**EKU COLONELS OPEN BASKETBALL SEASON**

The 1976-77 version of the Eastern Kentucky University Colonels gets its cage season underway Wednesday night against basketball power UNC-Charlotte in Charlotte, North Carolina.

First-year coach Ed Byrne's EKU Colonels will have their hands full against the 49ers who last year won the runner-up position in the National Invitational Tournament and finished with a 24-6 record. UNC returns four starters from last year's squad including Cedric "Cornbread" Maxwell who was named to two All-American teams.

Byrne will also have to contend with a rash of injuries that have crippled his Colonels heading into the season. Junior Darryl Davis and Bill Dwayne will be out of action with injuries - Davis with torn ligaments and Dwayne with an injured foot.

Another junior, Darryl Young will be academically ineligible until the Toledo Invitational Tournament, four games into the season. Two freshman and one other probably will see some action in the opener. Mike Bell of Akron, Ohio will be out with an injured wrist; Jim O'Brien a 6-4 1/2 guard from Chicago, Ill. has a knee injury and Danny Hancey from Lexington is out also with a knee injury. Hancey will make the trip, however.

**NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING**

The City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, is preparing a pre-application proposal to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for community development block grant funds. These funds may be used for activities such as property acquisition, public works, job enforcement, and other public projects. In order to secure public participation in the pre-application process, two public hearings will be held. All citizens are urged to attend. The first public hearing will be held on Thursday, December 2nd, 1976 at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall. At this hearing, eligible activities will be discussed, citizen suggestions on community development projects will be solicited and past proposals will be reviewed. The second public hearing will be held on Monday, December 13th, 1976 at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall. The pre-application proposal will be presented to the public for comments and suggestions, prior to completing the application and submitting it to the Area Development District and the State for review. Submission of an application does not insure automatic HUD approval, since HUD generally has sufficient funds in hand to finance a majority of the applications submitted. The maximum grant for which the City may apply is \$500,000. The HUD criteria for ranking pre-applications includes the amount and percent of substandard housing and poverty; the project benefits to low and moderate income families; the community's housing efforts; any serious threats to health or safety in the project area; and the use of matching federal or state resources for the project. If the application is approved, a Citizens Advisory Committee will be appointed to insure full public participation of the final application, preparation of the community development plan, proposals, and implementation of the proposals. Members of this committee will represent a cross-section of the community in terms of age, sex, race, geographical locations, business, and labor, and other important community characteristics. 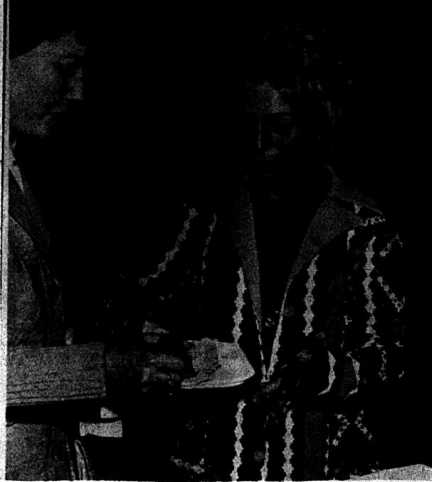

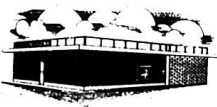

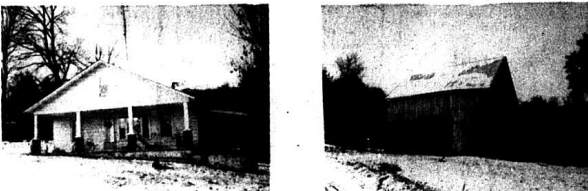

## Rockcastle Gets New Industry; To Begin Production Jan. 1

A new industry is coming to Rockcastle County. Rockcastle Steel Corporation is expected to be in production by January 1, 1977, according to J.C. Denny of Lexington, one of the owners of the company.

The announcement came at a meeting last Wednesday afternoon at The Bank of Mt. Vernon. The company will operate from the former Braden Steel Corporation building between Mt. Vernon and Brodhead.

Mr. Denny, a native of Cynthiana, said the company will begin production with about 10 employees and plans are to employ about 50 persons by the end of 1977.

