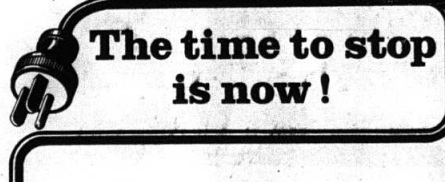

School Board Meets

Bids were submitted on 5 #6 items for which bids were advertised and opened at a routine meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education. Virco Man, Co. which operates out of Conway, Arkansas was awarded a contract to furnish Kindergarten which will be opening in the county elementary schools this fall. Total cost of the furniture is \$2,806.25. This breaks down to \$561.25 per classroom for 5 rooms. Institutional distributors of East Bernstadt will supply a few dishwashers for the Livingston School at a cost of \$3,996.84. Other contracts awarded were: Cecil Tuttle of Mt. Sterling, Yearbook for RCHS, \$478.06; L. J. Ballour, Louisville, class rings for RCHS, cost depends on ring size and type; janitorial supplies, Thompson Sanitary Supplies, Lexington and Kenway Chemical Supplies, Louisville. The two companies will split the contract because each had low bids on various products. There was approval for the suggested purchase of 45 used panel buses for pupil transportation. This is designed to lower transportation costs to some extent.

Cummins, Bige Towery and Pauline Mullins. A new policy was approved to allow non-certified to carry forward unused days of sick leave from the 1976-77 school year. In the past, this had been done only for certified personnel. Norton Insurance Agency of Mt. Vernon will be carrying bonds on School Board Employees for Fiscal Year '78. Total cost of the bonds will be \$699.00. Lloyd's Sureties, treasurer, will be bonded for \$25,000. Others are Barbara Thacker, \$2,000; Ronnie Mink, \$2,000; Blanch Baldwin, \$2,000; Jerry Nunnelly, \$2,000; and Ronnie Cash, \$3,000. Other items of business which were included: approval of checkwriting policy; approval of a GED certificate for Larry R. Kirby and approval of a Kentucky Plan for Improvement of Professional Performance of School Personnel.

Two Ton Sundae?

If Agriculture Commissioner Tom Harris has his way, June Dairy Month activities in Kentucky will see a new wrinkle this year. Registration for a kick-off luncheon in Lexington, Harris announced tentative plans for a June Dairy Celebration in Frankfort, on June 22, featuring a dairy products lunch topped off with 4,000 pounds of the world's largest ice cream sundae.

Harris acknowledged that state health authorities have some reservations about the 2-ton sundae, but invited the public to attend all the festivities at the Capital Plaza Sportscenter. In other dairy-related news, official approval has been given for a referendum among Grade A dairymen in Kentucky on doubling the current milk promotion assessment, from 4 cents to 8 cents per 100 pounds.

More than half the state's 3,600 Grade A producers already deduct the 8 cents through the Dairymen, Inc. marketing cooperative, officials say. Passage of the ball ballot referendum, scheduled for the third week in June, would equalize assessments and bring in an additional \$100,000 per year to the American Dairy Association of Kentucky.

STATE CAN AID WEATHER PREPAREDNESS

Preparedness is the key for dealing with another severe winter, like the one just past, Kentucky Farm Bureau Information Director Paul Everman told a Frankfort conference on the economic impact of "Winter '77". The conference was called by Gov. Julian Carroll to formulate state government's plans to deal with future outbreaks of harsh weather. Everman proposed that the state develop a broad, comprehensive informational program on preparedness, utilizing the scientific and technical expertise of the University of Kentucky.

Register for Referendum

The second and final week of registration for the national beef referendum began Monday, June 6th and ends Friday, June 17th. Rockcastle County producers can register at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office in Mt. Vernon, then return the first two full weeks of July to cast their votes. At stake is the beef research and information plan a producer's self-help to strengthen beef markets here and abroad, increase research to solve beef industry problems, and improve communications throughout the cattle business. The plan would be funded by a 30 cent per \$100 deduction on all cattle sales, but any producer who does not want to participate can get a prompt refund. If a producer does not register by June 17th, he can't vote in the referendum," according to Roy G. Brown, Mt. Vernon. "This is a major decision for the cattle industry, and each producer should participate. Any legitimate cattle producer is eligible to register and vote. There is no age limit.

