program areas. This, however still provides individual districts with flexibility, since in most cases the state funds will free other funds that would have been spent in these specialized areas.

The amount of exceptional children-related funds that will be distributed is \$800,000, while the amount of School

Food Services Funds is \$725,000. These funds would have returned to the state's uncommitted general fund if they were not committed today. The additional \$380,000 necessary to provide \$2.00 per student in Average Daily Attendance is being provided by the Governor from his Contingency Fund. The Department of Education has been charged with developing an appropriate distribution mechanism that will disperse the funds over the next two weeks.

"Over the last few years several districts have had repeated budgetary difficulties," the governor pointed out. "It is our intention between now and January 1, 1978 to examine the problems relating to local school district budgeting and financing. Upon completion of this review, we plan to share our analysis with the General Assembly." According to the Governor, "Any difficulties facing local communities in financing a school system will be appropriately addressed during the 1978 regular session."

Supt. Charles B. Parsons said Tuesday that it had not been determined exactly how much Rockcastle County would receive from this special allocation.

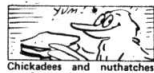

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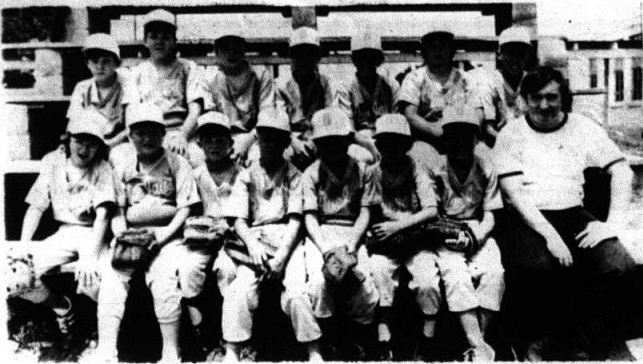

touch the hard hearts of his captors. In light of this conviction he may be pardoned in exaggerating as he did. Such a lie would not mean much to a man talking for his life.

Incidentally, Allensworth's account of his sufferings at the hands of their Mexican captors is fully corroborated by printed history and his name is given as being one of the captives in official government reports. If one part of his story is true, then perhaps the other part is also. It is true that he was of a family certain members of which were given to exaggeration for effect, but it seems unlikely that he would lie to his own brother, who was in a position to know where he had been and what he had done. In any event I do not think he was actor-enough to call up real tears to

go with his story, as Uncle Joe testified that he did, if it had not been true. As he observed, his action in deserting his comrades was nothing to brag about, so he could not have told it just to be boasting.

We would probably be justified in dismissing the whole story as a figment of an over-active imagination and letting it drop here, but as long as there is a faint chance of authenticating it I want to keep trying and I am hereby calling on all Adams descendants to help me in every way that they can. Discovering another survivor of the Alamo would certainly be a proudfest achievement for ROCKCASTLE. RECOLLECTIONS, would bring honor upon the whole family and give Allensworth Adams his rightful place in history, which has perhaps been denied him for well over a century.

\$1,905,000 To Be Distributed

To Local School Districts

Governor Carroll announced today that he will distribute \$1,905,000 to local school districts throughout the Commonwealth. This amounts to an allotment of approximately \$3.00 for every pupil in Average Daily Attendance (ADA). The financial assistance is intended to ease the financial problems many school districts are experiencing this fiscal year because of harsh winter weather, spring flooding, and the implementation of specialized programs in the local districts.

"During the winter I met with local school superintendents when many schools were closed for prolonged periods and being confronted with fuel cutbacks and high utility bills," the Governor said. "At that time the Governor indicated a concern for the plight of local school districts by endorsing a Department of Education regulation change in calculating ADA. The change increased state funding to local school districts by \$700,000," he indicated. The fiscal 1977 state support to local school districts through the Minimum Foundation program is approximately \$369 million.

Department of Education officials encouraged the Governor to make a supplemental allocation to local school districts from the Minimum Foundation program. After considering this possibility, the governor requested an Attorney General's opinion as to the legality of such an action. The opinion indicated that the contemplated allocation, because of the peculiarities of Minimum Foundation program statutes, would be a supplemental appropriation. The 1976 General Assembly, regular

session, removed all supplemental appropriation authority from the Governor.

In a letter sent to each school district superintendent today, the Governor writes, "Since the law will not allow me to provide additional funds to your district through the Foundation program, I have looked to other areas where funds may be available." Carroll added, "the funds to support our allocation will come from three sources: the School Food Services program, the Identification and Evaluation of Exceptional Children program, and the Governor's Contingency Fund."

