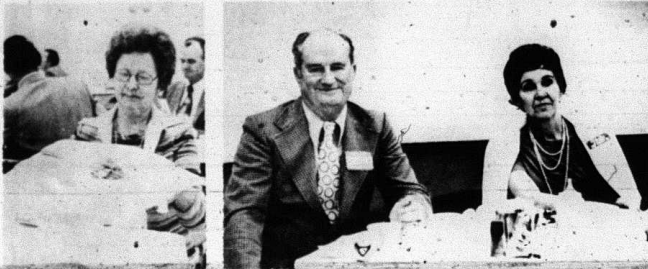

Several Food Service Businesses Closed by Co. Health Dept.

During the week of Sept. 12-16, 1977, four establishments, one grocery and three food service establishments in Rockcastle Co. were closed by order of the County Health Department.

Those Establishments closed, having made corrections and upon re-inspection were allowed to re-open.

Four other food service establishments are currently under ten day notices to correct violations. Failure of those establishments to correct violations will result in further closures.

All food service establishments in Rockcastle Co. are reminded that food service is regulated by the State Food Service Code which is provided for by Chapter 219, of the Kentucky revised Statutes and has the force of law.

Since it is one of the functions of the Health Department not to close restaurants, but to educate those serving the public in safe food service, a series of three food service schools are being planned for October 10 and 11, 1977 in the Courtroom on the 3rd floor of the County Courthouse.

On October 10, there will be a session from 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 8:30 in the evening.

On October 11, there will only be one session from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

Those are open to anyone interested in food service such as schools, restaurants, nursing homes. All three sessions will provide the same information for meeting requirements of the Health Department.

Rockcastle Co. Day Care Centers Awaiting Word Concerning Opening

The fate of the Rockcastle County Day Care Centers is in doubt, according to Gary Cromer, director of the program.

Mr. Cromer said last Friday that the program is awaiting official word from the Comprehensive Education and Training Act (CETA) Title VI program as to whether or not a grant had been approved for the program. ARC funding was originally set up under a five-year pilot program which expired August 31. Since that time, Mr. Cromer said, Mrs. Cosh, accountant for the centers, have been working without pay. Mr. Cromer said Friday that he had been verbally assured by CETA officials that funding would be approved but no official word has been received.

When and if funding is approved by CETA, two centers will open at Brodhead and Brindle Ridge. The Maple Grove Center, which was closed March 31 of this year because of a lack of funds, will remain closed.

It is expected this year that there will be about 70 children in average daily attendance. Mr. Cromer said he had applied for partial funding of 48 slots for children from Certified, Aid for Dependent Children families. The applications have gone to the Title XX program and the Department of Human Resources under their "Purchase of Care Program."

In addition to the CETA grant, the local centers will have to come up with \$12,000 in local funds. \$5,000 of this has been approved by the county Fiscal Court and Mr. Cromer said the other \$7,000 would have to come from fund raising projects, in-kind services, etc. Last year, in addition to the \$1,000 given the program to Fiscal Court, the centers had to have \$5,930 in local matching funds.

"Retroactive Adjustment" Available For Some

Some Kentucky families whose federal rent subsidies disqualified them for food stamps may be entitled to "retroactive adjustment," according to Gail S. Huecker of the state Department for Human Resources.

Ms. Huecker, commissioner for the department's Bureau of Social Insurance said today that a recent circuit court decision got the HUD ruling overturned. February, 1976 district court ruling which stated that Housing and Urban Development (HUD) rent subsidies disqualified a household from receiving food stamps eligibility. The U.S. Department of Agriculture, which administers the federal food stamp program, had appealed the 1976 ruling.

As directed by the district court, a social insurance already had offered corrective action for households who applied for food stamps after October 8, 1976 but were declared ineligible or received reduced benefits because of HUD payments. The recent court of appeals decision pushed the retroactive benefits period back to Aug. 5, 1974.

"Families who may benefit by this decision are those who applied for food stamps after Aug. 5, 1974 and before October 8, 1976, and who were receiving rent subsidies when they applied," stated Commissioner Huecker. "These people should contact their local food stamp offices."

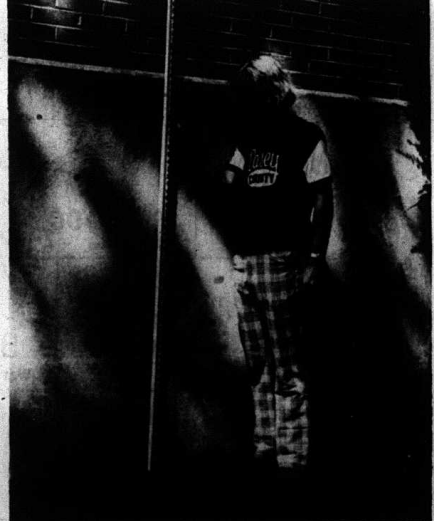

Tip To The Editor:

The question has been brought to my attention: "May one who has been a candidate for nomination in the primary and been defeated be eligible for a write-in candidate in the general election?"

