Senior Citizens To Share In Title III Grant

Cumberland Valley Area citizens age 60 and over will share in more than \$400,000 granted today to Title III

programs across the state. The Cumberland Valley Area Development District has been granted \$33,980.

Gov. Julian M. Carroll and Secretary C. Leslie Dawson, Department for Human Resources announced today that the grant is made to supplement funds already in use for the programs.

"These additional funds will provide further opportunities for the state's elderly to receive valuable services as part of my continuing commitment to the needs of older Kentuckians," said Governor Carroll.

Title III is part of the Older Americans Act which provides for transportation, in-home services, home repair, legal services and other related social services for older citizens.

The Cumberland Valley Area includes Rockcastle, Clay, Jackson, Laurel, Knox, Bell, Whitley and Harlan counties.

Notice is hereby given that Kentucky Utilities Company has filed with the Public Service Commission of Kentucky an Application to modify its retail rate Fuel Clause.

If the average cost of fuel consumed by the Company's generating stations is in excess of or less than 36.492 cents per million BTU, as determined from the Company's most recent monthly operating reports available prior to the beginning of the month, an additional charge or credit will be made on the kilowatt-hours purchased by the customer at the rate of .00113 cent per kilowatt-hour for each 1 cent or fraction thereof of variation in the cost of fuel above or below 36.492 cents per million

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BTU for that month's billing.

The effect of this modification upon its customers would be to reduce the time between fuel expense expenditures and its recovery through Fuel Clause application. In moving from the present three month calculation period to the proposed one month calculation period there will be two months' fuel expense eliminated from recovery under the Fuel Clause. The Company has requested authority to recover this amount prorated over the next twelve months, by surcharge. This does not constitute an increase in rates.

This Application is set for public hearing at the offices of the Public Service Commission in the Capital Plaza Tower, Frankfort, Kentucky, on October 19, 1976, at 9:00 A.M. EDT.

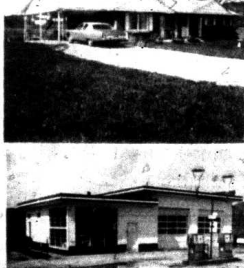

High court hears case on religion

annual holy days that parallel Jewish holy days. Saying that he would work "any other time," Cummins told his plant manager that he couldn't work on Saturdays. For a year, Cummins, whose regular work week was Monday through Friday, was not asked to work overtime on Saturdays.

Other supervisors complained that they were having to do Cummins' Saturday work. Plant manager L. G. (Dutch) Haddock called Cummins in and asked him if there was any possibility he could change his religious beliefs.

Cummins refused and was fired on Sept. 3, 1971.

"In a group of 17 supervisors, who I was trying to weld into a team, you can't do that if one of them is going to be a loner," Haddock testified.

Cummins filed a complaint with the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights, and in early 1972 the commission ruled that Parker Seal would have undergone "an undue hardship" to keep Cummins.

Two years later the U.S. District Court in Eastern Kentucky agreed with the Human Rights Commission and Parker Seal.

But in January 1975 the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in favor of Cummins, saying that the lower court "did not specify what undue hardship would have resulted and did not explain why an accommodation that was reasonable for over a year suddenly became unreasonable in September 1971."

The appeals court said the complaints of other supervisors at the rubber products company were "mild and infrequent." It also found the law itself constitutional.

The Parker Seal Co. fighting the decision that would have resulted in Cummins being awarded back pay and being reinstated appealed to the Supreme Court.

Cummins, who has operated a sawmill in his hometown of Mount Vernon, Ky., for the past three years didn't have to be in court yesterday. His lawyer, Thomas L. Hogan of Louisville could have argued the case without him.

But Cummins, his wife and two of his four children left the Festival of Tabernacles held by the World Wide Church of God in Hampton, Va. to come to Washington for the hearing.

Cummins said the past five years haven't been easy for his family.

After being fired, Cummins tried to learn to be a carpenter in order to get into the construction business on his own. But he had to travel 25 miles from his Mount Vernon home to work, and the cost of traveling hurt.

"It cost me a lot of money," Cummins recalled. "I had to borrow money to live."

