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# Fishing Report

**Fishing on Kentucky's 16 major lakes continues to show slow improvement with unstable weather the primary reason the angling isn't better. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:**

**Barren:** White bass good on the upper lake casting do-jigs and still fishing minnows at the head of the lake; crappie fair to good at the head of the upper lake and over creek channels on the lower lake; black bass fair on the lower lake jigging dollies with pork rind over stump beds; clear to murky to muddy, rising, 15 feet below summer pool and 54 degrees.

**Cumberland:** White bass fair on the upper lake on spinners and do-jigs at the heads of large tributaries; black bass slow on spinner baits in inlets and bays; crappie slow on the upper lake over drift piles in inlets and bays and by jigging minnows in weed beds and brush on the lower lake; in headwaters, white bass fair on the South Fork and slow on Main Cumberland and Laurel River; in tailwaters, crappie and sauger slow; clear to murky to muddy, rising, nine feet below the timberline and 42 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** Black bass fair on spinner baits of deep banks and points; white bass fair on spinners and dollies at the heads of large tributaries; clear to murky, stable, 24 feet below summer pool and 50 degrees.

**Laurel:** Trout good on cheese, corn and worms off points and in inlets; clear to murky, stable, three feet below power pool and 49 degrees.

**Nolin:** Crappie fair around stick ups in the upper section; black bass slow jigging dollies with pork rind in lower lake tributaries; clear to murky to muddy, rising, 11 feet below summer pool and 50 degrees.

**Herrington:** Black bass fair casting spinner baits and still fishing night-crawlers at the heads of inlets and bays; clear to murky to muddy, stable, five feet below summer pool and 44 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** Black bass slow jigging night-crawlers in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish and trout slow to fair; muddy, falling, 15 feet below summer pool and 50 degrees.

**Rough River:** Crappie slow around stick ups; in tailwaters, trout good; murky to muddy, falling, five feet below summer pool and 48 degrees.

**Kentucky:** Crappie slow over submerged cover drop-offs; in tailwaters, catfish slow; murky to muddy, clear to murky to muddy, stable, five feet below summer pool and 44 degrees.

**Barley:** Crappie slow over drop-offs; in tailwaters, no activity; murky to muddy, rising slowly, four feet below summer pool and 50 degrees.

**Flattrap:** No activity; in tailwaters, trout fair to good, crappie slow; murky to muddy, stable, 32 feet below summer pool and 53 degrees.

**Cave Run:** No activity; clear to murky to muddy, stable, five feet above summer pool and 48 degrees.

**Dewey:** No activity; muddy, stable, five feet below summer pool and 47 degrees.

**Graysen:** No activity; murky to muddy, rising, four feet below summer pool and 45 degrees.

**Green:** Crappie fair around stick ups on the upper section; murky to muddy, falling, 17 feet below summer pool and 40 degrees.

## "FACTS ABOUT WOOD"

1. Wood decay is caused by fungi, very small plants that will attract any wood and use it for food if conditions of moisture and temperature are right.

Decay will not occur when any wood is kept dry, usually with a moisture content of less than 20 percent. There are buildings in the United States over 300 years old containing original wood that has not decayed. The wood longevity record is held by a seven-foot-thick log found buried in Washington and estimated at 12 million years old.

Properly designed wood support structure provides safety during a fire.

rate of only one inch every forty minutes. Hence, a wooden beam or post several inches thick will retain most of its strength during the initial stage of a fire.

5. On the other hand, materials that may melt or conduct heat quickly sag very early in the fire, and allow the structure to collapse much sooner than do wood timbers of the same initial strength.

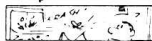

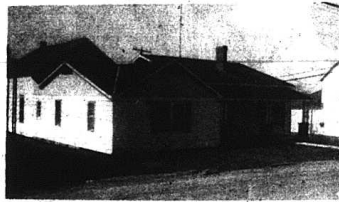

## Local Health Department May Be Receiving Improvement Funds

The Rockcastle County Health Department has a good chance of receiving funds for capital improvements, according to a letter from Gov. Julian Carroll to Rep. Harold DeMarcus.

