

# Fishing Report

From the Ky. Dept. of Fish and Wildlife

Fair to good fishing can now be found for several species of fish, including black bass, bluegill, crappie and even trout and musky. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**Barron:** Black bass fair to good early in late on crank baits off gravel points, and in stump bass bluegill and good deep banks; clear to murky to muddy, stable, six inches below pool and 80 degrees.

**Laurel:** Trout good at night still fishing cheese and worms off deep banks and points; black bass fair on spinner baits in timbered coves; clear, stable at power pool and 79 degrees.

**Cave Run:** Musky fair to good casting and trolling deep runners off deep banks and over main channel; black bass fair on surface lures; spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers around rock banks and stick uprs; clear to murky, falling slowly, 1 1/2 feet above pool and 80 degrees.

**Green:** Black bass fair on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs; bluegill fair in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, 6 1/2 feet above pool and 80 degrees.

**Herrington:** Bluegill fair still and drift fishing worms and crickets off deep banks; black bass fair late evenings casting artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs; clear to murky,

stable, one foot above pool and 78 degrees.

**Kentucky:** Sauger fair drifting minnows over ridge tops and in the canal; black bass fair on surface, medium and deep runners and artificial nightcrawlers off gravel points on banks with stumps; in tailwaters, catfish fair; clear to murky, stable, three feet below pool and 82 degrees.

**Barkley:** Black bass slow on artificial nightcrawlers in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish fair, rockfish slow; clear to murky, stable, three feet below pool and 81 degrees.

**Crappie:** Crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass fair on teh lower lake trolling deep runners off deep banks and still and drift fishing small crawfish off rocky points and slow on the upper lake trolling deep runners and casting artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks; in tailwaters, trout slow to fair; clear, stable, 35 feet below the timberline and 79 degrees.

**Rough River:** Crappie fair and improving on the south fork in inlets and bays; and around stick uprs; black bass fair and improving on the south fork on crank baits and artificial nightcrawlers in inlets and bays and slow on the north fork on surface lures and artificial nightcrawlers around stick uprs and in inlets and bays; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, two feet above pool and 80 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** Trout fair off shallow banks; black bass slow on medium runners off shallow banks; in tailwaters,

catfish slow, clear to murky to muddy, stable, one foot above pool and 81 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** Black bass fair on deep runners off deep banks during the day and casting artificial nightcrawlers over weed beds at night; white bass slow on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; clear, stable, five feet below pool and 81 degrees.

**Nolin:** White bass fair early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; black bass slow on crank baits off points; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, two feet above pool and 78 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** Crappie fair around stick uprs; black bass slow early and late on surface lures in inlets and bays; clear to murky to muddy, stable at pool and 79 degrees.

**Grayson:** Bluegill fair in inlets and bays; black bass slow on medium runners in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout slow, clear to murky, falling slowly, six inches above pool and 80 degrees.

**Dewey:** Crappie slow to fair over submerged cover; clear to murky to muddy, stable at pool and 80 degrees.

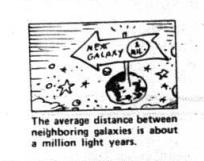

# Applicants Can Help Speed Claim for SSI

People who plan to apply for supplemental security income (SSI) payments can help speed the processing of their claim, a social security spokesman said today.

SSI payments are made to people who are age 65 and over, or blind, or disabled and who don't own much property or have much income. SSI is administered by social security.

They can help, by getting together material to support their claim before they contact a social security office to apply. The spokesman suggested that people get the following kinds of information together first:

- Bank books, stock certificates and bonds
- Motor vehicle registration
- Proof of pensions and annuities
- A copy of the person's most recent tax return if self-employed
- If blind or disabled, a list of the doctors, hospitals, or clinics where treated

A doctor can apply for SSI payments at any social security office. The basic Federal SSI payment is \$177.80 a month for an individual and \$266.70 for an eligible couple. Not everyone gets this much, however, because most other income causes the SSI payment to be reduced.

The value of a person's real and personal property may have an effect on eligibility. Not all property counts, though. A person's home doesn't count and neither does a car of reasonable value, nor small life insurance policies.