The company will fabricate structural steel, i.e., buy steel from the mill and then custom build it to specification for buildings, bridges, etc. Mr. Denny said that the company had orders already on file to begin production in January.

Future plans for the industry call for the development of vocational education training programs and the addition of draftsmen to the staff locally. At present, the drafting part of the process will be farmed out to independent drafting companies.

Mr. Denny has a mechanical engineering degree from the University of Kentucky and has had 14 years experience in this type of business. He said, during the meeting, that he (Mr. Denny) had been working on opening a factory such as this for some time and that, since he was a native of Cynthiana, he had contacted Tracy Farmer, chairman of The Bank of Mt. Vernon, for advice. Mr. Farmer told him that the area and the building available here.

Calling the industry a "community project," Mr. Denny also said that he, personally, "wanted to become a party of the community not just as a manufacturer but with involvement in the life of the community." Mr. Denny, his wife and two daughters, plan to move to the community as soon as possible.

Bill James, president of the Rockcastle County Improvement Council and a bank officer, welcomed Mr. Denny to the community on behalf of the improvement council and said he felt this was a step forward for the county in

their effort to attract industry. "This is the type of industry we like to have because it will be locally owned and operated and its owners want to become part of this community," Mr. James further said.

Mr. Denny responded by saying that he appreciated the interest shown by the band and the community. If you are interested in applying for employment with the company, applications are available at The Bank of Mt. Vernon.

## Robin Walker Convicted In Clarence Perciful Murder

Robin Wayne Walker, arrested in June of 1975 for the slaying of Clarence Perciful of Mt. Vernon, was found guilty of Murder, Burglary and Theft by Deception last Wednesday by a Rockcastle Circuit Court Jury.

Walker, 20, was given five years for the Theft by Deception charge; 20 years for Burglary in the First Degree and life imprisonment on the charge of Murder.

Entry of judgement and imposing of sentence was postponed and suspended pending a presentence investigation. A hearing will be held December 7th at 10 a.m. for the purpose of determining whether the defendant should receive a sentence of imprisonment, a sentence of

probation or a sentence of conditional discharge.

Mr. Walker was remanded to jail await the ruling of the Court.

Another Indiana man is already serving a prison sentence in connection with the murder and Peter L. Tribbett, 26, also of Indianapolis, Indiana is awaiting trial in connection with the same murder.

The trial of George Drew for the murder of Goy Thaddeus Phillips has been set for Monday, December 6th.

An earlier trial ended in a hung jury.

## BOND SALES

James W. Lambert, Volunteer Chairman for Rockcastle County, reports that sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in his county amounted to \$1,668 in September, bringing him up to 70% of his county's goal for 1976.

Over the state, sales amounted to \$7,445,299 in September. Nationwide, total sales for the first nine months were \$5.7 billion (7% above a year ago).

Holdings of Series E and H Bonds reached \$70,752 million as of September 30, 1976. Including Freedom Shares, holdings totaled over \$71 billion, which is nearly 1/5th of the privately-held portion of the public debt.

## State Leaf Averages \$117.90

Continued higher prices for burley have resulted in Kentucky recording its all-time record seasonal average to date. The state's daily average yesterday dropped two cents a hundredweight, with a quarter of a million pound decrease in volume - but brought the six-day seasonal average to \$117.11.

Some 96,488,795 pounds have been sold for a total of \$113 million.

The state's daily average yesterday was \$117.90 on 21,587,223 pounds, compared to Monday's average of \$117.92 a hundredweight for 21,519,376 pounds.

State sales to date are 2 million pounds more than at this time last season but 35 million pounds more than at this time last season but 35 million pounds less than the 1974 season when prices were breaking records at \$116 for the day.

Lexington's volume was up slightly more than a quarter of a million pounds, compared to Monday, but the average dropped 36 cents to \$116.10. The market sold 3,717,605 pounds which was the highest daily volume this season and the highest poundage auctioned since Jan. 9, 1975 when 3.8 million pounds averaged \$112.63.

However, the total purchase price for leaf sold here yesterday was thought to be the largest amount recorded for a daily take on a single burley tobacco market, according to tobacco officials. A total of \$4,390,347 was paid by tobacco company representatives for the 3.7 million pounds.

The Lexington market's total volume to date is recorded at 15,321,171 pounds at \$117.32.