The Food Services program and the Identification and Evaluation program have balances at the end of this fiscal year for particular reasons in each program. One factor was the anticipation of federal regulation changes which did not occur. Although the state Department of Education has surplus funds in these programs at the end of fiscal year, 1977, many school districts have spent considerable sums in operating related specialized programs.

Several school districts are converting from catered cafeterias to fully-functional kitchens. Also, much kitchen equipment was lost in the Eastern Kentucky floods. Each district has been establishing evaluation committees to outline educational needs for all exceptional children. Specialized programs have contributed to budgetary difficulties in local school districts.

The funds distributed from each of these programs must be spent in those

Fiscal Court Agrees To Mortgage Hospital to FHA

At the final meeting of the Fiscal Court held last Thursday, the Court heard representatives of the Rockcastle County Hospital board and their bonding council request that the county allow the present hospital building to be mortgaged in order to obtain a loan for an extended care facility.

Joe Ferguson, the hospital's bonding council, told the court that FHA (Farmers Home Administration from whom the hospital is attempting to make the \$900,000 plus loan) required the mortgaging of the present hospital building to them as security for the loan on the extended care facility.

Dr. George W. Griffith, also present at the meeting, told the Court that, in his opinion, "If we don't get this extended care facility then you (the court) can probably close the hospital in five years." Dr. Griffith said that the "feds" (federal health agencies) were very much opposed to the small hospital preferring instead to lend their support to the bigger medical facilities such as the UK Medical Center and other large hospital or at least those with 50 beds and over available. (The addition of the extended care wing would give the local hospital around 60 beds in the acute and extended care facility together). Dr. Griffith also said that the addition of the extended care facility to the local medical program would probably be instrumental in helping to obtain a surgeon for this area but that he didn't think this would be a possibility without

the facility. According to Dr. Griffith, there are now waiting lists at Sowder Nursing Home, the Berza extended care unit and other area facilities and this would indicate that there would be no problem with keeping the facility in use.

The Court voted unanimously to allow the present hospital building to be mortgaged and appointed themselves with the exception of Magistrate Chester Whitaker) as incorporators of the holding company for the new facility.

As the incorporators, it will be their duty to apply for the loan and to see to leasing the facility to the present hospital board.

Catchin' Up
 The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce and the Kentucky Municipal League find themselves on opposite sides of the fence concerning the call for a constitutional convention.

During a meeting of the General Assembly's Interim Committee on Cities, a representative of the Municipal League presented his organization's legislative package, which included the endorsement of the call for a convention to rewrite the state's 19th century constitution.

"I'm glad to see your stand," said Rep. Steve Beshear, D-Lexington, never a favorite of the state Chamber.

"Well, I'm proud that the Chamber's director," replied the League's executive director Michael Amyx.

Earlier in the summer, the Chamber's executive director, Phillip Thompson, wrote the Legislative Research Commission questioning the LRC's ability to put out a non-partisan flyer on what is involved if the people vote for a constitutional convention. The flyer has been printed.

Proponents of the call admit they're running well behind at this stage, but hope to begin getting the support of local officials. Securing the backing of the courthouses is a necessity if the call is to be approved.

The two candidates in the hot race for Jefferson County Judge-Executive are running for more than just the courthouse in Louisville. The race clearly has statewide implications.

Governor Julian Carroll's forces are looking for an attractive candidate to share the ticket with Commerce Commissioner Terry McBrayer in the 1979 Democrat primary for governor. A candidate who would draw votes from Jefferson County would be ideal. The need for a Jefferson County to run with McBrayer would be enhanced if Lt. Gov. Thelma Stovall, who has always done well in Jefferson County, stays in the race for governor.

Jefferson County Judge Todd Hollenback fits the bill, providing he can get re-elected to a third term in November. It won't be easy.

Although Hollenback was personally disliked by many on the governor's

staff when the judge made his abortive try for the governorship in 1975, he has since returned to Carroll's good graces. Put simply, Hollenback has behaved himself.

Hollenback, however, was not impressive in turning back two opponents in the spring primary, and he needs a strong showing this fall to gain a spot on the McBrayer ticket. He has his hands full with young Mitch McConnell. Like Hollenback, McConnell is good-looking, a strong public speaker, and a tireless campaigner.

McConnell is a Louisville attorney and a former aide to Sen. Marlow Cook. He knows how to run a good campaign and has the money to do it. McConnell spent almost \$80,000 in the primary and had no opposition.

A McConnell win would not only mean Hollenback from state office, it would also propel McConnell into consideration for a shot at governor, if not in 1979, at least in 1983. The Republicans in Kentucky are starved for gubernatorial material and if McConnell can become a winner, the GOP would have the man it needs.

Although she's a beautiful child, it's not likely Governor Carroll's youngest offspring will be in the running for Kentucky Dairy Princess anytime soon.

