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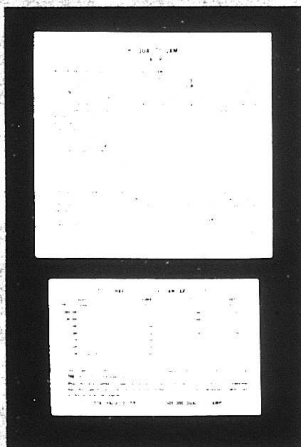

## Pesticide Applicator

### Meeting Scheduled

A federal regulation has been enacted requiring every user of "restricted-use pesticides" to be certified before they can apply the pesticides. Such persons must be certified by October, 1977. By that date all pesticides will be labeled either "restricted" or "general". Many of the pesticides which you now use will be in the "restricted" category and you will not be able to buy or use these pesticides unless you are a certified applicator.

You can become a certified private applicator by attending a "Pesticide Applicator Training Program" on March 8, 1977 (Tuesday) at the Rockcastle County High School Vocational Agriculture classroom at 7:00 p.m. There is no fee or test involved in becoming a private certified applicator; just attend the training session. It will take about 2 1/2 hours of your time so plan your schedule.

## Court Presented With Road Program

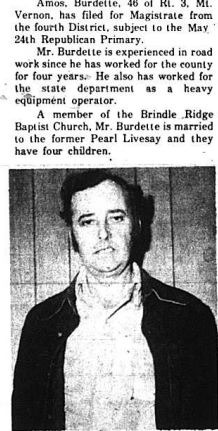

## FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

When Kentuckians go the polls this November they'll find an important statewide question on their ballots. For the fourth time since 1931 Kentucky voters will be asked to give their okay to a constitutional convention.

The three previous calls for a convention met defeat, although each time the deficit was smaller. In 1931 the convention call went down to 97,788 to 28,204; in 1947, by 191,876 to 144,692; and in 1960, by 342,501 to 324,777.

Since the constitutional call had never passed in the twentieth century Governor Edward Breathitt tried in 1966 to circumvent the process. Breathitt presented a revision to the constitution by charter directly to the people. It lost in every county and was smashed statewide by 517,034 to 143,133.

Breathitt's charter might have failed because Kentuckians resented his bypassing the regular path for constitutional revision. In addition, some powerful Kentuckians including former Governor A.B. Chandler and Thelma Stovall opposed it. Stovall, now Lt. Governor, opposes the present call, too.

Following a presidential election could create some problems for those favoring revision. The number voting yes must be 25 per cent of those voting in the previous general election. Getting more than 270,000 yes votes to the polls in an off-year election will be a challenge for those wanting the call.

If the voters approve the call for a convention it doesn't mean Kentucky will get a new constitution. It simply continues a process in which a new charter can be drafted and then submitted to the public for ratification. If the call question passes, in 1978 elections would be held in all 100 state legislative districts for representatives to the constitutional convention.

The convention would have to begin its work within 90 days of the election. The earliest Kentuckians could decide on a new charter would be the general election of 1979.

The call is on the ballot this fall because of the enterprising work of Rep. Joe Clarke, D-Danville. Clarke introduced the constitutional call question in the 1974 legislature and it was approved. The same legislation had to be approved by the 1976 general assembly before the question could go to the public. Governor Julian Carroll has

said he would not oppose a constitutional convention. Clarke's legislation easily passed the recent legislative session.

Kentucky operates under its 1891 constitution. The state has been able to function under the old charter for several reasons. Kentucky has primarily been a rural state with small units of government. The state has a strong governor with wide powers to rule by executive order. Finally, the state's highest court has been flexible in its interpretation of the constitution.

The state, however, is no longer apparent. Our lifestyle is more complex than it was in 1891 and more demands are being placed on local government.

In Louisville, for example, the mayor cannot succeed himself. The ability of the state's largest urban areas to channel tax money into downtown renovation is also limited. For those reasons and others it's no surprise that Louisville Mayor Harvey Sloane and Lexington Mayor Foster Pettit support the call for a constitutional convention.

Ironically, the state high court's ability to be flexible with the old charter might create problems for those wanting a change. The court's flexibility has kept the tight restraints of the present constitution from being seen by the public as a constant headache.

In 1975 Kentucky voters gave their okay to judicial reform. Many political observers believe the court reform question passed only because it was on the ballot with the homestead exemption for the elderly. In 1977 the constitutional call will be the only statewide referendum getting a vote. It will not get help from another issue. **All Kentucky Autos Must Be Inspected**

One of every 18 vehicles inspected in Kentucky during 1976 was found to have at least one mechanical defect, according to a report released here by

state Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts.

