The County Health Department has set aside each Tuesday as W.I.C. Clinic, when persons should come to receive their health evaluation and/or food vouchers.



# 18 RECC's plan to pass cost to consumer if rate climbs

The Kentucky Public Service Commission has adopted a plan to help prevent 18 state rural electric cooperative corporations from going bankrupt when and if their wholesale supplier is granted a rate hike.

PSC executive director Eugene Moody said, if a \$14 million rate hike requested last month by the Eastern Kentucky Power Cooperative of Winchester went into effect, the 18 RECC's would be in financial danger unless the increase could immediately be passed on to customers.

To help prevent the RECC's whose prices are also regulated by the PSC from going bankrupt, Moody has asked them to submit increase requests before the end of the year so that all rate filings could be processed at the same time.

"Most RECC's are non-profit cooperatives and they don't have capital cushions. The 18 RECC's must be able to bill their customers simultaneously, otherwise they're caught in a lag," Moody said.

"This is all being done with the commission's blessing," he said, adding that a similar plan was used last year with four rural electric cooperatives in Western Kentucky, who would have been greatly affected when a Tennessee Valley Authority rate hike went into effect. But he said that until now, such a plan has never been done on so large a scale.

**Blue Grass Rate:** The Kentucky Electric Corporation manager Jack Taylor said the 18 cooperative members will ask for a rate hike on Dec. 22 to accommodate whatever increase is granted the Eastern Kentucky Power Company.

Moody said the coordination effort requires that each electric company involved base its increase proposal on the same economic period. Should the 18 cooperatives be granted rate hike, they will be evaluated several months after it goes into effect to determine whether they could have absorbed their higher wholesale costs. If the higher retail prices are not justified, the extra money will have to be refunded to retail customers, he said.

The 18 cooperatives are: Blue Grass, Lexington; Clark County, Winchester; Fox Creek, Lawrenceburg; Fleming-Mason, Flemingsburg; South Kentucky, Somerset; Big Sandy,

Paintsville; Harrison, Cynthiana; Inter County, Danville; Jackson County, McKee; Licking Valley, West Liberty; Nolin, Elizabethtown; Owen County, Owenton; Salt River, Bardonia; Shelby County, Campbellsville; Farmers, Glasgow; Cumberland Valley, Gray; and Grayson County, Grayson.

## Clark sworn in; election suit begins

Joe Clark was sworn in as magistrate in Rockcastle County's fifth district on Monday, but whether or not he will remain in office is not yet decided.

Ernest Mason, the magistrate who lost to Clark in a re-election bid has filed suit and the case was started in circuit court Thursday.

Charles Coy, Mason's attorney, contended in the trial that fraudulent election practices gave Clark a narrow write-in victory over Mason whose name was on the ballot.

A total of 20 witnesses including one document examiner, three newspaper editors, two of who were also publishers, eight election officials, the county court clerk, the circuit court clerk, and the write-in candidate testified Thursday. Other witnesses were voters who claimed they were unable to vote for Mason though they wanted to.

The witnesses said that after they had entered the voting booth, the write-in vote door was opened on the machine and they were unable to register a vote for a listed candidate.

Voting machines can be cleared if a handle, beside a listed candidate is moved, but when the write-in door is opened, it cannot be cleared.

Reasoning is that if a candidate decides not to write in an unlisted candidate he can still write in a listed one.

James E. Barber, a certified

polygraphist and document examiner from Louisville testified that a large number of the write-in votes for Clark were written by the same person. A document examiner is commonly known as a handwriting expert.

According to Barber, an individual's handwriting is as individual as his fingerprints. He said that evidence such as that he presented has been accepted in courts for over 50 years.

Clark's attorney, Carl Clontz, contended that even though the names were written by the same people, there was no basis for declaring the practice fraudulent. He contended that some voters, unable to write had requested help from election officials in writing in a name.