In the eight-state burley belt Monday, 34,565,893 pounds were

auctioned the largest volume since Dec. 15, 1975 when 34.85 million pounds averaged \$108.94.

The average price in the belt Monday also was up 97 cents on the hundred, averaging \$116.99, compared to the lowest volume sold this season. Total pounds sold on the belt's markets through Monday totaled 129,832,705 pounds for \$150,057,573 to average \$115.58 for the season.

Belt sales yesterday prevailed under a generally steady market with small fluctuations in grade averages, according to the Federal-State Market News Service.

The Service reported top averages were \$121 a hundredweight on a few better quality grades. Although some markets in the belt reported light sales, most points experienced medium to heavy volume.

The Burley Growers Tobacco Cooperative received 1.6 per cent of sales Monday.

The highest average in the state yesterday again was at Lebanon \$119.32.

Five other Kentucky markets had averages above \$115. Franklin, Henderson and Paducah markets did not hold sales.

## BR-R-R ITS COLD

Local weatherman Bud Cox reported Wednesday that the temperature Tuesday morning was a cold, cold 6 degrees in Mt. Vernon. Also, 3/4 of an inch of snow fell Sunday night and early Monday morning.

## TO THE CITIZENS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY

Dear Citizen:  
The members of the Kentucky Industrial Development Advisory Board wish to thank the Rockcastle County Improvement Council for their invitation to come to Rockcastle County and discuss the industrial potential of your county.

After touring the county, viewing the industrial properties, schools, hospitals and other facilities in the communities, we came to the conclusion that there is a good potential for the county. The properties are excellent industrial land and would be suitable to many industries. Some effort on your part is required to create a favorable first impression.

A site selection team from an industry will select five or six communities in one or more states which appear to meet their needs. They will usually visit these communities very briefly often with no advance notice. They will usually visit all five or six in a period of no more than three days. On the basis of these brief glimpses, their choices will usually be narrowed to two communities which will then be visited in detail.

I point this process out only to impress upon you the need to create a favorable first impression.

Your community has all the facilities, and with a bit of paint and effort on your part can compete with most towns of its size in the state. To improve your chances of getting industry to Rockcastle County, it will take a push to clean up and paint up. Even with this effort, there is no guarantee you will get an industry next week, next month, or next year, but your chances of getting serious consideration will improve greatly.

In closing, I want to compliment the community interest shown on our visit. The attendance was large, and this is an indication that you want to help yourselves. I congratulate you.

## 25% Receive Swine Flu Vaccine

Approximately 25% of the county's population, over 18 years of age, received immunization for Swine Flu during the second of two days set-up by the local Health Department to administer the vaccine.

Altogether 1,870 doses of the vaccine were administered or about 48% of the doses made available locally by the State Dept. of Health. If you still wish to receive the immunization, you may do so by coming by the local health department, located in the courthouse, but you should get first to insure that a nurse will be there to administer the vaccine.

The vaccine for children 9-18 years of age has not been received by the health department so plans cannot be made for administering it. At this time, the local health department does not even know how many doses will be made available to the county. Further information on this will be made available as it is received.

**County Agent's Notes**

**Apply Lime, Phosphate, and Potash This Winter**

Several fertilizer jobs can be taken care of between now and spring so that when spring planting time gets here, you won't be bothered with getting these done. Hayfields can be limed and topped with phosphate and potash any time between now and early spring that you can get machinery over the fields. Lime, phosphate and potash can also be spread onto cornfields and pastures... particularly those you will be renovating in early spring.

You do need some information beforehand though... soil test results from fields to be fertilized and limed.

If you haven't taken soil samples already this is a good time to get them and have them sent in for analysis. With the results you can then decide if you need lime and fertilizer and if so, how much you need.

Be sure to do a good thorough job in sampling your fields, because in the testing procedure only a few ounces of soil is actually used to represent all the hundreds or thousands of tons of soil in a field. If you need advice on how to take a good sample or if you have other questions about soil tests, call or come by the local extension office.

One final thought - last year we had a rush of soil samples sent in during late winter and early spring. This overtaxed our testing capacity and results were delayed in being returned. We have increased the testing capacity since then, but it still would be a good idea to get your samples taken now and sent in as soon as possible. That way you'll be assured of having your results back well ahead of late winter and spring deadlines.

