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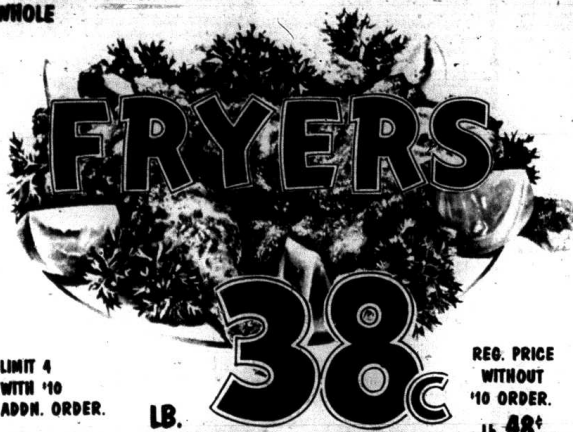

#### FREEZING APPLESAUCE

Tart-flavored cooking apples make the best applesauce. Wash apples, peel if desired, core and slice. To each quart of apple slices add 1/2 cup cold water. Cook over low heat until tender. Cool by setting pan of applesauce in cold water. Strain if necessary. Sweeten to taste with 1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar for each quart of applesauce. Pack into containers, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Seal, label and freeze.

#### CANNING APPLESAUCE

To can your applesauce, pack it

simmering into hot clean jars, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Adjust lids. Process either pints or quarts in boiling water-bath canner for 10 minutes. As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary.

#### CANNING CARROTS

Carrots keep well in a root cellar or well-mulched, in the garden for fresh use through the fall and winter. But it's good to have some canned or frozen, ready to use in soups or casseroles, and to serve buttered or creamed as a side dish.

This time of year you'll be canning medium-sized carrots - but don't bother with the large, woody ones. Scrub and peel them, or parboil just long enough so skins slip off easily (the way you do with beets). Slice or dice, cover with boiling water and bring water to a boil again. Pack into hot clean jars, leaving 1/2 inch

headspace. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt to pints, 1 teaspoon to quarts. Cover with boiling-hot cooking liquid, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Wipe jar rims clean, adjust lids.

Process in pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure - 25 minutes for pints and 30 minutes for quarts. Remove jars from canner and complete seals if necessary.

#### FREEZING CARROTS

To freeze, cut clean peeled carrots into thin slices or tiny cubes and heat in boiling water for 2 minutes. Cool right away in cold water. Drain, pack into freezer containers, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Seal and freeze.

#### FREEZING CABBAGE

Frozen cabbage is good in cooked dishes, especially soups. Use solid heads fresh from the garden. Trim off coarse outer leaves. Cut into shreds or thin wedges, or separate into leaves. Heat in

boiling water 1 1/2 minutes. Cool right away in cold water. Drain, pack into freezer containers, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Seal and freeze.

### County Agent's Notes

#### BALANCED RATION HELPS KEEP KETOSIS PROBLEMS IN CHECK

Ketosis or acetonemia is one of the problems that plague high producing cows shortly after freshening. This nutritional disorder, which usually occurs within six to eight weeks following calving, is not a contagious disease. Rather, it is a situation whereby the cow is producing more milk and thus requiring more nutrients than her feed intake provides. As a result of the inability of the cow to meet her energy needs from the ration, body reserves must be metabolized. Production is thus maintained by the use of the body fat and the energy it provides.

When this situation occurs, some intermediary products known as "Ketone bodies" may build up in the system. These components can be smelled on the breath of the animal, in the milk and urine. The compounds can also be analyzed in blood urine and milk.

In order to detect animals with ketosis early and this provide treatment, it is necessary to be alert for symptoms of ketosis.

