around our tree. We also strung grains of red corn-not capped-and would these strings with the white capped corn, add oil it was beautiful."

In Henderson, the Groves family tries to decorate with traditional pine and holly, paper chains and displays of holiday cards as their families did in West Virginia. In the Boone County hills there would be hickory nuts and walnuts, and at one time chestnuts. In the Dowler and Conley families as well as others, children would gather nuts to fill bowls for table centerpieces and for eating, and often at night would roast chestnuts and apples in the fireplace while cutting colored paper into pieces for chains for the tree.

In Floyd County, the Fitzpatrick children made their trimmings, and often they were good enough to eat!

Spray the common cornblades and make them gold and silver bouquets; wrap small playthings in big packages and little packs to stack anywhere there is space. Clutter it up with Christmas and let everyone help. Talk Christmas, share Christmas and love Christmas. It's a time for family closeness when family and neighbor embrace the next street, the next town, the far country and the stranger.

Whatever you do this year, decorate with your heart.

## No Decision Made Yet as to Who Will Be Trial Commissioner for County

According to District Judge Calvin Aker, no decision has been made as yet as to whom the Trial Commissioner for Rockcastle County will be when the new court system takes effect the first of the year.

Mr. Aker said Tuesday in a telephone interview that technically no one would be appointed until January 2, 1978, when he was sworn in but that an announcement would be made prior to that. Mr. Aker further said that several conversations had been held with various people in Rockcastle County including one local lawyer and that the statute says that a lawyer shall be appointed when available—of course, this is incumbent on a lawyer being willing to take the \$6,200 a year job.

On question, Mr. Aker said that he and the other district judge, Walter Macquire expected to be in the county two days a week Monday and Thursday. This is a tentative arrangement, Mr. Aker said, depending on the case load which might require more or less days.

There will not be a court stenographer required under the new system. According to Mr. Aker, a sophisticated quadraphone recording system with 4 speakers will be used instead. The four microphones will be distributed one to each lawyer, the judge will have one and there will be one for the witness. The advantage of this system is that if it is necessary to play back the tape, the four channels can be separated so that if two persons speak at the same time, then both can be distinguished by selecting the proper channel.

The microphones will be a permanent installation at the courthouse but since there was only one recording device purchased for each judge than on their days here, the judges will have to hand carry the machine with them.

## City Council Meets; Decides To Annex Additional Property

The Mt. Vernon City Police were briefly discussed at a meeting of the City Council Monday night.

The Council is still considering whether or not to hire an additional full or part-time policeman to replace John Grider, who resigned several weeks ago. But, once again, the Council failed to resolve the situation.

However, after two months of revisions, a final decision was reached on the question of annexation of property on the north end of Mt. Vernon.

The Council finally decided to use the original survey, taking in 150' of the Fannie Mullins property on Richmond Street. Annexation will extend to Ernie's T&M Market on the east side of U.S. 25 and to the Red Top Restaurant on the west side.

Charles Barr suggested to the Council that a crosswalk be printed across Main Street in front of the Bank of Mt. Vernon. Mr. Barr told the council he was interested in the welfare of elderly pedestrians crossing the street at that point.

The Rockcastle County Court Clerk asked the Council that they be allowed to use the block building, located at Lake Layville, for their monthly meetings.

Keith Coffey, president of the club,

said that the club would make some improvement on the building if they were allowed to use it. The building is presently empty and is not included in the lease to John Lair.

The waterworks system was on the council's agenda twice. The 1977 audit was approved for publication and a grant for a storage building for the waterworks was discussed. Plans will be drawn for the building so the grant may be secured.

The council also voted to approve a resolution designating official signatures to be used on forms concerning the city's planned elderly housing project. The signatures include Mayor Roland Mullins, Councilman Chester Hellard and City Clerk Mary Craig.

A new comprehensive map of the city has been requested by the U.S. Census Bureau. The new map is required so the population count of the city can be corrected with the newly annexed areas.

A new sewer line was approved for a proposed car wash to be installed behind Jerry's Tire Center. A total of 130' of 6" line will be installed. The council also approved a water line for Claude Sweet. A 100' extension will be made on the Elmer Hale line on Rose Hill Road.

## National Farm Strike Draws Little Support In County

The nationwide "agriculture strike" scheduled to be Wednesday of this week, apparently has generated little interest or support in Rockcastle County.

The strike is being planned by a grass-roots farm group known as American Agriculture, based in Colorado and claiming one million members. It is holding a series of organizational meetings and demonstrations in Kentucky, Indiana and more than 30 other states.

William K. Bullen, with the local Farm Bureau office was not available for comment Tuesday, but an office employee said there appeared to be very little if any interest in the strike in the county. She reported that Mr. Bullen had just returned from Louisville where the Kentucky Farm Bureau held its state convention at the Galt House last weekend and said Mr. Bullen had reported that the strike was not even officially brought up at the meeting.

