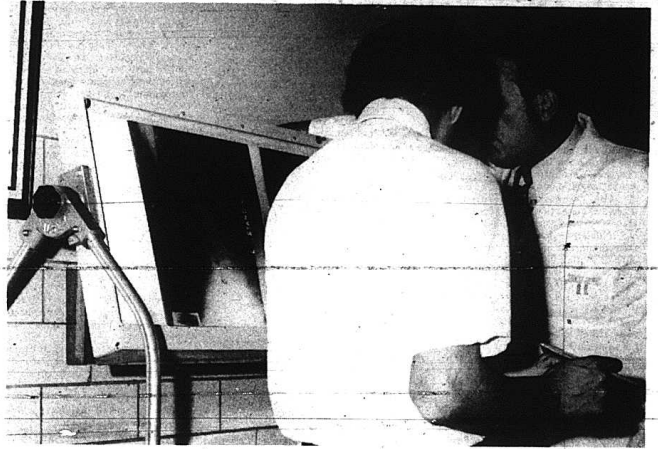


Shriners Donate Millions To Child Welfare



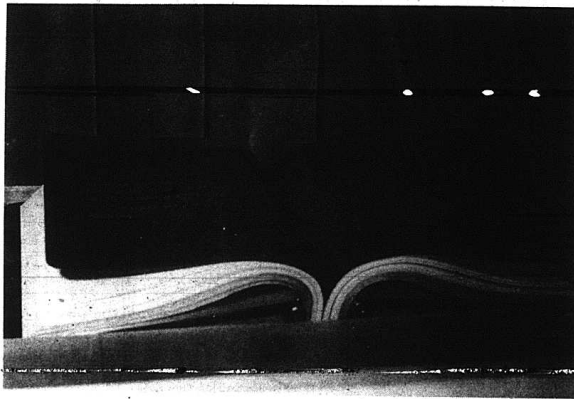
THE ORIGINAL Lexington Shriner hospital was abandoned in 1955 for the present 1900 Richmond Rd. site. A holly tree from that hospital's lawn was transplanted to the new location as a reminder of Shriner service to thousands of children.



THERE ARE 11 active staff doctors at the Lexington facility, and 33 consultants who can be called in if needed. At the Cincinnati burn center, there are nine staff doctors and 20 consultant doctors.

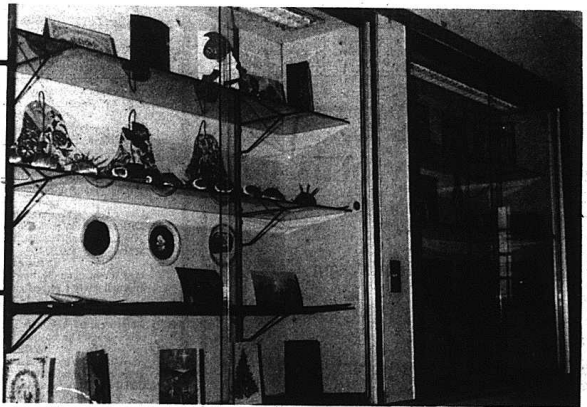


ADOLPH RUPP, chairman of the board of this particular hospital, said in-patients spend Christmases at home, returning for treatment in January. A vending man in the hospital lobby said he was going home to take his tree down, because he'd "... never seen one as pretty as that."



NUMEROUS PLAQUES found in other hospitals are not to be seen in Shriner hospitals. A "Book of Gold" records the names of persons who make legacies, bequests and gifts in their wills to the hospitals. The left page reads, "In this Book of Gold are recorded the names of those who have been mercifully mindful of little children who needed help. For them we pray God's blessings." On the right page — "Dedicated to those who have aided our work."

ADMINISTRATOR SPRADLIN said the staff makes an effort to exhibit any work the patients do. While at the hospital, kids attend school so they will not be behind when they return to public school. Education TV is used a lot, she said, and the students put on two plays each year. The Shriners provide the youngsters with numerous toys and games, and make available recreation and opportunities for exercise.