In his letter, Gov. Carroll said that although his original version of the 1978-80 Executive Budget did not contain funds for capital improvements and local health departments, the concern and interest expressed by legislators led him to reconsider his position.

Gov. Carroll went on to say that a set of revised recommendations have been drawn up which contains \$2 million for local health department improvements. The bulk of this \$2 million is expected to be allocated under guidelines developed by the Dept. for Human Resources, to local health departments which received no allocations in 1976-77.

Since Rockcastle County received no allocation in 1976-77, it would appear that their chances of receiving an allocation are relatively good, the letter went on to say. The letter also pointed out that the \$2 million will not serve all local health departments in need and decisions will have to be made on the basis of several criteria.

Gov. Carroll ended his letter by expressing the hope that the \$8 million (\$4 million state matched by \$4 million local) used in the two biennia will

significantly upgrade local health department facilities across the state.

### ILLEGAL STRIP-MINING IS MAJOR PROBLEM SAYS SECRETARY

Illegal strip-mining is a major problem in Kentucky, Secretary Robert D. Bell, Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, today told a Senate committee for agriculture and natural resources.

Bell said almost 200 violations per year are noted by the department and said Senate Bill 281 is designed to discourage such activity and strengthen departmental ability to enforce it.

Sensors were shown a picture of David Smith, representing the Tennessee-Kentucky Independent Coal Operators, of a strip operation licensed as a deep mine which he said is "operated by one of your colleagues in the legislature."

Coal operators, in general, have expressed agreement with the proposed legislation, but had expressed concern about language that gave latitude to the department to set fines.

A state attorney general's opinion presented by Sen. Ken Gibson (D-Madisonville) declares that such blanket authority would be unconstitutional.

### KU Granted

### Rate Increase By PSC

The Kentucky Public Service Commission has granted Kentucky Utilities Company a rate increase for retail electric customers amounting to \$16,262,809 annually. Due to action now being undertaken by the Commission to develop a uniform fuel clause for electric generating utility companies, the Commission denied the Company's request to place in effect a new fuel clause which would have substantially reduced its fuel adjustment charges.

The Company on September 28 had requested an increase of \$32.2 million for overall rate increase of 29.4%. The increase approved by the PSC was 9.28% which is less than half the amount requested. The Company announced that 10 new approved rates would be placed in effect immediately.

In responding to the rate increase, Mr. W.A. Duncan, President, commented, "We are most disappointed that it does not adequately respond to the revenue needs of the Company. This means that it will be necessary to file another rate increase request as soon as possible."

William "Bill" Taylor of High Bridge has announced his intention to seek the Democratic nomination for the senate seat presently held by Walter D. Huddleston.

While he does not drink or smoke, Mr. Taylor says he will give full support to the tobacco program and conduct a strong fight to protect the interests of tobacco farmers.

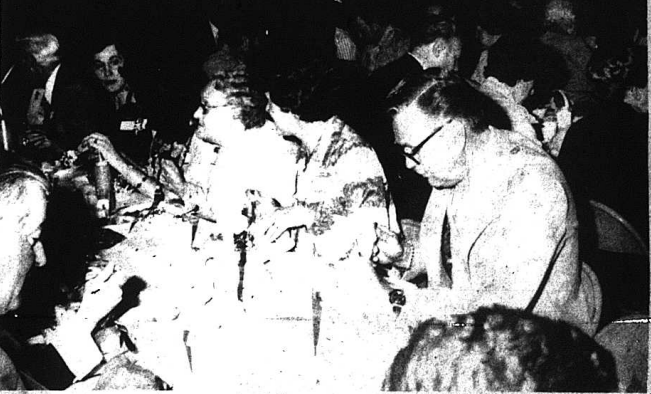

The 1978 Easter Seal Telethon will be broadcast Saturday and Sunday, April 1 and 2 by WKYT Television, Channel 27, at Lexington.

Kentucky volunteers will also be able to see the telecast over WKRC-TV, Cincinnati; WSAZ-TV, Huntington, West Virginia and WHET-TV, Evansville, Indiana.

Funds raised from Kentucky's participation in the four broadcasts will be used to provide rehabilitation services for handicapped children and adults, according to Smith D. Broadbent, Jr., Cadiz, Easter Seal Campaign Chairman.