The most obvious symptom is loss of appetite. Animals with ketosis will go "off feed" shortly after freshening. The animal refuses most of grain and in advanced stages may not eat anything. Following loss of appetite the animal may appear dull and listless while exhibiting uneasiness of the rear legs. The animal may appear nervous and usually excited. All of this of course, is followed by a drop in milk production and body weight. Acetone odor appears on the breath, urine and milk. Should tests be conducted, there will be ketone bodies present in the milk, urine and

blood. The blood sugar will drop to about 50 percent of the normal level. The fact that some cows recover spontaneously from ketosis makes it difficult to evaluate treatment. In any case, the veterinarian should be consulted.

The most acceptable treatments of ketosis have included the injection of sugar into the neck, injection of hormones such as cortisone or ACTH, or oral administration of propylene glycol or sodium propionate.

Which treatment is best cannot be predicted. The injection of sugar into the neck is used up in a matter of hours. Hormones are effective but expensive. And, there is danger of giving material orally because of the possibility of it entering the lungs. The veterinarian may decide to use a combination of treatments to treat animals with ketosis.

Certainly the best treatments for animals with ketosis is prevention. However, no known method will assure 100 percent prevention. But, most researchers will agree that feeding a balanced ration to provide nutrients in accordance with production is certainly beneficial.

To help prevent ketosis some management guidelines to consider include: 1. do not have cows excessively fat at calving time; 2. provide plenty of good quality roughage; 3. bring cows up to full feed gradually following freshening; 4. do not make abrupt changes in the ration; 5. feed a balanced ration; 6. do not rely on molasses to provide sugar to cows with ketosis; 7. do not feed poor quality grass or legume silage high in butyric acid during winter feeding period; and 8. maintain good appetite by exercise, fresh feed, comfortable conditions and adequate ventilation.

#### PINE - NEEDLE DROP

Some white pine trees are beginning to show yellowing and browning of needles. Those needles that are affected are not those that were produced this past spring which remain green, but those that were produced the season before. The normal time for needles to drop on white pine is in the fall of their second year, so this is what is being observed now.

Usually, annual needle drop goes unnoticed because new needles conceal old inside foliage that has turned yellow and brown. In some seasons it may be a

very noticeable depending on the growing season. During a rainy summer, most plants put on a heavy growth of foliage. If the following summers dry, the light growth fails to camouflage the old yellowing leaves. Similarly, a year or two after white pines are transplanted, effects of normal needle drop may be more striking because new growth is seldom dense enough to cover the yellowing older needles. The normal needle drop described does not usually indicate a disease is present nor that the trees is in any real troubles.

Other evergreens such as spruce, fir, hemlock, larch, and 2 and 3 needled pines keep their needles from 3 to 6 years. Loss of 1-year-old needles on these conifers could be a sign of insect, disease or other trouble.

## Down On The Farm

Well, now, all tobacco has been raised and now is a good time to think about your 1977 crop. That means preparing for tobacco plant beds.

There are two ways to start a tobacco seed bed. One is to use a garden mow or a southern or eastern slope. Let the rain do the work. Another plan for plant beds is

in an open field and near a good water supply.

You will need a bed about 9 feet long by 100 feet long to each acre of tobacco you plan to set. Regardless of seed control method to be used, plow the ground and work into a good seed bed. Leave it level if the center is slightly higher. Weed seeds may be killed by weeding, burning, gassing or drenching. You can use any of these soil treatments in the fall or spring, but the weather and time are better in fall.

Thermal insecton equipment is being used to inject methyl bromide vapors and corles into the soil. This is a good advantage of fall treatments as that you can leave the cover on and take it off in the spring and seed the bed as soon as it will be dry enough to work the soil any time cover is taken off.

Good sturdy healthy plants is a must for a good tobacco crop. This will take good management practices and work Down On The Farm.

## Rockcastle Recollections

There is a tendency among historians to spend all their time and attention on a man during that time of life in which he is most vigorously engaged in the exploits which make up his active career. After he has withdrawn from the limelight or advancing years have set their stamp upon him he is no longer of interest to the writer or his readers and is soon forgotten, so that coming generations know of him only during his newsworthy years and have no knowledge of what he did or how he fared for the rest of his days.