During the festivities surrounding the completion of the world's largest ice cream sundae in Frankfort, the guy pushed a spoon filled with ice cream in front of daughter Eilly, now two years old. Itemize House Tax Deductions

One of the great financial benefits of home ownership versus rental is that you are immediately eligible to deduct a good sized amount of money from your income tax. As a homeowner, you will generally find it to your advantage to itemize deductions rather than taking the standard deduction.

This is especially true during the earlier years of home ownership. The mortgage interest and real property taxes on your personal residence, when added to other deductible items will usually be well in excess of any standard deduction you could claim.

Your home payment may consist of several parts; an amount placed in escrow to pay real estate taxes and fire insurance, F.I.A. mortgage insurance premiums, and an amount applied to reduce the principal of the mortgage. Of these parts, only the interest and taxes are deductible - but that will prove to be a very sizable figure.

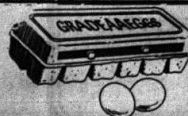

Rockcastle Recollections

One of the most famous and unusual events in the military history of our country was the fall of the Alamo and the brutal massacre of its defenders, only one of which is reported to have escaped. This was Louis Moses Rose, who "dropped from the wall surrounding the fort and stole away in the darkness without being discovered by the Mexican forces surrounding the Alamo."

The descendants of "Devil Bill" Adams have long preserved a family tradition that his fourth son, Allenworth Adams was also at the Alamo and also escaped with his life. This tradition has not been given wide circulation, is unknown to historians and consequently no serious attempt has been made either to verify or discredit it. I present here the only written account of the Adams family claim, written out many years ago by Joseph Adams, a nephew of Allenworth and a grandson of "Devil Bill." He gave me the original paper several years ago when he was the last living grandson of "Devil Bill." It is given here just as he wrote it down:

"If I should write all that I have heard from the lips of Allen Adams it would cover many pages. He was the wildest of the eight sons of "Devil Bill" Adams. I heard him tell my father (his brother) that he was in the Alamo with Bowie and with tears rolling down his cheeks he told how he had fought until there was no hope, saying that it was no honor to tell it. Bowie told his men that all was lost and that no one of them could expect mercy, but any man who wanted to could surrender for a worse death or do as he liked.

The Mexican women were allowed to approach the port holes of the Alamo to drag away their wounded and dead. Allen gave a Mexican woman seven hundred dollars to bring him a dress and thus attired he crawled through the port hole and walked off with the women to freedom.

Afterward he joined a troop of Texas Rangers consisting of two hundred and twenty five men. They were camped in a

small oak grove when suddenly they were surrounded by five hundred Mexicans. The captain had a parley with the Mexican commander, then told his men that they would surrender. Allen cursed the captain, calling him a coward and a traitor, saying that it was a prearranged sale of his men. (According to Texas history, Allen was correct). The Mexican officer had ropes put around their necks and the dogs they were started to the city of Mexico. Only twenty-five arrived. The others perished for want of water. The only way they had was when dragged across streams. The Mexicans would spur up their horses, so they had not time to drink then but would have to suck the water from their wet clothes. Even then their tongues would dry and become swollen. Allen, being a doctor, advised the men not to drink the alkaline water, as they were dying from dysentery. He kept a lead bullet in his mouth to keep it moist and protect his tongue and lips from the scorching hot winds.

A short time after his imprisonment in the City of Mexico he escaped with four of his companions and reached the mountains, but they would find little food, as they were without firearms. They wandered half starved for three weeks, living on wild honey and an occasional terrapin. Allen had the misfortune to fall and break his ankle and in this condition travelled on until they were all captured by Indians, who soon made preparations to put them to death. Fortunately while they were parleying a few Mexicans that were following came up and purchased them from the Indians for three ponies. They were returned to prison and next day condemned to die, but given a chance to draw beans for their lives. A black bean meant death and a white one back to prison. Allen said there were no white ones, so all drew black beans. The next morning before sunrise, 5 men were placed in a wagon, each sitting on a coffin, and driven to the firing grounds. The priest asked them if they had anything to say. The fellow next to Allen could speak Spanish, so Allen said "yes" and arose, having the other prisoner repeat these words for him: "I

thought I was fighting for my country and home and was following the officers that were commanding us when were were captured by your soldiers without a struggle and led to this city like dogs-I have 5 little golden haired girls in Texas waiting for their father's return." The priest dropped his head and walked away. "Saved!" said Allen to his comrades and in about one hour they rode back to prison on their coffins. He remained in prison until after peace was declared, when his father got him freed through the efforts of the President of the United States."