National Easter Seal Chairman, Jack Klugman, will be host emcee for the telethon which will be broadcast from Los Angeles. Shirley Jones will co-host the telethon.

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consumers making complaints about bill collectors. Typical complaints heard regarding these debt collectors include being harassed by phone at all hours of the night, having the debt collector follow the consumer to work and harass both him and his employer about the debt, or for the debt collector to misrepresent himself as an attorney or governmental official.

For example, one consumer told the office that his son, Johnny, was called to the telephone at his elementary school because the caller said there was a fire in the family. When he answered the phone, the child discovered that the caller was only a debt collector threatening to throw his mother and father in jail if they didn't pay the debt. This is just one example of the abuses that have resulted in the enactment of this federal statute to prevent others from abusive collection practices.

In addition to the practices already listed, the Act prohibits debt collectors from publishing "shame lists" giving names of alleged debtors and other information under false pretenses, or

collecting more than is legally owed. Deceit or threatening to deposit a postdated check for the purpose of threatening criminal prosecution or communicating with a consumer regarding a debt by post card are also violations of the Act.

The Federal Trade Commission is responsible for enforcing this new Fair Debt Collection Practices Act. Any questions about the law or complaints against debt collectors can be referred to the Federal Trade Commission, 1320 Federal Office Building, 1240 E. 9th Street, Cleveland, Ohio 44199.

However, under this new law, persons who are harassed by debt collectors who have broken the new law can bring a lawsuit against the collectors or collection agency. Actual damages sustained by the debtor, punitive damages up to \$1,000 and attorneys fees and court costs can be collected. If a collector is sued though, in bad faith and for purposes of harassment, the court may award the debt collector or collection agency reasonable attorney's fees and court cases.

After March 20, if you feel you are a victim of illegal collection practices, you should contact an attorney or legal services office who can advise you or render assistance in filing your lawsuit. The case must be filed within one year from the date on which the violation occurs.

If you have a consumer complaint regarding another problem, contact the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, 209 St. Clair Street, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601. Our office has found that it can most effectively handle written complaints. In my first medical insurance claim under Medicare. My doctor doesn't accept assignment of medical insurance payments, but he did give me a copy of the Request for Medicare Payment form. How do I fill it out?

A. You complete Part I of the Request for Medicare Payment. Then, ask your doctor either to complete Part II of the form or to give you itemized bills for the services you received. An itemized bill must show a description of each service (or supply) you received, the date and place of the service, the charge for the service, the name of the doctor or supplier who provided the service, and your name and health insurance number. How to make small rooms look large

As inflation costs keep deflating room sizes, we sometimes find ourselves with a room that's Grandmother would have called "good, but closet." New mind benders know many ways to make rooms seem larger.

Light colors, small patterns. Keep walls off-white, champagne, or one of the very pale or neutral tints. Use very dark or very bright colors only as accents. In these days, when so many fabrics are so resistant, you can even treat yourself to pale carpets and fabrics. Patterns, too, should be small and not too obtrusive. Large, very "contrasty" patterns tend to make a small room look "busy." You can also create a more spacious look by using the same color scheme in adjoining rooms so that the spaces seem to flow together.

Light furniture be light in color and style. Avoid heavy, dark, massive pieces. Choose the lighter finish woods - such as maple, birch, poplar - finishes. Chairs and sofas with graceful turned or curved legs and arms give a lighter, airier look than pieces that are fully upholstered. And, remember that today's upholstery fabrics can be pale and practical too.

If you like modern, glass tops and steel legs are ideal for small rooms. But traditional and Early American is also available in styles that are authentic but scaled for smaller rooms. Dressers, chests and buffets are shallower today. Beds with headboards but no footboards help avoid that crowded look. Floor coverings should be unobtrusive.

Wall to wall carpet is an excellent choice for a small room because it tends to carry the eye clear to the wall and on into other rooms, rather than "cutting up" space. But here again, you'll achieve a more spacious look if you choose light colors and plain rather than patterned styles.

Hard-surface floor coverings are good for the same reason, provided patterns are not too pronounced or confining. Devices like borders, large patterns or sharp contrasts from room to room should be avoided.

