These proposed rates represent the maximum levels that may be permitted as a result of the aforesaid pass-through, and they could be less depending on the ultimate adjustment allowed East Kentucky Power.

The Governor said he makes a distinction between the detectors and citizen's band radios, because the latter may also serve many useful purposes in notifying motorists of road conditions and helping stranded travelers.

"But I can't think of a single legitimate reason anyone needs a radar detector," Carroll said.

The Governor indicated that since the devices are not yet in widespread use, comparatively few drivers would be required to remove them from vehicles.

He indicated the cost of enforcing the ban on the devices would be minimal. The legislation, Senate Bill 60, is sponsored by Sen. Pat McCuiston.

## Jones Found Guilty of Drew Murder

Arthur Jones, 33, of Red Hill was sentenced to a maximum of 20 years in prison Tuesday after he was found guilty of murder by a Rockcastle Circuit Court jury last week.

Jones was the second of two men accused of murdering William Drew at Red Hill on August 8, 1976. Ronald Maupin was also found guilty in circuit court last term and also received 20 years.

Drew's body was found on Drew Valley Road on Monday, August 9, 1976 and Deputy Coroner Roy Martin concluded that he had been dead for several hours. An autopsy showed that Drew had bled to death sometime Sunday night from a gunshot wound in his left arm.

Jones and Maupin contended throughout their trials that they along with Drew were engaged in an ambush and the wounding of Jones.

Jones is expected to appeal the verdict.

## State Police Investigating Death

State Police are investigating the shooting death of a 21-year-old Lincoln County man who died Thursday night about 9:30.

William Leslie Smith of Route 1, Crab Orchard, died at the University of Kentucky Medical Center after being shot once in the face with a .22 calibre weapon. State Police said he was shot late Thursday afternoon.

The shooting took place about 9 miles south of Crab Orchard in the Flat Woods Road section of Lincoln County.

State Police are calling the death a murder and have one suspect under investigation. No arrests have been made yet.

William Smith was born in Lincoln County on October 22, 1956, the son of Earl Smith and the late Alma Jean Collins Smith.

Besides his father, he is survived by his step-mother, Mrs. Mary Smith, Rt. 1, Crab Orchard; one sister, Mrs. Wanda Faye Denny of New Castle, Indiana and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lucy Collins of Eubank.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday, December 25, 1977 at the Dowell & Martin Funeral Home by Bro. Cecil Roundtree. Burial was in the Double Springs Cemetery at Waynesburg.

Dowell & Martin Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

## RECC says rate increase may be necessary

Lee Roy Cole, President and General Manager of Jackson County RECC, announced today that the Board of Directors of Jackson County RECC has approved and filed an application with the Public Service Commission in Frankfort to request that Jackson County RECC be allowed to adjust its rate by the same amount that the wholesale rate may be adjusted by East Kentucky Power Cooperative in its case before the Public Service Commission.

East Kentucky Power, the wholesale power supplier, has requested an adjustment to cover the increased cost it has experienced in the construction and operation of its new generating and transmission facilities as well as general cost increases for the production and delivery of electricity. As examples of its increased costs, East Kentucky cited the cost of constructing its Cooper generating station unit two completed in 1969 which cost \$129 per KW for the 200,000 KW unit, its Spurlock unit one completed in 1977 had increased to \$383 per kw. for the 300,000 kw. unit. Interest rates have increased from 2% to 6.40% during this same time period for the above facilities. Other increased costs were itemized. Jackson County RECC is requesting that its adjustment be limited to the amount granted to East Kentucky Power.

Mr. Cole also stated that this is the first step in a two-step rate application both of which are designed to recover increased costs which Jackson County RECC is required to pay for wholesale power. One increase started in 1976. The other is in process at the present time. The second step in the application by Jackson County RECC will probably take place in the next few months.

He further stated that the Cooperative has requested the Public Service Commission to approve a plan for transferring a large portion of the fuel charge into the base rate. If approved this would mean that most of the fuel charge will not appear on the electric bills as a separate item. It also means that the new proposed rates are not an increase over the old rates insofar as the amount of fuel charge to be rolled into the base rates is concerned since the fuel charge already is a part of the bill.

## Carter Announces for Re-Election

Congressman Tim Lee Carter announced formally today that he will seek another term as U.S. Representative from Kentucky's Fifth District.