The answer to the question is in the affirmative. KRS 118.345 prohibits a defeated candidate in the primary from having his name placed on the ballot in November for the same office for the nomination of which he was a candidate in the primary. However, the Court of Appeals has declared that a defeated candidate may run as a "write-in" candidate since his name is not listed on the ballot and he has the constitutional right to be voted for by the "write-in"

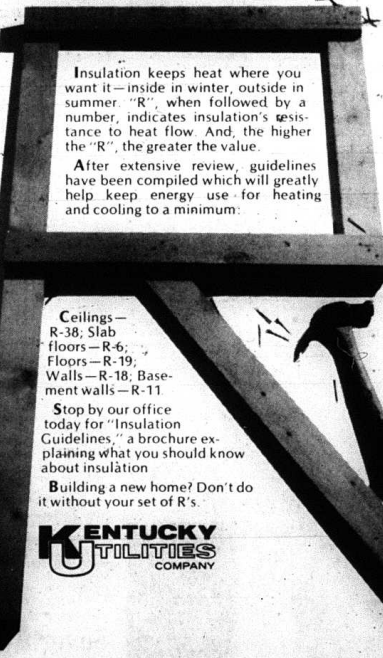

Down on the Farm

Four months ago we finished our tobacco plant beds for another season; however, it's time to be thinking of them again. Now is the time to start preparing for next year's plant bed crop.

This month is a good time to turn the ground for the beds so the soil can settle. Then, within a month we can go ahead and gas the beds.

Possibly, you may want to try the new way of sod planting the plant beds. Several farmers have tried this means locally and have had good luck.

If you stay with the conventional method of working up a seed bed, you may want to get the gas applied with a machine. The machine can be used to apply the plastic and one of several chemicals to kill the weed seed all by one operator from a tractor seat.

Plant ahead now for better results next spring "Down on the Farm".

Rockcastle Recollections

By John Lair

A recent request for additional information on the Cook Family has been productive of very good results. In addition to history of this family sent in by Mrs. Mary Walker, of Berea, which was recently published here, I now have further facts submitted by Mrs. Robert Huff, also of Berea. Her article follows:

"In the Scaffold Cane area of Rockcastle County, on the farm now known as The Seals Place, in this year 1877, there remains standing a log house erected prior to the year 1812, by William Cook. He and his wife Elizabeth are buried in a small cemetery near the house. This is probably one of the oldest houses remaining in this area. When it was erected the people came from the Stanford area of Lincoln County. There were not enough people living in this area to have a 'house raising'."

This Cook land is believed to be that issued to Valentine Cook of Lincoln County, April 25, 1794, under Treasury Warrant No. 5247. Valentine Cook, Sr., was born 1740 and died 1797. He married Susannah Baughman. His father was John Hamilton Cook, of London, England. Valentine Cook is shown in list of Old Kentucky Deeds and Entries with a grant of 400 acres on Clear Creek in 1782 (7).

Robert Duncan Cook, born Dec. 28, 1826, was a son of Lindsey Cook and Elizabeth Cook. He first married Matilda Haley, who died in 1865. He then married Martha A. Graves, of Rockcastle County. He was a captain in the Union Army, 1861. Sheriff of Rockcastle County in 1864. County Court Clerk in 1864. Representative in Kentucky Legislature for Laurel and Rockcastle Counties 1871-1873 and took the census of Rockcastle County in 1880.

The following is copied from the Cook Family Bible: William Cook was born Nov. 26, 1770; Jane Cook, first wife of William Cook, departed this life Oct. 31, 1791; Elizabeth Cook, second wife of

William Cook, departed this life July 19, 1812; Lindsey Cook, son of William and Elizabeth Cook was born March 25, 1786; Elizabeth Duncan Cook, wife of Lindsey Cook, born Dec. 3, 1799, died Oct. 12, 1848; Robert Cook, son of Lindsey Cook and Elizabeth Cook, born Dec. 29, 1826; Frances Cook, daughter of Lindsey and Elizabeth Cook, was born Jan. 3, 1840.

