### Fire places-Source of Auxiliary Heat

A half century ago, the fireplace was the only source of heat in many homes - and was therefore a necessity.

Today, a fireplace can be a costly luxury. Unless careful and extensive modification in design and installation is employed, it can be very expensive, primarily because of a lack of efficiency and the increasing cost of energy for home temperature control.

Many homeowners prefer a fireplace an auxiliary source of heat - and many home-owners are adding fireplaces to their homes as a source of supplemental heat.

If money is a factor when planning an emergency or supplementary home heating unit in the form of a fireplace, a number of facts should be considered.

The common fireplace, in most instances, is only about 10 percent efficient, even when well designed and constructed.

The efficiency can be increased considerably by adding a commercial fireplace circulator, which can possibly raise the efficiency to 40-50 percent. Even so, it is still a comparatively inefficient heating unit.

In properly operating fireplace, between 500 and 600 cubic feet of

combustion air per minute will be drawn up the chimney. This means all the air from a 15 to 20 foot room can be drawn out in five minutes.

Unless special provisions are made, combustion air for a fireplace comes from inside the house. This can include air heated by a central heating system. While fireplaces do operate efficiently, the air must be replaced by outside air, rather than inside air.

For proper operation of a fireplace, there must be five or six air changes per hour. Tightly constructed houses will normally average less than one complete air change per hour.

Heating infiltrated cold outside air places a large demand on the home heating plant, hence is an extremely expensive factor.

Following are a number of tips that can improve the efficiency of a fireplace: Located the fireplace on an inside wall if possible. The heated masonry will radiate some heat into the home.

Build in a metal manufactured fireplace heat exchanger. An exchanger with a small fan for circulating hot air increases efficiency.

Install a glass door fire screen of clear tempered safety glass. It reduces heat loss up the chimney when fire is smoldering.

Install an air tight grill in the hearth at the front of the fireplace to obtain combustion air, preferably from outside, or from the basement or crawl space if not possible from the outside. The air inlet should be closed when the fireplace is not in use.

The thermostat for the home's central heating system should not be in the room with the fireplace, or it should be a considerable distance from the fireplace.

Install and manage efficient dampers and draft controls to minimize heat loss up the chimney.

Close off the room where the fireplace is in use, if possible. This will reduce heated air from other rooms being drawn up the chimney.

Fireplace air heaters can be built or obtained commercially that will not only serve as a grate to hold the wood or other fireplace fuel, but will also force warm air into the room.

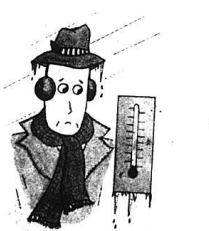

## 4-H talk meet is January 30

The Rockcastle County 4-H Talk Meet (Speech Contest) will be held January 30, 1977 at 7:00 p.m. at Livingston School.

Rules for the meet are: 1) Any 4-H member age 9 to 19 may participate. 2) Talks by 9 to 13 year olds are 3-5 minutes long; those by 14-19 year olds are 5-7 minutes long. 3) Participants may choose any topic they wish and may have assistance in preparing their talk. 4) The 4-H Talk program is divided into the following divisions: Girls - ages 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14-15, and 16-19; Boys - ages 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14-15, and 16-19 (ages as of January 1, 1978).

A champion will be chosen in each division and will represent the county at the Area 4-H Talk meet, and will receive a trophy.

4-H leaders or members must register their talk by calling the County Extension Office at 256-2403.

Parents, leaders and friends are welcome to the Talk Meet.

If school is closed on the day the talk meet is scheduled due to weather conditions, it will be postponed and the public will be notified of the new date.

## City Council discusses police problems will meet in special session Thursday

The Mt. Vernon City Council went into executive session at their first regular meeting of the new year Monday to discuss alleged "improprieties on the part of Police Officer Joe Howard," according to Mayor Roland Mullins.