The strike is a protest against low

grain and livestock prices. Members of the American Agriculture group are threatening to withhold crops from the market, stop or cut back their purchase of farm machinery and other items, reduce next year's crop acreages and perhaps throw up picket lines around food distribution centers.

The protesters are asking for national legislation that would have the effect of setting minimum prices for the nation's crops.

About 150 farmers staged a tractor demonstration in Frankfort Saturday while the state Farm Bureau group was staging a spirited election fight and taking stands on various state and national farm issues. The Associated Press said the issue of the farmers' strike was not mentioned at the convention on Saturday.

The demonstration in Frankfort was one of 30 week end rallies in various states.

Rockcastle County's figures for October stand at 4.6 percent.



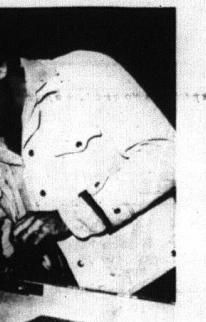

## CHAIRS FROM THE PAST

Sweet makes chairs for the society's exhibits like his shaped-seat corner chair of Honduras mahogany. This style is from the Queen Anne period (1720-1765), and was originally popular in Newport, Rhode Island. The tall-backed chair on Sweet's left is a copy of the "Craftsman" style or "Mission chair" which he fashioned from quartered white oak. It was designed by Gustav Stickley, the inventor of Craftsman furniture between 1890 and 1915. On Sweet's right is his interpretation of an Art Nouveau chair from the period between 1890 and 1915.

Sweet's skill and craftsmanship is displayed throughout the Old Crafted in Frankfort in the 40 pieces of furniture which he repaired and refinished during the restoration project from 1973-75. One of his most important contributions to the project was making the Speaker's desk in the Senate chamber. Sweet is currently working with the museum staff on the addition of a new room in the History Museum, one which will highlight Kentucky-made furniture.

## Socks from Santa's Pack

Warm up some feet this Christmas.

There's a world of color, style, and variety in current footwear. Your choice could be that perfect last-minute gift for either an outdoor buff or homebody. Take your pick and check the prices.

Leg warmers and stockings—these come in a splendid array of weaves, colors, styles and lengths—ankle-lengths, knee-lengths, and thigh-lengths. Cost: \$3 to \$30 or more.

Foot mittens—these are booties padded with goose down or synthetic insulation. The ones made with continuous filament synthetic stuffing are almost as warm as the down ones—cheaper, and easier to wash.

Leather-soled booties are tougher, but vinyl-soled ones are to be worn in the washer.

The uppers are made from rip-resistant nylon and should be fitted at the ankles so you can tuck pants inside them. They're good for backpackers at the campsite, hunter in the deer stands, and for padding around back home on cold floors. Cost: \$10 to \$20; less for a new sew-on knit.

Electric socks—these are wired for heat and hooked up to batteries. They're a little unhandy, but warm! Cost: \$8 to \$10.

Thermal socks—old standby, they're available in more colors than ever, and the thicker the better. Wool and wool blends absorb perspiration and do a good job of trapping insulating air between fibers. Cost: \$2 to \$10.

"Wick-away" socks—these are inner socks, made from synthetic fibers and meant to be worn with an absorbent wool sock over them. Not absorbent themselves, they pull perspiration away from your feet and into the outer socks.

Pair them with a colorful outer sock and gift wrap. Cost \$2.00 or less.

Insolens-long used in hunting boots for extra warmth. They cushion your foot in shoes or boots that have room for them. Made from foam, felt, or sheepskin, they trap insulating air. Cost: \$1 to \$5.

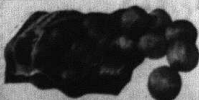

# County Agent's Notes

Two New Burley Tobacco Varieties Available for 1978 Planting  
Seed for two new, improved burley tobacco varieties is available to Kentucky growers for planting their 1978 crop.

Ky. 15 and Ky. 17 were released last spring to tobacco seedsmen for seed increase by the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Research Service of the USDA. Seedsmen found foundation seed of the two new varieties this summer, and now have an ample supply of certified seed to meet the demand expected from burley growers for planting next spring.

"Both varieties have more resistance to major diseases than varieties that growers have been planting, and both are high-yielders of quality leaf," says G.B. Collins, plant breeder and leader of the Experiment Station research project that developed the new varieties.

Ky. 15 and Ky. 17 have been tested for three years under farm-growing conditions across Kentucky and in Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia and Ohio. Tobacco leaf companies have evaluated the new varieties and have found them acceptable in chemical properties and in smoking tests.