Richard F. Cox, Jr., a son of "Dick Cox" formerly of Mt. Vernon, is really upsetting my apple cart and maybe causing me to do a lot of work all over again. After much research in an attempt to name the first settler in Rockcastle County I had finally settled on David Lewis and family. I was basing this conclusion largely upon a statement in the History of Kentucky, published 1922, by Connelly and Coulter. Connelly has long been considered one of our most careful and qualified historians and when he wrote that David Lewis, born in Petersburg, Virginia and married to Latitia Napp, of Wales, came with his family in 1785 and settled two miles west of Mt. Vernon, I thought my search was ended, and so announced. Now young Richard Cox, Jr. tells me that he has a lengthy and almost completed history of the Lewis Family and that according to his information the David Lewis whose wife was named Matilda was born between 1775 and 1780. If this is correct, then he could not possibly have been in Rockcastle with a family in 1787. In the hope that he might have read it wrong, I am writing Richard to take a second look at his family records. If I have to give up on David Lewis and family as the first permanent settlers in the county I've got a lot of work ahead in trying to decide who was.

To further complicate matters by informing me that a Joseph Lewis who came to Rockcastle County at an early date on David Lewis's family as the Lewis' headed by David Lewis. He quotes from a published book that the Lewis family which shows that Joseph Lewis was born in England and came to the part of Lincoln County which was later embraced in Rockcastle County.

His wife was Sarah Whitley, a sister of William Whitley, famous Indian fighter, and builder of the first brick house in Kentucky. They had 8 children: Ruth, Sarah, Isabelle, Mary A., Samuel, Joseph, Jr., William and Benjamin. He is believed to be in the census of 1820.

Who knows anything about the Reed Family living in a big house outside of Mt. Vernon, on the Sand Springs Road? The house is still standing and was lived in for awhile by the Bullock family. I believe the head of the Reed family was named Charles. A son attended medical school in Lexington and after graduating went west and was a physician with General Custer and his command, escaping death in the Custer defeat only by being left on post when the 7th Cavalry left headquarters on their expedition against the Indians that ended at the Little Big Horn. His sister, Julia Redd, married Dr. Cooper, of Livingston, and after his death, went to live in Louisville. The Redds were a well-connected and prominent family in this area and I would like to know more about them.

If you have information differing from what I have written about any family, or any incident, please feel free to correct me. These articles are being run in the hope that we can get at the true facts in all cases and I depend on you setting us straight if we are in error.

demands for police protection and investigation across the state. Ricks was to be disappointed. The governor and the 1976 legislature authorized 50 extra officers for the KSP for the 76-78 biennium.
Within months, though, Dr. Ricks was back on the campus of Eastern Kentucky University. The bureau was busted.
With the KSP in financial trouble, the start of the next class at the academy was postponed once, then twice, by September of this year, however,

resignations and retirements had lowered the number of sworn officers to the level where the KSP could again open the academy. An "attrition class" is how the KSP describes the recently formed group which is taking the 16 week course of instruction.
There's something unique about this class. It includes a woman cadet; the first in the history of the academy. She is Maxine Rogers of Nicholasville. Cadet Rogers is 5 feet, 6 1/2 inches. That one-quarter is important.
Two women have been denied consideration by the KSP because they're shorter than the bureau's 5'6"

minimum. The Ky. Commission on Human Rights went so far as to try a legal maneuver to delay the start of the September class because the commission felt the minimum discriminates against women. The attempt failed.
While the question of the minimum will eventually be decided by the courts, the commission's effort to delay the start of the academy at the last minute would have caused problems for the 45 men and one woman who had given up their apartments and quit their jobs to report for training. Around the academy there were more than a few grumbles that if the commission had been successful in

delaying the class, the cadets who had already been accepted would have been the ones who would have been unjustly treated.

The entry of cadet Rogers into the academy clearly puts the KSP on the spot. If she is given any breaks during the training period, morale within the KSP, already suffering would sink even lower.

Should cadet Rogers quit during the training, as many men have in the past, the bureau would be open to charges of "trying to run her off."

The day before cadet Rogers started her training, the academy commander gave me a tour of the cadets' living quarters. A glass partition separates the men's area from the one where cadet Rogers will be living. Her bunk, desk and the size of her room are the same as those of the men. She does have a private toilet, which should be expected, and her room is carpeted. It used to be the instructors' night room. The carpet wasn't laid just for her.

The academy, for all practical purposes, is a boot camp. The instructors put the cadets under maximum stress to weed out those who cannot take the pressure. Better now, than on a deserted back road in Eastern Kentucky.

"Two-thirds of these guys don't know what they're getting into," said one instructor as the recruits checked in for the first day of training. Whether or not the instructor's comment includes cadet Rogers is not known, and probably won't be until the class ends.

Cadet Rogers did make one interesting remark prior to entering the academy. She said the 5-foot-6 rule is a good one. "No one is better than I am,"
