We have examined the Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances Arising From Cash Transactions of Rockcastle County as of June 30, 1976, and the related Statement of Operations from Cash Transactions for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We also conducted tests of compliance with state and Federal laws and regulations including Federal revenue sharing requirements.

Our review of cash receipts revealed that the County Treasurer had not deposited receipts promptly. This resulted in two overdrafts on the County General Fund. Some receipts were held as long as _____ before deposit was made. We recommended that the County Treasurer begin making timely bank deposits.

We also recommended that the County Treasurer keep a ledger to include all disbursements by the county. This ledger should be a hardback book containing a numerical listing of all checks for each county fund.

Violation of KRS 68.370 concerning quarterly statements of county receipts and expenditures were discussed with the County Court Clerk and noted for change.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balance arising from the cash transactions of Rockcastle County as of June 30, 1976, and its revenue collected and expended during the year then ended, on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Where's The "Scrivener?"

Much of the tradition and ceremony has disappeared from the business of transferring real estate. You might enjoy learning how it used to be done in the old days.

The law has always regarded the transfer of real estate as one of the most solemn acts and, thus a great deal of formality attended the transfer. In the early days of land tenure, transfer was accomplished by "livery of seizen" which literally, means transfer of possession.

The buyer and seller would go upon the land in question and there, in the presence of witnesses, the seller would take a clod of turf and a twig from a tree and hand it over to the buyer as a symbol or token of the transfer.

The transfer was then made a matter of record by having the "scrivener" (the person in the community who could write) do his thing and write out the transfer on a parchment and affix his seal.



Brodhead's Third Public Meeting Is Thursday Night, April 20th

Brodhead third Public Meeting will be held Thursday night, April 20th at the fire house in town. This meeting will be to finalize an application for a block grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

At the first public meeting on March 30th, about 40 persons were in attendance. Jim Cass, David Cornett and Steve Jones explained to the citizens what projects were eligible under the HUD grants and made a list of the citizens' priorities.

A Citizens' Participation Committee was selected at this meeting. They are: D.H. Gray, chairman, Edd Lamb, Elmer Riddle, Eddie Cash, Bobby Proctor, John L. Hoskins, Dawson Whitte and Mrs. Maggie Kidwell.

On Friday, April 14th, the Citizens' Participation Committee met at the fire house to hear Mr. Patton explain to them their duties as members of the committee. Then, on April 10th, the second public meeting was held. At this meeting, Jim Cass reviewed HUD's criteria for single purpose grant applicants and Jerry Reekert, planner, (Lumberland Valley Area Development District), gave a summary overview of housing rehabilitation.

After much discussion by citizens, receiving the most votes were housing units to be built on the town's land beyond Boone's Ford Bridge with extension of the sewer to residents between Boone's Fork Creek.

Three Programs Offered at Berea College This Summer

Three summer programs for high ability high school students will be offered at Berea College this June.

Seventy students will be accepted for program in creative writing, psychology and wildlife biology. Applicants should be completed three years of high school.

Each four week intensive course, from June 11 to July 8, offers four semester hours of college credit. There is no tuition charge, and full and partial scholarships are available for living expense. In addition, each student will, like all Berea College students, work ten hours a week in a related job for pay which can be applied to expenses. Total fees are \$140.

The wildlife biology program, now in its fifth year at Berea, will accept 40 students. It offers a combination of classroom and laboratory experience in biology with field work in conservation and wildlife management in the 7000-acre college forest-lands.

The director is Dr. Claude Gentry, professor of anatomy and biology at Berea.

The psychology program, which accepts 25 students, is in its second year. Taught by two professors trained in the related field of human and animal communication, the course examines the communicative behavior by which all organisms pass information to one another. Verbal language will be emphasized, and there will be research on human and animal behavior in laboratory and natural environment experiments.

The director is Dr. John Wright of Berea's psychology department.

Creative writing offers a seminar for 15 students. In addition to daily writing of their own, the students will discuss contemporary writing and deal with the problems facing the practicing literary artist.

The director, Dr. William Schaefer, professor of English at Berea, will be assisted by two writers-in-residence, a poet and a fiction writer who will each join the program for one week.

The following night, the town council met and agreed to accept the committee's recommendation but voted to add an application for a senior citizens' housing unit to be built on the town's southwest property, known as the Profit property.

All citizens are urged to attend the last Public Hearing Thursday night, April 20th.

According to State Police reports, a witness following the Alcorn auto, which was traveling north, said the Alcorn auto had been weaving on the highway and swerved off the road onto the right shoulder. Alcorn reportedly cut back onto the road, lost control and crossed the center line into the path of an approaching auto traveling south.

The driver of the other car involved was Donna Chambers of Route 1, Berea. She is listed in satisfactory condition at the Pattie A. Clay Hospital.