Gen. Hammonds, a Rockcastle County resident, stated to the council that he was stopped by Mt. Vernon police on December 16, 1977 after another individual complained to city police that he (Hammonds) was driving recklessly. Hammonds was stopped and taken to the Rockcastle County Jail. No warrant has apparently been issued but Hammonds was cited for reckless driving while at the jail.

According to Police Officer Larry Williams, he has been a long-standing procedure for the police to arrest individuals on the promise of a warrant if a complaint is made late at night and no issuing authority is available. Williams said the officer can make an arrest if he is fairly well-assured that the complainant will procure a warrant the following day.

The Council will meet in special session Thursday night, tonight, to discuss the incident.

Charles Alfred Mullins was present to discuss with the council the Bureau of Census map which must be updated before revenue sharing funds can be received. Mullins agreed to update the map as soon as possible and return it to the Census Bureau.

## Square dancers workshop

A workshop for Western Style Square Dancing in Beres on Thursday, January 19, at 7:30 p.m. at the St. Clair Catholic Church, Lloyd Holbrook will be the caller.

The Council voted to hire Jailer Billy Kirby as radio dispatcher. The Council will, however, discuss the method of payment to the dispatcher with the county. Presently, the city pays \$100; the county \$50 and Broadhead and Livingston \$25 each. The county also pays for radio maintenance.

Bud Cox, of Cox Funeral Home, presented the council with a bill for \$336.

Mr. Cox told the council that he has been paying the telephone bill for the fire department since January of 1975. An error was apparently made when an outside bell was installed at the funeral home resulting in their being billed for the fire department's phone service.

The Council voted to pay the bill and to correct the billing error with the phone company.

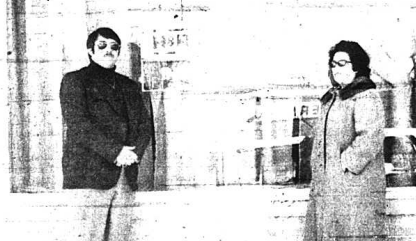
will be present to assist veterans and their dependents with claims for benefits due them as a result of their military service. He will be here between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.

"Our campaign will be based solely on the issues, and I will give specific answers to any and all questions asked so there will be no doubts in anyone's mind on where I stand," said Carmical, who denies having a "photographic memory." "Let's say I have usually instant, almost total recall of what I have read and heard," said the professor-turned-politician, "and that I do my homework."

## "Lest we forget"-A Rockcastle Legacy

The dark clouds of a great depression hovered low in 1929 but for me, a carefree tot of seven about to enter school, the national cares and woes were a millennium away.

Dressed in my knee pants, boots and Lindbergh headgear, complete with goggles, I entered the first grade. The white frame building, recently razed, was situated in the southwest corner of the "old graded" school ground.

Actually, the building was a large two-room structure housing the first and second grades and separated in the center by a cloakroom. A receptacle for storing our garments and "dinner," usually consisting of a cold biscuit and jam wrapped in a newspaper or carried in a brown sack.

Students never forget their first grade teachers and we considered ourselves the luckiest in the whole country for we had Dena Nicely - our "Miss Dessie" as we called her. What a wonderful lady - erudite, poised, beautiful; she molded our lives and filled them with love, joy and compassion. After these many years, it is still a thrill for me to see her.

Too, after these long lapsed years, I remember certain particulars of that first year. The deserted Brown Memorial School stood serene, ghostly and mysterious to the front of the lot and

was to turn a few years later and to the north of the school ground, a small burial plot consisting of approximately a dozen graves.

At recess, I would get an eerie feeling as I stood there occasionally watching the early morning sun radiate the dawn dew off the honeysuckle vines and periodically a frog would sound off in the saw briars and under foliage.

Years later, I learned that this was a Negro graveyard and my story has a bearing on this small rectangular spot.