Mirrors and windows open up a small room. Large mirrors reflect and re-reflect the scene in front of them to multiply the apparent size of a room. It's hard to get too many mirrors in small rooms, but try to place them so a guest won't sit for hours facing his own image. Even an eggplant can be embarrassed by too much of his own company.

If your view is pleasant, open up the windows during daylight hours. Curtains lightly. Hang draperies over the wall. If you need shade, try to get it with awnings rather than blinds or drawn draperies. By bringing some of the outdoors into your room, you add to its effective size.

Avoid all kinds of clutter. Simplicity is the key to "stretching" small rooms. Don't put too many or too big things on tables and chests. Plan one dramatic arrangement of properly-sized wall accessories, rather than scattering pictures and other objects over all four walls. Area rugs are all right if you space them widely, but avoid closely spaced highly patterned small rugs. Drive for a lean, pared-down, slightly bare look and you can add feet to the apparent size of a small room.

## Tax Law Changes Benefit Elderly

Recent tax law changes have provided additional tax benefits for persons 65 years of age and older, says the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

Taxpayers of this age bracket can now exclude \$3,000 of the gain from the adjusted sale price of their residence, up \$1,500.

And there are continuing tax benefits for older Americans.

Liberal filing requirements provide that single persons 65 years and older are required to file a tax return only if their gross income is at least \$3,700. Likewise, married couple who file joint returns are required to file only if their combined gross income is \$5,450 in 65 or older and \$6,200 if both meet the age requirement.

As in the past, according to the IRS, taxpayers age 65 and over receive a double personal exemption. This means they should check both the "yourself and the 65 or over" boxes.

There is a tax credit for older Americans which depends upon the amount of income, both earned and from a retirement pension or annuity. As much as 15 percent of \$2,500 for single persons (\$3,750 for couples filing joint returns) are both age 65 or over) can be credited toward the tax bill. However, these amounts must be reduced by the amount of tax exempt social security or tax exempt retirement income received, before the credit is computed.

The IRS considers taxpayers to be 65 on the day before the birthday occurs, allowing them to take advantage of these benefits for the 1977 tax year even if their 65th birthday was January 1, 1978.

Additional information about these benefits is found in the tax package instructions as well as in a number of free IRS publications. Publication 522, "Tax Information on Selling or Purchasing Your Home," 524, "Tax Credit for the Elderly," and 524, "Tax Benefits for Older Americans" can be ordered and questions concerning taxes and the elderly answered by phoning the IRS toll-free. Fair Debt Collection Practices Act

Threatening and harassing tactics by debt collectors are now illegal under a new federal act. President Jimmy Carter's first consumer bill, entitled the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, took effect March 20. The new federal law was designed to put an end to the oppressive and abusive collection practices used by some debt collectors or collection agencies. This law makes it a federal offense for debt collectors to threaten consumers with violence, use obscene language, or contact the consumer by telephone at inconvenient times or places.

Specific conduct outlawed by the Act includes contacting a debtor before 9 a.m. or after 9 p.m., or communicating with third parties in connection with the collection of the debt. Debt collectors also cannot contact the debtor at his place of employment if the debt collector knows the employer prohibits such contact.

## Home Line

### Spring Green Gathering

This is a good trip for family, friends or club. Don't forget to teach your family to appreciate the things we have in nature. If you don't know greens, why not plan a trip with someone who does?

The main thing to remember when going out to hunt greens is to be sure you know what you are picking, and if you go onto someone else's property, be sure to get permission first.

Some good places to hunt for wild greens are in woodlots, old pastures, stream banks, swamps and even on the lawn. Many of these plants grow along roadsides, but it is best not to gather them from such places. They are likely to be polluted with the residue of automobile exhaust fumes.

Some wild greens for gathering are: Foke, dandelion, wild lettuce, crow's foot, watercress, upland cress (creasies).

evening primrose, broad-leaf plantain and lamb's quarters. As soon as new leaves start growing during warm spring days, wild greens can be gathered. Use a basket, big paper bag or plastic bag to collect them. Be sure to choose plants whose growth is new and tender. For cutting use scissors or a sharp knife. Such plants as dandelion are easiest to handle and wash if they are cut off at the root crown so the bunch of leaves hold together. You should cut greens, not pull them. Mixing greens of different kinds may improve flavor and eye appeal and you may find it easier to get small amounts of several kinds than to get a large amount of any one.

