Kentucky Afield

Kentucky's deer hunters need to plan ahead—especially those who like to hunt on one or more of the wildlife management areas or military posts which require advance reservations.

Four popular deer hunting areas, in addition to a new deer area this year, require that hunters participate in drawings to determine who gets to hunt, or in some cases when. So if you want to hunt in one of these areas, circle the application dates on your calendar so you won't forget them.

But don't get too anxious either. Four of these areas won't accept applications before certain dates, so being early is just as bad as being late.

To be considered, an application must be received within the specified time frame.

The Ballard County Wildlife Management Area, in far western Kentucky, will be opened to deer hunting for the first time in many years. This area has a good deer population—too good, in fact. Biologists want to reduce the deer herd size to lessen the chances of disease and overbrowsing, so six weekend hunts will be conducted there, three with firearms and three with bow and arrow.

The dates for the gun hunts are Oct. 21 and 22, Oct. 28 and 29, Nov. 5 and 6. The archery hunts will be held Oct. 16 and 17, Oct. 23 and 24 and Oct. 30 and 31. Applications for the drawing to determine who will hunt (each two-day

hunt in limited to 120 hunters) will be accepted by letter during the period between July 1 and July 14 only.

Mail the application (more than one from an individual will disqualify that applicant) to: Manager, Ballard County Wildlife Management Area, Rt. 1, LaCenter, Ky. 42056. Write "archery" or "gun" in the lower left corner of the envelope, and enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

Letters must contain the name of each applicant (limit 2), address, age, telephone number, hunting license number, method of hunting (gun or bow) and first, second and third choice hunting dates. All persons submitting applications will be notified whether or not they were successful in the drawing. Those whose names were drawn will have 14 days to mail back the \$10 fee.

At the Higginson-Henry Wildlife Management Area (Union County), the

gun deer hunt will be held Nov. 15 and 16. Applications are required for gun hunting and requests will be accepted only between Aug. 13 and noon September 3. Requests received before or after these dates will be discarded. Mail requests for application to: Manager Higginson-Henry Wildlife Management Area, Rt. 5, Morganfield, Ky. 42347. All requests for applications must be accompanied by a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

At Land Between the Lakes in Western Kentucky, applications for gun hunts (Nov. 7, 11, 16 and 19) and for the special youth hunt (Nov. 5) must be postmarked no later than midnight, Aug. 10. You can write for an application for the computerized drawing to: Kentucky Deer Hunt, Land Between the Lakes, Golden Pond, Ky. 42231. LBL will also send you a complete rundown of their drawing regulations, which often

differ greatly than statewide rules.

Those wishing to hunt at Ft. Knox during the Dec. 3, 4, 10 and 11 gun season should mail their applications between Sept. 6, and Sept. 16. Bow hunting will be permitted on Oct. 1 through Oct. 31, and applications for archery permits must be received between Sept. 1 and Aug. 20. Separate applications are required for each hunt, and each application must be accompanied by a \$10 certified check or money order payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Mail applications to: Fort Knox Conservation and Beautification Committee, P.O. Box 1062, Ft. Knox, Ky. 40121.

The Bluegrass Army Depot, Madison County, will hold both gun hunts (Dec. 3, 4 and 17) and bow hunts (Oct. 15, 16, 29 and 30) this year. Applications must be postmarked no earlier than Aug. 15 and no later than

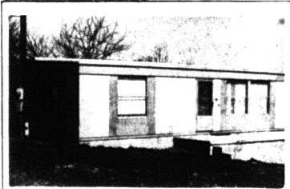
Sept. 15. More than one application from an individual will disqualify that hunter. Applications must be mailed on a postcard and include name of hunter (one person only), address, age, telephone number, and method of hunting (gun and archery). The depot charges a \$10 fee, payable only after hunter is notified of his election and specific hunting date.

Ft. Campbell (Christian and Trigg Counties), generally does not announce specific details of its reservation procedure until sometimes in September. Hunters wishing to visit this installation should write directly to: Hunting and Fishing Unit, Outdoor Recreation Branch, Ft. Campbell, Ky. 42223.

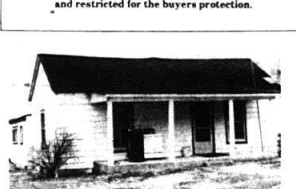

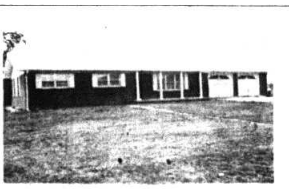

Gregory Carries County Two Incumbent Magistrates Lose; Mason and Cromer Win

Rockcastle County voters failed to respond to a call for unity from Mt. Vernon Attorney William D. Gregory resulting in a victory for incumbent Representative William Harold DeMarcus of Stanford.

Gregory carried Rockcastle County by 370 votes. However, DeMarcus' margin in Lincoln County was 994. In addition, 5 Pulaski County precincts voted for DeMarcus by 823 votes.

Incumbent County Judge Hubert Thacker won re-election and will be the first County Judge Executive in Rockcastle County. Thacker held off six opponents and tallied 28% of the total votes cast in that race.