Actually, this is not my story for it was handed down many years ago by Mr. M. Gentry who lived in the west end section of Mt. Vernon. I have added and deleted certain passages where needed.

The Gentrys were a vast storehouse of Rockcastle history and lore and what a pity that these stories are not recorded for future use.

Slavery was abundant and a way of life in antebellum Rockcastle. Many prominent men in-law of Colonel James William Smith, an in-law of Colonel Jim Maret was probably the largest slave owner in the county since he owned vast acreage here and in other places.

Another slaveholder was a kind gentleman by the name of William Newcomb, financially secure. Mr. Newcomb had other valuable possessions also.

Unlike other fellow slave owners, Mr. Newcomb was a compassionate, man

with much regard for humanity and his fellow man. He dealt fairly with his slaves and, after they had completed "what he considered a fair day's work," he would let them go as they pleased with their leisure time.

All slaves, living a life of servitude, had little ambition, motivation or duration and were content living a life in bondage their days on earth. They had very little in their meager lives to look forward to other than putting in a day's work, rearing a family and having "three squares" a day. When leisure time permitted itself, they would engage in digging around in their small garden plot or working in a nearby field.

However, among Mr. Newcomb's tribe, was a man by the name of Walker who had visions of freedom and a life of his own as he had dear harshly with him. Since Walker didn't know his last name, it was the custom for slaves to take the name of their masters and Walker became known as Walker Newcomb.

To make life more dreary and oppressive, Walker had married a slave girl who lived on a nearby plantation and was owned by another man.

Breeding and yearning for her personally, Walker was yearning for and very short periods of time. Too there was the constant worry that one of them could be sold at any time to some other slave owner in a distant place

which usually meant final separation and good-bye.

This was more than Walker could endure for his every thought was about his wife and a life of his own.

In the agony of his lonely nights and days, Walker conceived an idea and at his first opportunity related it to Lizzie. He would achieve their freedom by working every minute of his leisure time so that his master had no graciously given him.

So Walker became a man possessed - a vision of a free and a good life was with him always. He knew he could reach his goal for he was a fine specimen in excellent health, strong as an ox with muscle and sinews as hard as granite and most of all - he was not afraid of work.

So Walker, with the help and permission of his master and with the loan of his tools, opened a blacksmith shop and every spare minute that he could afford, would find him at his forge with his bellows huffing and puffing at all hours. And, on an ever-planting, a young wife pruned that his endurance would hold and someday they would reach their pruned goal.

And so, after many months of back-breaking toil, Walker Newcomb became a free man, buying his freedom and the tools and paraphernalia of the blacksmith profession.

He had reached only half of his goal and the other half was on a nearby

plantation and he was profoundly determined to have her free in the near future.

And so again after months of toil and frugality, Walker saved enough to buy Lizzie's freedom.

At last, with much love and bliss in their new lives, no task seemed too large for Walker and his faithful Lizzie. Their next aspiration was to have a home of their own.

A piece of land was put up for sale in Mt. Vernon by the land commissioner. Walker and Lizzie had saved enough to purchase this land but, due to much bias and prejudice, the purchase was blocked for Negroes were not permitted to own land in this part of the county.

But Walker, through his honesty and hard work, had amassed quite a number of white friends and they came to his rescue. A Mr. Myers and a Mr. Cook bid the land for this desiring couple and they became the proud owners of a block of land extending from the Dixie Boone Hotel northward to the late Bob McKenna residence, on Richmond Street and extending westward to the top of Hysinger Hill.

Next, Walker built a blacksmith shop near the site of the Dixie Boone Hotel and a home located somewhere in the vicinity of the present location of the Roland Mullins residence.

Walker and Lizzie lived a life rich in happiness and contentment, rearing a

family in Christianity. They were honest, God-fearing, hard working and most of all - highly respectable.

And now to the climax of this true story. Lizzie Newcomb's old mistress came upon hard times. Her husband had died and she was left without means and became destitute and, it looked like she would be living out her remaining days on this earth in the poor house.