After greens are gathered, keep them cool. If collected in a bag and stored in a refrigerator, they will stay fresh for hours. Trim away roots, thick stems and poor leaves. Use a little detergent in warm water to be extra sure the greens are clean. Wash in fresh water several times until no grit or suds appear in the water.

When gathering wild greens, be careful to leave enough foliage so plants left in the ground will continue to grow. Some kinds of greens can be killed by removal of all leaves. A notable exception is the dandelion which regrows quickly.

Some wild plants are poisonous or have unpleasant tastes. Use only those kinds you know are safe. Dandelions, upland cress and evening primrose should be gathered in the rosette stage, that is before they start stemming up to bloom. Foke is the best when it is six inches to a foot in height. At six inches from the ground, it can be cooked like asparagus tips. After leaves have unfolded, they can be removed and prepared like spinach. Leaves can be picked at almost any time in the early spring.

Wild greens may be cooked or used raw in salads. Greens are good canned or frozen. Some greens such as poke and "creasies" can be purchased in cans at grocery stores. They taste better, though, when gathered fresh from the wild. They also save on the grocery bill. For more information, stop by or call the County Extension Office and ask for the "Wild Greens" leaflet. Our number is 256-2403.

The purpose of this adjudicatory hearing is to resolve the issues raised by the person requesting the hearing. These issues are listed at the end of this Public Notice of Adjudicatory Hearing.

The adjudicatory hearing is an administrative proceeding that closely resembles a court hearing. The Presiding Officer will be an Administra-

tive Law Judge, who will conduct the necessary pre-hearing proceedings, preside at the hearing and forward findings and conclusions proposed by the parties to the Regional Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, Region IV, after the hearing.

The time and place of the hearing will be set by the Administrative Law Judge when the identity of the parties has been determined.

The hearing may be preceded by one or more informal conferences between the parties and one or more formal prehearing conferences. Matters relating to the conduct of the hearing, to the issues listed hereafter, and to the possibility of settlement, including amendment of the permit, will be discussed. Persons wishing to participate in any stage of the proceedings and to present their rights in the final administrative determination, must become parties.

This hearing and all related proceedings may be consolidated with other hearings requested by the same party, or with hearings which raise the same similar issues.

As provided in 40 CFR 125.36, published at 30 Federal Register 27081 (July 24, 1974), any person may submit a request to be a party to this adjudicatory hearing within 30 days after the date of issuance of this public notice. The request to be a party with two copies must be filed with the Regional Hearing Clerk for Region IV of the United States Environmental Protection Agency during this time period and must:

(1) State the name and address of the person making such request.

(2) Identify the interest of the requester which would be affected by issuance, denial or modification of the permit.

(3) Identify any other persons whom the requester represents.

(4) Include an agreement by the requester to be subject to examination and cross examination and to make any employee or consultant of such requester or other person represented by the requester available for examination and cross-examination at the expense of such requester or such other person upon the request of the Presiding Officer, on his own motion, or on the motion of any party.

(5) State the position of the requester on the listed issues and specify terms and conditions that in the judgment of the requester would meet the intent of the Act.

Any person admitted as a party may submit additional material issues for consideration at the adjudicatory hearing within 30 days of the date of issuance of this notice. If additional issues are submitted, in addition to the above-listed requirements, the requester must state with particularity the reasons why the additional issues should be considered and must propose terms and conditions which in the judgment of the requester would be required to carry out the intent of the Act.

Any party may at any time prior to the hearing submit any documents or written evidence or testimony which he intends to introduce at the hearing.

After 30 days have elapsed following the date of the notice, the Presiding Officer may set a time and location of a prehearing conference and will so notify all parties. Following the

expiration of the time provided for the submission of requests to be a party, any person may file a motion for leave to intervene in the adjudicatory hearing by following the procedures specified in 40 CFR 125.36.

Any State with certification rights under Section 401 of the Act must specify within thirty (30) days of this notice when of the parties, any person may file a motion for leave to intervene in the adjudicatory hearing by following the procedures specified in 40 CFR 125.36.