"Farm Operating Loans are Available" Burnette Says

William E. Burnette, State Director for the Farmers Home Administration, has announced that funds are available through this agency to finance the farm operating type needs of the Kentucky farmer.

He states that Congress has recognized the cost-price squeeze which the farmers are experiencing and it has allocated sufficient operating type funds to meet the needs of those who qualify. At present the Farmers Home Administration still has 18.5 million dollars in those funds and Mr. Burnette has advised the county offices to react as quickly as possible to applications received.

To be eligible for this type of assistance, an applicant must: (1) Have farm experience or training and possess the character, industry and ability to carry out the operation.

Committee Chooses Housing Rehabilitation And SC Center for HUD Application

At a public meeting Monday night, the Citizens Advisory Committee voted to recommend an application to HUD for rehabilitation of low income elderly housing in Mt. Vernon and a senior citizens center. This will be the number one priority of the application with a storm drainage system ranked number two by the committee, which was chaired by Robert Robinson.

Of course, these priorities are only recommendations to the city council who will have the final say-so as to what the application will be made for. There was much discussion among the committee members about various needed projects in Mt. Vernon among which was a sidewalk for the west side of West

Main Street to the new high school. However, it was finally decided that the rehabilitation program and senior citizen center would probably stand the best chance of being funded by HUD so these projects were given first priority.

The final public meeting will be held next Monday night at city hall at 7:30 p.m. and interested citizens are urged to attend this meeting since the committee is still open to suggestions and changes could be made in the priorities.

Other members of the committee present for Monday night's meeting were: Ernest Stanley, Tom Welch, Virgie Sowder, Charles Barr and Tommy Hodges.

Council Holds Called Meeting

At the called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council, following the Public Hearing, the council had several items on the agenda.

The most important involved the completion of Mt. Vernon's 201 Facilities Survey which was presented to the council by representatives of Schimpeler-Corggino Engineers and Crawford and Crawford Engineers.

Mr. Moore of Schimpeler-Corradiño told the council that their next step would probably be to have an application prepared to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for a study to pinpoint exactly where surface water seeps is entering the city's sewer system and forcing it to run at capacity in a heavy rain. Mr. Moore said the application could also contain a request for funds to correct the problem once it is identified. After some discussion, the council voted to allow this application to be prepared.

Mt. Vernon Fire Chief John Cox was also before the council to talk with them, concerning the lack of fire plugs in some areas of the town.

Chief Cox said that some of the area recently annexed by the city did not have adequate plugs and that the installation of a six-inch line at least partways into Barnett Subdivision was needed badly.

Cox said that if this line were installed to about the middle of the road in the subdivision, replacing the present two-inch line, that a fire plug could be installed in the subdivision and

the line run across to the school property and another plug installed there. He said that the only plug to the high school at present was located on the Broadhead Road. Another area where Chief Cox said plugs were badly needed was on Richmond Street. The city recently annexed to Red Top Restaurant and Chief Cox said the last fire plug was at Cromer's Tire and Appliance. He said the addition of at least two more plugs there was needed. In all, Chief Cox told the Council that at least five more plugs in the city limits were needed and the council agreed to try to draw up a plan for acquiring these and other needed equipment at their regular meeting in May when Chief Cox was asked to present a list of needed items.

Bud Cox also asked the council to agree to a mutual aid agreement, as part of the Disaster Preparedness Council, of which Mr. Cox is a member.

Herrington: Crappie good over submerged cover; black bass fair on crank baits off deep banks; in headwaters, white bass slow early and late; clear to murky, falling, seven feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

Laurel: Crappie good over submerged cover; black bass fair on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers in inlets and bays and timbered covers; clear, stable, two feet below power pool and 55 degrees.

Fishtrap: Crappie fair around stick.

ups; bluegill fair off gravel banks; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, rising slowly, 12 feet below summer pool and 67 degrees.

barren: Crappie fair to good over submerged cover and creek channel drop-offs; black bass slow to fair on surface lures and crank baits in inlets and bays; in headwaters, white bass fair; in tailwaters, white bass slow; clear to murky, rising slowly, 10 feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

Green: Black bass fair on crank and spinner baits off points and over drop-offs; crappie slow to fair over submerged cover; in headwaters, white bass slow; in tailwaters, white bass fair; clear to murky, rising slowly, two feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

Barkley: Crappie fair to good over drop-offs and along brush line in inlets and bays; black bass slow and improving on crank and spinner baits in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish and white bass fair; crappie and sauger slow; clear to murky, rising slowly, 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 66 degrees.

Kentucky: Crappie slow over drop offs and along brush line in inlets and bays; black bass slow on crank and spinner baits over stump beds; in tailwaters, catfish fair; clear to murky, rising slowly, 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 62 degrees.

