Rockcastle Recollection

DAVIS FAMILY

The principal branch of the Davis family in Rockcastle County is of Welsh derivation. They are descended from an ancestor, first name unknown, who came from Wales to America at an early date. He was married to Elnor Howe, of a noted English family. Their son, Solomon Davis, also had a son named Solomon Davis. This Solomon Davis was the father of Josephus Newton Davis, who in 1852, at Mt. Vernon, Kentucky wrote a brief sketch of his activities in Rockcastle County.

In his autobiographical sketch he states that he had taught two schools in Mt. Vernon, one a large school for which he was employed by H. Carpenter and T.J. Smith and for which he received one hundred and sixty dollars plus an additional thirty dollars for conducting a class in surveying for some of the boys, a total of one hundred ninety dollars for the entire term. He is said to have had a classical education, being well versed in Greek and related subjects.

Joseph Newton Davis spent much of his time in the ministry. He says in his autobiography that he preached many sermons in Rockcastle and felt that he did much to effect a union between the Reformation and the Baptist. He spent much of his life in neighboring Pulaski County, where most of his family was born. One of his sons, William (Uncle Bill) was, for many years, one of the better-known schoolteachers in Rockcastle County and raised a numerous family here. Some of my earlier years in the schoolroom were spent under him and I remember some of the unique and original corrective measures he applied in preserving order. If a boy fell behind his class, Uncle Bill would cut a couple of dogwood forks and tie them on his neck like spurs, suggesting that he spur up a little and try to catch up. I remember the time at Red Bud School, in the summer season when the big woodshed stave was empty, that he put one of the smaller boys inside it and closed the door, telling him he was headed for jail someday if he did not mend his ways and he might as well begin early to get used to being locked up. After his death, his wife was elected Superintendent of Public Schools for Rockcastle County. Their youngest son, Carl, was one of the boys in the group I took to Chicago in the early thirties to form a country music act on radio station WLS, where he became a successful performer and songwriter.

Another son of Josephus Newton Davis was Dr. Cepha Davis, who taught school and practiced medicine in Pulaski County until 1886, when he was brought to Rockcastle County by County Judge Jerome Burke Lair and appointed to fill the unexpired term of Dr. A.B. Lovell as county superintendent of public instruction. After serving out this appointive term, he was elected for the full term following. He stayed on in Mt. Vernon, practicing medicine and operating a drug store. Among his children were two sons, both of whom became assets to their community. Charles C. Davis was long the leading druggist in Mt. Vernon and a businessman of substance. William T. Davis was, for many years, owner-editor of the Mt. Vernon Signal, during which time readers were not kept in ignorance of his views on any subject. He bore a marked physical resemblance to Jefferson Davis and possibly entertained somewhat similar ideas on several subjects. He never gave up hope that "The South Would Rise Again" and always went fully prepared for appropriate action in that eventuality.

The Davises have always made themselves felt in any community in which it has been their lot to cast.

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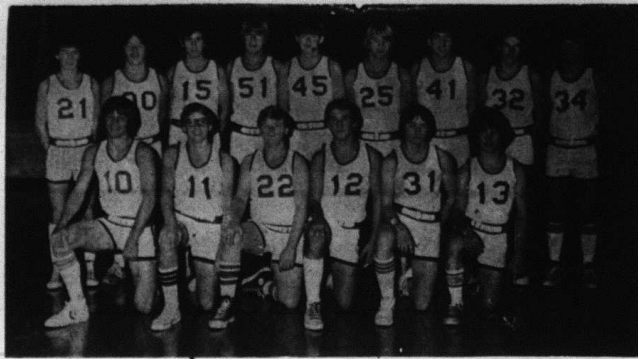

City Council to Break Ground for New Recreation Project at Lake Linville

The Mt. Vernon City Council has set Saturday morning at 10:30 a.m. as the time of the ground-breaking ceremony for the Lake Linville Recreation Project.

A definite first move was necessary on the project or the city stood to lose federal funding which had been allocated. Work must begin on the project by December 1.

The city is still discussing with various civic groups the possibility of an organization such as the Jaycees or the County Recreation Council overseeing the park after its completion. The Mt. Vernon Lions Club has already refused responsibility for operating the park.

The council received an Environmental Assessment concerning the elderly housing project planned for property located behind city hall. The report is required by the Department of Housing and Urban Development before a Community Development Block Grant can be given. Mt. Vernon was awarded \$28,000 last summer to begin the project.

Fire Chief John Cox requested that the Council match funding he had promised to purchase new fire department radios. The department had received \$250 in state funds and had collected an additional \$130 themselves. The Council agreed to donate an additional \$119.90 to purchase the radios which cost \$699.90.

Annexation problems were on the Council's agenda again Monday night. Residents of Dally Street, concerned over the possibility that their homes would not be taken into the city, asked for further explanation by the Council. Difficulties with annexation on the north side began when Fannie Mullins asked

that only a portion of her property be taken in. The Council is to discuss with her again what part of her land will be annexed.

The Hale-Robinson property on the Rose Hill Road also presented some problem to the Council. There is apparently some discrepancy between actual property lines and the annexation

survey. The situation will be reviewed with City Attorney Carl Clontz and Charles Mullins, surveyor.

The Council received one new application for city policeman but they have not firmly decided whether a full-time or part-time policeman will be hired. Some action is expected to be taken Saturday morning.

Ernest Mason, who was defeated in his bid for re-election as Magistrate of the Fifth District in last week's general election, has asked for and received a recount of the three precincts in which his race was on the ballot.