The Division of Inspections in the Bureau of Vehicle Regulation reported that 1,751,801 automobiles were inspected during 1976 at more than 3,000 official stations across the state.

Although the number of vehicles inspected increased by 6.8 per cent over 1975, the number of rejected automobiles was up by only 4.2 percent. Archie Craft, director of the Division of Inspections, said the decrease in rejections was most likely caused by the greater care drivers are taking of their automobiles.

As in the past, the most frequent cause of rejection was a faulty exhaust system. Other common defects included faulty turn signals, tires-tail lights, stop lights, head lights and windshield wipers.

Kentucky law requires that every motor vehicle registered in the state be inspected once a year. Official inspection lanes are found at service stations, repair garages and automobiles dealers. Owners pay \$2 for the inspection. If the vehicle passes, the inspector marks it with a sticker good for one year. If it fails, the owner must have the defects repaired.

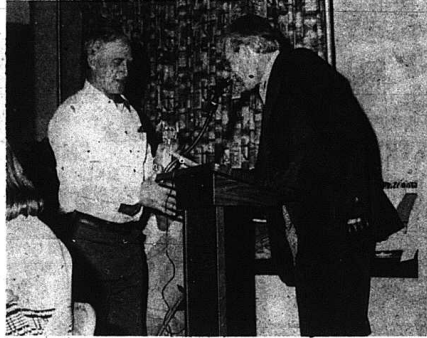

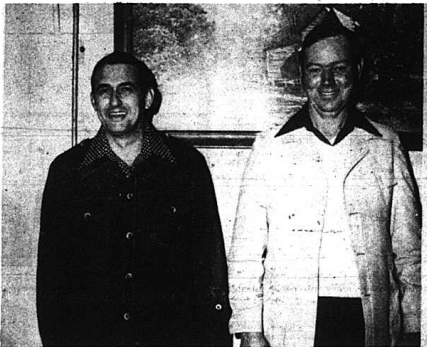

### Cost of Utilities Will Continue to Increase

Utilities will continue to ask the state Public Service Commission (PSC) to approve rate increases unless national action is taken to stabilize the energy situation, Barkley Sturgill, PSC chairman, said today.

Sturgill, speaking at a meeting of the Interim Committee on Public Utilities and Transportation, said inflation, environmental protection costs, a shortage of energy and lack of national energy policy have resulted in requests for utility rate increases.

"There will be continued rate cases," Sturgill said, adding, "this is a national picture." The PSC conducted 61 hearings during the last two months.

In response to questioning from committee members, Sturgill said he has "no way of knowing" what fuel rates will (Cont. to 12)

# Mental Health Matters

## Emotional Disturbance In Children

Ten years or more ago emotional disturbance in children was being identified and treated at ages of 8-9 and upward. Today, as a result of research and study we know that the symptoms of emotional disturbances can be detected in the infant and young child.

When a so-called normal child lags behind or departs too far from the norm in his social or emotional behavior, the problem may be an emotional or behavioral disturbance. Such problems are often rooted in the first few months of life, but not discovered before the age of two-and-one-half, three or even later

for several reasons. The family may think or be reassured by others that the child will not outgrow the problem or that their influence on the child has caused the problem. They are afraid professional will confirm their feelings of guilt about the situation.

To improve the ability of all people to prevent or understand emotional disturbance in the very young, we need education in the areas of normal growth and development of children and the ways in which normal emotional processes can be upset. A child's environment plays a unique and critical role in his emotional and social development.

## Kentucky Afield

An increasing number of fishermen are discovering that angling success can sometimes depend as much on a good map as on the right lure. Particularly among bass fishermen, the ability to locate "structure" areas in deep water is becoming as important a skill as accurate casting.

The emphasis today is on pinpoint fishing because of fairly recent discoveries that bass do tend to concentrate in certain areas of the lake, and that they remain in these "holding areas" except for infrequent feeding forays along the shoreline.

Ninety per cent of the bass will generally be grouped in about 10 per cent of the lake. So it's obvious that the angler can locate that 10 per cent way ahead of the fishermen who blindly cast the shoreline, hoping to find the bass there.

An indispensable tool of the "structure" fisherman is a detailed map which shows the contours of the lake bottom. With such a map, the experienced angler can have a fairly good idea of where he wants to fish before he even gets to the lake.

