The above-named city proposes to
request the U.S. Department of Housing
and Urban Development to release
Federal funds under Title I of the
Housing and Community Development
Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) to be used for the

following project:

Community Renewal and Housing
Development Project, City of Living-
ton, Kentucky, \$109,200.

It has been determined that such
request for release of funds will not
constitute an action significantly
affecting the quality of the human
environment and accordingly, the
above-named city has decided not to
prepare an Environment Impact
Statement under the National Environ-
mental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The reason for such decision not to
prepare such Statement are as follows:
a. Only temporary and minimal
adverse effects will occur as the result of
construction activities such as increased
noise and dust levels during daily
working hours. b. The long term
positive environmental effects far
outweigh the short-term adverse effects
listed above. The positive effects
include:

"Provision of a site for new and
adequate housing for low and moderate
income housing."

"Rehabilitation of a number of
houses (the number to be determined by
cost) for low income elderly persons."

Only negligible effect will be
experienced by the community's
facilities and services.

An Environmental Review Record
respecting the within project has been
made by the above named city which
documents the environmental review of
the project and more fully sets forth the
reasons why such Statement is not
required. This Environmental Review
Record is on file at the above address
and is available for public examination
and copying, upon request, at the
Livingston City Water Works between
the hours of 8:00 and 4:00, Monday thru
Friday.

No further environmental review of
such project is proposed to be conducted
prior to the request for release of federal
funds.

All interested agencies, groups, and
persons disagreeing with this decision
are invited to submit written comments
for consideration by the Livingston City
Council. Such written comments should
be received at the address specified on
or before February 2, 1978. All such
comments so received will be considered
and the City will not request the release
of federal funds or take any
administrative action on the within
project prior to the date specified in the
preceding sentence.

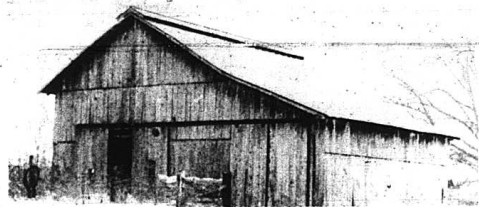

Winter has descended on Rockcastle County with all the finesse of an angry bull in the proverbial china shop. Perhaps it is news to no one that the weather has been bad, but, if you'll pardon our lack of optimism, we'll tell you just how bad.

First, let's begin with what the weather was like at this time last year that will make things sound a little better.

On January 17, 1977, we were suffering through perhaps the coldest weather on record. The jet stream was carrying frigid arctic air from northern Canada, to our mini-tundra, and the temperature in Mt. Vernon was 14 degrees below zero. We haven't had any air that cold yet.

So far, the low temperature recorded in 1978 has been 7 degrees below zero on January 11th. But, here's the kicker, we have had a total of 17 1/2

inches of snow since Sunday, January 8th. Believe it or not, 6" of that snow has melted leaving us with 11 1/2" on the ground, this is all according to local weather recorder Bud Cox. To us, of course, that seems like 11 1/2 feet when you're making a serious attempt to drive or get a car unstuck.

And what about those roads we have all been trying to drive on? Well, things are looking bad. The state department crews have been working around the clock trying to keep the main roads more or less passable. Individuals have been working 12-16 hours a day scraping and sliding.

Salt supplies, however, are very near being frozen in on the river. Well, the outlook is grim again.

The state highway department says they are again suffering from a salt and calcium chloride shortage. It's not the

barge on the river this time, it's the trucks not being able to move over atrocious roads.

If we don't have another snowfall for the next few days which we probably will, state crews said they may be able to catch up with what is already on the ground. If more snow falls, as predicted, it will be back to the interstate and main highways trying to keep up with Mother Nature.

Tired of the kids being home from school? Get used to it. School officials say school may as well be called off the remainder of this week and may not be in session for the rest of January.

So what to do? To paraphrase a famous writer, "not nothing. Just stay home, warm firm and watch that 17 1/2" of snow melt, hopefully. Unless, of course, the jet stream comes south again and the weather gets really cold and more snow comes down.