Among the principle actors engaged in the exploration and settlement of Kentucky, Daniel Boone serves as a striking example of this sort of neglect. Being the hero of the first book written about Kentucky and consequently the recipient of worldwide promotion, his name was on every tongue. To think of the Kentucky Wilderness was to think of Daniel Boone, the brave and daring pioneer who led parties of settlers into the new frontier, built forts, repelled Indian attacks, laid out roads where none had been before and stood as the leading example of that stalwart

manhood which enabled the white race to conquer the Great Unknown and fit it for settlement and civilization.

All during the active life of Ft. Boonesborough and up to and including the Battle of Blue Licks, often considered one of the final battles of the Revolution, Boone's exploits and deeds were well known and fully recorded in history. After this time and after the gradual removal of danger from Indian attacks, knowledge of and interest in Boone began to fade. Since the protection of the fort itself was no longer needed, the inhabitants of Boonesborough began to scatter out, removing to choice farms and building better houses. Boone himself had in the meantime moved his family to what was known as Boone's Station, not far from where the road to Athens, Kentucky now comes into I-75, near Lexington. This was around 1779. Leaving there, he resided on Marble Creek. After a year or two of the life of a farmer, which never did appeal to him, he turned the farm over to his son-in-law, William Hayes, who had been with him in settling Boonesborough, and moved to Maysville, then known as Limestone, where he opened a store and supply house. Does it seem odd to find Daniel Boone operating a store and feeding Indians instead of fighting them?

The crude set of books kept by Daniel Boone for his store and trading post at Limestone show that he was doing a big business, but with very little cash involved. He traded heavily in furs and ginseng. He not only traded merchandising for ginseng, he went out in the woods around Limestone and gathered it himself, with his "sang" hoe, a common implement in the home of all pioneers and sometimes seen to this day. Once when he found himself with fifteen tons of dried ginseng on hand he started shipping it up the Ohio by flatboat, expecting to send it overland to Philadelphia, where it was at that time in demand at a good price. On the way up

the river the boat capsized and the ginseng which had been so long in drying was soaked. By the time he could get it dried out again and delivered at Philadelphia, the price had gone down. By that time, however, he had gathered up fifteen logs more, on which he had better luck.

While located at Limestone Boone was also busy in buying and selling land and trading in horses which he drove overland to Eastern markets. During this period he also tried his hand at tavern-keeping, but with his usual luck it was probably not a profitable venture.

In keeping with his usual restless spirit, Boone moved again, in 1789-90 this time settling at Point Pleasant, Virginia. Sometime after 1794 he moved to what is now Charleston, West Virginia. During all his years spent in various activities along the frontier he never ceased to roam the woods "sing-a-long" as the occasion allowed.

In 1795 Daniel and his wife, Rebecca, with their son, Nathan, were back in Kentucky, living in a log cabin near the Blue Licks where he had lost a son in the battle of that name. All around him here were scenes of many of his earlier adventures in the days of his glory - days which were rapidly slipping away as old age came on. His many thousands of acres of good land were gone, taken from him by reason of inaccurate surveys and the resultant land suits. Finally every foot of it was lost and today all that is left to him and his faithful wife are the graves in which they sleep on a hill above Frankfort, Kentucky.