Hospital Costs Rising

As are all hospitals, the Shrine facilities are experiencing the increased costs of equipment, utilities and manpower. The Shrine budgets about \$24 million a year to operate its 22 centers. Per patient costs in the Orthopedic units last year averaged \$2,200. The average length of stay was 34 days.

For acute burns patients the average length of stay was 40 days, with costs coming to about \$375 a day.

In the last 55 years, about \$325.4 million has been spent for hospital operation, but the return of the children to society is the Shrine's first concern.

Area Support

Central and Eastern Kentucky communities have supported fund raising activities through their attendance at Shriner circuses, horse shows, rodeos and athletic events. Businesses contribute by purchasing advertising in programs printed for use during these activities.

In addition, church and civic organizations entertain the children with musical programs and plays. Area Shriners are members of the

Oleika Shrine Temple in Lexington or the El Hasa Temple in Ashland. Many are members of a Shrine club or parade unit in their own communities. Members of these clubs and units are often the clowns or mini-car drivers seen in parades.

The Mount Sterling Shrine club contributed several hundred dollars worth of toys to the children's Christmas celebration. The members purchased the toys with money earned at a Mount Sterling Court Day booth in October.

Major Health Problems

Two million Americans are accidentally burned each year. About 70,000 of these require hospital treatment — 12,000 eventually die. Of the latter, half are less than 16 years old. Thousands of orthopedic children require help each year.

Many live in towns that cannot provide the necessary medical care. The Shriner centers make this care available.

"We consider the kids we don't treat our liabilities," one hospital administrator said. "The ones we do get to are our assets."



THE STAFF operates dining rooms for the girls and boys, and also for employees. Laundry is also taken care of as about 600 lbs. are done daily, depending on the occupancy.

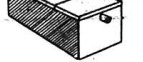

One of the most spectacular winter scenes in Rockcastle County is the cascading icicles formed in the cut on Burr Hill. The water comes from tiny underground streams which find an outlet in the limestone cliffs made when the roadway was built. Thus far, a low temperature of three below zero has been recorded this year and, on the 11th day of January last year, the low was also

three below but the high temperature in January of 1976 was 58 degrees compared with this year's high so far of 38 degrees. Also, only two and one-fourth inches of snow fell in January of last year while, thirteen and one-half have fallen so far in January with four and one-half inches, on the ground now.

No Injuries Reported in Four-Vehicle Accident

The accident occurred when Rufus Wheat of Route 1, Mt. Vernon turned onto Richmond Street and reportedly hit an icy spot. He then slid into another auto driven by Charlie Bussell of Mt. Vernon. The impact pushed the Bussell

car forward and it slammed into a car driven by Richard Connelley of Mt. Vernon. The Connelley car was pushed into the rear of a pick-up truck driven by Floyd Foster of Cincinnati, Ohio. Mr. Foster was stopped at the stop sign at the corner of Main and Richmond Streets.

Mr. Connelley, an employee of Bob Mullins Ford in London, was bringing the new car. He was driving to Mt. Vernon to deliver it. No serious injuries resulted from the accident though Mr. Bussell stated

that his grandson was buried under debris and groceries in the back of his station wagon.

State Trooper Danny Coleman investigated the accident.

Two Directors Elected, Four Re-Elected At Annual Meeting of Bank of Mt. Vernon

Stockholders of the Bank of Mt. Vernon held their annual meeting Tuesday, January 11, 1977 and elected six directors. Tracy Farmer, Chairman of the Board, announced that four of the previous directors and two new directors were elected.

Directors re-elected were Tracy Farmer, Chairman, Jess Bullock, W.E. Hunt and James W. Lambert. The two new directors elected at the meeting were R.H. Hamm and C.T. Huffines.

Stockholders also voted a one-for-one split in the capital stock issued by the Bank of Mt. Vernon. The stock split

is subject to approval by regulatory authorities and will be issued on obtaining such approval.

Mr. Huffines, his wife, Carolyn, their two sons and daughter reside in Countryside Estates and attend the Berea Church of

Christ. He is a member of the Rockcastle County Improvement Council.