Walker and Lizzie Newcomb learned of the condition of Lizzie's old mistress and they came to her rescue. They opened their comfortable home to the aged lady taking her in and providing a separate room for her where Lizzie faithfully waited upon her for the rest of her life.

Walker Newcomb, in a deed, provided a plot for a final resting place for his family and their families and Lizzie's old mistress was the first person and the only white to be buried there.

During the Christmas holidays, I paid a visit to this little Negro graveyard. I found it in a disgraceful and deplorable condition. My dominant reason for the visit was to search for a headstone that was there at one time, bearing the engraved inscription - Walker Newcomb - Born 1824 - Died 1883. I didn't find the stone for it has probably been destroyed or eroded away. I only wish I had discovered it, for I know that I would have been standing by the grave of a man.

## The Frankfort Report

The first day of the 1978 Kentucky General Assembly began at 12 noon on Tuesday, January 9th. During this first meeting, newly elected members of both the House and the Senate were certified and were administered the oath of office. In the house, there was the ritual election of the presiding officers. William Kenton (D-Leicester) was elected Speaker and Lloyd Clapp (D-Wingo) was elected Speaker Pro-Tem. At that time, the pasty leaders in the House were also introduced. The Democratic Floor Leader is Bobby H. Richardson (Glasgow). The Democratic Caucus Chairman is William (Bill) Donnermeyer (Bellevue). Dwight Wells (Richmond) is the House Whip for the Democrats. For the Republicans the Minority Floor Leader is W. Harold DeMarcus (Stanford). Representative W. Ruffin (Cynthiana) is the Republican House Whip and Arthur L. Schmidt (Cold Springs).

The Senate also went through the ritual of electing officers on the first day. Elected President Pro-Tem of the Senate was Joseph W. Prather (D-Vine Grove) and Pat M. McCaustion (D-Pembroke) was elected Assistant President Pro-Tem. The Party Leaders in the Senate were also introduced at that time. For the Democrats, they are: Tom Garrett (Paducah) Majority Floor Leader, A.D. (Danny) Yocum (Louisville) Caucus Chairman and Kelsey Friend (Pikeville) Whip.

The Republican Leaders in the Senate are: Eugene P. Stuart (Prospect) Minority Floor Leader, Walter A. Baker (Glasgow) Caucus Chairman and Clyde Middleton (Covington) Whip. The highlight of the first day of the session and probably the first week was Governor Carroll's State of the Commonwealth Address. The Governor delivered the 49 page address to a joint session of the House and Senate in the House Chambers. In a nutshell, the governor reviewed his accomplishments of the past two years and said things could not be much better than they are today in Kentucky. As for future programs, he touched upon the expansion of kindergartens within the public school system.

To find out exactly what programs Governor Carroll will propose for the next two years in Kentucky, we will have to wait to see his budget messages, scheduled to be delivered sometime during the first week of the session. Frankfort say that the proposed budget will probably contain a 3% pay raise for public school teachers.

According to Kentucky law, all lobbyists must be registered with the Attorney General's office. Kentucky law also states that within 30 days after a session of the General Assembly is over, each lobbyist must file a report showing all expenses incurred while promoting or opposing legislation. As of Friday, January 6th, there were over 108 registered lobbyists at the 1978

Kentucky General Assembly. Predominant among the lobbyists were representatives of oil companies, public utilities, unions, education, highway construction and financial institutions. Noticeably absent from this list were representatives of women's groups.

Some of the new legislation introduced during the first week included one which would authorize a restaurant wine license for restaurants receiving 50% more of their gross annual income from food. A bill which would limit the Kentucky National Guard educational fund to \$250 per year or \$500 for 12 months and would allow guard members to attend any school in Kentucky.

In response to the unusually large absentee ballot vote in some areas of the state during the November 1977 General Election, and in response to provisions whose provisions would strengthen the requirements for casting an absentee ballot.