Please bring the foregoing to the attention of persons whom you know would be interested in these matters.

Issues

(1) Whether, in light of Sierra Club v. Abston Construction Company, the EPA has NPDES permit jurisdiction pursuant to the FWPCA, as amended.

(2) Whether Kentucky Gem should be allowed the same time to come into compliance with its permit limitations, terms and conditions as it took EPA to arrive at final effluent guidelines.

(3) Whether limitations applicable to acid mine drainage should be applied to the mining facility in question.

(4) Whether in areas where there is more than one discharge point whose discharges must pass through a downstream structure, sampling only of the downstream discharge should be required.

(5) Whether normal sampling should be permitted to be done on any day of the second and fourth weeks of each month rather than on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month as required in the permit in question.

(6) Whether grab samples should be permitted rather than composite samples as required in the permit in question.

## County Agent's Notes

#### Farm Accident Survey To Be Taken

A team of twelve volunteer interviewers is preparing to swing into action on Rockcastle County's accident and health survey. During the first ten days of April, the interviewers will visit 120 rural families in the county as part of a study to develop a long-range statewide safety and health education program.

The Cooperative Extension Service, in cooperation with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, drafted plans for the survey at a meeting held in Mt. Vernon on March 22, 1978. Larry Piery, State Extension Safety and Occupational Health Specialist at the University of Kentucky met with the group to outline plans for conducting the survey.

In the forthcoming "down-the-road" canvass, the interviewers will ask rural residents for accident and health information covering the first three months of this year. The information will include the ages of any family members injured, where and how the accident happened, factors involved, seriousness of injuries, time lost from work, amount of hospital and doctor bills and other such data.

H. Lee Durham and Cheryl Witt, County Extension Agents, urge all rural people to cooperate.

All information will be kept confidential," they said. "We hope to gain from this survey facts that will point out problems and serve as a basis for a safety and health program geared to the needs of rural people in Rockcastle and throughout Kentucky."

The survey will be repeated in July and October of this year and in January, 1979.

Rockcastle County is one of 30 counties participating in the study. In the 30 counties, approximately 3,800 farm families will be interviewed. Complete questionnaires will be sent to the University of Kentucky where the State Extension Safety and Occupational Health Staff will tabulate and analyze the findings.

Yes, Your Backyard Soil Will Grow Vegetables

If you haven't grown a garden in your backyard because you think the soil is too poor, don't let that stop you any

more. Your vegetables will be as nutritious and delicious as if you grew them in the finest garden soil around. They just won't be as big. If you plant a bean, you'll get a bean's worth of nutrition. If a crop will grow at all, it will be nutritionally adequate.

Carbohydrates, protein, fat and vitamins will vary with the maturity of those vegetables when you harvest them. The nutritional quality will vary with the varieties you plant.

You can build up a better soil in your backyard year after year by adding such things as leaves, grass clippings for mulch, organic wastes from your kitchen and commercial fertilizer.

**New Garden Tabled.** Beginning gardeners as well as old-timers can get lots of help from the Rockcastle County Extension Office, including a copy of the new home-gardening tabloid written by horticulturists and other specialists at the UK College of Agriculture.

It tells what varieties to plant, when to plant them, and just about everything else you could possibly want to know. Come in and get your free copy.

Kentucky residents age 65 or older may fish without a license by carrying a card (which can be obtained free of charge from any county court clerk's office) attesting to their age and residence, but

## Kentucky Afield

 With some of the year's best fishing just around the corner, now is a good time to review Kentucky's fishing regulations.

There is only one major change this year, but it is a significant one. The size limit on black bass has been raised from 10 inches to 12 inches (30.5 centimeters). Although this change has been in effect since Jan. 1, 1978, few anglers have been on the water this year and might not be aware of this change.

The 12-inch limit applies to all black basses - largemouth bass, smallmouth bass and Kentucky (or spotted) bass. Fish may be measured from the longest jaw to the longest tail fin. Bass under 12 inches must be returned to the water immediately and in the best possible condition.

Even fish which are deeply hooked or otherwise injured must be returned to the water. Although this practice might seem wasteful, it is necessary because of the few unscrupulous anglers who would see it as a loophole to use to their advantage.