Property that does count in-

cludes savings accounts, stocks, bonds, jewelry, and other valuable items. If the value of this kind of property is more than \$1,500 for an individual or more than \$2,250 for a couple, SSI payments cannot be made.

Persons who want more information about SSI can contact any social security office. The address and phone number can be found in the telephone directory.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education today announced its policy for free meals, free milk and reduced-price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served in schools under the National School Lunch Program and/or School Breakfast and/or Special Milk Program. Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

FOR EACH ADDITIONAL FAMILY MEMBER, ADD \$910 PER YEAR TO THE INCOME LEVEL FOR FREE MEALS AND \$1,420 TO THE INCOME LEVEL FOR REDUCED PRICE MEALS.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free meals, an extra one half pint free milk or reduced price meals. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with hardship conditions due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter charges, percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Although applications are submitted at the beginning of the school year, they may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement about the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and the deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and Federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them, the family should apply for such meals and milk for these children by contacting the school official for the eligibility criteria for foster children.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family's size and income changes during the school year, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding program, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy the school principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the decision of the school official he may make a request for a hearing to appeal the decision. This request may be made either orally or in writing to: Charles B. Parsons, Superintendent, whose address is Mt. Vernon, Kentucky 40456.

The policy agreement, on file in each school and in the office of the district superintendent, contains an outline of the hearing procedures and may be reviewed by any interested person.

## Consumer Comments

### Landlord/Tenant

Every year at this time students begin searching for apartments close to campus in which to live for the next school year. If you have ever had to go apartment hunting, then you know the frustration that arises if you do not know the necessary questions to ask, or specific clauses in lease agreements to watch out for.

Kentucky's Landlord/Tenant Act statutorily outlines the rights and responsibilities of landlords and tenants. However, this act only applies to the Lexington/Fayette County and Louisville/Jefferson County areas. Whether you live in these areas or not, you should be careful to find the answers to the following questions before renting:

-Is there a lease agreement? Insist on receiving a written lease from the landlord explaining the terms for the renting period, and the length of time that the lease is to be in effect. Make sure you understand all of the terms of the lease. Never sign a lease until you have read the entire document and fully understand what the lease includes and what it does not include. The more details clearly explained in writing, the better the agreement will be for the landlord and the tenant.

-What about the security deposit? Understand under what conditions the landlord can keep your deposit. Check the lease to see if the deposit is forfeited for damage to the apartment, or for failure to the tenant to pay rent or meet other conditions of the lease. Insist on inventorying the apartment with your landlord and making a signed list of damages that exist when you move in, then when your lease ends, review the apartment with the landlord and note

any new items of damage that may affect your deposit.

-What about repairs to the apartment? Find out who is responsible under the lease for any necessary repairs. Outline with your landlord, the procedures you, the tenant, must follow to give notice of needed repairs.

-What about eviction? Under what conditions can the landlord terminate your lease? Find out how much notice the landlord must give you before you have to move out of the apartment. You'll also want to know how notice you must give the landlord if you want to leave before the lease is up.

There are many other questions that you may want to ask the landlord before renting the apartment, but remember these basic suggestions:

1. Ask for a written lease agreement. 2. Read and understand the entire lease before you sign it. 3. Make a signed damage list so you won't later be charged for damages existing at the time you rented the apartment. 4. Follow your lease provisions and pay your rent on time so you won't be subject to eviction.

If you have any questions about your rights or responsibilities as a landlord or a tenant, contact the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, Frankfort, Ky., 40601. The office has found that it can most effectively deal with written complaints and encourages you to write if you have a consumer complaint.

## questions and answers

Q. My wife and I get supplemental security income payments. She just entered a public health facility and Medicaid will be paying for most of her care. Will this affect our monthly SSI payments?

A. Probably so. When an SSI beneficiary is in a public or private health facility which receives Medicaid payments for more than 50 percent of his or

her care, the SSI payment is reduced. But, in cases where only one member of a couple is in a Medicaid facility, the income of each member is considered separately in determining the amount of payment. You should notify a social security office right away. The people there will tell you exactly how your SSI checks will be affected.