Meanwhile Kentucky was rapidly being settled. In addition to families moving north and west from Virginia and North Carolina, real-estate dealers in Europe were busy selling to prospective emigrants to America the rich lands of Kentucky and borders of these families were coming overland from the seacoast

and rapidly populating the Wilderness. During all this, Daniel Boone, who had started it all was being forgotten and ignored. When it became necessary to enlarge the trail into Kentucky so that wagons could travel it as well as packhorses, Boone heard of the project and felt that he was the right man to survey and handle the job. He might have even figured that the state owed the job to him, since he had cut out the original path some twenty years before and had never been paid for it, except in land claims that had turned out to be worthless. He accordingly set down and wrote Governor Shelby a letter asking for an opportunity to bid on the contract. That letter is still in existence, but there is no record of a reply. Whether he got the job or not, it is certain he didn't get the job. Even at so early a date politics and road building seemed to have some

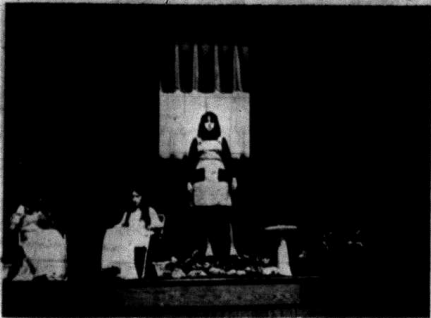

# Rockcastle County 4-H'ers Observe National 4-H Week



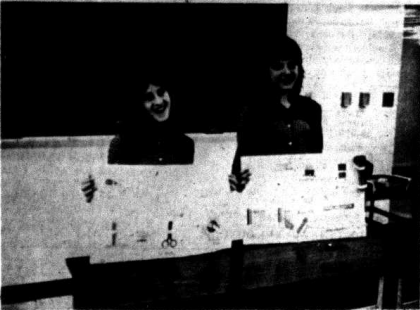

## 4-H In Rockcastle County

During the 1975-76 year, 1286 youth in Rockcastle Co. were involved in 4-H programs. Most of the 44 clubs were in school classrooms and studied projects

such as health, nutrition, window sill garden, conservation, and Mulligan Stew Nutrition program. 4-H members participated in poster

contests, variety shows, speech contests, demonstration contests, consumerism, fashion revues, camp, Brodhead Fair, State Fair exhibits, horse shows, 4-H week at Lexington, Older Youth Conference in Washington, D.C. and as teen leaders.

This year many 4-Hers will be studying a new project, Super Shopper, which will

The council is made up of club leaders, teens, business men and civic minded persons interested in 4-H. 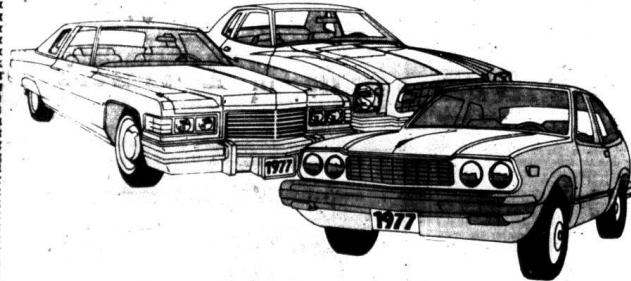

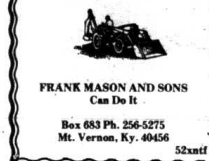

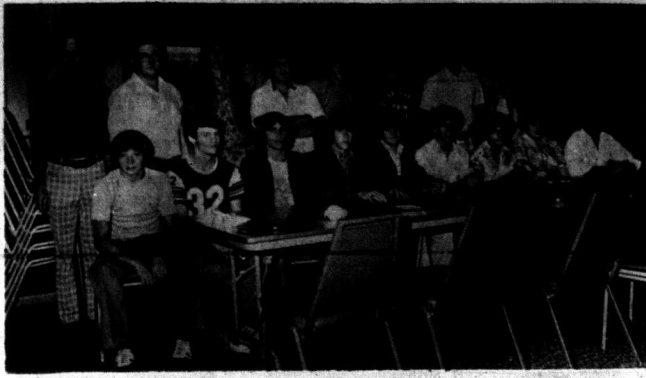

residence there. In September of 1799 Boone and Rebecca set out for their new home, accompanied by their son, Nathan, and his new bride.