Salt Supply

Running Low

The state highway department in Rockcastle County reported early Wednesday that salt supplies had dwindled to almost nothing as only a few tons were available for county use. The salt will be used only in case of emergency situations. Emergencies are when traffic tie-ups occur on major roadways in the county. An example is the 150 car and truck jam on I75 near the Rockcastle River on Thursday, January 6th.

Salt can be used to melt ice on roadways only when temperatures are above 20 degrees. The highway department then uses a mixture of Rock salt and calcium chloride. This mix however is only good when temperatures range upward from 10 degrees. The supply of calcium chloride is as low as the salt supply.

According to a state highway representative, the only way to handle the combination of icy roads and frigid temperatures is to spread cinders on top of the ice. They won't melt the ice but cars can at least get traction on the cinder cover. But, with the days of coal burning stoves and furnaces quickly fading, and the advent of clean fuel sources such as oil, gas and electricity the days of cinders are also gone. Enough cinders to cover one Rockcastle County highway could not be accumulated during an entire winter. Aside from that, the cinders would have to be spread by hand since the state does not have equipment to spread them.

Snowplows as well as useless when ice covers the roadways. Snow can be scrapped off, but the weight of the plows is nowhere near sufficient to break through the ice. The blades barely skim over the surface collecting, perhaps a handful of residue every 1/4 mile.

The single bright spot in this mess is the fact that there have been no serious accidents in Rockcastle Co. in this period. Numerous minor accidents have occurred all over the state of Kentucky on a statewide several deaths have been attributed to poor road conditions. People in Rockcastle Co. are either not driving, being extremely careful or are awfully lucky.

School kids are having a ball sleigh riding, building snowmen and having snowball fights while school is called off until road conditions improve. What they probably don't realize that according to the state board of education there must be a minimum of 175 teaching days. That means that school, as of Wednesday, will be in session until at least June 3. The possibility of calamity days being approved is still alive but they would be nowhere near the number that schools have been closed. Calamity days are declared so that the days will not have to be made up at the end of the year. The maximum number in the past has been 6 days and schools have already been closed for 14 days. Rumors of Saturday classes have been floating throughout the county but that would only be a last resort measure. Saturday classes would have to be approved by the state board of education and probably would not be because of extremely poor attendance by both students and teachers.

So, it looks as if the best plans for the very near future will be to stay at home, admire the beauty of snow on the ground and read the Signal.

Homestead Exemption Increased

The Homestead Exemption has been raised from \$7,700 to \$8,900 for the 1977, according to Robert Cromer, Property Valuation Administrator.

Mr. Cromer said that if you have already signed up for the Homestead Exemption, the exemption will automatically be raised. If you have become 65 years of age, or will in 1977, and have not signed for the Homestead Exemption, you should come by the PVA

office in the Courthouse and sign the form before the March 31st deadline.

To qualify under the Homestead Exemption, you must be 65 years of age in 1977 and sign the Homestead Exemption form before March 31, 1977 and must live in and maintain the property. With the new increase, taxpayers qualifying for the Homestead Exemption will save \$82.41 on their 1977 tax bill.

Coldiron Announces Candidacy For First Magisterial District

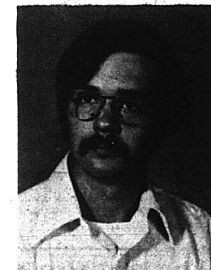

FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

Since this column is titled *Frankfort Watchline* it seems only appropriate it occasionally include a few people worth watching. Yes, there are a few in Frankfort, So., as we grind, slip, slid, or skid into 1977 here as a few folks worth keeping an eye on in the new year.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE BOBBY RICHARDSON. When the governor handed the legislative leadership for the 1976 legislature a lot of heads were left shaking in wonder at the selection of Rep. Bobby Richardson as majority floor leader. Richardson, 32, of Barren County was serving in only his third term as a lawmaker.