## County Population Increases to 12,900

Rockcastle County's and Kentucky's population both grew between 1970 and 1976, according to a new report prepared by the University of Louisville's Urban Studies Center and published by the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

In Rockcastle County, estimated population in 1976 was 12,900, up from a 1970 estimate of 12,305.

Kentucky's population grew by more than 207,000 - a 6.4 percent increase, from 3,220,711 in 1970 to 3,428,000 as of July 1, 1976.

The report, which the center updates every year, also shows the population shift for each county in the state.

(The Urban Studies Center has been designated the official population research center for Kentucky by the census bureau.)

During the six-year period, the reports says more than 66,000 people moved into Kentucky and the rest of the growth was a result of a larger number of births than of deaths in the state.

Fayette County showed the greatest growth with an increase of 13,800 from 174,323 in 1970 to 188,100 in 1976.

Other counties with high growth rates were Christian County (increased 10,500), Bullitt County (8,800), Pulaski County (7,700), Floyd County (6,700), Hopkins County (5,900), Warren and Wething Counties (5,800 each), Laurel County (5,600), Boone County (5,300) and Oldham County (5,200).

The counties which showed the heaviest losses were Jefferson County (4,000), Campbell County (4,000) and Fulton and Meade Counties (700 each).

Despite the high loss of Jefferson County, it represented less than 1 percent of the total population. The loss was caused by people leaving the county rather than a decrease in the birth rate. The county showed a net loss of 36,700 people, through migration although births outnumber deaths by 30,700.

Dr. Michael A. Spar, codirector of population research at the Urban Studies Center, explained that all the population figures in the report, except for the 1970 figures, are estimates and therefore have been rounded off to the nearest hundred.

## Local School Districts to Receive State Grant

A state grant of \$509,000 will be distributed among local school districts this year for the identification, evaluation and placement of exceptional children. Dr. James B. Graham, superintendent of Public Instruction, announced today in a letter to school superintendents.

The grant will help local school districts implement the provisions of the Education for All Handicapped Children Act which requires that local school districts provide an appropriate free education for handicapped, school age children.

From the state grant, each local school district will receive a base amount of \$500 plus an additional amount derived from the school district's averages for public attendance. The grants to individual district range from \$600 to \$67,000, said Dr. Stella A. Edwards, assistant superintendent of the Bureau of Education for Exceptional Children.

The bureau's field consultants - there are 18 positions across the state - will work with local school district personnel to determine what services the districts need and how the districts might use the grant to meet these needs.

Some items which may be included under the grant are special equipment for classes for exceptional children, instructional and assessment materials, therapists and specialists to train teachers in specific skills for educating exceptional children, and teacher stipends for training days, said Dr. Edwards.

## Coach House near Red Hill Has Interesting and Varied History

Ulysses S. Grant ate lunch there. Frank Smith was shot to death there. A 30-year-old woman died during childbirth and according to one man's story still haunts the place. J.S. Adams kept slaves to work the farm and Tom Jim Ballard made legal whiskey there. Verbal history even says that "Devil Bill" Adams ran the coach house, which is located in the Red Hill Section of Rockcastle County.

Even if it sounds like the set of a Walt Disney adventure film, the place is real and has been since about 1807. Wally Phillips owns the farm and lives in the house that has been standing about 170 years.

Wally bought the place from Thaddeus Drew, his father-in-law. Thad Drew got the property and house from Tom Jim Ballard who got it from J.S. Adams. Records of ownership before Adams are gone-burned with the courthouse in 1873 but a man named Stephen Gilbert did the original survey. One of the oldest, if not the oldest, house in Rockcastle County, Wally's house was originally intended to be a coach house where people and animals rested on their long trips from London to Richmond. The house stands beside the original Daniel Boone trail that eventually became the main road from Indianapolis to the Cumberland Gap.

Though it can't be documented, legend has it that "Devil Bill" Adams, one of the county's most colorful characters owned the house and farm. It is said that he owned 6,000 acres of land in the area, and kept 75 slaves on the place.