The availability of seed to burley growers culminates 8 to 10 years of research that has gone into the development of the new varieties. Collins and ARS researchers C.C. Litton and P.D. Legg, in the Agronomy Department of the UK College of Agriculture, had the support of research by other scientists in the cooperative effort.

Ky. 17 is especially good news to tobacco farmers who have a black shank disease problem. This disease is widespread in the burley growth belt and the major disease problem in Kentucky, according to Collins. Ky. 17 has good resistance to black shank. In comparison with Burley 49, a variety with medium resistance and the best up to now for growing in black shank areas, Ky. 17 yields 400 to 500 pounds more per acre. The new variety also has complete resistance to black root rot, and high resistance to wildfire, mosaic virus and fusarium wilt.

Other important attributes of Ky. 17 include its early maturity and high quality leaf. Ky. 17 matures 3 to 4 days

earlier than Ky. 10 and Burley 49. The new variety has a 3.97% average total alkaloid level in its cured leaf on a dry weight basis.

Ky. 15, the other new variety, is a high-yielder that produces high quality leaf. Ky. 15 yields are comparable to or better than those of Ky. 10 and Ky. 14, the higher-yielding varieties that farmers have been growing. The new variety matures 5 to 7 days ahead on Ky. 10. Its cured leaf has an average total alkaloid level of 3.19% on a dry weight basis.

Ky. 15 has high resistance to black root rot, wildfire, mosaic virus and fusarium wilt. Its genetic resistance to black root rot, which Collins says is close to immunity to the disease, was obtained from a wild species in Australia, named *Nicotiana debeynii*.

"Both Ky. 15 and Ky. 17, are uniform standup varieties that should help Kentucky burley growers produce higher yields of high quality leaf acceptable to the industry," says Collins who led the cooperative research effort that developed the new varieties. The goal now of tobacco breeders in the continuing research program is to develop varieties that will produce even higher yields of better quality leaf.

**Pest Alert News**  
**BE AWARE THAT:** Alfalfa weevil egg populations are high in some southern fields. These high egg numbers may produce early larval populations next spring. Allowing animals to graze off accumulated growth may be some help in removing eggs already laid and in reducing egg laying sites, since Alfalfa weevil lays its eggs in alfalfa stems.  
**EXPECT PROBLEMS WITH:** Various pests in stored products, insect problems developing on house plants that were outside during the summer.  
**WATCH FOR:** Millipedes, centipedes, spiders, and various beetles and bugs being carried into homes on firewood; increasing lice populations on livestock.

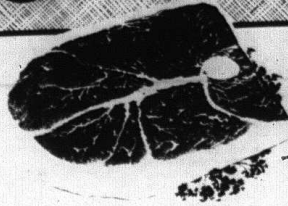

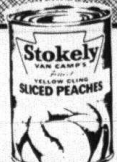

**Kentucky Afield**

Buying Christmas gifts for an outdoorsman can be a problem, particularly if the buyer doesn't know whether a plug is something you put in a shotgun to limit its capacity or something to catch bass.

Gift giving should be simplified by the fact that hunters and fishermen never have enough gear, tackle or accessories. But most outdoorsmen also do have very specific ideas about what they want or think they need, and this can complicate things.

Of course, if you start finding fishing tackle or hunting supply catalogs strewn strategically around the house, open to certain pages or with particular items circled in red ink, you have a pretty good idea what the sportsman wants for Christmas. But if such subtle hints aren't forthcoming, you'll have to improvise.

If the sportsman on your list shops regularly at a certain sporting goods store, the clerks will probably have several suggestions. Or a fishing buddy

or hunting partner may be able to help with the selection.

But often a gift certificate, or even cash, is the best way out. At least half the fun of acquiring new gear is going to the store, trying out the various items, swapping a hot tip or two before making the final purchase.

The larger the purchase, the more involved the recipient should be in the selection. A boat and motor, a shotgun, even a new gun and reel or a tackle box are, in a sense, rather personal items which even a knowledgeable-outdoorsman hesitates to select for another. So it's often better to forego the element of surprise in favor of making sure the sportsman gets exactly what he wants.

One gift, however, that you can feel safe in giving is a 1978 hunting or fishing license. This is something every sportsman needs, it's good for an entire year, and there are no problems about the right color or size.

All sport licenses expire at midnight, December 31, so the outdoorsman will need a new one shortly after Christmas. Resident hunting or fishing license cost \$5.00 each, or a resident combination license is available for \$9.00. Hunters under 16 years old need a junior license (\$3.50) but a license isn't required of fishermen until they reach their 16th birthday.

Also check before you buy grandpa a license-Kentucky residents over 65 need only a card (which can be obtained free from any county court clerk) showing their age and residency.