Representative Ailee McNutt has introduced a bill which would petition the U.S. Congress to call a constitutional convention for the purpose of proposing an amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibiting abortion in the U.S.A.

Have you ever gone into the voting booth to vote thinking you were voting for the lesser of two evils? State Senator Larry Hopkins is thinking about introducing legislation which would help you solve that dilemma. Two years ago, Senator Hopkins, then a member of the House proposed legislation to the 1976 General Assembly which would entitle a voter to vote for NONE OF THE ABOVE. IF NONE OF THE ABOVE received a significant number of votes, it would put the winner on notice that he did not impress many people during the campaign. If the winner is an incumbent, a significant vote for NONE OF THE ABOVE will tell him that he better do a better job next term. Although Senator Hopkins' idea was not passed during the 1976 General Assembly, the idea won national acclaim from such notables as newscaster Paul Harvey.

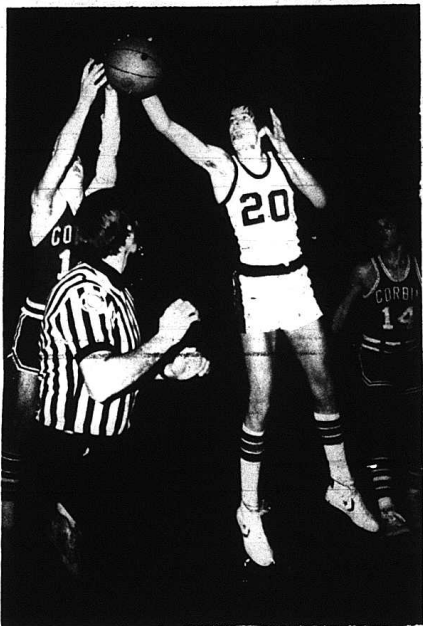

**EKU RECEIVES \$73,425 GRANT UNDER WOMEN'S EQUITY ACT**

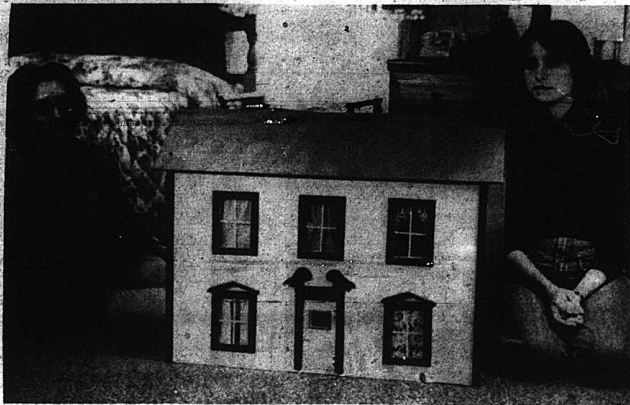
Eastern Kentucky University has received a \$73,425 grant under the federal Women's Educational Equity Act. Dr. J.C. Powell, EKU president, announced.

Dr. Anne Uhler, co-chairman of Eastern's Department of Physical Education, said the money is for the first year 20-month project "to reduce sex bias in co-educational instruction and program operation for secondary school physical education." She will serve as project director.

Dr. Uhler said the sum is the only 1977-78 fiscal year grant awarded in Kentucky under the act which supports elimination of sex bias and promotes education opportunity for females at all levels of education. From 334 applications, the federal program awarded only 36 new general grants for

a total of \$2,884,714 during the fiscal year, Dr. Uhler said.

Dr. Agnes Christberg is the assessment specialist of the project at Eastern. Ms. Mary Neikirk is in charge of the development of education modules, and Dr. Mary Dee Leslie is working in curriculum assessment and data collection. # County Agent's Notes

## Landscaping

January is the month when, sitting by the fire, we grow the best flowers, shrubs and evergreens. It is fine to talk about what others have or are doing, but it's the time when plans should be made by you, the individual homeowner. The outside of the house is just like the inside, in that it takes constant planning and budgeting, as well as plenty of work, to create the appearance you want for your home.