Carter, a Republican, will be vying for his party's nomination in the May 1978 primary to run in the general election next fall.

Word of Carter's decision came at a 2 p.m. news conference at his district office in Somerset. Carter told newsmen that he would run and laid out plans to campaign for the seat in Congress on the floor of service to the people of the Fifth District over the past 13 years.

"I believe we have made a great deal of progress, and I am seeking re-election in order to continue to help the people in the Fifth District," Carter said.

"In addition, I have received the endorsement of the county chairmen and

chairwomen in every Fifth District county for another term. I consider this a mandate from my party and will do my best to fulfill it," the Congressman added.

Carter, a physician from Tompkinsville, was first elected in November 1964 and has been voted into office six times since.

During his years in the House he has served on one of the busiest and most important committees, the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, and risen to leadership position. He presently is ranking Republican on the Health and Environment Subcommittee and also holds the top GOP spot on the Small Business Committee's Subcommittee on Energy, Environment, Safety and Research.

Much of the legislation he has been

instrumental in helping to develop and enact has been in the health field, including new laws to fight cancer, arthritis, diabetes, genetic diseases, and kidney ailments.

Numerous organizations have cited him for his contributions to the nation's health. Carter was also an original sponsor of the Safe Drinking Water Act and has supported many programs directly affecting the Fifth District, including the Appalachian Regional Commission and Farmers' Home Administration.

Three times he has been presented the National Associated Businessmen's "Watchdog of the Treasury Award" for fiscal responsibility and was the National Federation of Independent Business' 1972 Kentucky Man of the Year.

Carter is married to the former Kathleen Bradshaw.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court met in special session last Friday morning and awarded the contract for construction of the new ambulance garage.

On a motion by W.H. Wren, seconded by Chester Whitaker, the contract was awarded to Preston Collins for his low bid of \$36,300. The motion stipulates that the work must be done within 200 calendar days.

## Low-Interest Loans Available to Farmers

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) announced today that low interest loans are available to help farmers improve their farms.

A spokesman for the USDA Agency said that from 10-177 through 11-30-77 only 28 Kentucky farmers have applied for and received \$109,180.00 in Soil and Water (S&W) loan funds. He also stated that Kentucky was 4th in the National for S&W loan making during the Fiscal year that ended 9-30-77 and hopes to be first this Fiscal Year. S&W loans have a 5% interest rate and a maximum repayment period of 40 years.

S&W loan funds are usually requested for farm and home water supplies, fencing, and basic land treatment such as liming, fertilizer, and seeding to establish permanent pastures. Loan funds can also be used for draining wet land, forestry, fish farming, and waste pollution abatement and control facilities. Most farm real estate improvements, with the exception of buildings, qualify as an authorized loan purpose.

Eligibility for loans is established by a committee of 3 persons who know local farming and credit conditions. Basic eligibility requirements include the applicant's inability to get sufficient credit elsewhere on terms he can meet and not having available resources of his own.

FmHA County Supervisors help the applicant prepare a plan of his operation to see if a loan can be repaid. Loans generally are secured by a real estate mortgage (including junior mortgages)

## Leaks and Lights Subject of Grand Jury report

The November Grand Jury expressed dissatisfaction with the condition of Rockcastle County's court house, although their complaints were not as strongly worded as those of the jury term.

The jail was found to be in satisfactory condition.

## Consumer Comment

### EXCHANGE OR REFUND POLICIES

Questions concerning store refunds and the return of merchandise have been increasing as a result of the holiday season. For example, you may receive a gift from a friend or relative for Christmas and have to exchange it. When you return the gift, however, the store may refuse to exchange the item or refund the purchaser's money.

There is no law in Kentucky that requires a store to refund or exchange merchandise, even if the merchandise has not been opened or used. If the established store policy is not to allow any refunds and exchanges, there is little that you or anyone else can do to force a business to refund your money or exchange the merchandise.

Smart customers find out what the store-policy is regarding exchanges or refunds before making any purchases. Signs should be posted in the store stating its policy on refunds and returns. If there is no sign, ask the clerk or manager if they allow exchanges, give refunds, or have special procedures for returning merchandise. Also check the sales receipts, lay-away contracts or retail installment agreements for return policies.