Coy then argued that when help is given to a voter writing in a name, an affidavit of assistance must be signed and an assistance oath given to the

## \$20,000 suit filed against deputy jailer

A \$20,000 civil suit has been filed in Rockcastle County circuit court in connection with an alleged incident at the county jail involving former Deputy Jailer Oscar "Larney" Durham and Tim Bullock.

The complaint filed on December 21, 1977 states that Durham "willfully and maliciously committed an assault and battery on plaintiff Bullock."

The complaint goes on to say that "As a result, plaintiff suffered bodily injuries, physical and mental pain, and his earning power was permanently impaired."

The incident took place about 11:00 p.m., December 16, 1977, according to Bullock. He was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital a about 11:45 p.m. and was transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center at 12:30 a.m.

Bullock was admitted there and was treated for a broken jaw according to hospital spokesman. Bullock also reportedly suffered two broken teeth.

Bullock was cited by the Mt. Vernon City Police with Public Drunkenness and disorderly conduct according to police records.

A grand jury indictment was sought against Durham in December, but the case was delayed to the March term because Bullock was unable to testify. The complaint in a civil suit tells only one side of a story.

## New faces a majority in county's fiscal court

With three new faces present, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court held its first meeting of the new year Tuesday.

The court granted permission to Kerd & Handy Coal Co. to construct a bridge at Skaggs Creek and in the name of Rockcastle County. The structure is expected to cost near \$50,000 and the Company wants to build it under the auspices of the county to avoid administrative delays.

Roy Adams, a resident of the Quail section of the county, requested that the court officially choose an old unused county road off of State Rd. 328. The court moved to begin the legal process in connection with the closing.

James W. Lambert, county attorney, requested that an additional 50 cents be added to all fines and forfeitures collected in Rockcastle County and that the money be used for a Law Library in the courthouse. The court agreed to the boosting of routine costs from \$17 to \$17.50.

Two employees of the last fiscal year were rehired. Tommy Harold Mink remains the budget commissioner, and Elmer Decker will stay as the maintenance man at the courthouse.

## License plates now on sale

Court Clerk Irene Bales reminds everyone that 1978 license plates are now on sale at her office in the courthouse. The office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday and till noon on Saturday.

If you are a veteran and a car is furnished you by the government, your license plates will also be furnished, Mrs. Bales said. Or, if you are handicapped

by the loss of both arms or both legs or a combination of the two or are blind, you can buy a special plate designated for the handicapped. This will entitle you to special parking privileges in certain areas.

Mrs. Bales also said that she had been notified by the Department of Transportation that the personalized plates would be late this year.

## Health Department program serves women, infants, children

The Rockcastle County Health Department is pleased to announce a new health program approved for Rockcastle County, providing supplemental foods for women, infants and children (W.I.C.) in the county who have nutritional needs. The W.I.C. Program is funded by the United States Department of Agriculture through State Health Agencies. It operates in Kentucky through local health clinics

that serve a low income population and persons considered to be a nutritional risk.

Pregnant women, breast feeding women up to one year postpartum, infants and children up to five years of age may be eligible for the W.I.C. Program. To be eligible to receive supplemental foods through the W.I.C. Program, you must have a health evaluation at the local clinic and be certified by one of the health nurses. After certification, approved persons will receive an identification card and will be issued food vouchers which they will take to the participating store of their choice to receive their free foods. Newborn infants must be certified within 6-8 weeks after birth.

This new W.I.C. Program does not interfere with the Food Stamp Program and will not cause you to lose your food stamps. It only helps you who have nutritional needs to buy more of the foods your family needs with your food stamps, by providing you with free foods such as milk, eggs, fruit juices, cereals and baby formula, to give you more nutrition.