Ambulance Service to be Moved to Hospital if Approved by CETA

The Rockcastle County Ambulance Service will be moving its base to the Rockcastle County Hospital by June 20 if a new plan conceived by the Hospital Board of Directors works as planned. A contract between the fiscal court and the hospital was signed at Tuesday's regular court meeting. The contract provides for the relocation of the ambulances and ambulance personnel to the hospital grounds. They will be based in a temporary facility until a permanent base can be built. If CETA approves the plan the service will be upgraded and supervised by hospital personnel. The service, at this time, is considered substandard by Federal Standards. This is primarily due to lack of training and supervision. The department head for the service will be supplied by the hospital, he will be responsible for compulsory teaching and in-service training of ambulance attendants and drivers. The program will be overseen by one of the local physicians. The hospital will employ ambulance personnel for hospital duties when they are not on duty in addition, though the hospital will not have the authority to

fire attendants, they reserve the right to return unfit personnel for placement elsewhere in county jobs. financial support will continue to come from the county for service. The funds will supplement fees collected by the service. Dispatching of ambulances as well as billing and collecting will be handled by the hospital staff. Property Valuation Administrator Robert Cromer announced to the Fiscal Court that the state will begin mapping

Rockcastle County. Three state employees will be brought to the county and they will be assisted by 10-12 local people who will be hired for the project. Mopping will begin July 15 and is expected to take about 16 months. The county will be responsible for office space for the project during that period. They will be operating out of the basement of the new Gregory building in Mt. Vernon.

City Council Holds Public Hearing; Approves Option for Elderly Housing Site

The Mt. Vernon City Council held its second public hearing concerning a Community Development grant on Tuesday, May 31.

The grant was applied for to build an elderly housing project in Mt. Vernon. Preliminary application of the project has been approved pending the selection of a suitable site.

Full application for the \$26,000 grant will be submitted in the near future to purchase property now owned by Ralph Sigmon, one site is 1.8 acres located behind city hall. An option has been prepared by the city for \$10,000.

Other sites that were originally being considered were a lot at the corner of Main and Richmond Streets where an abandoned house stands and a lot belonging to Clarence Carter behind his home. Both were ruled too small for the project by HUD engineers.

William James represented a group of Mt. Vernon businessmen who have been searching for solutions to Mt. Vernon's growing traffic problem. He suggested that a traffic light be installed at the corner of Main and Richmond Streets, something that has been tried in

the past, and another traffic light in front of the Western Auto Store on Richmond St. James also suggested that the street running from Richmond St. in front of Central Body Shop be improved and widened as well as a stop light beside the post office.

Assistant Police Chief John Grider told the Council that police will walk a beat on Main St. in the business district at least twice each shift. The purpose of walking will be to prevent groups from gathering in the downtown area. If the groups fail to disperse, they will be charged with illegal assembly.

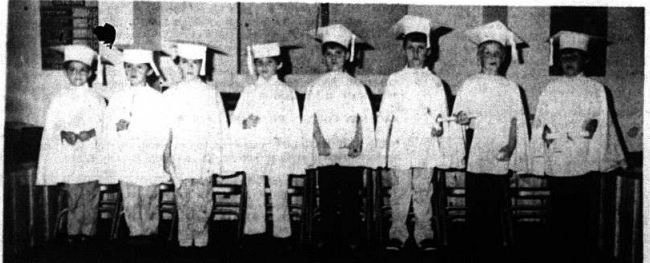

Frankfort Watchline

It seems certain some of our laws are going to be rewritten as a result of the deadly Beverly Hills Supper Club fire.

State Police Commissioner Ken Bradenburgh is conducting a special probe of the fire for Governor Julian Carroll. The governor says the kind of legislation he'll recommend to the 1978 legislature depends on what the commissioner's investigation reveals.

The governor has already said he wants sprinkler systems required for all buildings, regardless of their age, in which large numbers of people gather. The Beverly Hills did not have a sprinkler, because the building was constructed before the state fire code was revised earlier in this decade to require sprinklers in large buildings. The law was not retroactive.

The General Assembly's Health and Welfare Committee wants to question those state officials who are conducting the investigation for the governor. The committee will likely consider revisions in the state's fire code.

The legislature's Cities Committee has the responsibility for the laws pertaining to building codes and construction. The committee has been looking at construction problems since 1974.