Jack Farthing came off the bench to help Rockcastle in the early going by hitting his first three out of four shots.

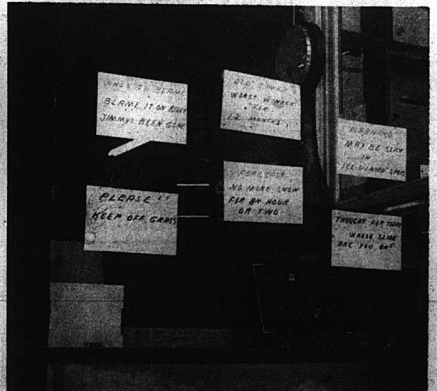

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The Frankfort Report

The pace of the 1978 Kentucky General Assembly was slow last week due in part to the winter weather and legislators awaiting Governor Carroll's presentation of the budget for the next two years.

Governor Carroll will ask the General Assembly for more than \$9.5 million in the budget to improve hospital emergency care for critically ill newborn babies in Kentucky. This money, to be spent over the next two years, will go to reimburse hospitals for losses they may suffer while providing this care.

Senator Richard Weisenberger (D-Mayfield) has sponsored a joint resolution which would rescind Kentucky's 1972 ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.

A resolution calling for the resignation of HEW Secretary Joseph Califano was passed in the House of Representatives by a 65-14 vote. This action, introduced by State Representative Buddy Adams (D-Bowling Green), came as a result of Califano's proposed anti-smoking campaign. The resolution was forwarded to Gov. Carroll, State Agriculture Commissioner Tom Harris, as well as President Carter and Kentucky's congressional delegation in Washington.

State Representative William Donermeyer has introduced a bill which will bring some emotional controversy to this session of the legislature. His bill would prohibit the use of state funds for abortion except in instances where the life of the mother would be endangered.

A bill has been introduced by Representative Mary Ann Tobin (D-Irvine) which would change the number of years in the terms of state legislators. She proposes that a State Representative serve for a four-year term instead of the present two years and that State Senators serve for six years instead of the present four years.

Attorney General Robert Stephens is thinking of requesting that legislation be introduced calling for state grand juries. The purpose of these grand juries would be to investigate such matters as corruption in government. This grand jury would have power in several court jurisdictions. This would insure that local officials in control could not block investigations into their own activities.

A bill has been introduced which would create a state surgeon general's office.

Legislation introduced by Rep. Bobby Richardson (D-Glasgow) would eliminate the prohibition that convicted felons be disqualified from public employment or occupational and professional licensure.

A bill introduced in the Senate, would require the consent of the parents of a girl under 18 for an abortion at any time.

State Representative Raymond Overstreet (R-Liberty) introduced legislation which would regulate use of the \$1 tax checkoff for political parties. If passed into law, it would require that the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance monitor the use of the funds and would outlaw use of the money in a party primary.

Interview with House Minority Leader, Harold DeMarcus

On Wednesday, January 11, 1978, Harold DeMarcus had an interview with one of the General Assembly's leading newsmen-State Representative Harold DeMarcus (R-Stanford) who is the House Minority Leader. Representative DeMarcus is a Stanford businessman. He attended the State Bennett College. Before going to the General Assembly in 1964, he served as a Stanford city commissioner. Mr. DeMarcus represents the 80th District, which includes Lincoln, Rockcastle and Pulaski counties.

When asked why he decided to serve in the legislature, Rep. DeMarcus replied that he has devoted his political career to the legislature because of the financial condition of Kentucky State Government. When he first went to Frankfort, the salaries for government employees and public school teachers were ranked 48th. He said, "We are only cheating our children by not providing our public school teachers the salaries they deserve." Because of his work, begun during the 1964 session of the General Assembly, the state after moving very slowly, will pay its teachers close to the national average at the end of this session of the General Assembly.