Kentucky's fisheries biologists feel that this increased size limit is one of the most effective management tools now available for improving quality of bass fishing around the commonwealth.

The daily limit on black bass remains 10 daily with 20 in possession after two or more days of fishing. There are only three other fish on which size limits are imposed: muskellunge, 60 inches (5 daily and 10 in possession); walleye, 15 inches (10 daily and 20 in possession) and rockfish, 15 inches (5 daily and 5 in possession).

Fish with daily and possession limits, but no size limits, are: rock bass (15 daily and 30 in possession); sauger (10 and 20); northern pike (5 and 10); chain pickerel (5 and 10); white bass and/or yellow bass (60 and 60); trout (8 and 8) and crappie (60 and 60). There are neither size nor creel limits on other fishes.

Also remember that if you haven't purchased your 1978 fishing license yet, you'll need to get one before hitting the water. Licenses are required of all

# SSI Monthly Payments Can Help Social Security Recipients

Supplemental security income (SSI) monthly payments can make a big difference in the lives of people who need additional income, a social security representative said today.

SSI makes payments to people 65 and over or disabled or blind who do not have much income and who do not own much property that can be turned into cash.

These payments along with the person's other income, can mean a little better life, the spokesperson went on. The basic purpose of the SSI program is to provide monthly checks when they are needed so that those eligible can have a basic cash income - \$177.80 a month for one person and \$266.70 a month for a married couple.

This does not mean everyone gets that much in the SSI check. Some people get less because they already have other income. Some get more because they live in a state that adds money to the Federal payments.

A single person can have assets - items owned worth up to \$1,500 and get checks. The amount for a couple is \$2,250. Assets include savings accounts, stocks, bonds, jewelry and other valuables.

Not everything counts as an asset. For example, a house doesn't count, nor does an older car or neither does a small insurance policy. Personal effects or household goods do not count either.

People can have some money coming in and still get SSI checks. The first \$20 a month generally does not count. Income above \$20 a month, except earnings, generally reduces the SSI payment.

People who work while they get SSI can earn as much as \$65 in a month without causing any reduction in their

SSI check. The check is reduced \$1 for every \$2 the person earns above \$65 (or \$85 if the person has no other income). The SSI check may be reduced if the eligible person lives in someone else's household, with a son or daughter, for example.

SSI is not the same as social security. And a person can get a SSI check even if he or she gets a small social security check.

People can get more information about SSI by calling or visiting any social security office. The address and telephone number of the nearest office can be found in the telephone directory under "Social Security Administration."

A Consumer Tip from Extension Specialists at the UK College of Agriculture

When you don't have an ingredient your recipe calls for, you can sometimes find or figure out a substitute, according to food specialists with the UK College of Agriculture Cooperative Extension Service. For instance, instead of a cup of buttermilk or sour milk, "doctor up" a cup of fresh milk, reconstituted dry milk or evaporated milk by adding a tablespoon of vinegar or lemon juice. 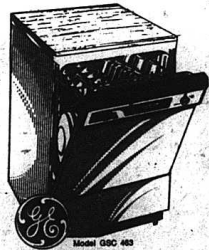

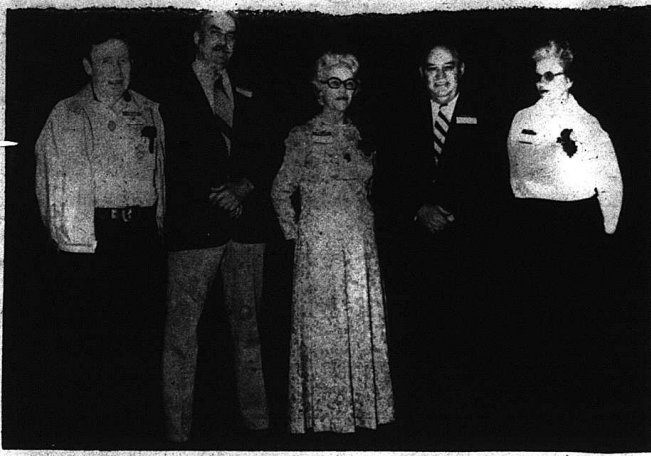