Persons approved and certified by W.I.C. must have a health evaluation every six (6) months which will

Eaton was concerned that pouring cement around the building might cause water drainage problems in connection

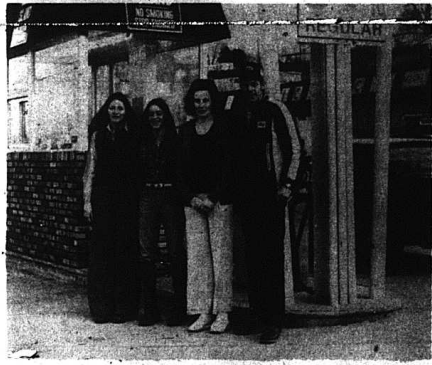
with storm sewers.

## State historical marker to be placed at Skaggs Trace

Skaggs Trace in Rockcastle County, site of the first Civil War battle in Kentucky, has been recognized by the state Historical Society with a historical highway marker.

The trace was named for Henry Skaggs, a long hunter, and was used by many famous pioneers, including Benjamin Logan, John Floyd and William Whitley. Daniel Boone crossed

the Rockcastle River near the trace in 1775 and it later became a part of the Wilderness Road.

On Oct. 21, 1861, the first Union victory in Kentucky took place near the trail at Camp Wildcat.

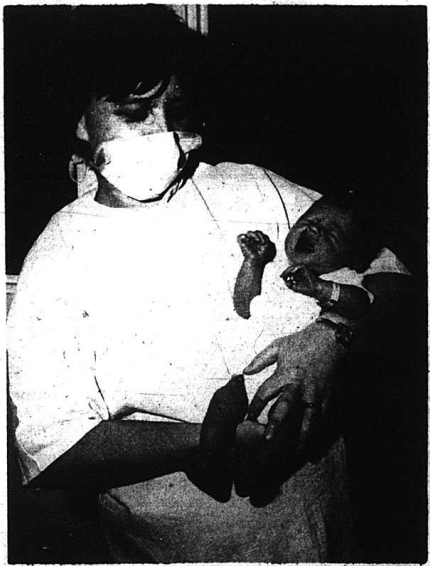
This marker is one of more than 1,800 plaques which the Kentucky Historical Society has created throughout the state to honor significant historical sites. The society has a guide available which contains numbers that

James and Mrs. Houk, Sr., merchant, farmer and former jailor. Home back of court house where R.L. McFerron now lives. Children: Babe, Leander and Nannie.

D.N. Williams and Mrs. Williams. Children: John, Casper, M.C., Cleo and Richard.

Ms. Kittie Bragg and daughter, Fannie. Where Mrs. Fannie Thompson now lives.

D.C. Poynter and Mrs. Poynter, sister to Mrs. Budge, merchant. One daughter, Bessie, now Mrs. Al Holmes who lives on West Main Street.

Dr. and Mrs. Jack Brown. Children: Georgia, Susie, Bob, Maurice, Aliza Logan and Eugene, only one living. Lived on corner behind courthouse.

Mrs. Lizzie Brooks. Children: W.T. McClellan and Bob. She lives on the lot where C.A. Davis nice log dwelling now stands.

J.E. Vowels, merchant, printer and chair-maker, where Wolf Hotel now stands on Main Street, where in 1877 the old Mountain Signal was first published by Vowels and James Maret. Children: John, Sally, Eugene, Bill, Aden and Lon.

Miss Lizzie Sowder, Miss Patsy Adams who later married Dr. Jack Brown and Harry Adkins, lived where the post office now is, south side of Main Street.

Dr. A.G. Lovell and Mrs. Lovell moved to Louisville in 1886 but returned about 1888. Children: Jack, who died young, "Lella" Ma' and Marguerite, now Mrs. Lella Mae O'Yara and Mrs. Marguerite Miller, living here.

Val Freeman and wife. Children: Alma, Annie and Ben. Annie is Mrs. J.T. Meadows and lives here.

James Prewitt and wife. Children: Henry, Frank and Joe. None live here now.

C.W. Adams, who owned property on

north side of Main Street where Mrs. Ella Baker now lives. He lived at the Joplin Hotel.

"Uncle" Marshall Moore, merchant, "Aunt" Coonie and "Aunt" Kate lived on northwest corner of Main and Moore Streets.