Three years ago, he began a sawmill business on "a shoestring," said Cummins. "There's no way they (Parker Seal) can fairly compensate me for what I lost."

In court yesterday, Leonard Becker, attorney for Parker Seal, said the appeals court was penalizing the company for having spent a year trying to accommodate Cummins. He said that Cummins — by not working on Saturdays — was being given preferential treatment over other supervisors.

"This statute indisputably aids religion," said Becker in arguing that the law should be found unconstitutional. He said governmental pressure was being leveled on one person because of another person's religion.

Hogan argued that the company had an obligation under the law to "accommodate" Cummins' religion.

Chief Justice Warren Burger, in questioning Hogan, said:

"This gentleman expected the whole (business) establishment to revolve about him."

Hogan responded that the company had a legal obligation to try to work something out.

In his brief, Hogan said:

"The employer forced the employee to choose between his religion and his job. If men and women are to be terminated from employment because their religious beliefs do not allow them to work on Saturdays, then a substantial minority segment of the nation's work force will be denied the opportunity to compete."

On the other hand, Parker Seal claimed.

Parker Seal strove abundantly to meet Cummins' religious demands.

"Indeed short of an abdication of responsibility for the operation and profitability of a marginal industrial plant, Parker Seal's area manager could hardly have attempted more to alleviate the burdens under which Cummins professed

to labor."

In joining Cummins' side in the case, a lawyer for several Jewish organizations said that Sunday-only religious observance laws are "a serious infringement of the civil, religious and economic rights of Jews."

Also joining Cummins in the case was the U.S. solicitor general, who argued that the 1972 civil rights law in question is constitutional.

Rockcastle County To Receive Public Defender Funds

Rockcastle and Pulaski counties will be receiving funds totaling \$4775 for second quarter public defender programs.

Chief public defender, Jack Farley said the monies are distributed to judicial districts through local fiscal courts. The amounts are determined on a per capita and past usage basis.

Rockcastle county will receive \$1250

of the total and Pulaski will be getting \$3825.

Last year the state's public defender program handled approximately 17,000 cases for indigent persons.

and salaries and noted that under the judicial article, cities will have no responsibility for these costs. Gov. Carroll explained that when the state takes over operation of the courts, it will have to find space for the new courts. The state, he said, will have to contract with local governments for space or will share revenues to pay for space. . . . In addition he said, the state will have responsibility for the operation of jails. "All prisoners will be state prisoners," he said, and cities and counties will have no responsibilities for the housing of prisoners. In this instance also, the state contract with local governments. . . . Pointing out that other states who have initiated court reform have taken from five to eight years to complete it, Gov. Carroll said that by implementing the law within two years, as Kentucky is trying to do, "we will have some difficulties not faced by our sister states. . . . However, he said, "There is no practical alternative," to implementing the articles. Gov. Carroll noted that if the law is not implemented by the state federal courts could do so. The General Assembly should have the opportunity to make the decision on the final article. . . .

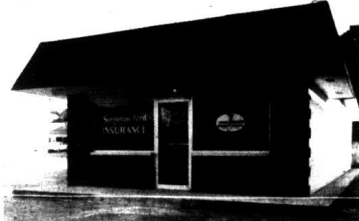

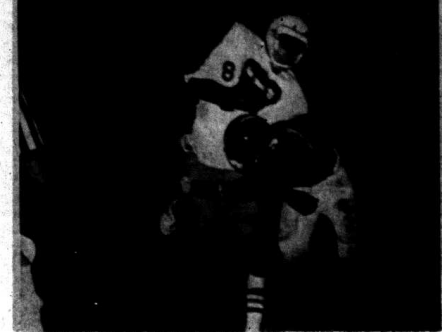

The large red, white and blue sign along the treelined road from the Jenny Wiley State Park to Prestonsburg urges passers-by to vote Republican. Beneath the names of the GOP standard bearers is the phrase "Keep Your Guns", a reference to the democratic platform on gun control. It's a good example of one of the few attempts Kentucky Republicans have made to attack Democrat Jimmy Carter on the Democratic platform as approved in New York City last summer.

Some Kentucky Republicans have complained that too much of an effort being made to sell the Ford/Dole ticket on the basis of the President's personality, honesty and record. They feel their party must make Carter's people defend the Democratic Party platform if the GOP is to have a chance in Kentucky.