Buckhorn: White bass fair and

improving on the upper lake casting do-jigs 40-45s; minnows; crappie slow over submerged cover; in tailwaters, catfish and crappie slow; clear to murky to muddy, stable, nine feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

Cave Run: Musky fair on the upper-lake casting large crank and spinner baits and still fishing nightcrawlers off shallow banks; black bass slow on spinner baits in inlets and bays and around stick ups; in tailwaters, crappie slow; clear to murky, stable, one foot below summer pool and 60 degrees.

Grayson: Crappie fair around stick ups; black bass slow on crank and spinner baits off deep banks and over drop-offs; in tailwaters, trout slow; clear to murky, stable 2 1/2 feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass slow casting and drifting big minnows off deep banks; clear, falling slowly, five feet below summer pool and 58 degrees.

Rough River: Black bass slow on crank and spinner baits in inlets and bays and off mud banks; crappie slow in inlets and bays and around stick ups; in headwaters, white bass slow; clear to murky, rising slowly, 2 1/2 feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

Nolin: Crappie slow over submerged cover; black bass slow on deep runners over creek channels; in tailwaters, white bass fair; clear, rising slowly, 2 1/2 feet below summer pool and 59 degrees.

Dewey: Crappie slow over submerged cover and around stick ups;

murky, rising slowly, four feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

with this dietary problem. Pre-natal, maternal deficiency of zinc can actually result in a mentally or physically handicapped baby and can cause behavior and learning problems, too. Zinc is essential for cell division. This means it can affect growth, tissue repair and other body processes that depend on a rapid cell regeneration. Zinc also plays a role in the activity of at least 70 metabolic enzymes. When these enzymes don't function at their best, symptoms can include fatigue or loss of stamina.

Pregnant Teenagers

Pregnant teenager girls are the ones most vulnerable to this nutritional deficiency. They need zinc for their own healthful growth, as well as for their baby's.

Dr. Donald Oberleas, nutrition and food science department head for the UK College of Home Economics, reported on zinc-deficiency research at a state-wide nutrition seminar in Louisville last month. Following is how he explained the problem:

Phytate is the major factor that affects the availability of zinc in our diets. It is a chemical substance found naturally in plant seeds, roots and tubers. In the intestine, it forms a chemical reaction with zinc and other minerals that keeps them from being used by the body. They are still there, but they just can't be absorbed into the blood stream.

Vegetarians, Take Care

Vegetarians run a greater risk of zinc deficiency than people who rely on animal sources for most of their protein intake. So, if you are a vegetarian, or if you count on a great many meat substitutes in your diet, be forewarned.

Vegetarians who drink milk and eat eggs, cheese and other dairy products run less risk of zinc deficiency than those who eat no animal protein at all, according to Oberleas.

Watching Your Diet

So, eat a wide variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, and don't rely heavily on dry beans. They have an extremely high level of phytate.

Wholewheat flour, wheat germ, bran, cereals and peanut butter are other foods relatively high in phytate.

Tubers and root vegetables such as potatoes, beets, turnips, carrots, parsnips and the like contain smaller amounts of phytate.

Food Science

Will food scientists be telling us next?

Well, food science is an exacting discipline, where research is always going on. There is still much we don't know about food and what happens to it in our bodies.

But we do know that our bodies need a balanced diet of many different foods from each of those basic four food groups. We do know that fat diets and fasting can be dangerous, that too much of one type of food and too little of another can cause all sorts of problems.

We know that complicated chemical reactions go on within us, and we know that the age old advice of "moderation in all things" isn't all that bad in slogan for how we eat and how we live.

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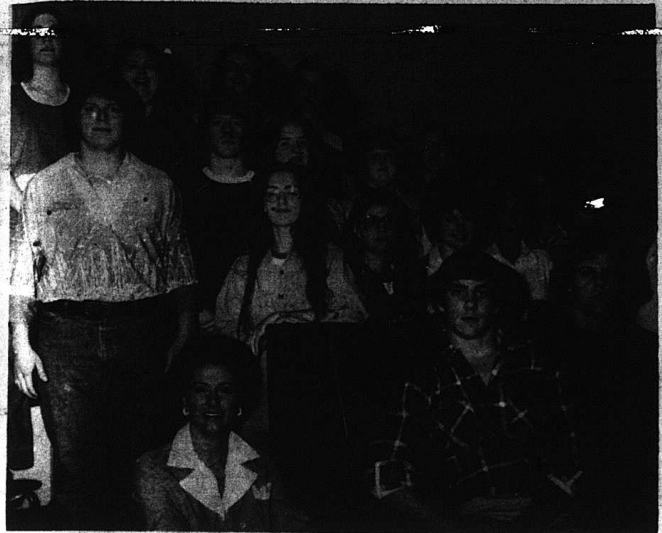