Investigators for the insurance company which insures Beverly Hills say sparks from a shorted power cord caused the blaze which took more than 160 lives. The cord provided power for a pump which was used in a decorative water fountain.

The governor's office, though, was quick to discount the insurance company's findings. Carroll's news secretary, John Nichols, said the team of insurance investigators "had no official role whatsoever."

Finding the cause of the fire, and strengthening the state's building and fire codes might not be enough to satisfy some lawmakers and a growing segment of the public.

During the recent Health and Welfare Committee meeting, Rep. Larry Hopkins, R-Lexington, called for "those responsible for the fire" to be charged with manslaughter. The assumption had been made that "someone" is to blame for what happened. That "someone" is guilty because he or she took a payoff; was victim of political clout; or was just incompetent.

Suspicion surrounds the tragedy. Recent developments in Frankfort and at the scene of the fire have done nothing to remove any nagging doubts.

Sen. Tom Easterly, D-Frankfort, is one lawmaker with his doubts about the responsibility for the fire. Easterly told the Health and Welfare Committee that he had visited Beverly Hills only last December. He said it took him 30 minutes to leave the building. He says he took his concern to Warren Southworth, Southworth is the state fire marshal.

"I know it's bad, Tom. I know it's dangerous," Easterly quotes Southworth as telling him. "But, I have the material here to cover me in case anything ever happens up there," Easterly says this is a case of a dedicated public official, Southworth who has tried to do his duty, but has been hamstrung by someone higher up than he is.

Easterly admits he doesn't know whom that "someone" is.

The response to Easterly's comment from the governor's office was quick. Sen. Easterly just misunderstood what Southworth said. There were hints the hamstrung really occurred during a previous administration. "Not so," says Easterly, who is standing by his story.

When confronted with Easterly's comments, Southworth said he could not recall the meeting with Easterly or the specific conversation. Those who saw Southworth testify, here and here on national television before fleeing reporters could not have had their suspicion eased about the state's involvement in the tragedy.

Easterly's charge that it was general knowledge the building was "a death trap" received support from three Cincinnati architects. They claim the supper club did not have enough exits. The architects say the Cabaret Room should have had, not four, but ten exits.

The buildings architect defends his structure saying it was 60 percent more fire safe than state law requires.

The immediate cause of the fire will ultimately be discovered. Laws will be changed. Promises made. But for thousands of Kentuckians who lost friends and relatives, that might not be enough.

lung benefits?
1) the miner has or did have, if he died, black lung, or a respiratory or pulmonary impairment; 2) the condition totally disables the miner or did at the time of his death or caused his death; 3) the condition was caused by his working in the nation's coal mines.

How are Total Disability And Black Lung Proven?

A miner is considered totally disabled when he is unable to engage in his immediate geographic area in gainful work which would require skills and abilities similar to those he previously used in the mines. The impairment must be expected to last for at least a year or to result in death. The test for disability for Black Lung Benefits is different than that for Social Security Disability in that it relates specifically to mining work.

X-rays and breathing tests, and autopsy, are the usual methods for proving black lung and disability. Biopsies are rare but permitted. Other evidence such as blood gas studies, electrocardiograms, physician's reports, and a spouse's sworn statement may also be considered. There is no time that a miner must have worked in or around the mines, but generally he will have an easier time proving disability if he worked fifteen years or more.

BLACK LUNG
What is the black lung benefits Program?

The Black Lung Benefits Program is a federal program enacted in 1969 and expanded in 1972 to compensate coal miners who have been totally disabled by black lung disease (pneumoconiosis). It also provides benefits to these miners' dependents and survivors. Management of the program was transferred from the Social Security Administration to the Department of Labor on July 1, 1973.

Who can apply for black lung benefits?
1) Disabled miners; 2) widows of miners or a surviving divorced wife of a miner providing that she had not remarried; 3) miners' children under eighteen years of age, or under twenty three, if he or she remains in school, or miners' children who were disabled prior to age 18 or prior to age 23 while a student; 4) parents of a miner who were totally supported by the miner; 5) brothers and sisters of a miner whose parents are dead and who were totally supported by the miner.

Applicants for Black Lung benefits under the Social Security Administration who were denied may submit a new application to the Department of Labor.