The slave houses were kept across the road and some 200 yards from the coach house. "Devil Bill" apparently didn't like the smell of the shanty's in which he housed his blacks. How "Devil Bill" got his nickname is a matter of some conjecture, but it apparently had something to do with the way he treated his slaves.

J.S. Adams is the first recorded owner of the coach house and of the property adjacent to it. According to records in the County Court Clerk's office T.J. Ballard (Tom Jim) bought the place from the J.S. Adams heirs on the 17th of April, 1872. Little is reported about J.S. Adams, but he did run the place as a coach house until his death.

Tom Jim Ballard is another one of those colorful characters that have propped up in Rockcastle County from time to time. Tom Jim was the last to run a coach house on the premises. He died shortly after the turn of the century.

Tom Jim has a 91-year-old daughter who lives in Hamilton, Ohio. The accounts of her father have come from her.

Tom Jim was a gambler. It is told that he played cards whenever possible. It is also told that he would very often involve passing livestock drovers in card

games and while they gambled, his stole a head or two of the stock. They usually drove a cow or a pig over the cliffs behind the house. Rather than try to struggle with a dead or hurt animal, it would be donated to the inn. Thus, Tom Jim stayed in fresh meat.

Tom Jim was one of the two proprietors of legal stills in Rockcastle County at one time. The other licensed operator was Dave Betherum who lived at Sand Springs. These were the two men who were involved in the famous Ballard-Betherum fight in front of the courthouse. The whole thing apparently started as a squabble over the county whiskey business. When the dust settled, Betherum was shot and Ballard was cut severely. Both men lived, but Ballard lay near death in the coach house for days.

Another man who lay wounded in the house was not so fortunate. Nothing is known except that his names was Haley and he was involved in the shootout between the Haley family and the Mullins family at Salt Pever cave. Haley died in one of the upstairs rooms of the old coach house.

One man, Frank Sith, was shot to death inside the house. Circumstances surrounding the shooting are hazy, but it

was allegedly a man named Lloyd Jennings who killed Smith. Jennings was a newly wed and was supposedly caring for the house while Thaddeus Drew, then the owner, was away.

Smith died in 1921 and a window sill in the house still has a large hole in it made by a shotgun blast during the shootout. It is a kind of mute testimony of all the colorful and sometimes violent people who have lived there.

Other assorted legends, maybe true, maybe not, have sprung up around the house. Some say that Ulysses S. Grant stopped at the coach house and had lunch while headed south with his troops. Some say that the ghost of Sally Cranberry haunts the house. Mrs. Cranberry died in the coach house in 1831 during childbirth. She is, however, buried less than a mile away.

However, Wally has lived in the house 57 years and he says he has never seen the ghost.

Whatever is or isn't true about Wally Phillips' house, the legends are good to hear. They are about our own people and are our heritage.

But if you ever go and stand for a moment in the attic of that ancient structure, you will almost visualize Tom Jim and some drovers sitting around the barrel playing cards.

## Food Stamps Benefit Poor and The American Farmer

Food Stamps. Mention that one program and you're bound to get conversation started in almost any social circle. The food stamp program is probably the most discussed and most completely misunderstood social program in existence.

The food stamp idea grew out of the commodities program which was instituted in the late sixties. Like food stamps, the commodities program was an idea which was designed to benefit the poor and the American farmer. It was originated to balance consumer demand with farmers' surpluses. Commodities available depended on what farmers were producing an excess of. One month, for example, people receiving commodities might get canned chicken because of a large poultry production. The next month they would get beef because of an excess on the market. In this way, farmers found a market for what they produced while the poor were fed.

Both programs are part of an evolutionary process which began with the Social Security Act of 1935. This new deal program was originally aimed at the aged and severely handicapped people. The Old Age Assistance, and the Aid to needy blind programs were the first federally funded help available to

any segment of society. Both were instituted in the 1930's.

The Aid to Permanently Disabled Program was adopted in 1957 and was an offshoot of the Social Security Act of 1935. It's aim was to provide a system whereby there was an equal distribution of farm commodities across the country. It was extended within a few years of its inception and became the commodities program from which food stamps evolved.