Whether purchasing a gift for yourself or for someone else, it is always wise to keep all receipts and to make each receipt so you will know which receipt corresponds to each gift. No matter how carefully you plan and shop there is always the possibility of having

to return or exchange the gift. To exchange unwanted merchandise, you will need to have the receipts to verify the purchase amount for the item.

A major problem many consumers may encounter when returning gifts received at Christmas is that the store refuses cash refunds and will only give you a credit slip toward the returned merchandise. This procedure is legally acceptable so purchasers should keep this in mind when buying presents for others. Ask questions regarding refunds and exchanges when you buy the gift to avoid problems if a return is necessary.

Each store may differ on its exchange or refund policy.

If you have any questions or complaints regarding these store policies, contact the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601. The office has found that they can most effectively handle written complaints and encourages you to write if you have a consumer complaint. However, if you have any emergency situation or just need some information call the toll-free consumer hotline number at 1-800-372-2960.

## Driving and Surviving on Winter Roads

into a snow bank or off the road and gets stuck? It's bitter cold out, night is coming on and no help is in sight.

Winter driving and handling this type of emergency can be rough. But with a little luck, and a lot of attention to a few survival techniques, you'll probably make it.

### Stay Warm, Set Out Flares

Set out flares or reflective warning markers right away, and tie a colorful cloth on your radio antenna as an S.O.S. Bundle up well before you get out of the car.

Once chilled, it's much harder to get warm again.

Run heater briefly. Keep the motor running and the heater on for no longer than about 10 minutes every hour to warm up the car. Be sure to open a window slightly to give ventilation in case exhaust fumes leak into the car.

Check your exhaust pipe right away and periodically, to be sure no snow blocks it now or later drifts over it.

Exhaust fumes are poisonous and breathing them can be quickly fatal. Drowsiness may be the only warning sign.

Use whatever is handy to help stay warm. Snuggle up with other people in the car. Cover heads, hands and feet to keep warm air from escaping from your body. Do not clapping and warming-up exercises of some sort if necessary.

Stay with your car, because it's probably the best shelter available. Don't go wandering off down the road to find help in bitter-cold or blizzard

conditions. Turn your dome light on occasionally and exchange some encouraging words with any passengers. Singing helps.

Precautions Here are a few things to do ahead of time to help you handle a snowbound emergency, especially if you're headed off on a long weekend or vacation trip.

Refill your gas tank when it gets to the halfway mark. This assures you a supply of gas to help run your heater very little bit to help from freezing or getting miserably cold.

Buy a beverage container you can heat water by plugging it into your cigarette lighter. Keep a jug of water in the car and some instant cocoa, coffee or tea. A hot drink can warm you and cheer you up, too.

Keep several lightweight "emergency blankets" in the glove compartment. These are full-size but will fold up into a small space. Wrapped around you, they'll retain and reflect back up to 80 percent of your body heat. These blankets cost only a few dollars and can make the difference between life and death in sub-zero temperatures.

Pack along some warm down or fiberfill sleeping bags as another alternative for staying warm through a long cold night in the car.

Carry emergency equipment, too, such as a flashlight, shovel, a bucket of sand or ashes, and tire chains. You might be able to dig, sand or clank your way out of your predicament and be on the road again.

Ice and Snow Skillful driving on ice and snow takes a lot of practice. The only substitute for practice is extreme caution and knowing what you should do, even if it's not instinctive yet.

Go very slowly, and keep more than the usual distance between you and the car in front. Don't let the impatience of

## Burley Quotas Likely to Stay Same for 1978

A quick windup is forecast for burley sales when the markets reopen January 4, and attention now has already turned to the 1978 crop outlook.

Will there be a production cut next year, or will the national quota remain about the same?

This perennial question is being weighed by growers and the industry in general. Under law the U.S. Department of Agriculture must fix the national quota for the 1978-79 marketing year by February 1, 1978.

The subject of next year's probable quota was aired briefly at the December meeting of Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association directors.

After a study of the government's latest supply-and-demand estimates and market figures on the present crop, it was generally predicted that 1978 quotas probably will be about the same as 1977, with no reduction likely.

The last national poundage quota cut was in 1976, a 5 percent reduction.

Burley stocks are about 2.8 years' use compared with the desired level of 2 1/4 years, under the USDA formula.