**Mulching Will Improve Strawberry Prospects**  
If you apply mulch to your strawberry bed you can expect a better

yield of delicious red fruit next summer. H. Lee Durham, Rockcastle County Extension agent, says mulch should be applied before the temperature goes lower than 15 to 20 degrees, but should not be applied before several hard frosts and light frosts have helped to harden the plants. Durham says between Thanksgiving and Christmas is usually a good time to put on mulch.

The Rockcastle County Extension agent lists several benefits to be gained from mulching strawberries. Mulching helps to (1) prevent winter injury to plants if applied before heavy freezing (2) retard blooming, which may let the plants escape injury from late spring frosts, (3) suppress spring weed and grass growth, (4) conserve moisture (5) keep fruit and pickers clean.

The most widely used and probably the best material for mulching is clean

straw, says Durham. Leaves pack down too tight, sawdust often sticks to wet berries, and pine needles are not plentiful.

Baled straw should be spread out in early fall and the ties cut so the material will absorb rains. This will help suppress weed and grass seeds. When putting the straw on the strawberries, shake it out and spread it evenly over the width of the strawberry rows. Some straw will soon be blown to the row middles to cover the bare soil there. If winds are severe, some areas will be blown free before the straw settles, and the straw will need re-spreading.

Usually one and one-half to two tons of straw per acre is considered a good amount of mulch to apply. A small plot of one-hundredth of an acre would require 35 pounds of mulch to equal one and three-fourths tons per acre. For a four foot row spacing, 110 feet of row would be one hundredth of an acre. A plot two rows wide and 55 feet long would also be a hundredth of an acre.



## Home Line

**Take Good Care of Leather Coat**  
Spiff up a smooth leather coat with a soapy sponge between professional cleanings. Brush off soil and lint from suede with a dry sponge or a special suede brush.

Get professional attention for a badly soiled or a stain on leather. If you try to spot clean it yourself, you're liable to dry out or discolor the leather.

If a leather garment gets wet, hang it up to dry in an open area, away from direct heat. It needs air circulation for a natural elimination of the moisture. Direct heat will dry out the leather, affecting its appearance and durability.

You can keep man-made leathers surface-cleaned with a damp sponge. Most of the look-likes can't be successfully drycleaned or laundered. When shopping choose one with a dark lining that won't show soil easily.

If you bought your coat at a second-hand shop or garage sale, and the label is missing, how can you tell for sure if it's leather or a synthetic?

For one thing, smell it. Also, most of the vinyls have a knit backing. The back of leather has that natural rough touch to it. Appearance wise, it's sometimes very hard to tell the difference. One way to notice the size of the pieces sewn together. A long leather coat usually has several seams — that's because the average skin is only 2 to 3 square feet in size.

### Use Gentle Cycle for Washable Wools

Washable wool sweaters and clothes can be put through the gentle cycle of your washer, but many should be air dried.

Turn the garment inside out, use a mild detergent and lukewarm water. You can usually hang up woven wools to dry, but it's best to lay knits flat on a towel. If the label says your garment can go into the dryer, try 15 or 20 minutes on the delicate or warm cycle, until just barely dry.

Wool is by nature soil releasing and responds best, to gentle sudsing. Hot water can cause fibers to shrink and mat. So a too high a setting on your drier.

# Rockcastle Recollections

This article will not appear in the history of Rockcastle County, nor will it be a completion. It may, in fact, greatly displease the subjects of it by recounting it here, but I have a reason for doing it which I feel justifies this notice.

School boys the country over, no less in Rockcastle County Schools than elsewhere, are apt to pick somebody on whom to pattern their lives in the hope of equalling their model in their own career. To many, such a person is a hero in a physical sense; a famous athlete, a war hero or fabulously successful in some exciting endeavor. To the more thoughtful student, a man who by his own efforts has won great financial success and national renown as a leader in his field is eminently worthy of serving as one after whom to copy his life.

It is quite customary for a boy to look afire for such a man, expecting to find about him only by reading newspapers and books or listening to radio and TV accounts of his accomplishments. For Rockcastle County students and dreamers such work is scarcely necessary. There is yet living, such a man, a native of your home county, known to your parents and even to some of you. He was raised in Rockcastle but early left his home to set out upon a business career that was eminently successful. Now that he is retired, with the strain and hustle to Big Business behind him, he often comes back to his home county and many of you have seen him on the streets of Mt. Vernon, conversing with old friends and acquaintances in evident pleasure at seeing them.