Unlike almost all other federal social programs, the food stamps system is funded by the Department of Agriculture. Most other social agencies have the Department of Health, Education and Welfare over-seeing them.

Since Food Stamps are designed as much to help farmers as the poor the program falls under the Agriculture Department. Food stamps are normally not free. In a few cases an individual can procure food stamps at net cost-but only for a maximum of 3 months. At the end of the 3-month period, a purchase price is set or if circumstances are extreme, other solutions can be found.

Normally a purchase price is calculated for food stamps recipients when they are first put on the program. Gross monthly income is calculated and

## FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

There's another teapot simmering in Frankfort.

The mess created when the state library lease boiled over was only recently cleaned up. The group that would have built the new library, B.J.T., Inc., backed out of the project saying it could not get the money it needed for the project.

It's expected by most Frankfort observers (including some inside the administration of Gov. Julian Carroll) that the recent leasing of the Ramada Inn by Kentucky State University will be the next spill that might need tidying. Kentucky State University (KSU) is beginning a two-year, \$6 million campus renovation. Part of that facilitating requires the closing of two large dormitories which will displace about 200 students. With the fall term beginning, KSU needed pace.

After considering three motels and an apartment complex, the school's Board of Regents selected the 84 room Ramada Inn in East Frankfort as a temporary dorm. The school negotiated a 10 month lease for \$204,000 with options to renew. The rental fee could also be applied toward the purchase price, if the school decided it wanted to buy the property.

During the emergency meeting in which the Regents decided on the Ramada, they were told by their attorney and the school's staff that the Ramada was clearly the best deal. Unlike the apartment complex, all of the students could be kept in one building. This would simplify maintenance and supervision. It would also create more of an academic atmosphere.

The Ramada has cafeteria facilities, which the other structures do not. The staff said it had been maintained better in the past than the other inns.

Recreation facilities are available at the Ramada. There is also space for office and meeting rooms and study areas. The motel, like KSU, is on Frankfort's east side. Actual cost per square foot at the Ramada was less than \$4, while the cost at the other motels was above \$5. The total cost, though, was some \$74,000 more than the Frankfort Travelodge, a motel much closer to the KSU campus.

The Ramada Inn is owned by Rodney Ratliff, a prominent Frankfort businessman and Democrat. Ratliff leases several buildings to the state. Some folks have already theorized that Ratliff is being paid off for entering a token bid for the library lease to make the B.J.T. bid look good. "Not so," says a man inside the Carroll administration.

"We've been waiting for someone to complain," he says. "We don't have anything to do with it. This is strictly KSU's deal."

"Who is KSU's attorney in the matter?"

"William Johnson," I said. Again my answer was William E. Johnson, a well known Frankfort attorney.

As the rumors continue that the administration got Ratliff the deal to bail him out of an unsuccessful financial venture (rumors so far unsubstantiated), the spotlight turns to state Auditor George Atkins. Atkins has used his position as a political soapbox and financial watchdog. He has been quick to investigate other leases. Will he investigate this one?

A one letter typing mistake has brought an Eastern Kentucky man a new car and lightened the state treasury by \$5,000.

Lloyd Blakenship of Majestic, Ky., applied for a flood relief grant. However, when his request was processed by the Dept. of Military Affairs, his first name was changed to Floyd. There is a Floyd Blakenship in Majestic. He got the check and promptly bought a new car.

When the state realized its mistake, Floyd said, "Too late, the money's gone." The Attorney General says the state has just lost \$5,000 unless Military Affairs tries legal action to get the money back.

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## KSP Activity Report

During the month of July, the Kentucky State Police at London reported the following activity:

from that a net income is derived by subtracting necessary living expenses and medical costs. A formula is used for each case to figure how much the individual should pay for the stamps.

Food Stamps are distributed on an as needed basis. Monetary income and family size as well as monetary outlay are the only considerations used when deciding whether family should be allowed into the program or not. There is no discrimination because of race or national origin, or any other such characteristic.

When food stamps are approved for a family, an identification card is issued. The card has to be shown to a merchant

when the stamps are used in a store. Without an ID card a merchant cannot accept the stamps. Each book of stamps is also coded with the owner and the codes of cover and stamps must coincide. Stamps removed from a book cannot be spent.