If the Kentucky GOP has an ace up its sleeve it had better play it in the next hand or the Ford/Dole effort is going to fold in the Bluegrass state. Ten days ago, although the national news magazines listed Kentucky as solidly in the Carter fold, I thought the Republicans were showing considerable momentum. That's changed. In the first ten days of October the administration in Washington blundered through the Earl Butz fiasco. During the second televised debate the President made the gaffe of the campaign when he said there was no Soviet domination of Eastern Europe. The President's remark caused a great deal of concern among the nation's ethnic voters who have roots in Eastern Europe. Chicago has more Poles than Warsaw. Kentucky isn't Chicago you

say. True enough, but I believe many Kentuckians found the President's statement disturbing for a different reason than the Eastern Europeans in New York and Milwaukee.

Admittedly, the President is human, but we expect more as well as should. The President is just not supposed to make mistakes of this magnitude. It wasn't a slip of the lip. He repeated it in a follow up answer. Kentuckians, like others, must now wonder if the President is big enough for the job.

During a visit to Louisville, Governor Julian Carr predicted a Carter victory in Kentucky by 50,000 votes. I agree.

The debates, as it turns out, may be closer as you'll get to the presidential candidates this fall. It's unlikely Ford or Carter will bring their campaigns to the state since the former Georgia governor seems to have the state's nine electoral votes in tow. Independent Eugene McCarthy will be in Lexington and Northern Kentucky in late October. American Independent party candidate Lester Addox has already been here.

Kentucky's Development Secretary William Short has taken issue with an earlier Watchline report concerning the departure of Larry Townsend as Kentucky Commerce Commissioner. The report pointed out the success of the Townsend administration, but said there would be some in the Development

Cabinet who might be glad to see Townsend leave because of the dominating ego of Short and Townsend. "We get along fine. There has been no problem," Short told me on the telephone. In a letter signed by Short and Townsend they wrote: "Neither of us condones power struggle management or an ego clashing administration and we take sharp issue with speculation in these directions."

Townsend has left the Commerce Department to re-enter private business. Short is the acting Commerce Commissioner. *****

Top Management of Newborn Calves Can Cut Death Rates

The death of calves between birth and two months of age has resulted in losses of millions of dollars by dairymen.

Researchers have estimated that between 15 and 25 percent of all calves born die before two months of age. This results in less calves for dairymen to use as replacements, loss of income from calf sales, and the strong possibility of dairymen being forced to purchase animals for use as replacements.

Therefore, a strong dairy calf management program is essential for maintaining and improving the dairy business.

Most of the calf losses at an early age are due to poor management at the time of calving and poor housing and feeding conditions.

Dairymen need to take extra steps to make certain dry cows are cared for properly, provide good management at the time of calving and provide plenty of colostrum milk. Takes care of your unborn calf before it arrives. A vigorous, healthy newborn calf really depends upon the health and nutritional state of the dry cow.

As summarized in the July 7 issue of the SOUTHEAST FARM PRESS, a dry cow should have approximately 50-60 days dry, and should not be overfed at the time of calving.

By feeding a balanced ration throughout the dry period, the unborn calf receives sufficient nutrients to grow and develop as it should before birth. Healthy, vigorous calves at birth are less susceptible to disease than animals in a weak condition.

Prepare For Calving

Whenever the cow is within a week of calving, she should be watched carefully. Observation can best be done whenever an animal is housed in a clean, dry area. Usually in the Southeast, a pasture that is close-by is the best facility for calving. If the animal is put in a barn, a maternity stall with approximately 100 square feet is recommended. The stall should be clean and plenty of dry bedding provided. Proper ventilation is essential to avoid dampness and drafts upon the animal and the newly born calf.

Be on hand when the calf arrives in order to help in the event of calving difficulties. Many cows and calves have been saved just because a herdsman was closely observing the animal and therefore able to assist at a critical time. Once the calf arrives, it should be dried with a clean burlap sack or cloth, mucus removed from the nose and mouth and the navel disinfected with a tincture of iodine. Should the calf not breathe immediately, artificial respiration should be applied by compressing the chest wall of the animal.