**New Registration Program Will Reduce Waiting Lines**

Kentucky is embarking on a new staggered vehicle registration program designed to reduce the waiting lines at county courthouses, according to the state Department of Transportation (KYDOT).

KYDOT Division of Motor Vehicle Registration Commissioner O.B. Arnold said license plates will be available at county courthouses by January 1, 1978.

"We are now moving to a staggered registration whereby license plates will be issued according to the month of vehicle purchase," Arnold said. "The program will take about six years to phase in," he said.

As in previous years, all cars must be licensed by March 1 and trucks, which are not included in the new system, must be licensed by April. However, when new cars are purchased during 1978, and as out-of-state vehicles are licensed in Kentucky, new tags will carry new renewal dates.

Arnold explained that a new car licensed in April, 1978, must be renewed by the end of March, 1979.

The 1978 license plates are manufactured by a firm in Mississippi not by prison industries as in previous years. And several changes have been made on the new tags.

The white plates with blue letters will be issued to last through the next five years so they are made of thicker metal than the old tags which alternated

colors each year. The tags will be updated with a yearly renewal sticker near the center of the license plate.

A county name sticker will be placed across the bottom of the plate and may be changed from year to year if a vehicle registration is renewed in a different county.

One advantage of the new system will be uniform fees for vehicle registration, Arnold said. He noted that in past years, if a vehicle was registered in the middle of the year, the registration fee was adjusted.

But with the new staggered system, a flat fee of \$12.50 is charged and the renewal date is moved to 12 months from issuance.

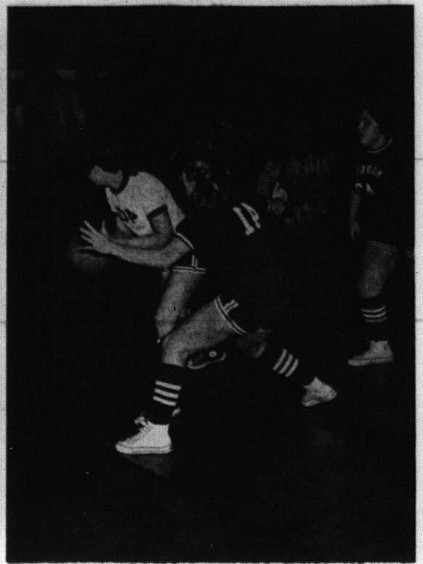

### KENTUCKY TURKEY HUNTERS MUST NOW TAG TURKEYS

This spring, for the first time, Kentucky turkey hunters who harvest one of the big birds must have it tagged at a check station or by a Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources conservation officer.

The mandatory tagging procedure, which was approved by the state Fish and Wildlife Commission in a meeting at Frankfort yesterday, was done upon recommendation of wildlife biologists, according to Fish and Wildlife Commissioner Arnold Mitchell, because of the need for more accurate harvest statistics.

Dates for the spring season and areas open are: April 22-30, Jackson, Owsley, Bath, Rockcastle, Lee Pike (except Breaks Interstate Park), Letcher (except Pine Mountain Wildlife Management Area), and Rowan counties and that portion of Menifee County north of U.S. highway 460; April 22-26, that portion of Butler County east of Green River Parkway.

In Land Between the Lakes Wildlife Management Area, in Trigg and Lyon counties, the season will run April 12

through April 23 and on the Pioneer Weapons area, in Bath and Menifee counties, the dates are April 22 through April 30. At the Fort Knox Wildlife Management Area, turkey hunting and civilian personnel assigned to or working on the post except that a limited number of off-post civilians will be permitted to hunt. Depending upon training priorities, any and all Saturdays and Sundays in April will be open to turkey hunting on that area, and civilians must apply in person at the hunt control headquarters building, beginning March 28 at 8:30 a.m.

Turkey hunters are limited to one bird per calendar year and only gobblers with visible beards may be taken. For further information, contact the Division of Game Management, Dept. of Fish and Wildlife Resources, Frankfort, Ky. 40601.

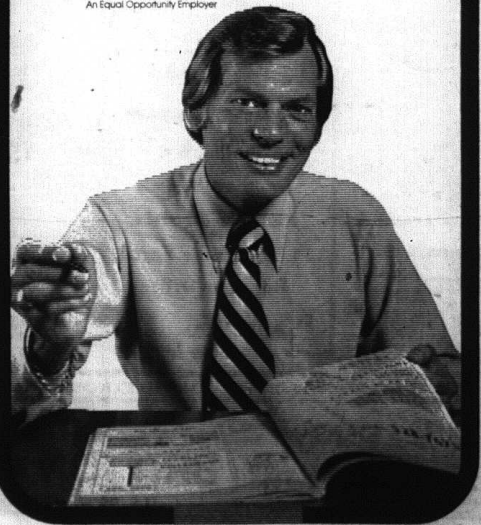