In giving me this article several years ago, Uncle Joe Adams, then a very old man, expressed the hope that someday somebody would be able to check up on this story and verify it so that it might find its rightful place in the history of the fall of the Alamo. As for himself, he had not the slightest doubt of its authenticity. He said that although he was a small boy when he heard his uncle Allenworth tell it to his father, he could tell that his tears and emotion and regret for his cowardice in leaving his comrades was real and unaffected.

Allenworth Adams lived until 1890 and has many descendants yet living in Rockcastle County and surrounding area, probably including grandchildren who must have heard in their youth of older relatives with whom he had told the story of his adventures. Surely there must be some scrap of evidence they can offer to support this story. If you have such supporting evidence to submit you owe it to your family and especially to the memory of Allenworth himself to send it in so that it can be used in our effort to get at the truth of the matter.

If we can establish a more accurate time schedule for his known movements, we might be in better shape to follow Allenworth's movements through the critical years. For instance, when did he make his various trips between Kentucky and Texas? An affidavit filed by his brother, Dr. Jones Lawrence Adams, says Allenworth left for Texas in February of 1838 and never returned, so he must have been in Texas during the period. We now know, however, that he must have returned to Kentucky soon after that date as we have records of him

practicing medicine in both Garrard and Rockcastle counties during the forties. Bible records indicate that he was being married to Miss Mink in Rockcastle County, in 1845, and so far as we know he spent the remainder of his life here. He is buried in the Nigger Creek Cemetery, near Brodhead, Ky.

I have done some research on his Alamo story. I checked enrollment records and government roles do not show the name of an Allenworth Adams. It must be remembered, however, that he may have left his wife back in Kentucky and was using an assumed name. It is also possible that he was in the Alamo as a civilian and did not belong to the army. Before the actual siege began friends and relatives of the defenders passed in and out the gates without being recognized by friendly local Mexicans. Also there were instances of wandering and unattached American frontiersmen visiting the place out of curiosity, just to see what was going on. John M. Meyers, in his informative book, "The Alamo" published in 1948, calls attention to the fact that many Texans hurried away at the news of Santa Anna's approach with his Mexican troops. It is possible that some of them did not. Also, a group of Mexicans who joined the garrison deserted it within a few days.

The picture of the defenders of the Alamo is by no means clear. War Dept records show a list of officially enlisted men, which I have checked but this list does not fully agree with the official list of those who lost their lives. Only one enlisted man is recorded as "the only survivor of the Alamo"; but there were other survivors. Mrs. Dickinson, wife of a garrison officer, several Mexican women, various children and the negro servants of Bowie and Travis. These are the historically accepted survivors mentioned in later official reports. There were others who joined the garrison during the siege, or a part of it, including Allenworth Adams, who is supposed to have gotten away before the end of the battle and would thus have accepted the notice of anyone reporting the closing scenes.

His story may be rejected on the grounds that it is based only on his own statement. Louis Moses Rose, the "official Survivor" was also the sole author of his story. The difference is that he told a family which he encountered on his route away from the Alamo that he had escaped in the manner which he reported and it was not until years later that survivors that he were willing to stay with him to the end. There are historians today who believe that Rose fabricated the whole account, including his escape.

It all happened a long time ago. There

was much confusion and excitement concerning it than and for years afterward no attempt was made to get at the true facts concerning it. Lon Tinkle's "The Alamo," published in 1968, quotes James Atkins Shackelford as saying "I suppose no event is recent historical times, with a basis in fact, has been more conducive to the creation of legend, fiction, gossip, error and falsehood than the destruction of the fortress at San Antonio de Bexar. Except for the date and the fact of its fall, there is almost no single point about the Alamo upon which the few survivors do not disagree. For us at this late date and in the absence of reliable information, to figure it all out cannot be hoped for.

On the evidence presented I cannot believe that Allenworth Adams was present at the Alamo, as claimed. On the other hand, I do not feel that the evidence has all come in. Reading Joseph Adams' account one would perhaps be justified in believing Allenworth meant to say that his experience wherein he was captured by the Mexican army

followed immediately after his escape from the Alamo. This did not happen, of course, and I do not believe that Joseph Adams so intended it to appear. He says only that "afterwards" Allenworth went through this ordeal, and "afterwards" could denote the passing of any lapse of time. Actually, the Alamo fell in early 1836 and the expedition which Allenworth travelled started in 1841. Between February of 1836 and February of 1838 he could have had plenty of time to come back to Kentucky, fight it out with his wife and head back to Texas in a final act of separatist following which he could later have joined the armed forces with which he was later captured.

Another item in his story that does not ring true is his statement to the priest when condemned to die that he had 5 little golden-haired girls in Texas awaiting his return. This was said for effect, as he later acknowledged. He said Mexicans were especially fond of blondes and he felt this statement would