The calf should receive three to four feedings of colostrum milk during the first 24 hours of life. The calf has the ability to absorb the antibodies in the colostrum milk which aids in resisting infections. The colostrum milk is also rich in Vitamin A which helps increase the calf's resistance to infection. The ability of the calf to absorb antibodies is reduced rapidly after 24 hours of age. Therefore, the sooner calves can be given colostrum milk the

more antibodies can be absorbed. Many dairymen make it a practice of feeding a calf colostrum milk in a bottle just a few minutes following birth.

Questions on Controlling Insects In Stored Grain are Being In

The steps to follow to help prevent insect infestations are: 1. Clean your storage bin and the surrounding area of trash and old grain; 2. Spray your bin before putting grain in for storage; 3. Use protecanes sprayed onto grain as it is being placed in storage; and 4. Inspect grain at regular intervals to detect infestations so that they can be controlled by fumigation. Spray bins two weeks before storing grain with one of the following: (each of these treatments will cover 1,000 square feet of surface area):

1. 1/4 pint of 57 percent malathion E.C. in 2 gallons of water or
2. 12 ounces of 50 percent methoxychlor W.P. in 2 gallons of water or
3. 1 quart of 25 percent methoxychlor E.C. in 2 gallons of water or
4. 1 1/2 pints of 8 percent pyrethrin combined with 60 percent piperyl butoxide in 2 gallons of water.

Consumer Comments

You have probably noticed advertisements describing methods of earning money at home. Unfortunately, most of these work-at-home schemes will cost you money instead of making you money.

In most instances the offers state that you may earn great amounts of money during your spare time in the convenience of your own home. What they do not tell you is that there is an instruction manual or an expensive piece of machinery that you will be required to purchase. As an inducement these materials, the promoter offers to buy the goods you will produce.

The problem occurs after you send the finished products you make to the company and they are rejected because they do not meet with company standards. Sometimes you find there isn't even a market for the product. Often, the promoter sells you the instruction manual or machine and never has any intention of buying the product you make.

Legitimate offers of "homework" are rare. The claims regarding possible earnings used in the sales pitches are often false and almost always exaggerated. There are also false claims about the amount of time required to do the work and market demand for the product.

If you're still thinking about a particular work at home program, you should at least: 1. Write and ask for all available literature about the company; 2. Check with the Attorney General's Office or the Better Business Bureau; 3. Before spending any money, know what the total cost will be in time and money; 4. Make sure all earnings, claims or guarantees used in the sales pitch are in writing.

If you have a consumer complaint, write to the Office of Attorney General, Division of Consumer Protection, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601. The office has found that it can most effectively deal with written complaints and

encourages you to write when you have a complaint. However, if you have an emergency situation, call the consumer hotline. The number is 1-800-872-2960.

How many remember the old threshing ring, first the old steam engine with the whittle, the big dinners, the long lines of men, the big crowd of people on the straw stack. After the steam engine, then along came the gasoline powered engine.

The period from 1900 to about 1920 was a time of rapid increase in the number of companies trying to make a tractor that would do the job it was needed for a very few made, a tractor that would partially do the job the farmer had to do. But with continued effort on part of the inventor they finally came up with tractors that would partially do the job the farmer needed. But it was no until after World War II that modern farm equipment began to make progress, for the farmer to get the job done. Kentucky Afield

Those gun racks which fit over the back window of pickup trucks are handy gadgets, but there are potential problems associated with their use, particularly if rifles or shotguns are kept in them all the time.

For one thing, the guns are too conspicuous, inviting anyone with a reasonable bent and a facility at opening locked doors to make off with your favorite firearms. Guns are highly prized booty among thieves because they are usually easy to sell for a good price. Leaving rifles, shotguns or other sporting equipment in an unattended vehicle, even a locked one, is an open invitation for a good ripping-off, especially if the firearms are in plain sight.

And living in the cab of a pickup is hard on the guns themselves. Dust and road dirt will stick to the oil surfaces of a gun, not only causing a gummy mess but also creating increased wear on moving parts if particles of grit get between the metal surfaces of the action.