Still Boone did not give up his interest in hunting and trapping but made annual expeditions into the surrounding territory for deer and beaver, accompanied some times by his two sons, sometimes by only a negro boy who went along to do the camp work and take care of the old man in any emergency. Some of these trips are supposed to have taken him into the far west. Indian troubles were still frequent and he handled them as he had handled them in earlier days back in Kentucky.

But even in the responsible position given him by the Spanish Government and their friendly feeling toward him, the story of his earlier land misfortunes was repeated here and his land was taken from him by fraud and in payment of debts he seemed fated to establish. I have in my possession old court records of some of these transactions, given me by an elderly gentleman in Florida several years ago which had been left to him by an ancestor who had been clerk of the Spanish courts in which the cases were handled.

Finally, the end came for Daniel and he and his wife were buried in Missouri, in a spot they had previously selected. Many years later their remains were brought back to Kentucky and buried in the Frankfort Cemetery, overlooking the seat of government of the state for which he had done so much and by which he had so often been forgotten.

settlers in territory she then claimed, including Louisiana, Florida, Texas, California, Mexico and Panama, she believed that Daniel Boone who had brought settlers into Kentucky would have suffice reputation to bring others into any new territory. 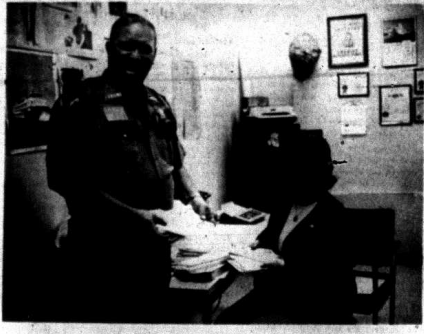

One of the main problems with having to send the tax bills out twice, Sheriff Shepherd said, is the heavy additional expense to his office for postage.

## Rockcastle County Included In Funding Priorities

The Cumberland Valley Area Development District Board Prioritization committee has gone through the prioritization process for fiscal year 1977 for Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) 214 funds. The Board understands that the target figure is approximately \$460,000. However, they are submitting projects totaling considerably more, since there is some possibility that as many as three of the projects may be funded through the Public Works program and may not require ARC assistance.

Project selection is limited because money from the ARC 214 Funds can only be used as supplemental funds. This means that to qualify for 214 Funding a project must qualify first under the guidelines of another agency as a "Base" agency for primary funding.

The priorities were established by the Board as they relate to job development. Those that would help develop more jobs were given a higher priority. The order of priority is as follows:

- 1. Knox Co. Regional Industrial park, \$100,000.
- 2. London, Airport Improvements, \$50,000.
- 3. Barbourville, Water & Sewer Improvements, \$100,000.
- 4. London, Industrial Park Development, \$20,000.
- 5. Rockcastle Co. Industrial Park Development, \$22,500.
- 6. Jackson Co., Water Improvements, \$200,000.
- 7. Corbin, Water Improvements, \$200,000.
- 8. Cumberland, Development of new Water Source and Expansion of Treatment Facilities, \$200,000.
- 9. North Rockcastle (Stafford Case), Water Improvements, \$45,000.
- 10. Manchester, Water Improvements, \$100,000.

## School Board Meets

A regular meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Monday night resulted in the possibility of the High School getting new fencing around at least part of the property for half price. Paul Blevins, a resident adjacent to the high school, asked that the board pay half the cost of fencing the back of his yard which is adjacent to the school property.

Mr. Blevins has been having problems with high school children cutting across his yard and leaving litter on the way. The board voted to pay half the fencing cost and, in addition, to make the same proposal to other landowners adjacent to school property as long as the fence is uniform. They specified that it must be of 9 gauge steel wire, 5 feet high, have 2" metal posts every 10 feet set in cement with a stress post every 50' and have a 1 3/8" top rail. The total cost of the fence was estimated at \$1,041.00.

