

Several Rockcastle, families have given me much trouble in searching out their past-none more than my own. Of these it has been especially difficult to hook up loose ends and arrive at definite conclusions concerning the Lawreiness. Perenthes Crawfords and Lawreiners, the hope that some reader of the Signal can add something to what is already known and will be kind enough to pass this knowledge along to me.

I am now engaged on the third approach to the origin and history of John Czawford, who married Elizabeth Adams-only daughter of "Devil Bill" Adams and Rebecea Lawrence. I hope to acquire a copy of this in due time.

years old.

Now he reports finding in Rockeastle tax records a John Crawford living in Rockeastle County in 1830 and married to Elizabeth Adams. This is undoubtedly the John Crawford we are looking for, but he was not a son of Dr. Adams Crawford. Could he have been a brother or whom the doctor name his son born in 1824?