Guns left in a rear-window rack are also subjected to extremes of temperature which can prove harmful over the long run. Remember how your car windows steam up in winter? Well, the same condensation (created by warm, moist air from the heater striking cold surfaces) forms on guns, too, not only on their exterior but also in the barrels and actions. Moisture leads to rust, and

rust, as every sportsman knows, is the firearm's enemy.

It's also possible that the summer sun could damage the finish of the stock or firearm. Have you ever seen old furniture with the finish cracked or crazed? That's caused by sunlight and excessive heat-conditions to which guns are subjected in a closed vehicle on a hot day.

Another problem with habitually carrying guns in a pickup rack is the possibility of finding yourself unable to enter an area (a campground, for example) where firearms are prohibited, or even of inadvertently violating the law.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is now conducting its fall campaign against illegal night deer hunting, an activity which has grown alarmingly in the past several years. Conservation officers will be making a number of night patrols, in many instances aided by aircraft surveillance. Any suspicious-looking light in the observation area will be investigated.

According to state law, it is illegal to cast the rays of a spotlight or other artificial lighting device from a road or into any field or forest while having a firearm in possession. This law was enacted to help control poaching, allowing wildlife officers to make an arrest without having to witness a suspected poacher actually take or attempt to take a deer or certain other game animals.

But what if someone is using a light for some legitimate purpose and has a rifle or shotgun within easy reach, say in a pickup rack? To avoid arresting those not involved in illegal poaching, law enforcement officials of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources would like everyone to know about this law.

The best way to avoid possible trouble is, of course, not to carry guns in a pickup rack except when transporting them to and from the hunting field or target range. This practice will not only prevent a possible brush with the law,

but it will also help avoid thefts and damage to the firearm.

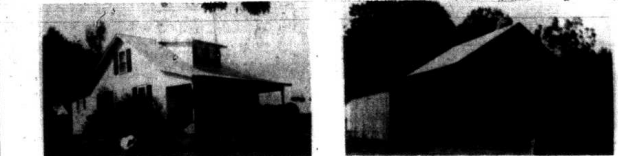

GARDEN FROZEN CABBAGE

If along with frost catches your cabbage still growing in the garden, don't give up on it. It's not ruined. Cabbage can be left in the garden and stand moderate frosts, usually on up into late November. Even in the outer leaves are frozen hard and are damaged, the rest of the head is probably okay. Cabbage has a really strong odor, so don't store it where it can smell up the house. Root cellar storage is best.

ONIONS TO BE STORED

Don't be too hasty in pulling up onions so frozen in storage through the fall months. Let the tops wither and turn brown at the neck of the bulb before you pull them or dig them up.

WHEN TO DIG SWEET POTATOES

It's best to dig sweet potatoes before frost. But if killing frost hits before you get them out of the ground, cut off the vines right away at soil level and dig them as soon as possible. Handle them carefully, setting aside for early eating any that you have cut into or bruised. Cure them before storing.

CURING SWEET POTATOES

Put sweet potatoes in ventilated boxes, or half-bushel baskets and "cure" them before storage. Ideally, this means holding them at 80 to 85 degrees and at 80 to 90 percent relative humidity for about 10 days. Keep the moisture level high by covering them with plastic sheeting or a tarpaulin.

If you don't have a place that warm to cure them, lengthen the curing period to 2 to 3 weeks and try to keep them at temperatures between 65 and 75 degrees F.

Outdoor pit or root cellar storage is too cold and wet for sweet potatoes. They need a warm place that won't get below 55 degrees F. or above 60. If you maintain a comfortable humidity level in your house, it will suit the sweet potatoes, too. If you store them in the coolest part of a heated basement, you can keep the moisture level up by covering the storage boxes periodically with moistened burlap sacks. Or set flat pans of water on the floor to evaporate.

If your house doesn't have central heating, you could store your sweet potatoes near a warm chimney.

Handle them gently, cure them properly, store them at the correct temperatures and humidity, and sweet potatoes should keep all fall and winter. However, if you can't manage those ideal conditions, store only what you can eat this fall. Freeze or can the rest for winter and spring use.

WHAT ARE THE SIGNS OF SPOILAGE IN HOME CANNED PICKLES AND RELISHES?