A close estimate budget was given to the board by Superintendent Charles B. Parsons. The close estimate budget is a more detailed break-down of the budget already approved by the board. However, total figures remain the same. For instance, instead of having a large sum for all utilities, the utility figures are broken down into water, electricity, etc. The same is done in all major categories.

The board also approved \$60,000 to be spent for four new school buses for the 1977-78 school year.

New requirements such as length and safety features have increased the price of buses and more money was allocated than will probably be needed. The board will take bids to be opened at the November meeting.

On the subject of transportation, the board approved the allocation of money to pay for the transportation of students to special schools in the area. Kentucky School for the Blind and School for the Deaf have students from Rockcastle County and the state does not cover the full costs of transportation. In addition, students have to be transported to the Somerset Reading Laboratory and have to have special education for the disabled.

School board policies were approved for the new school year. These are on file at the superintendent's office. An application to participate in CETVA was also approved.

Other business consisted of hiring several more substitute teachers. They were: Betty Zundinger, Carolyn Scott, Gail Banney, Juanita Robinson, Patsy Morgan and Brent Laswell. Flossie Burdine was hired as a substitute cook for Roundstone Elementary School.

The board also approved leave pay for Paul Holbrook and a GED certificate for Pamela Clemmons Hensley.

## Fiscal Court Hires Williams To Serve as Public Defender

At Tuesday's meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, Nicholas Williams, an attorney with offices in Brea, was hired by the Court as Public Defender for Rockcastle County. Mr. Williams was appointed after it was found that none of the local attorneys were interested in the office.

County Attorney James Lambeth reported to the Court during the meeting that he had been informed, by letter, from the Attorney General's

office that a tonnage tax on the local stone quarry would be unconstitutional since it would be an excise tax and the county can only levy ad valorem taxes or license and occupational tax.

The opinion was given to Mr. Lambert by Charles W. Runyan, Assistant Deputy Attorney General.

Also during the meeting, Magistrate Ernest Mason made a motion that Jailor Ivory Anglin be paid \$50 per month by the county to act as radio

dispatcher for law enforcement officers in the county (including the sheriff's office). Jailor Anglin is presently being paid \$25 per month each by the cities of Livingston and Broedhead to act in the same capacity and \$30 per month by the City of Mt. Vernon.

The motion was seconded by J.R. Cromer and passed unanimously.

Thanks to action taken by the Fiscal Court, on a motion by Ernest Mason, county employees such as truck drivers and grader operators, will receive a 25c per hour raise effective October 5th. The increase brings the men's hourly wage to \$3.00.

## Burley Pool Distribution Is Nine Million Dollars

Climaxing a record year of returning profits to farmers, the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association this week is placing checks totaling \$9 million in the mails.

The distribution represents net gains earned on that portion of the 1969 and 1970 crops taken under loan.

Growers in this county who pooled a portion of their crop in either of those two years will share in the distribution. Approximately 200,000 checks are being mailed on October 8 from headquarters of the burley growers co-op, 620 South Broadway, Lexington, Ky.

Accompanying each check are a letter and a financial statement giving a summary of the Association operations during the last 37 crop years, since it has been in charge of the price support program in Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Missouri.

The record "lets a story unequaled in the history of farm programs," says the report of the Association officers and sales committee.

The statement gives a detailed accounting on the 1969 and 1970 pool consignments:

1969 CROP: 132,985,496 pounds taken under loan; \$96,274,008.28 advanced to members at time of sale; \$6,837,584 additional distribution to

members represents net earnings returned to growers of 7 cents on each dollar they received at time of sale; total of 140,593 checks distributed, averaging \$48.63 per check.

1970 CROP: 43,434,889 pounds taken under loan; \$32,128,893.39 advanced to members at time of sale; additional distribution of \$2,538,741.66 a net gain of 8 cents on the dollar; total of 57,615 checks distributed, averaging

## Swine Flu Vaccination For "High-Risk" People

If you're 55 years or older or with a chronic illness, protection from influenza will be available in the form of a vaccine which will be administered November 1 and 2, 1976.