Joshua Boring, shoemaker, and sister, Mrs. Rowzee. His shop was about where the Bryant brick now stands. Mrs. Rowzee's children: John, Mattie and Essie.

George Baker and daughter Rica. He was a merchant and live on Richmond Street near where Mrs. Jilla Brown now lives.

Rev. James Hiatt, Christian minister, preached in the Old Christian Church house, the building now occupied by the Mt. Vernon Signal, the only church house in Mt. Vernon at that time. Rev. Hiatt and Rev. John Carmichael, a Baptist minister, preached two Sundays each per month in this house. And by the way, this is a surprise for you younger folks, the same people attended each service regardless of who was the preacher and you could not tell by the crowd which denomination was going to hold services till the preacher arrived. That was Christian Unity. The Masonic Lodge was on the second floor.

Judge George McClure, lawyer, and Mrs. McClure. Children: Tom, Lena, Bessie. They lived where Mrs. Sallie Bryant and Miss Myrtle now live.

"Uncle" Dick Miller, county clerk, lived where his grand-daughter, Mrs. Ina St. Clair, now lives. Children: James, Georgia, Mace, John D., Eliza, and Bessie.

Tom Taylor, blacksmith with shop behind the depot. Children: Susie, Logan D. and Eugene.

"Uncle" Henry and "Aunt" Becky Gentry. He was a blacksmith. Children: Clay, Mechack, George, John and a little daughter who died young, Thrye and Jim.

J.C. McClary, and Mrs. McClary. Children: Bill and Margie. They lived at what we call now the Dave Clark Place, on Richmond Street.

James Maret, R.R. Agent and Mrs. Maret's son, Lloyd.

E.B. Smith, lawyer and landowner.

Old Mrs. Grissom lived where Mrs. Ellen Price now owns and lives on West Main Street.

Sam Thompson and family now occupy the old Stanley House just beyond the Christian Church.

Will S. Adams, "Uncle Jack's" Willis", and Mrs. Adams lived where the Ab Sparks place is, on the corner of West

Main and Quarry Streets in an old house that has since burned. Children: Jack, Ida Mae, Lylie and Elizabeth.

Joe Jopkin's farm was next on the Broodhead Road, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Jasper Rickels. Children: Eliza, James, Bettie (my wife), Emma, Stella, Sallie and John.

Willis M.N. Jones, jeweler and Mrs. Jones. Children: Leone, Nell, Agnes, Nonie, Minnie, Flora and son William. Lived on the lot where the barber shop is adjoining U.G. Baker on Main Street.

W.M. Webber, druggist, and Mrs. Webber. Children: Gertrude, Mattie, Harry, Janie and Ann.

C.W. Ping, grocer, and Mrs. Ping. Children: Amanda, Smith, Jack and Bob.

J.W. Brown and Mrs. Brown and son, Conn.

Steve Ashley, big orchard east of town. Children: Jepome, Ed and Will.

Willis Griffin and Mrs. Griffin, undertaker, also operated a large grist mill and wool and carding factory

opposite the cemetery.

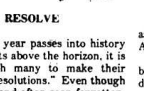

### Making Memories in Your Kitchen

- 1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce
- 1 can (15 oz.) Mexican style beans
- 1/2 to 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 cups biscuit mix
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1/4 cup sesame seeds

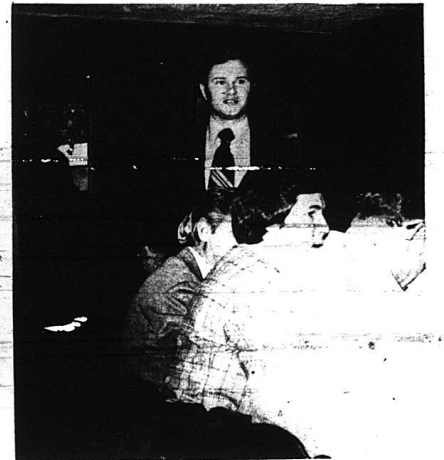

- 2 cups sliced canned peaches, or sliced bananas, or drained fruit cocktail, or canned apple sauce

Mix together gingerbread mix, evaporated milk, and water. Beat until smooth. Pour into greased and floured 8 inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Remove to wire rack. When cold, split gingerbread to make 2 layers. Fill and top with fruit. Serve immediately. Makes one 9-inch cake.