Before opening a jar, examine it closely. A bulging lid or leakage may mean the contents are spoiled. When a jar is opened, look for other signs of spoilage such as spurting liquid, mold, disagreeable odor, change in color or an

unusual softness, mushiness, or slipperiness of the pickle product. If there is even the slightest indication of spoilage, do not eat or even taste the contents. Dispose of the contents so they cannot be eaten by humans or animals.

HOW SHOULD LEFTOVER EGG YOLKS BE STORED AND HOW SOON SHOULD THEY BE USED?

Cover leftover egg yolks with cold water and store in the refrigerator in a covered container. Extra egg whites should also be refrigerated in this way. Use leftover yolks and whites within 2 to 4 days.

Can cracked eggs be used safely in home prepared foods? If eggs are cracked, use them only in foods that will be thoroughly cooked.

SHOULD HONEY AND SIRUP BE STORED IN THE REFRIGERATOR?

Store honey and sirup at room temperature until opened. Sirups are better protected from mold in the refrigerator. Refrigeration hastens crystal formation in honey. If crystals form, dissolve them by placing container of honey or sirup in hot water.

After a jar of peanut butter has been opened it should be kept in the refrigerator. Remove it from the refrigerator a short time before using to allow it to soften.

How can I be sure of buying a good quality of meat? Buy meats that are graded and have been inspected by the USDA. This assures that the meat came from healthy animals and was processed under sanitary conditions.

What fruits are rich in Ascorbic acid? Oranges, grapefruit, langerines, lemons and fresh strawberries.

Kentucky Afield

Well, it looks like the summer doldrums are about over. We've had a few cool nights, the leaves are starting to show their fall colors and the water temperatures in our lakes and streams are starting to get down near the 70-degree mark.

Beneath the surface, the bass are starting to sense this drop in water temperature and they, like us, recognize that winter is on the way. They are beginning to stir around, to become more active. They are leaving their deep water lairs where they have spent most of the summer and are prowling the shoreline more and more in search of food.

We should get some fairly heavy fall rain about this time of year, rain which will give some color to the crystal-clear waters of summer. The light penetrating the water won't be as harsh now, and won't bother the sensitive eyes of the bass. He'll start spending more and more time in shallow water, where the temperature and light

penetration are within his comfort range, and where food is abundant.

His primary food—shad—have been growing all summer and are now large enough to make a meal for even a lunker bass. He likes this too, because his appetite is increasing. When the water turns cold, his metabolism will slow down, he will become less active and will take less food. But now, in the fall, he is "storing up" for the lean months ahead.

The experienced angler knows all of this, is aware of what is happening in the underworld of the bass and understands the physical changes in the fish's environment and the physiological changes in the fish itself. Like the bass, the bass fisherman starts getting restless in the fall. The shortening days, he knows, presage the coming of the gloom of winter when only the hardiest of souls continue fishing.

Time is short, and the water is waning; conditions are right for some of the best fishing of the year. Compared to summer, the lakes seem almost deserted—the same cool water that brings skiers to other pursuits inland. Even many sportsmen have left the lakes with the temperature of summer, lured away perhaps by the call of squirrel-hove and bow deer hunting.

Yes, it is one of the best fishing seasons of the year in Kentucky. Those surface lures which have lain in a back tray in the tackle box all summer can be brought out now and chugged or twitched along the edge of shorelines, cover, cast beside stumps or exposed treetops or pulled enticingly over submerged logs or rocks. Spinner baits and medium running lures also usually work well at this time of year, and that old standby, the plastic nightcrawler, will take its share of fish too.

The knowledgeable fisherman also keeps alert for disturbances out in the lake, away from the shoreline. He knows that shad are schooling near the surface and that hungry fish—both black bass and white bass—often purpse these schools. At the first sign of surface activity, he moves his boat quietly into casting range and lets fly with either a surface lure, a spinner or a shad-imitating "vibrator" lure.

Night fishing for white bass and crappie is also productive in the fall, although the chilly nights can be a little uncomfortable. Daytime crappie anglers can also often locate schools of fish by drift fishing over submerged cover areas. And fishing the tailwaters below the dams on our larger lakes can yield a surprising number and variety of fish.

So don't put your boat and fishing tackle into winter storage yet—there's still a lot of good fishing in front of you this season.