The governor's faith in his floor leader has been rewarded. Richardson capably maneuvered Carroll's legislative package through the regular session. The recent extraordinary meeting he was responsible for keeping the pace moving permitting the lawmakers to be home for Christmas.

While some Frankfort watchers had early doubts about Richardson's ability, the governor apparently had none. "We had complete faith in Bobby," says Carroll recently. "We knew he could do the job, and he has."

It's no secret Richardson has his eye on the 2nd District Congressional seat now held by William Natcher when Natcher resigns.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE RAYMOND OVERSTREET. In the final days of the special session Ray Overstreet's subtle hints that he was considering a run for the governorship in 1979 were no longer subtle or hints. The 34 year old Republican from Casey

Overstreet told me he had been visiting around the 1st Congressional district trying to organize what few Republicans there are in Western Kentucky.

Overstreet, a maverick among House Republicans, claims the reorganization of the state's judicial system hurt Governor Carroll in the state's courthouses and with the voters. Overstreet claims four feelings generated by justice reform will hurt Commerce Commissioner Terry McBrayer who is thought to be Carroll's choice to follow him in the governor's office.

The governor made a mistake in not pressing for a district judge for every county. It's a mistake both politically and realistically," according to Overstreet. Whether or not it's a mistake for Overstreet to think about being governor has not yet been determined.

FARMERS AND OTHERS USING RESTRICTED PESTICIDES MUST BE CERTIFIED

A federal regulation has been enacted requiring every user of restricted-use pesticides to be certified before they can apply the pesticides. Such persons must be certified by October, 1977.

By October, 1977 all pesticides will begin to be labeled as "General" or as "Restricted." Many of the pesticides that you growers have been using may fall in the "Restricted" class. You will not be able to continue using these pesticides unless you become a Certified Applicator. Farmers who apply pesticides only to their own land or to a neighbor's land in exchange for other services are classed as Private Applicators. You can become a Certified Private Applicator by attending a "Pesticide Applicator Training Program" being given on Monday, January 24, 1977 at the Rockcastle County High School, Vocational Agriculture classroom, beginning at 7:00 p.m. There is no fee or test involved in becoming a Private Certified Applicator; just attend the training meeting. It will last about two and one half hours of your time, so plan your schedule. If you cannot attend the meeting on the above date, the next certification training meeting will be held at the same place and at the same time of day on Monday, February 7.

All county agents in the state of Kentucky, under the direction of specialists at the University of Kentucky, the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources and the Environmental Protection Agency, have been given training and are now qualified to conduct Pesticide Certification Training Schools. *****

Burley Quota Talks Jan. 14 At Lexington

By Bennett Roach

Burley marketings have shown a steady increase in pool assignments since Christmas, and if the rate continues the total may reach last season's mark of the highest in several years.

Tobacco placed under loan through the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association has been coming from all grades, said Alvin R. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer of the co-op. The 1976-77 season's total reached 18,641,300 pounds, through January 14. Percentage of the offerings consigned to the pool was 9 percent last week, going as high as 10.33 on January 5, first day of sales after the holidays. For the entire 1975-76 season the amount taken under loan was 6.2 percent.

Loan placements from the current season will be a factor in determining the national marketing quota for the 1977 crop, to be announced no later than February 1. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has called a meeting for Friday, January 14, at Lexington, Ky., for growers and the industry to discuss the outlook for burley in relation to production needed to keep supply in line with demand.

The meeting will be at 10 a.m. in the E. S. Good Dairy Barn Auditorium, College of Agriculture, Several USDA tobacco officials from Washington will address the meeting, including Wm. L. Lanier, Robert H. Miller and Robert P. Hieronymus, and others associated with the burley production control and price-support program.

A reduction of 5 per cent was ordered last year, but despite this the 1976 crop was up 1 per cent over the previous year, according to the latest USDA estimate, which put the total at 646 million pounds.

Other developments to be weighed in the 1977 quota fixing: Burley exports up 24 1/2 million lbs., now 92 million in sixth consecutive year of increase.