"We have more money to spend that ever in the history of the Commonwealth," he said, according to the representative, should be used to help Kentucky progress in all areas of endeavor. He noted that "with this increase in the amount of money coming into the state treasury there are great pitfalls" which must be avoided. When asked what these "pitfalls" were, he replied "Corrupt political parties." Then he listed abuses from the public trust by Democratic Party officials during Governor Carroll's administration - the warehouse deal, the library lease deal, the school service contracts, etc. He said that these actions by members of the present state administration "have left a smerch on the good name of Kentucky."

Representative DeMarcus said that he would like to see all departmental appointments made by the governor be approved by the State Senate. Sometimes the incumbent governor appoints individuals to head departments in order that they may gain public exposure for seeking high elective office in the state. He felt that the legislature should have more control over department and agency heads because once an individual becomes the head of a particular state agency his control over that agency is like that of a "czar."

Likewise, Mr. DeMarcus mentioned that the office of the Lt. Governor was being used for nothing more than a spring-board to the Governor's Mansion. Several years ago DeMarcus introduced legislation which would eliminate the office of Lt. Governor. Presently the role of the Lt. Governor is not essential to the workings of state government. He estimated that if the office of Lt. Governor was abolished that it would save the taxpayers of Kentucky close to a quarter of a million dollars.

In speaking of the office of governor, the House Minority Leader said: "The Governor of Kentucky is the most powerful chief executive in the fifty states. His word is law - simply because he is able to spend the money (about \$3 billion) for two years after we (the

legislature) go home."
The House Minority leader believes "We should have an independent legislature. We (the legislature) should not be told how to vote. We have become of absolutely no value when the governor tells us how to vote."
In explaining his responsibilities as the minority leader, he said the position gives him a seat on the Committee on Committees which is the governing committee of the legislature. "It also gives me a seat on the rules committee which is the powerful committee in the legislature in regard to the flow of legislation. As House Minority Leader, the position gives me contacts with the leaders of the Majority Party. It is my duty to see that the members of the minority party get all their rights under

the law of the Commonwealth and the rules of the legislature. My duty also includes seeing that members of the majority party receive the same consideration and abide by these rules."
Mr. DeMarcus also helps with the preparation of the Minority Party Platform for the legislature. This platform will be presented to a news conference after all preparations have been made, sometime in the last part of January.

In regards to the House Resolution urging the resignation of Joseph Califano as Secretary of HEW because of Califano's anti-smoking campaign, DeMarcus was in agreement. He criticized Senator Huddleston for voting for Califano's appointment as HEW Secretary in the first place. The Minority

Leader said: "Huddleston cut the throat of every tobacco farmer in Kentucky by not objecting to and voting against Califano because of his known hatred of tobacco."
Speaking about one of the pieces of legislation, he has proposed for this session Mr. DeMarcus said: "I have proposed a state-wide information retrieval system so that the legislature may tap into computer banks in the state capital to receive any information it might have." This would help legislators keep informed of the financial status of different state agencies.
House Minority Leader Harold DeMarcus offered this contrast for the present state of affairs in Kentucky - "For the state which ranks 47th in (Cont. to 11)

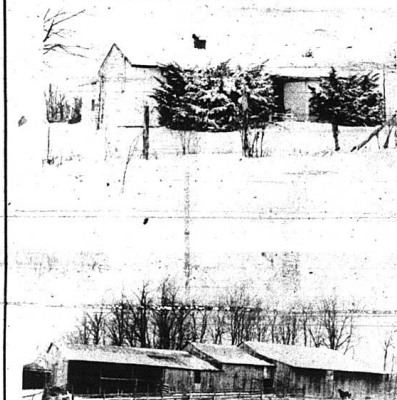

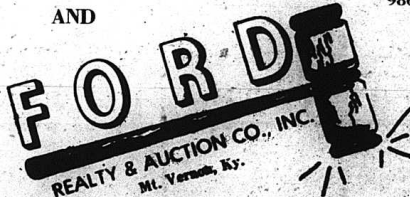

Cornmeal Master Mix Saves You Time, Money

You can make your own nutritious Master Mix and have it handy for hush puppies, corn bread, corn muffins, and a "different" topping for chili. Here's the recipe:

- 7 cups cornmeal
- 2 cups unsifted regular flour
- 4 tablespoons baking powder
- 1 1/2 cups non-fat dry milk
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 cup hydrogenated shortening (don't use lard)

Combine all dry ingredients and stir carefully to blend. Add shortening and cut into dry ingredients with pastry blender or two knives until mixture looks just like cornmeal. Makes 14 cups.