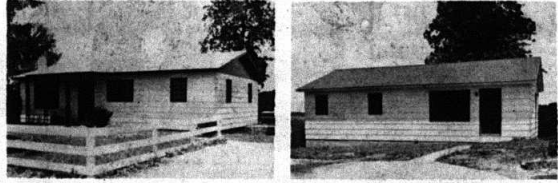

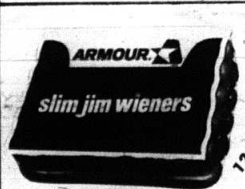
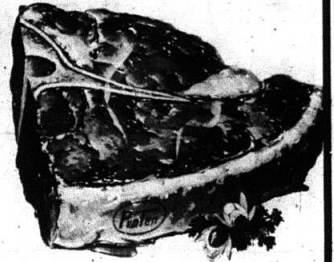

Rockcastle Recollections

By John Lair

Several Rockcastle families have given me much trouble in searching out their past—more than my own. Of these it has been especially difficult to hook up loose ends and arrive at definite conclusions concerning the Lawrences, Frenches, Crawfords and Lavenders. This resume of known facts is given in the hope that some reader of the Signal can add something to what is already known and will be kind enough to pass this knowledge along to me.

I am now engaged on the third approach to the origin and history of John Crawford, who married Elizabeth Adams—only daughter of "Devil Bill" Adams and Rebecca Lawrence. I first considered him as a possible descendant of Colonel William Crawford, boyhood companion and lifelong friend of George Washington, who taught him surveying and had him run out several tracts for him in pioneer Kentucky. This was the same William Crawford who died such a horrible and long prolonged death under Indian torture when his army was routed by them in the area of Upper Sandusky. There are a few more gruesome accounts in history than that given of this event in a book written by an eyewitness, a copy of which is in my library.

One thing which led us to believe that the Rockcastle Crawfords might possibly be descended from this man was the similarity in family names mentioned. He had a brother named Valentine, a fairly unusual name for a man, and W.T. "Mode" Crawford remembered a "Valentine" in his family background. This Valentine Crawford who was a brother of Col. William was also a surveyor, and several years ago W.T. Crawford and other Crawford heirs were notified that many thousand acres of unclaimed land issued to Valentine Crawford would be reclaimed by the State of Kentucky within a specified time, and they showed up within a specified time.

Much of this was coal land in the Kentucky Mountains, which has since become extremely valuable. W.T. Crawford had a sister named Effie. Col. William Crawford had a daughter who had the same name spelled and pronounced in the same way.

Col. William Crawford's only son, John Crawford, was with his father's troops but escaped capture and death at the hands of the Indians. He later moved with his family and settled in Adams County, Ohio. A careful search of records there might possibly establish the line of descent coming down to the Rockcastle Crawfords but I have never had time to make the trip. I understand there has recently been published in a magazine or pamphlet, a rather complete account of the Ohio line coming down from Col. William's son. I hope to acquire a copy of this in due time.

Other than this one item, I believe I have everything published on Col. Crawford, back to eyewitness accounts of his torture, as well as a fairly complete history of his life, including his early friendship with young George Washington, who boarded in Crawford's home while making extensive land surveys in earlier days. The sickening accounts of his inhumane torture will not soon be forgotten by anyone who reads them. They will not be inflicted, in full, upon the present reader of these lines. The British Capt. Caldwell, writing to his superior officer a brief account of the tragedy has this to say: "Simon Giltry arrived last night from the upper village, who informed me that the Delawares had burned Col. Crawford and two captives at Pipestown after torturing them a long time. Crawford died like a hero; never changed his countenance though they scalped him alive and then laid hot ashes upon his head, after which they roasted him in a slow fire."

Another lead on a possible ancestor for the local Crawford family came several years ago from a grandson of "Devil Bill"

who told me it had long been a tradition in the Adams family that the John Crawford who married Elizabeth Adams was a brother to the husband of the woman upon whom Dr. McNeill performed at Danville, Kentucky, the first ovariotomy in medical history. This I have never been able to prove.

Andrew Crawford, a very knowledgeable researcher from Fairborn, Ohio, has a history of a Crawford line exhibited in census reports in Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties. He has written me several times about a John Crawford who was a son of Dr. Adams Crawford who practiced medicine in Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties between 1820 and 1865. This could not have been the John Crawford who married Elizabeth Adams, as he was not born until 1824, at which time she would have been sixteen years old.