If you look for a rich, impressive man with an air of command about him and every evidence of self-esteem or importance, you'll never find him. Look rather for a small man in plain everyday clothes, with maybe a checked flannel shirt, open at the throat. If you think you have found him, ask somebody his name and he says "Jack Wood" that's him.

Not Jack Wood, really. That's just a nickname by which his folks know him. His real name is Thomas Jefferson Wood and you'll find it that way in the pages of Who's Who in America and in countless business magazines and publications where the big names of national and international business are to be found. While he doesn't like for me to talk about it, I have seen a write-up in a business magazine where he was listed as the third highest-paid sales executive in America, and you'd have to say that was pretty good.

And now you'll be wondering how a boy from Wildie got that way. Was his father wealthy enough to put him in business? Did he have a rich relative leave him a bundle? Did he have friends with a lot of pull? Did he marry the bosses daughter, or find any of the other dime novel rags-to-riches shortcuts? Some of the answers to these questions may be apparent from these facts. His father was Uncle Henry Wood, who worked a farm and ran the little country store at Wildie; he never had any rich relatives except the ones he later made that way. His many friends with pull came much later in life; he did not marry the bosses daughter because he was already married to Hilda Welch, a Berea girl, when he went to Cincinnati and got a job with a small soap company, Proctor and Gamble. But they didn't stay small long and Thomas Jefferson Wood was one of the reasons for this. I visited him there in the early days of his employment and an old negro who worked around the place told me "Missus Jeff, he was a lotta after dese salesman 'round heah an' if he git to be do big boss some day he sho' gonna cut

out dis goodtime lofin' 'round heah." In due time "Missus Jeff" did get to be the big boss and wound up in charge of world-wide sales for Proctor and Gamble, by then one of the biggest incorporations in America.

Before his retirement as vice president of Proctor and Gamble a few years ago the boy from Wildie, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, was on familiar terms with presidents and members of their staff and was an always welcome visitor in the Whitehouse. He was known as having a keen insight into politics and his help and advice were given in more, than one hard-fought campaign. For years he was the favorite hunting companion of the Chief Justice of the United States and they went on annual big game hunts in all corners of the world.

He doesn't talk much about his wealth and he doesn't throw it around much, either. When the end came for "An't Lize" in Berea, Kentucky, at an advanced age, she was ready to go, knowing that her life's investment in her boys had paid off. Nobody knew that better nor appreciated it more than they.

And remember that Alfred, the younger brother, was not a bit behind in his lifetime's accomplishments. He, too, after a thorough education at Harvard, went to work for Proctor and Gamble's sales force and wound up with a big territory and big accomplishments with the firm. It is worthy of note that the boys after going to work for Proctor and Gamble never worked for any other concern either before or after their retirement.

Alfred, being a bit younger and more active, took time out to serve his country in a notable way. Going through World War One as a lieutenant in the Naval Air Corps, coming back during World War Two he served as a Colonel in the Air Corps, winning several citations, including the much-coveted Croix de Guerre from the French Government.

In 1960, he retired as an official of Proctor and Gamble and now lives in Dallas, Texas, where he looks after his extensive oil interests and operates a large ranch in Oklahoma. A relative, Wayne Stewart, often visits him there and Alfred and his wife, the former Mary

Swain, of Eminence, Kentucky, make frequent visits with relatives and friends here, always spending some time with my wife and me and old friends of long standing.

If the life stories of these two Wood boys from Wildie do not furnish you with sufficiently attractive reasons for trying to amount to something in this world, then maybe someday I'll take time to tell you about young Tom Wood "Jack's" son who is doing pretty well for himself in the world of Big Business after helping me for a few years in the beginning in putting Renfro Valley on the map.

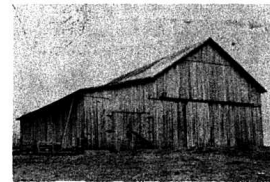
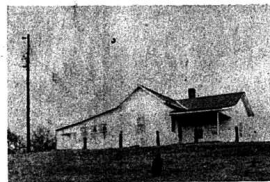