Since food stamps are designed for the American farmer, foreign produced food can't be purchased with them. Coffee, bananas and other imported foods must be paid for with cash. In addition, tobacco, alcohol, and household items (soaps, etc.) cannot be paid for with food stamps. They are for the purchase of necessary foodstuffs which have been produced by American farmers.

Representation while attempting to acquire food stamps is a federal

offense. It amounts to defrauding the federal government and can be cause for large fines and imprisonment.

The food stamp program is administered by the Bureau for Social Insurance and it's parent organization is the Dept. of Human Resources. The Rockcastle County Office is located in Mt. Vernon on Highway 150.

Next time you're in one of those discussion of the food stamp program, remember the benefits of it as well as the detriments. Those who try to cheat the system are eventually caught and those that it helps well, it may be helping you more than you realize.

For the first time, in several years, our family attended the State Fair at Louisville Friday and Saturday. It was fun, there were some irritating moments, but, all in all, we had a good time. I can't say how the people who run the hotel we stayed at fared but the children had a ball and, I am certain, now hold the hotel record for making the most trips from the pool to our third floor room (drizzling all over their plush carpet every step of the way I might add).

Of course, it is no small matter to take five children anywhere but you really have no idea how much money they can do away with at a place like that. Someone suggested to me years ago (after watching the third child ten minutes hit me up for Coke money at the ballpark) that I would be ahead of the game to get one of the little coin vendors that attaches to your belt. 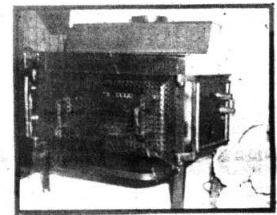

## USDA Increases Payments for Programs

Carol Tucker Foreman, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Food and Consumer Services has announced that the school lunch, breakfast, and child care programs will receive increased payments adjusted to reflect the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) series for food away from home.

The adjustments, effective July 1, reflect the 4.9 percent increase in the CPI for the six month period, Nov. 1976 to May 1977. The increased payments paid to schools and institutions through state agencies help defray meal preparation costs in the national school lunch, school breakfast, and child care food programs.

The national average payment for the school lunch program will be increased from 13.25 cents to 14 cents for each lunch served. Within that average, states are authorized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to vary the rate of reimbursement up to a maximum of 20 cents per lunch.

The additional average payment for lunches served to needy children will be increased from 50 cents to 53 cents for reduced-price lunch and from 60 cents to 53 cents for a free lunch. The maximum total reimbursement states may pay schools and institutions has been increased from 78.25 cents to 82 cents for a reduced-price lunch and from 88.25 to 92 cents for a free lunch.

Under the school breakfast program, the national average payment will be increased from 10.75 cents to 11.25 cents for each breakfast served. The additional average payment for each reduced-price breakfast will be increased from 20 cents to 21 cents. The additional average payment for a free breakfast will be increased from 28.75 cents to 29 cents. Maximum rates of reimbursement states may pay special needy schools and institutions will remain at 40 cents for each reduced-price breakfast and at 45 cents for each free breakfast served.

Under the child care food stamps, states will receive the same payments for breakfasts as those for the school breakfast program, and the same payments for lunches and suppers as those for the national school lunch program. Payments for each mid-morning, and mid-afternoon snack allowed under the child care food program have been increased from 5.50 cents to 5.75 cents. The additional average payments for reduced-price snack under this program will increase from 1 cents to 11.50 cents, and free snacks will increase from 16.50 to 17.25 cents.

In lieu of maintaining records on the actual cost of food used, sponsors of family and group day care homes in the child care food program may use a food cost factor of 44.25 cents for each lunch or supper, 24.75 cents for each breakfast, and 15 cents for each supplement served. These factors are also adjusted semi-annually to reflect changes in the CPI.

The rates of payment are scheduled to appear in the Federal Register of Friday, July 1.