Mr. Mason was defeated by Joe Clark, an unsuccessful candidate for the Republican nomination in the May primary, who mounted an intensive write-in campaign, prior to the general election.

The East Livingston precinct gave Mr. Clark his needed margin with 257 write-in votes cast for Mr. Clark to Mr. Mason's 62. Mr. Mason carried the other two precincts, Orlando and East Mt. Vernon, by 192 votes. Mr. Clark also out-pollied Mr. Mason in the absentee ballots 15 to 5. However, this is one area in which there has been a question raised as to their legality.

According to Clyde Barnett, one of the election commissioners, Mr. Clark received 15 votes on absentee ballots. All of these ballots had Mr. Clark's name written in but the required X, indicating their vote for him, was not there and this is supposedly a requirement when voting by absentee ballot for a write-in candidate.

Mr. Mason's attorney, Charles McCoy of Richmond, has questioned the legality of all 15 of the absentee ballots cast for Mr. Clark. When the three voting machines were checked for the re-count, there was found to be no discrepancy as to

the original figures. But, when the write-in votes from the East Livingston precinct were checked, it was found that one vote cast for John Doe for Magistrate of the 5th district had been included in Mr. Clark's total and this vote was deducted from his total making the final count 374 to 362.

Another question also arose when the write-in votes in the East Livingston precinct were checked. Mr. Barnett said there was evidently some discrepancy between the handwriting on the book where a voter signs and the handwriting by these same voters on their write-in vote, if a voter wants to vote a write-in candidate and he cannot read nor write, he must swear to an affidavit to this effect and then, two election officers — one democrat and one republican — must accompany him to the booth along with another person of the voters choosing it he desires and the name of the candidate be written in as the voter indicates.

In the question that has arisen, if the signature on the voting book does not match the handwriting on the write-in vote, then there should be an affidavit to back-up the action of an election officer writing in the name of the candidate for the voter.

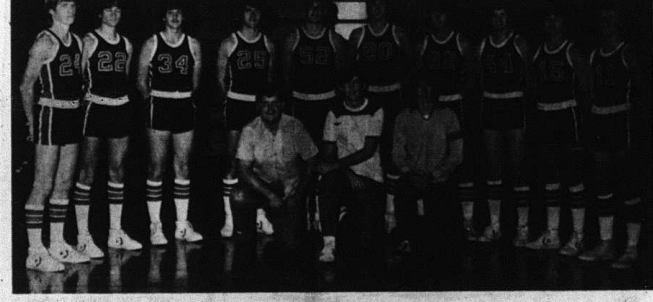

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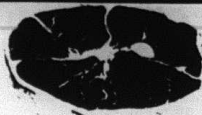

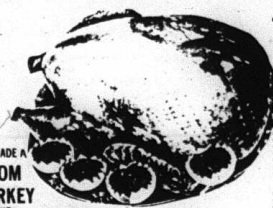

Are You Ready For Winter?

Remember the winter of 76-77? Were you ready for the below zero temperatures, for ice and snow, for limited or no fuel supply? The lack of water, heat and electricity puts strains on any family. Now is the time to begin preparing your home for the cold weather to come.

The following list can help you recognize things which you need to do to be ready for an emergency.

Heating: If your fuel source runs out or is cut off, are you prepared by having an alternative heating source? It may be an electric space heater; a gas, wood, coal or kerosene stove; fireplace; or an electric generator.

Is your heating system cleaned and ready for winter? Call in an experienced

service man for the job.

Do you have on hand or within a reasonable distance a supply of: oil or kerosene, coal, firewood, bottled gas, gasoline, newspaper, magazines and matches for whichever alternate heating system you will be using?

Do you know how to change furnace filters?

Do you keep registers, air vents and radiators clean?

Will you close off the fireplace flue (shut damper) when it is not in use?

Have you checked the chimney and repaired loose mortar?

Have you purchased and/or located a fire extinguisher near your stove or fireplace? A pail of sand, salt, or baking soda can be used on most non-oil material fires.

Plumbing: Do you plan to reduce the amount of hot water used daily?

Have you insulated long hot water pipes, especially those under the house or those that go through unheated basements?

Have you repaired leaky faucets? One drop a second can waste up to 60 gallons of hot or cold water in a week.

Have your encouraged family members to take showers versus tub baths—must be sure to limit showering time to 5 minutes or so?

Have you considered lowering the temperature setting on the water heater to 140 degrees or 120 degrees. Unless you have a dishwasher, these temperatures will be adequate.

Have you made provisions for an alternate water source should pipes freeze for personal hygiene and sanitation? Store in closed containers where it will not freeze. Remember snow can be melted to use for these purposes.

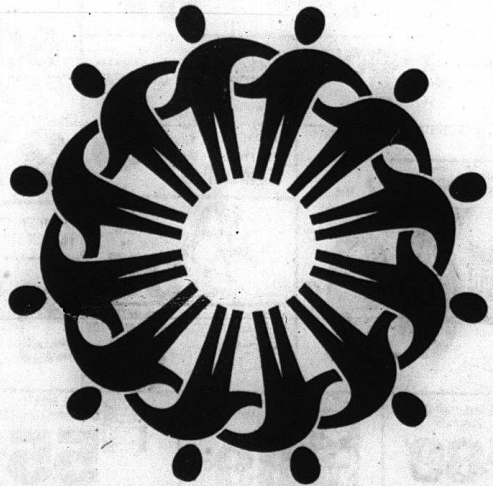
If pipes freeze inside, do you have on hand a heat source (lamp, candle) to begin the thawing process. You may need a plumber; do you know his number?