U.S. cigarette output up 7 1/2 per cent. Burley loan stocks 44 million pounds, as last season placements increased.

Foreign production of burley up sharply in the five Central American countries, also Italy, Korea and Mexico. Reporting recently from Mexico, R.C. (Dick) Travis, the Burley Co-op vice president for export promotion, said production almost doubled there, last year, with burley exports from that country near 50 million pounds. *****

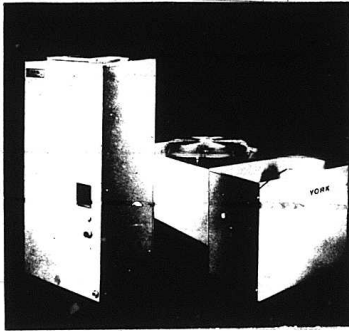

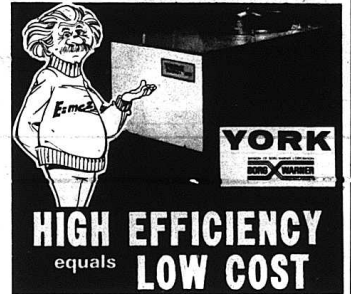

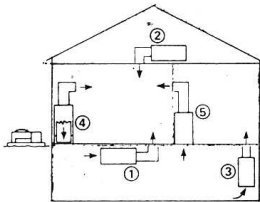

A seminar on pest and vector control will be sponsored for health officials, environmentalists and others at Eastern Kentucky University January 27 by the Kentucky Public Health Association.

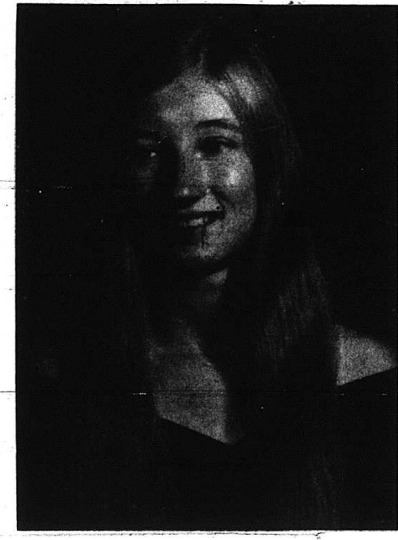

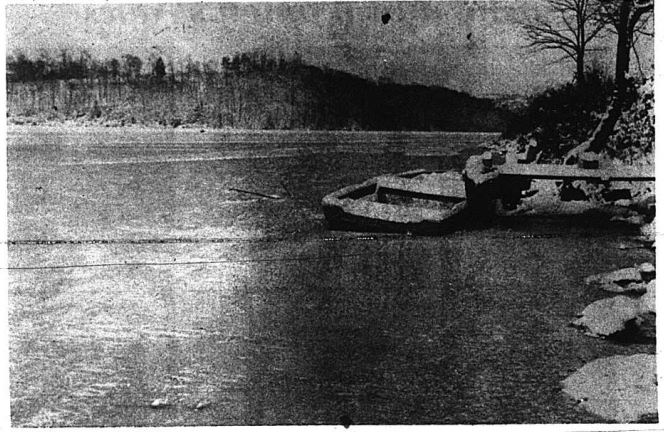

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Five Hours In The Life Of A Policeman

Everyone knows that when the snows come and temperatures drop, the workload for certain members of any community will increase. Highway workers work 18 hour shifts trying to overcome the build-up of snow and ice on our streets and highways. They are greatly overpowered by their forces and there is no humanly possible way that these small armies can successfully combat conditions until nature relents.

Also overworked are the police officers assigned to work any area where road conditions turn suddenly hazardous. Numerous drivers loose control of their automobile and either end up in a ditch or resting against another car. If you have ever wondered what a snowy cold, icy evening is like in a police cruiser, here is a small sample of what they must do. Not included in this report are the numerous small incidents that occurred and were never reported. Cars and trucks were off the roadways in every part of Rockcastle County. This reporter spent one evening riding with Mt. Vernon City Police officer John Grider. Some reports were given by the Kentucky State Police and some were handed by the city police. These are only the major reported incidents of the evening of Thursday, January 6, 1977.