Once on the water, he'll probably use his map, in conjunction with a depth finder, to locate such "structures" as old road beds, creek channels, submerged timber, drop offs and other areas of the lake bottom that are potential bass hot spots. And after a day's fishing, a good map can sometimes come in really handy for finding the way back to the dock.

However, finding good contour maps of lakes can be difficult. The best maps for just about any outdoor pursuit are the U.S. Geological Survey's 7 1/2

minute quadrangle maps. These maps have a large scale (one inch represents 2,000 feet) and are extremely detailed.

But the fisherman who shoots off a order for these maps may be disappointed. Instead of showing underwater contours for his favorite lake, the map may indicate the body of water only in blue outline form. Up until fairly recently, the USGS revised its maps soon after the impoundment of man-made lakes, taking into the contours of the lake bottom.

Now, however, the maps are being re-revised to show underwater contours, but the process is a slow one. To find out what is currently available for Kentucky write to the Map Sales Section, Department of Commerce, 133 Holmes St., Frankfort, Ky. 40601. The folks there will furnish you a list showing the map status of 25 lakes in the state, along with prices and ordering information.

For fishermen wanting maps of Laurel and Cave Run Lakes, Map Sales has a supply of maps made before the lakes were impounded. It's fairly easy (although time consuming) to trace the outline of the lake on these maps, and the resulting map will show the locations of former house sites, old roads and other features not found on newer maps.

The same process of finding old maps and tracing the-lake outline will work with other bodies of water but the maps must be obtained from a different source, since the Department of Commerce does not stock other out of print maps.

A card to the Map Information Office, U.S. Geological Survey National Center, Sharshe Valley Drive, Reston,

VA. 22092 will connect you with the source for out of print maps. Tell them the name of the lake you're interested in and the state and counties where it's located. Be sure to specify your interest in bottom contour maps.

The USGS will tell you if the maps you need are available and what the charges are for reproducing them for you. The cost will probably be higher than the \$1.25 charge for current maps.

## Consumer Comment

The American dream of self-employment which produces great personal profits still has an enormous appeal for many people. The dream itself is fine, but it can be manipulated by unscrupulous business promoters to exploit and defraud consumers. The American dream can easily become the American nightmare.

The nightmare often begins with the following advertisement: "Excellent opportunity. No selling. Only 4-10 hours weekly, with complete company training and location set-up. Make up to \$12,000 per year. Investment of \$600-\$5,900. Call Mr. Smith." An ad like this can attract a lot of attention. The investment is significant, but not overwhelming. The work involved seems minimal. The potential profits claimed are extraordinary. In short, this seems like a golden business opportunity. But is it?

If you call Mr. Smith, you may be given a pitch which is fairly routine for such business opportunity proposals. You may be told you will sell Mr. Smith's products or make products which his company will buy back from you, or for which a certain market will be guaranteed. Mr. Smith's company will help you set up an accounting, production, or distribution system. You will have to make an initial, sizeable investment, usually in the form of cash or a cashier's or certified check, in order to set everything else in motion.

Before an interested party signs even one piece of paper connected with Mr. Smith's company, he or she should thoroughly investigate the business. Ask Mr. Smith for business, financial, trade association, and other customer references which you can check. Find out how long the company has been established and the quality of its business reputation. Check with the chamber of commerce, the Better Business Bureau, and the state and local consumer protection agencies.

Ask what you get for your initial investment. If the investment is guaranteed, ask how it is guaranteed and check on the strength of this assurance. If your personal check is

refused and your money is demanded in the form of cash or a certified or cashier's check, this will tell you immediately that you are dealing with someone who "is more interested in getting your money than in establishing a good business relationship with you. Don't forget that once your cash or a certified or cashier's check is put in Mr. Smith's hands, it may be almost impossible to get it back. However, you may be able to stop payment on a personal check, if something goes wrong.

The mere fact that your money is demanded before Mr. Smith does anything should make you take a serious second thought about any further negotiations.

If a particular sales or "exclusive" territory is guaranteed, find out how many other salesmen are in the same area. Look into the marketing possibilities in your area or the area Mr. Smith proposes as the market or outlet for your products. You should also ask about the presence of a permanent, well-established company representative in your area.

The profit claims should also be examined and analyzed very closely. Can the company verify the details of the profit claims? Does the proposal state the writing the time it will take to produce the claimed return? What is the success record of others who have invested in this particular company? Insist upon being furnished with names and addresses of other investors. If your request is refused, then you should seriously question any further negotiations.