Storage Container

Store your Master Mix in a container with a tight-fitting lid. A cool, dry area is a good keeping place. If you don't expect to use it up in 2 months, put it in your refrigerator or freezer.

Your storage container might be a wide-mouth gallon or half-gallon jar, cottage cheese cartons, lard can or a potato chip canister.

Chili Supper

Make your favorite recipe of chili to serve eight to 10 people. Simmer it about 30 minutes, or until almost done. Then pour into 9 x 13 baking dish or pan and spread cornmeal mix topping on it. Bake in 375 degrees oven for 20 minutes.

Topping Recipe

Mix together 2 cups of Cornmeal Master Mix, 1 cup of shredded cheddar cheese and 2 cups of water. You can use this on other casseroles, too.

Oven Cornbread

Combine 2 beaten eggs with 1 cup of water. Four half of it over 2 cups of Cornmeal Master Mix and stir to blend. Add rest of liquid and beat until smooth. Pour into a well-greased 8 x 8 pan or a 10 inch iron skillet. Bake in 400 degree

CONSUMER COMMENT

Small Claims Court

Have you ever felt like you were "ripped off"? If you are unable to settle

your consumer complaint then take the law into your own hands and sue in the Small Claims Division of District Court. The Kentucky Small Claims Court became effective January 2, 1978, and will assist consumers and businesses in settling disputes of \$500 or less.

The Small Claims Division was designed so that consumers or businesses with claims of \$500 or less can file a claim or defend themselves without the assistance of an attorney. However, you can employ an attorney to handle your case if you desire.

The procedures used in the Small

Claims Division Court are very simple and informal. The two parties involved in the dispute go to Court at the designated time and tell their sides of the disagreement to the Judge. The Judge listens to each side, then makes a decision based on the law governing the facts presented. No juries are used in the Small Claims Division.

To file a claim in the Small Claims Division follow these steps:

1.) Go to the office of the Circuit Court Clerk in the county where the Defendant lives or does business. If the dispute arose from a sale which was made in your home, you can sue in the county in which you live.

2.) Complete the Small Claims' Complaint Form which the Clerk will provide. You will need to supply the following information:

a. Your name and address, and the Defendant's name and address;

b. A short, simple statement telling why you are suing;

c. The amount of money you are suing for.

3.) The Clerk will assign your case a number and set a date and time for the hearing before the Judge. The hearing will be held within three-six weeks after the Clerk notifies the Defendant of your suit.

4.) The Clerk will send a copy of your Complaint to the Defendant by certified or registered mail. If the Clerk cannot reach the Defendant by mail, then you must have the Sheriff's Office personally deliver a copy of your Complaint to the Defendant.

There is a \$10 filing fee for bringing a claim in the Small Claims Division. This does not include the cost of sending a copy of your Complaint to the Defendant by certified or registered mail, or sheriff's fee if the Defendant must be personally served. Remember, however, that if you win your case the Defendant can be charged for these "court costs."

If you receive notice that you are being sued in the Small Claims Division, do not fail to appear at the hearing. A default judgement can be rendered against you if you fail to appear, or if you are not granted a continuance by the Court.