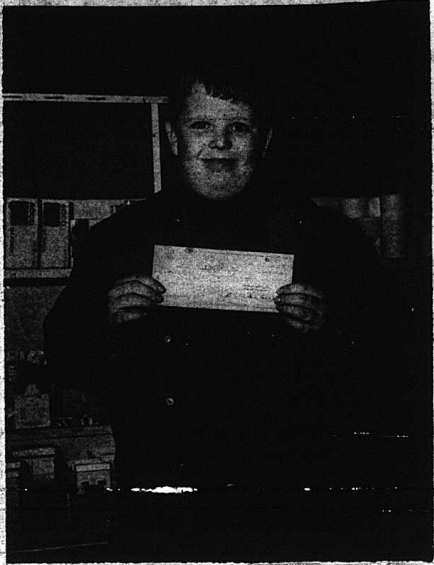

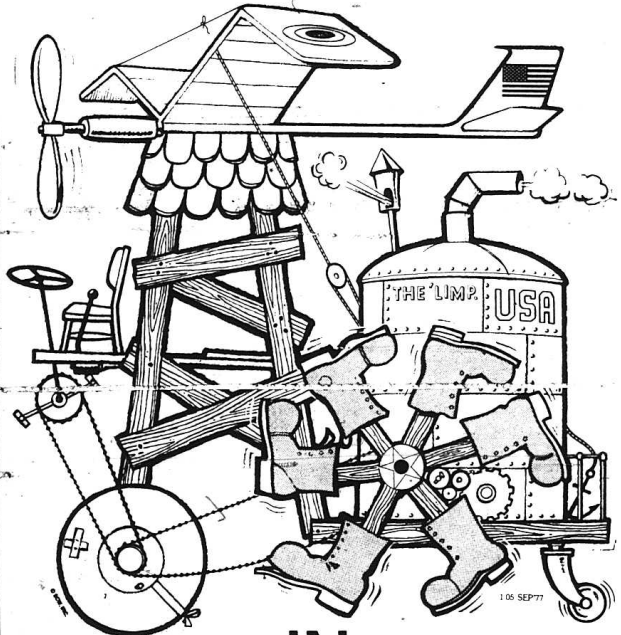

### Two-Faced Friend

In her declining years, a well-to-do widow became acquainted with a gallant young bachelor. He paid frequent visits to her home, showered her with small attentions, and ran assorted errands on her behalf.

Sure enough, when she died she left all her property to him. Disgruntled relatives promptly challenged the will, accusing the young man of exercising "undue influence" over the widow.

"Obviously," they told the court, "he was a two-faced friend. All he really wanted was her money."

Nevertheless the court upheld the widow's will, finding no evidence that she had been helpless. Regardless of his motive, said the court, he had a right to do her favors and she had a right to show him appreciation.

Influence is not "undue," say the courts, if it does not overpower the person's freedom of judgement. Even an illicit relationship does not automatically invalidate the will. Thus

A man's surviving sister objected to his will because it left everything to his paramour.

"This was adultery," she reported in court, "which was both immoral and illegal. Surely such influence is undue. But again the court sustained the will. The court said her brother's adultery did not prove that he was unable to think for himself."

On the other hand, such a relationship may at least cause a court to take a closer-than usual look at other circumstances.

Another man's will, also favoring his mistress, was thrown out on grounds of undue influence where the court found he had been suffering from both physical and mental disabilities.

The judge said the adultery should "intensely the care with which courts examine the facts and it may give to such facts a significance they might not otherwise have."