The vaccine will offer protection from two influenza virus strains - the A/Victoria, which caused most influenza earlier this year, and A/New Jersey (the swine flu), which some experts feel could enter in epidemic proportions.

"The new influenza strain was isolated in New Jersey in February of this year, and health experts recognize the possibility that it could cause one of the most severe epidemics in modern history.

Most experts feel that this

particular strain was very similar to the one which caused the worldwide epidemic of 1918 during more than 500,000 Americans lost their lives.

"This is a potentially serious threat to the populace, and for that reason, public health professionals across the nation are launching the most massive immunization effort in the country's history."

Some of the conditions which would constitute chronic illness would include heart disease of any kind, lung disease of any kind (including emphysema, chronic bronchitis, asthma and tuberculosis), diabetes, chronic kidney disease and others.

Nick Martin wears blue jeans, sneakers and a red and white tee shirt with the name of a Lexington record store on the front. He has a thin growth of whisker over his upper lip. He listens to rock music on a stereo FM radio station. There are some people who would hint that Nick doesn't look like a major campaign director for a major presidential candidate, but these same Minnesota Senator Eugene McCarthy a major candidate.

The phone bank in the McCarthy campaign headquarters in Lexington consists of a typewriter. The Ford and Carter campaigns will each spend around \$17,000 in Kentucky. To date, McCarthy forces have raised \$400.

The McCarthy folks are paying \$150 rent for the space they call a

headquarters. The narrow, rundown ground level office on a downtown Lexington street gets much less traffic than the liquor store next door.

These hardships would move the most seasoned politics to toss up their hands, dump their campaign buttons in the garbage, and cast their votes for the National States Rights Party. The McCarthy volunteers, though, are not so awed by politicians. With a smile they'll tell you not one local or state elected official has hopped on the McCarthy bandwagon in Kentucky.

They may wear jeans, tee shirts and tie political buttons in the woods, but if the momentum of the Ford effort continues to build, the McCarthy backers could create old fashioned political problems for the democrats.

McCarthy supporters are mostly young. All are liberal. If they voted in 1972 it was for George McGovern. The democrats in Kentucky could suddenly take notice of the independent McCarthy effort if the fuzz around the Carter campaign continues. If the liberal vote goes to McCarthy, the democrats could

find themselves second best for the fifth time in the last six presidential races in Kentucky.

"We haven't been able to get much publicity in Kentucky," complains Martin. "Only on radio and television have we been able to get any exposure at all. We think McCarthy is a major candidate who deserves attention."

Visitors to the McCarthy headquarters are asked to sign petitions asking that 'Clean Gene' be given a spot on the televised debates. Martin admits working for the former senator is difficult and his man is a longshot. Martin's pride prevents him from calling McCarthy a 'spoiler'. However, Martin admits McCarthy could affect the direction of other political parties. He sees the candidate as a liberal George Wallace. Wallace's 1968 candidacy may have brought us Jimmy Carter.

"I see no difference between Ford and Carter. Even if I were the only McCarthy voter, working for a man with principles would make all of my efforts worthwhile." Nick Martin is a little idealistic.

There is some good news for the Kentucky Democratic Party. The voter registration books closed in early October, and it may be another week before we know the number of new names on the rolls. However, of the first 10,000 new registration cards processed by the Kentucky Board of Elections, more than 70 percent of the registrants identified themselves as members of the Democratic Party.

The new state law which eased voter registration and registration drives are responsible for what apparently will be a record number of new voter applications. Franklin County Clerk Lloyd Russell echoed the comments of other clerks when he said, "This is the heaviest registration we've had in our office in 17 years. If they vote, we could have a record turnout."

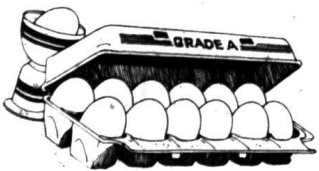