To prepare for your appearance at the Small Claims hearing, collect all

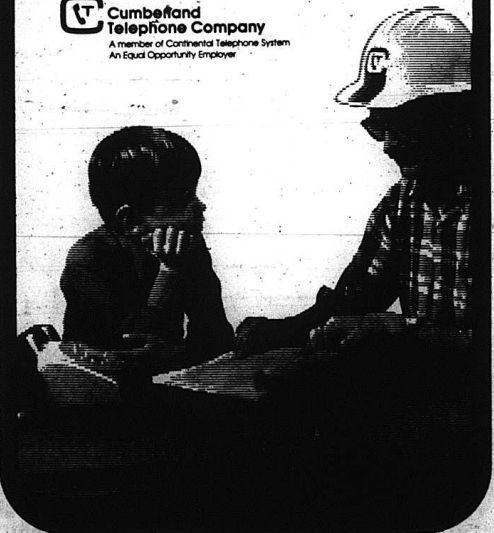

With rural and urban Kentuckians facing challenging times of economic and social pressures, we feel that a special effort is needed to help them with all the information that the College of Agriculture can make available," Barnhart said.
 He emphasized that the week's program is being developed to help people solve problems, make sound decisions, plan for the future, stimulate their thinking, become better informed about important issues, and enrich their lives. Topics will span a wide range of specific interests from those of farmers, businessmen and factory employees to those of farm and city homemakers.
 Information will be served "tailor-made" in style. Many workshops, each focusing on a specific interest theme, will be going on at the same time. The

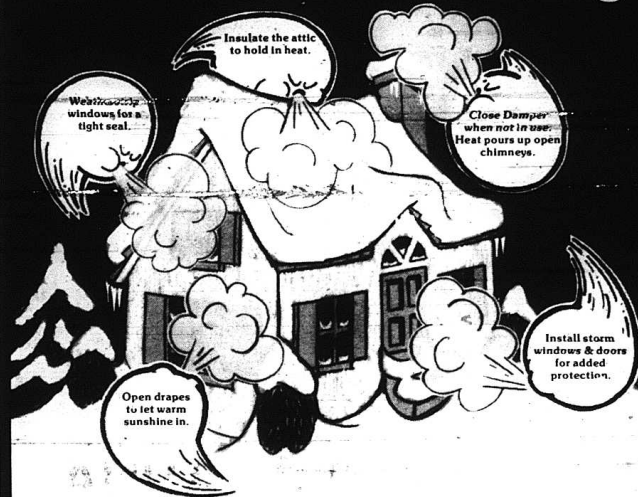
program also will include general sessions featuring speakers who are recognized nationally as authorities in their fields related to current issues confronting Kentucky and the Nation.

evidence in support of your position. Including contracts, letters, sales receipts, damaged goods or pictures. Bring any witnesses you wish to call on your behalf. Present only those facts involved in your case in a concise and organized manner. You may want to visit the Court and watch a hearing before your own hearing date, to better understand this Court's procedure.

The Small Claims Division of District Court is an efficient and inexpensive way of settling consumer complaints if your claim is \$500 or less. You are limited to bringing twenty-five (25) claims per year, and must be eighteen (18) years of age or older, or represented by a parent or legal guardian, to file a Complaint.

You can obtain a free brochure prepared by our office on "How to Use the Small Claims Division of the District Court," from your local Circuit Court Clerk, or by calling the toll free consumer hotline at 1-800-372-2960 to request a pamphlet. Our office will continue to mediate consumer complaints and has found that it can most effectively deal with written complaints. If you have a consumer problem that you feel does not immediately merit legal action and you would like to attempt to resolve it, then send your complaint to the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, 209 St. Clair Street, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

DEPT. OF FISH AND WILDLIFE GETS NEW BIOLOGIST

 Kentucky's bass fishermen got two New Year's presents this year: a new size limit on bass and a new biologist to study their favorite fish.
 Effective January 1, 1978, the size limit on all black bass in Kentucky went from 10 to 12 inches. This is a move that has the support of most bass clubs throughout the state, the League of Kentucky Sportsmen and the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.
 The 12-inch limit, biologist feel, will prove to be one of the most effective management tools to increase the quality of bass fishing in lakes, ponds and streams throughout the commonwealth.
 To evaluate scientifically the changes brought about by this new size limit, the Division of Fisheries has added to its staff a research biologist who will concentrate on black bass. Filling this new position is Ted Crowell, who has

been with the fisheries division since 1974, most recently, as a district biologist stationed in Morehead and who is himself an active and avid bass fisherman. Crowell assumed his new duties, January 1.
 Crowell will be in charge of measuring changes in bass population, mortality, growth, and catch rates around Kentucky, with his findings forming the basis for future bass management. *****