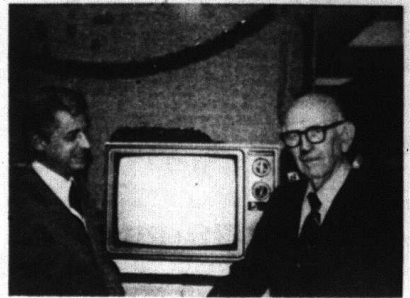
This year's crop, now about 1/4 sold, is estimated at 651 million pounds, up 1 percent since the market opened but still 4 percent below the 1976 crop of 679 million pounds.

Increased pool consignments over last year continued up to the market's Christmas recess. Alvin B. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer of the coop, reported that 8.62 percent of the offerings so far this season have gone under loan, compared with 4.6 percent at this time last year. The figures cover the five states of Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Missouri in which the Association handles price supports.

Total pool receipts for the season, against 14,529,990 pounds last year before the holiday recess.

Over-all quality of the crop is regarded as good. The pool consignments cover all grades.

Recent sales of old stock tobacco reported by Beckley were 17,038 pounds, from the 1976 crop.

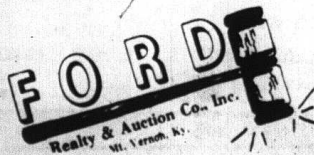

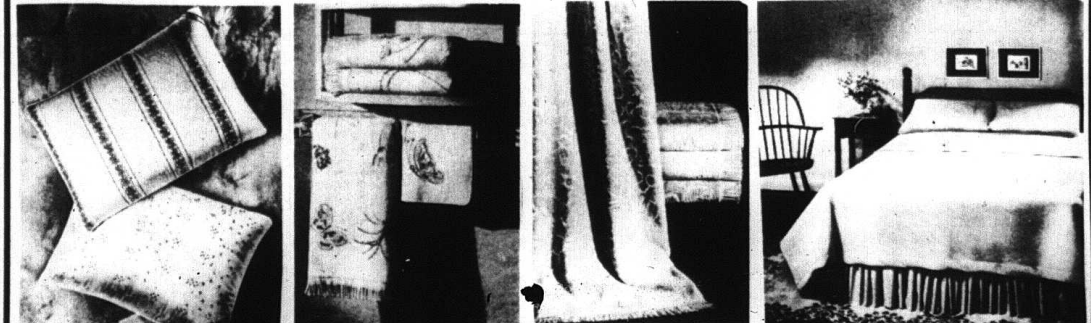

## Governor Carroll Wants To Outlaw Radar Detectors

If Governor Julian Carroll has his way, heavy-footed travellers on Kentucky highways will no longer have the advantage of radar detectors to outwit law enforcement officers.

Gov. Carroll is proposing legislation to the 1978 General Assembly to outlaw the devices by "strengthening the language of current laws on the books, which are not specific enough in making the devices illegal."

"In the last few years, there has been a growing trend toward making it a sort of game to get around 50 mph speed limit through the use of citizen's band radios and radar detectors to locate law enforcement officers and avoid speeding citations."

"This is a game where the losers may pay with their lives rather than a simple fine," he said, "so at least in the case of the radar detector, we have

otherwise.

**Your Tires**

You should have gone into winter with an engine tune-up and with good tires on your car. For some people, who stay home when the roads are their worst, regular tires with good tread are enough. Others prefer snow tires, or go to radials all the way around.

If you have to come and go every day in spite of weather conditions, studded snow tires and chains are a good investment. They'll often get you safely in and out of places you couldn't go

in the direction the rear of the car is sliding.

**Wet Roads**

Driving on wet roads can be dangerous, too. Roads can be especially slippery when it first starts to rain. The water can mix with dirt and oil and put a slick film on the road. So slow down when the rains come.

If there's much water on the road, your wheels can hydroplane, losing complete contact with the road. If you feel this happening, take your foot off the gas pedal, don't turn the steering wheel or hit the brakes. As the car slows down, the tires will take hold of the road again.

**Water and Ice**

One of the most dangerous road conditions can happen on a wet day when

School yourself to start slowly. Stop slowly, too, pumping the brakes lightly (something you can practice ahead of time). If you start to skid, keep your foot off the brake and try to steer