The Sheriff's race was not as close as some in the county had counted on Henry Lee Abney finished on top in the race with 1062 votes.

The Jailer's race never even got close as Billy Kirby walked away with 2081 votes. With four other candidates running, Kirby received almost 57% of the total votes cast for Jailer.

In the second district, incumbent J.R. "Boone" Cromer won re-election after a tight race with Leonard "Rogee" Hammond.

Hammond, the see-saw race ended with Cromer receiving 384 votes to Hammond's 331. Two other candidates finished a distant 3rd and 4th.

Ben Carpenter won nomination in the 5th district with 219 votes. The difference between 2nd and 3rd in that race was almost non-existent with Mac Warf receiving 186 votes to Fred

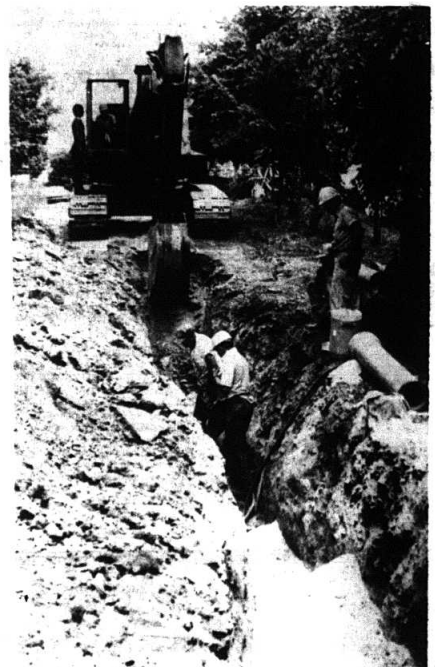

Down On The Farm

We in the cattle business face a key choice in the future price of our cattle. And that is the beef referendum vote set by the Secretary of Agriculture pursuant to the Beef Research and Information Act, Public Law 94-294 (7 U.S.C. 2901). The referendum vote will be held July 5 through 15, 1977. But in order to be eligible to vote you must register.

You can register at the Rockcastle County ASCS Offices at the Courthouse in Mt. Vernon, from June 6 through June 17, 1977. Registration and voting may be in person or by mail. Request for forms may be in person, by mail or by telephone. A producer may request both the registration card and the ballot at one time.

Any individual, group of individuals, association, cooperative, corporation, partnership, or any other entity that owned one or more cattle between January 1, 1976 through December 31, 1976.

Each producer entity shall be entitled to cast only one ballot. The plans call for the setting up of a national research and information program for beef.

Producers, themselves, are to have complete control of the program through a 68-member beef board made up entirely of cattlemen.

The program is to be funded through an automatic collection of three-tenths of 1 percent of cattle sales base on a "value added" system so each producer pays his fair share. However, the program is voluntary produces can request a refund and get it promptly.

Cattle producers are optimistic that the plan will be voted into action. Producers must work together to build a more profitable future. Nobody's going to do it for them. When you boil it down, it's a question of whether we control our own future in the cattle industry of someone else controls it for us.

Beef producers, think who you want to control beef prices "Down on the Farm."

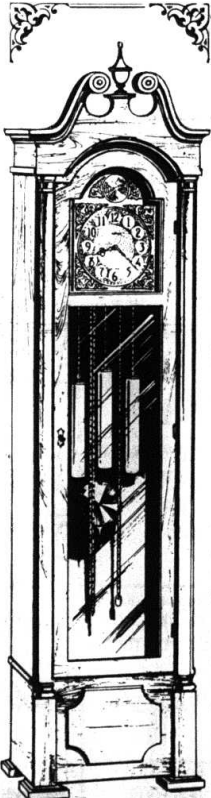

Expected To Enroll in SCC Summer Session

Mr. Raymond Miller, admissions officer at Somerset Community College, reports three major factors contributing to the expected enrollment.

"First," says Miller, "many students want to get a jump on next year's work by taking two or three courses in the summer to accelerate their program or to lighten their load next fall." He explained that many students who plan to go to college elsewhere come to Somerset Community College while they hold down a summer job. "Classes taken here are fully transferable to other colleges and universities," he said.

A second reason for the expected enrollment says Miller, is that many students are having difficulty finding full time summer employment. "Rather than waste the summer, these students enroll in classes. Many students are qualified to receive financial assistance while enrolled," he said.

"Finally," explained the admissions officer, "a number of students are unsure of their plans of whether or not to attend college and the summer gives them an

opportunity to test their abilities." He reported that several classes which are being offered are designed to assist students to overcome areas in which they are weak such as composition, reading, and math.

Registration for summer classes is scheduled for Wednesday, June 15, from 9 a.m. until 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the College.



Home Line

As everyone knows, one good way of controlling your weight and helping to get rid of excess fat is through exercise. However, you don't have to wait until you start sporting multiple chins or buying your clothes from Omar the Tentmaker to begin a regular exercise program.

Besides helping take off weight and trim muscles, a personal physical fitness program is the best way of encouraging good health, physical and mental, reports the Health Insurance Institute.