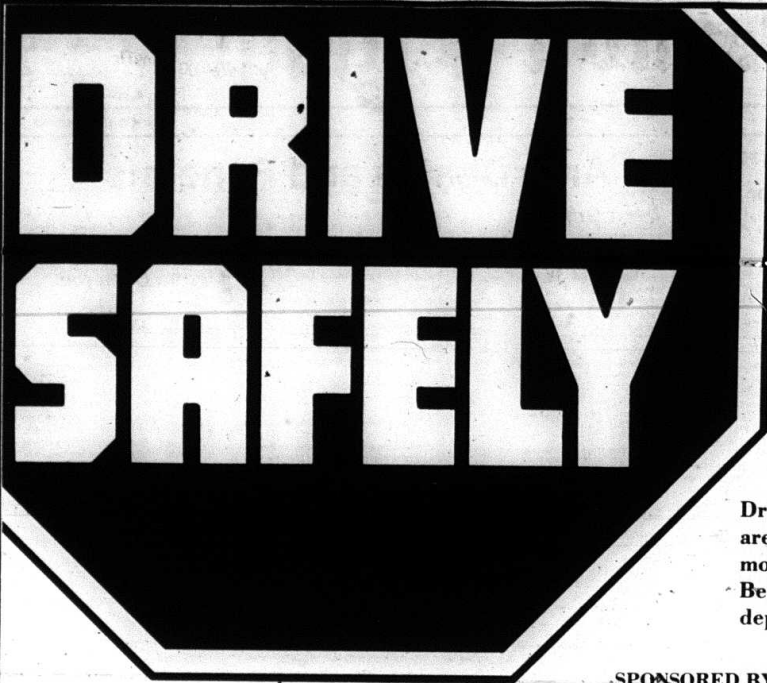

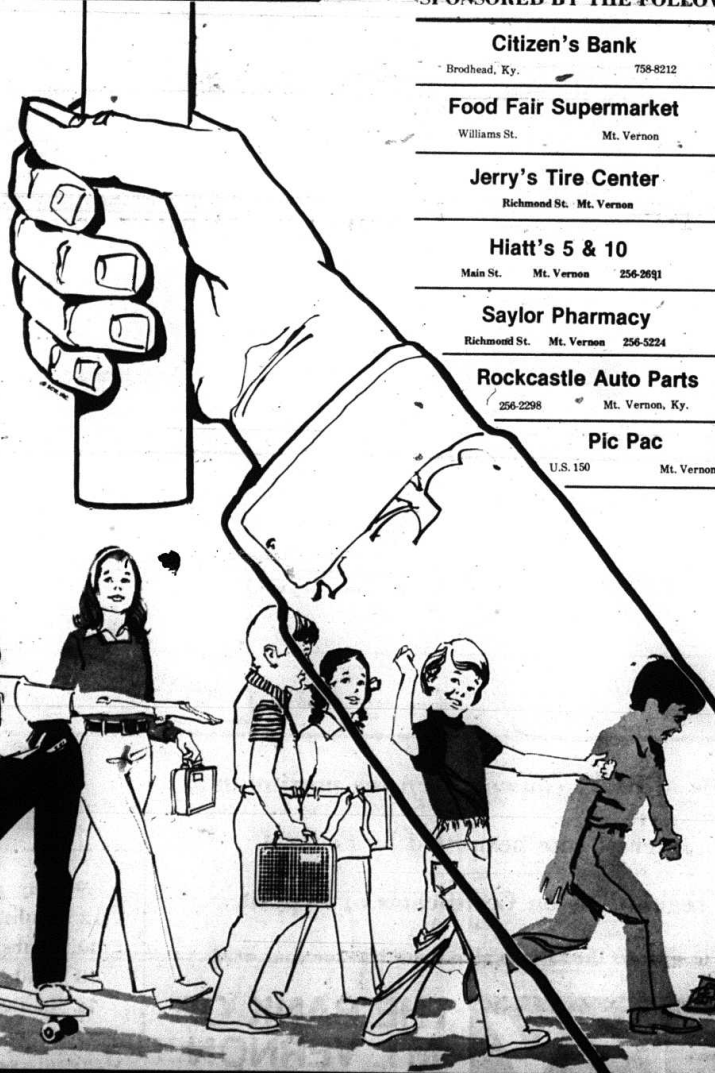