Many thanks to Officer Grider for his cooperation in allowing this reporter to ride with him on that evening. The events are in the order of their occurrence in a 5 hour period from 5:10 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

5:00 p.m. A two car accident occurred on Greenhill Hill north of Mt. Vernon on U.S. 25. An auto owned by Jack Dalley of Mt. Vernon slid into a ditch. Jerry Reed, also of Mt. Vernon, was behind the Dalley auto and when he attempted to miss it, Reed lost control striking the other car. No injuries were reported. State Trooper Roy Wheat investigated.

5:30 p.m. A two car accident occurred on Richmond Street in front of Jerry's Tire Center in Mt. Vernon. Jerry W. Belcher, U.S. Army, Fort Campbell, lost control of his car and slid into a parked auto belonging to James C. Carroll of Mt. Vernon. No injuries were reported and city police John Grider investigated.

5:40 p.m. State Trooper Cletus Brown of Mt. Vernon lost control of his cruiser on ice covered Rose Hill and went over a 6 foot embankment. According to Trooper Brown the cruiser is probably a total loss. He received a laceration on the bridge of his nose but no other injuries. State Trooper Greg Ennis investigated the accident.

6:30 p.m. A one car accident occurred at the corner of Richmond Street and Lovell Lane in Mt. Vernon. James Sheehan of Mt. Vernon lost control of his auto on Richmond Street and struck an electric pole. No injuries resulted. City Police officer John Grider investigated.

7:40 p.m. A two car collision occurred on 175. No details were available except that it was a rear end collision resulting from one auto's inability to stop. The call was received on aradio report and no investigation was made.

8:10 p.m. One of Rockcastle County's ambulances on a code III run attempted to climb town hill. Though equipped with chains it came to a complete stop 50 yards up the hill. The driver backed down and amid sparks flying from the chains, the second attempt was apparently a success.

8:25 p.m. A report came over the radio of a second tractor-trailer jackknifed on 461. The driver apparently escaped injury and no other vehicles were involved. All traffic was advised to stay clear for at least one hour and perhaps longer.

8:30 p.m. An accident apparently has occurred on 175 at the 5 1/2 mile marker. No details were available.

8:35 p.m. The accident on 175 turned out to be a pair of trucks jackknifed on the Rockcastle River Hill. Traffic was completely stopped. No injuries were reported and state police responded, both trucks are in the southbound lane.

8:55 p.m. The temperature has dropped to 31 degrees and the roadways are beginning to freeze solid. Traffic had become much lighter.

9:00 p.m. A trucker has just reported over the C.B. Radio that at least 150 cars were stuck on the Rockcastle River Hill on 175. Numerous salt trucks and snowplows from Rockcastle and Laurel Counties headed for the tie-up to help unplug traffic.

9:10 p.m. Rockcastle Counties Ambulance just returned from town hill. A 3:30 p.m. car with Ohio plates stopped to inform police that a car has spun off the road and is stuck on the median on 175. State Trooper Greg Ennis responded.

9:35 p.m. At least 3 wreckers from Mt. Vernon headed for the traffic tie-up and River Hill. The trucks and trucks backed up has risen to an inestimable number.

10:00 p.m. 2 inches of snow is now on the ground as snow and sleet continue to fall. Mt. Vernon is almost completely empty of traffic.

This is what happened during one five hour period on Thursday, January 6, 1977. School was called off Friday as road and highway conditions continued to get worse as the weekend and into this week. "But I must consider the possibility of this new position as not what is in my best interest, but what is in the best interest of my constituents, the state I represent and the Senate as a whole."

Ford said the present real of the Aeronautics and Space Committee is "too limited" to justify its status as a full committee.

"This committee is a good example of how the Senate's efficiency could be improved by merging its functions with another committee that has jurisdiction in a similar area," he said.

Ford predicted that reorganization would have a "net" impact on the operation of the Senate.