One of the simplest ways of practicing do-it-yourself preventive medicine, doctors advise, is walking 2 miles a day, or 40 city blocks. Cardiologists explain that since leg muscles account for about 30 percent of the blood's circulation, a regular regimen of walking as well as other leg exercises helps clear the veins and prevents formation of blood clots.

Such regular exercises as calisthenics, jogging and swimming, will improve both strength and heart function, advise doctors who link diseases of the heart and blood vessels to inactivity as well as obesity.

Another benefit of such "stretching" activities as swimming, jogging or tennis is that they will relieve tensions after a day's work. "Stretching" in form of exercise or sports is the best way of getting rid of stress.

Exercise can also act as a tranquilizer. A recent university of California study notes a significant increase in chronic depression among people participating in a six week exercise course. The University's research also found that 54 percent of the participants improved their sleeping habits following the physical fitness program.

If you can't find time for tennis, swimming or jogging, another way to make the day's work easier to face in the morning is to skip rope, according to Murray State University study. The same level of fitness can be achieved in 10 minutes of jumping rope as in 30 minutes of jogging, the study found.

Some rules to keep in mind about exercise and active sports, especially for those out of shape or over 60; avoid fast, exhausting activities unless your doctor finds you in shape for these. Before any strenuous exercise, stay away from food for about three hours and from alcohol for at least an hour. Take regular rest breaks. After exercising take a tepid shower. Jumping into a cold pool or cold shower may affect your blood pressure adversely.

Best time to exercise? Ideally, in the late afternoon. Thirty minutes to an hour a day is a good workout. Contrary to some common notions, exercise does not necessarily spur the appetite. Most importantly, it may help relieve the mind and prolong life.

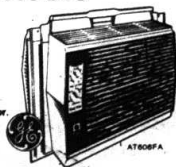

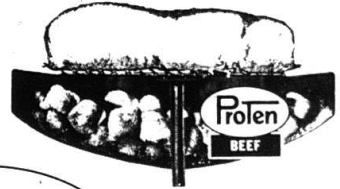

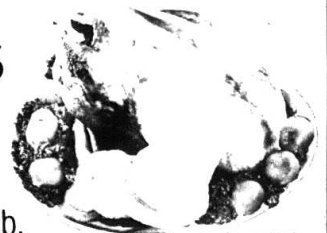

working with a small crew, he suggests pulling plants in the early morning and transplanting later in the same day.

Transplants need plenty of water to survive - 250 to 300 gallons per acre, according to Smiley. He cautions growers not to use river or creek water that is likely to be contaminated by disease-causing organisms. Draw transplanter water from ponds and springs that are free from contamination.

Extra care is needed during hot weather to prevent severe dehydration damage to transplants. When the temperature is 90 degrees or above, growers should delay transplanting until the weather cools off or transplant only during the late afternoon or early evening.

Set Date for Beef Cattle Field Day

A beef cattle field day will be held July 12 at the University of Kentucky's Coldstream Farm two miles north of Lexington where beef cattle research is being conducted.

The field day will give Kentucky beef cattle producers an opportunity to tour the research facilities and to obtain the results of projects completed or underway. The program will also include discussions of transplanting and trends in beef cattle production.

The event is sponsored by the Animal Science Department of the UK College of Agriculture. Research and extension staff members will be on hand to answer specific questions cattlemen may have about their own operations.

Tobacco - Pythium Soft Rot

In some years, about a week after setting, tobacco plants suddenly wilt and die. When affected plants are removed from the ground they have a soft watery rot of the buried stem. The disease is caused by a soil-borne species of Pythium, one of the fungi responsible for damping-off of seedlings - of many different plants.

The disease is more prevalent and destructive when the weather is cool and damp following setting. It is more likely to occur in fields where the decay of cover crops or other organic matter has not been complete. These conditions appear favorable for the multiplication and buildup of Pythium in the soil. If the number of diseased plants is high, possibly 10 to 15 percent, the field

should be disked and reset. The new rows should be placed in the middles between the old, disease ones.

Fly Control

Dairyman should be planning a fly-control program, because lack of fly control can reduce milk production from 10 to 40%. The first step in fly control is eliminating breed places. Manure should be cleaned up and spread on fields regularly. Be sure to clean around corners and fence posts and don't neglect manure piles around calf and heifer sheds. Large numbers of flies can breed

in small amounts of manure. Daily residual type spraying is difficult, but there are many dust-dispersing and oil dispensing devices which can be placed where all cows must walk through at each milking. Insecticide concentrates that can be mixed with water and applied weekly are a possibility for use to supplement dust and oil application devices. For heifers on pasture, dust bags and back rubbers in conjunction with regular group spraying, using water mixed sprays, give effective control. Insecticide recommendations are available at all county extension

offices. Fly control is possible, but the important thing is action. Lack of a systematic action program results in average to low production in this as in other areas of dairy management.

There are goats in Tennessee and Mississippi that actually fall into a dead faint at any loud sound—a thunderclap, an engine starting up, even the clatter of a feed bucket. The cause is not cowardice, however, but an inherited nerve disorder.