Now he reports finding in Rockcastle tax records a John Crawford living in Rockcastle County in 1820 and 1825, to Elizabeth Adams. This is undoubtedly the John Crawford we are looking for, but he was not a son of Dr. Adams Crawford. He had a brother for whom the doctor name his son born in 1824? If so, he was a son of Alexander Crawford, who was in Pulaski County before the war and was a brother buried with Dr. Adams Crawford, in Mt. Pleasant Baptist Cemetery, located almost on the line between the two counties along Highway 461 between Mt. Vernon and Somerset. More biological guesswork involved, which can be verified only by finding definite records on Alexander Crawford, his origin and his descendants.

My grandmother Lair's mother was Charity Lawrence, who married Will French, who married "Devil Bill" Adams, were daughters of William Lawrence and his wife, the former Charity Lair and her sister, Rebecca Lair, were daughters of William Lawrence back to Scottish and English nobility, and even back to Lord Lawrence, of Done. Included in early American ancestors were Commodore John Lawrence, "Don't give up the ship" fame, six officers of the American Revolution and a governor of New Jersey, under the British Crown.

found no trace of him. I recently came across a William Lawrence who had been the founder of Lawrenceburg and had hopes that I had discovered a trace of him. I had Linda Ashley make a trip to Lawrenceburg to look into his history, but he turned out to be the wrong William Lawrence, and I am no nearer to a solution than before. Maybe somebody will stimulate upon a hidden clue some day that will open the way to a successful search for our William Lawrence, an English-Swissman.

Even more frustrating continues to be the search for history of Will French, who married Charity Lawrence, as previously stated. Few families in the early history of Kentucky rated ahead of the Frenches. Coming in with Daniel Boone, they were long prominent at Boonesborough and figured largely in the early activities of pioneer Kentucky. They were among the biggest landowners and every generation produced judges and prominent legal and business lights. The principal family residence seems later to have been in the area of Mt. Sterling.

When I learned that my great grandmother, Charity Lawrence, had married Will French, "from over around Mt. Sterling," I naturally assumed that he was a descendant of the original settlers of that name. When I got into family records, however, I could find no mention of a Will French and I remember distinctly my grandmother saying her father's name was Will French, which had also been his father's name. Most of the French family records were easy to follow out. There were few sons and many of them died without issue. The only possible chance for a Will French existed on a record of one of the French settlers having had two sons whose names were not given. Unless he had long wanted to erect a marker to establish his claim to descent from this branch of the family.

I remember as a child hearing many tales of Will French's temperance. My grandmother said it was his habit to set a cedar pail partly filled with whiskey beside his bed at night, with a gourd dipper handy, so he could take a drink anytime during the night when he awoke and felt the need for it. Such a life as I

Mental Health Matters Learning New Skills

Sometimes parents expect a child to learn a new skill all at once! They may lose patience if he doesn't. They think the child is not paying attention, that he is not trying hard enough, or that he is lazy!

The truth is that the mastery of a new skill takes practice and practice takes time! The learner successively masters a chain of steps, which, when linked together, form a complete, newly learned skill. This is true for the kindergartner learning the alphabet as well as for the adult attempting to master an athletic skill.

The process of teaching a new skill in a step-by-step manner can be successful with all types of people, including the emotionally disturbed and retarded. First—break the task into small parts. Require the learner to do only the first part. Reward him for attempting or accomplishing it; then move on to the next step. In shaping behavior, the most important ingredients are small steps, followed by frequent reinforcement.

Learned about seems to have been taken up with drunken spree and prolonged absences from home. My recollection is that he and his wife were often separate and were in that state at the time of their death. They're buried side by side in the Renfro Valley Burying Ground in unmarked graves. Also beside them is one of their daughters, who had come to be with her mother during a seizure of typhoid, contacted the disease herself and died a few days before her mother. I have long wanted to erect a marker to these ancestors of mine, but have not been able to do so for the lack of necessary information. Charity and her husband's birth and death dates are well known; neither date is available for Will French.

Could it be that the proud French family completely disowned him on account of his status as the black sheep and wastrel?