You should not sign any binding legal documents until all of these questions have been answered satisfactorily. Give the proposed investment your serious consideration and don't rush into any agreements about which you lack any important information. It may be wise to check with an attorney about the advisability of the business opportunity offer and the quality and fairness of the documents involved.

If you have a consumer complaint, write to the Office of the Attorney General, Division of Consumer Protection, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. The office has found that it can most effectively deal with written complaints and encourages you to write when you have a complaint. However, if you have an emergency situation, call the Consumer Hotline at 1-800-372-2960.

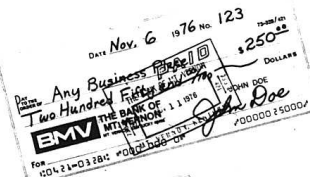

Other Rockets scoring were: Harmon, 11; Durham, 8; Browning, 8; Burdette, 3 and Nugent, 2.

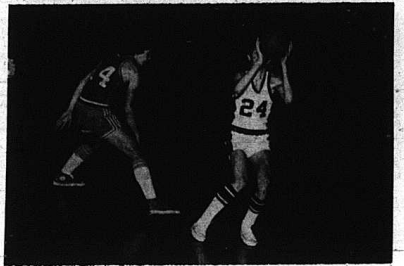

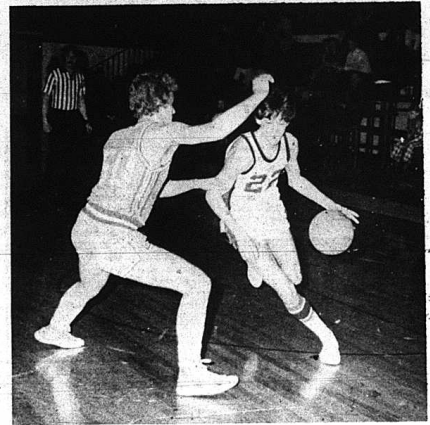

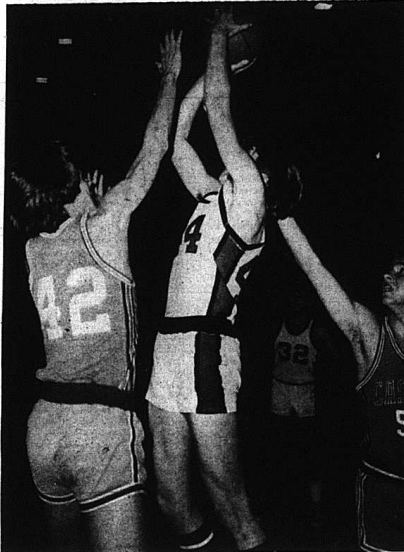

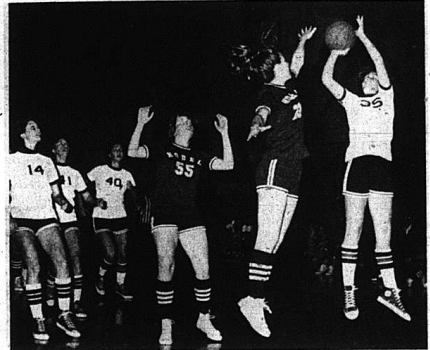

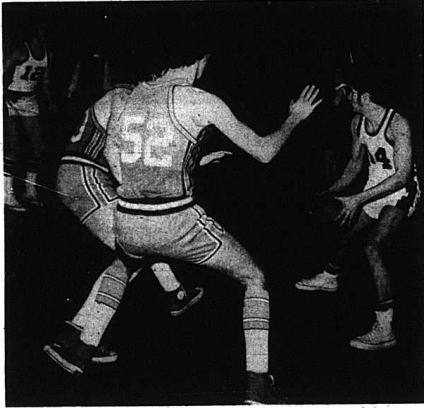
Jack Farthing, No. 22, drives for a lay-up against a Casey Co. defender in the B-Team game. Farthing had five points on the night.

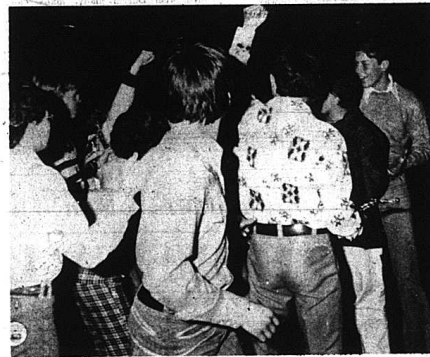