We believe firmly that the place to begin is by making a plan. Perhaps you will say that you cannot draw, but you do not need to be able to make a fancy drawing. You can use a simple piece of wrapping paper on a kitchen table or on the floor and make a sketch of what you have and then begin to add the things you want. Keep this sketch where you can get it when needed, and when you see a plant that appeals to you, study your place, look at your sketch, and if you think it will look good, make plans to get it. For example, you may see an evergreen that strikes your fancy - select a place for it, and if it will be satisfactory there, then get out your plan and mark it on the plan.

When you do this you are doing two things that are very fundamental - 1) you are studying your place critically, and 2) when you write it on your plan you have a record and will not forget it. One can easily look at a full-grown tree in the winter when it does not have any leaves or tell just how large it will grow. Then ask yourself if you have room for that kind of tree at your place. The same

may be said for evergreens and shrubs. We are sure that the homeowner who has one of these plans, regardless of how crude it may be, is on the right road to having a better looking place over the years. Another thing is the budget; you may like some plant, but may have to wait a year or so for your budget to stand the cost.

Now is the time to write a postcard or letter and get the flower and nursery catalogs. They are all ready for distribution, so be sure and get yours. You will find new kinds of flowers and good information about the old ones. We have often said that it is better to get fresh flower seed than to try and save them from plants you may have grown last year.

Go easy on the new kinds of flowers - a few will be all right, but be sure most of the kinds you order are the tried-and-true ones. After the new ones have been tried for a few years and proved to be good, then buy them. Most of your seed order, however, should be for the old ones which you know will succeed for you.

January is the month when you should be sure that the newly planted evergreens have enough water to keep the ball of earth around the roots moist. Select a day when the temperature is above freezing and carefully pour 3 to 6 gallons of water around the stem of the plant and let it soak into the soil. This simple thing may be the difference between losing and saving a valuable plant. Apply this water once in January and once each month until we have plenty of spring rain. Then in the spring if you have a young plant that is having trouble starting to grow, apply plenty of water.

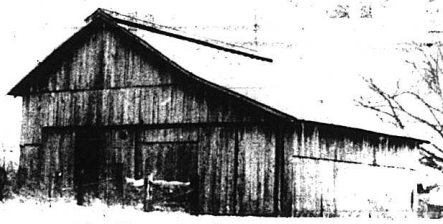

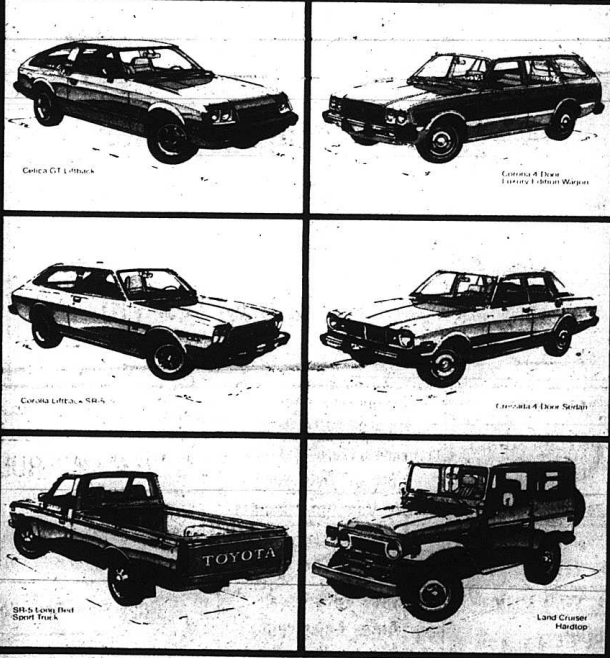
