long journeys, it had the advantage that it was quite filling, even when eaten in small amounts, because once inside the stomach it immediately expanded and gave the feeling of being well fed. In this connection I am reminded of a bit of humor of earlier days when a poor man was describing how he fed his family on small coal. He claimed they ate dried apples for breakfast, drank water for dinner and sweated up for supper.

Once he had gotten by the first few months and harvested a crop of sorts the pioneer could make-do, but it continued to be a hard existence for some time, in directions other than food and shelter. Few families brought along extra clothing and when that started with was gone there was the problem of what to wear. This was a problem they had to solve individually.

After they were in the country long enough to acquire a spinning-wheel and loom and produce flax and wool the problem lessened. Before that happened they were largely dependent upon skins of the deer, bear, raccoon, wildcat for the material from which to fashion their clothing. In the very beginning when buffalo were to be found in the Kentucky wilderness and caribou, pioneer women were often able to weave a satisfactory cloth of buffalo wool and the fiber from wild nettles, but this was by no means common. Incidentally, there were buffaloes in Rockcastle County, according to William Henderson, who reported killing one near the present site of Mt. Vernon on his way back to Virginia after serving with George Rogers Clark on his Northwest Expedition.

Most men and women of pioneer days had developed special skills that enabled them to meet the requirements for conquering the Wilderness and raising a family. Where some did one particular thing very well they were generally able to exchange work with those skilled in other things at which they were not adept. A good community skill was cooperating. A man who was handy at

making barrels, tubs, buckets, pigging, churning, and the like could always depend on being kept as busy as he wanted to be. Skilled craftsmen for making hoes, spinning wheels and associated articles were a great help in any community and a good furniture maker could always be assured of plenty of orders. All these stages of early development and change in the way of living took place in Rockcastle County, as well as elsewhere, in the early part. All this is merely a hint at the hardships our ancestors had to endure which we now know nothing about and could scarcely believe if they were told us.

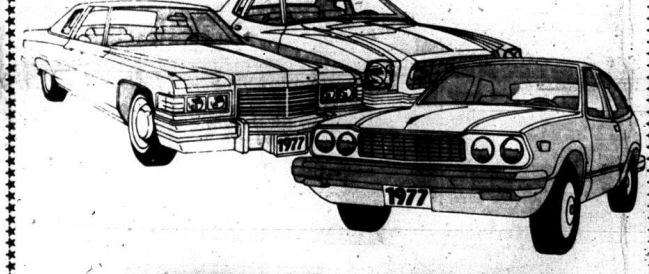

## Drying Apples

Use crisp, tart fall or winter cooking apples for drying. Wash, peel, core, and trim out any blemishes. Cut them into slices or rings about 1/8 inch thick and drop them into a salt-water-and-vinegar or ascorbic acid solution to help prevent darkening. You can either sulphur apples or dry them without any further pretreatment but unsulfured apples will turn darker and will have a different flavor than the sulfured ones.

Spread apples one layer deep on drying trays. Dry them in sun, oven, dehydrator, or even in your attic, if it is well ventilated. If you dry them in the sunlight, be sure to bring them in at night or on a rainy day. If you have an old car out in the yard, you can set your tray of apples in it to dry, leaving windows open for ventilation.

Apples are done when they are leathery, with no moisture showing when you cut and squeeze them.

## Conditioning & Pasteurizing

Since it's hard to dry foods evenly, you should condition them before storing. Cool the dried apples or other food to room temperature, then put into a large closed jar, can or plastic container. Open the container and stir them once or twice a day for a week. This should make the whole batch equally dry.

Heat treat (pasteurize) sun-dried foods to get rid of insects or insect eggs. You won't need to do this if fruits have been sulfured. Spread dried foods on trays in oven, heat 10 to 15 minutes at 175 degrees F or 30 minutes at 150 degrees F. Then spread out to cool on clean dishcloths. Package when food reaches room temperature.

## Storing Dried Foods

ers with light fitting lids. You could store small quantities in plastic or waxed paper sandwich bags, placing them all in a larger container with tight closure. Once you open a package of dried food, keep it in the refrigerator, or you may have trouble with insects.

## Nutritive Value

Dried fruit, just as it is, makes an excellent and nutritious snack. Properly dried reconstituted fruits and vegetables supply useful amounts of necessary fiber in your diet. They return to almost their original size, form and appearance.

Because of their high natural sugar content, dried fruits are rich in food energy. Many are also rich in iron and other minerals. Dried beans and peas are high in protein.

Drying does, however, destroy most of the vitamin C in vegetables and in un-sulfured fruits. Much of the vitamin A is also destroyed, especially in sun-dried foods. Sulfuring does protect against the loss of vitamins C and A in fruits.

## Keep Frozen Foods at Zero or Below

After all your hard work in the garden and kitchen, is your freezer keeping its cool? Frozen foods keep best at zero degrees F. or below.

Foods frozen at higher temperatures take longer to freeze, don't keep as long, and are poorer in quality than foods frozen at zero degrees F.

Check the interior temperature of your freezer with a thermometer, or give it the "Ice Cream Test." Put a container of ice cream in the freezer. Remove it after a few hours and try spooning it out. If it's soft enough to spoon out easily, your freezer temperature is probably around 20 degrees; not nearly as cold as it should be. If the ice cream is hard and brick-like, impossible to dish out without heating up the spoon, the freezer temperature is at zero or below. If you find that your freezer is too warm at its normal setting, turn the dial to a colder position. If it still doesn't get cold enough, call a repair man.

## Ice Cream Needs Freezer Wrap

Cardboard ice cream cartons are not meant for long-time protection. So if you buy ice cream in gallon containers and eat it up slowly, or plan to keep smaller quantities of ice cream more than a week, give it the extra protection of regular moisture-vapor-resistant frozen food wrapping. This way you can keep ice cream up to 3 months without loss of flavor or quality.
