## Cancer Hopeline

Q. What are the symptoms of bladder cancer?

A. The most common presenting symptom of bladder cancer is bloody urine. It usually appears suddenly and without pain. Depending on the amount of blood present, the color of the blood may vary from a smoky or rusty hue to deep red.

The blood may appear one day and be absent the next. Although weeks or months go by during which time the urine is clear, sooner or later blood reappears. This repetitive appearance of blood in the urine is the single most characteristic symptom of bladder cancer.

Q. What does a Hospice program do for patients?

A. Hospice, by working with the patient's own physician, offers several services—management of the patient's pain and related symptoms, instruction of family members in care of the patient, consultation with and emotional support for survivors. Nonmedical services as meal preparation, yard work, baby sitting, etc. are done by Hospice volunteers. The patient/family chooses those services which will allow the patient to continue to live at home.

Once a person has become part of the program, Hospice team members meet with the patient, family and physician to assess what needs exist that the hospice can help meet.

A nurse visits the patient at least once a week, calling in other team members for assistance as needed. The team is on call 24 hours a day. After death, the team maintains contact with the survivors to help them through their bereavement.

Q. I am a Physical Therapist in a small community hospital in Eastern Kentucky and one of the major deficiencies in my training is the lack of information on how to deal with cancer patients. Also, there are not very many programs in Continuing Education for physical therapists available. Is the McDowell Network planning any activities such as workshops for physical therapists and other allied health professionals?

A. The Ephraim McDowell Community Cancer Network, in cooperation

with the College of Allied Health of the University of Kentucky, is planning a workshop on June 19th for the various disciplines involved in Allied Health. This program will provide information on the current State-of-the-Art in cancer management, research and rehabilitation. Also, small working sessions will be concerned with the psychosocial problems involved with the patients and the family. This program is open to all health professionals but will be of particular interest to physical therapists, dental hygienists, medical technologists and individuals involved in community health programs.

Registration is open to all concerned individuals. Continuing education credits will be available. For further information and a copy of the brochure, contact Sheila McKinney at 606-233-6661.

## State Minimum Wage Increases July 1 to '2 Hour

Workers across Kentucky covered by state minimum wage-hour laws will be getting 40 cents more per hour beginning July 1.

The increase was approved by the 1978 General Assembly and signed into law by Gov. Julian Carroll.

This action raises the minimum wage for workers covered by state regulations from the current \$1.60 an hour to \$2 an hour, effective July 1.

The new law also provides for another increase a year later, raising the minimum to \$2.15 an hour, effective July 1, 1979.

Workers covered by federal minimum wage laws are not affected by the new state law.

"There has been some confusion as to the amount of the increase and when it goes into effect," said Charles E. Yates, assistant director of labor

standards in the Kentucky Department of Labor.

"We want to make it clear to the employees and employers all over Kentucky who are affected by this law that the new minimum wage will be \$2 an hour," he emphasized.

Yates said confusion most likely developed because of a floor amendment that proposed a higher minimum wage. But that amendment was rejected by the General Assembly.

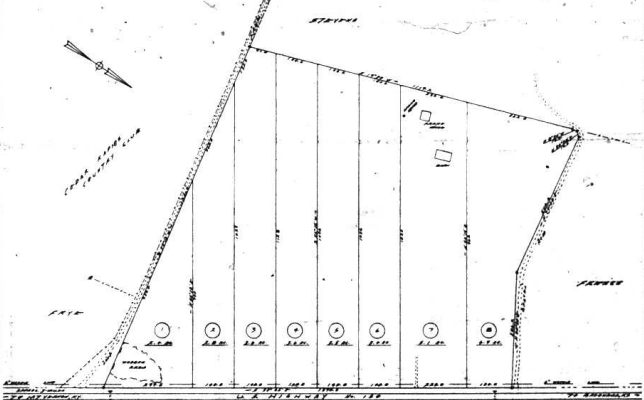

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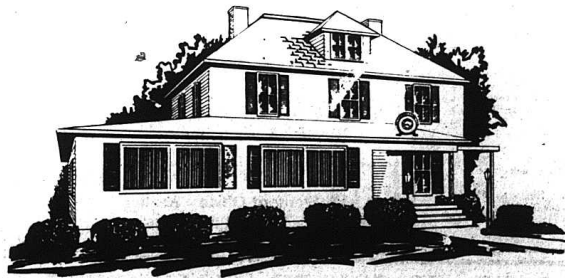

## Citizens' Committee Makes Final Plans for HUD Application

The Citizens Advisory Committee held their final Public Hearing on an HUD pre-application Monday night at City Hall and finalized their recommendations to the City Council for items to be contained in the pre-application.

The committee did make one change from their original agreement which had included the rehabilitation of low-income and elderly housing in the county and the acquisition of a senior citizens center.

The Committee amended their motion concerning the senior citizens center to the acquisition and renovation of an existing structure for the center.

This means that instead of trying to purchase a site and build the center, the committee would, if granted the funds, attempt to buy an existing structure and renovate it feeling that this would be more economical in view of today's escalating land values. They were told by David Patton with Tri-Community Development, who was present at the meeting, that if the 100% grant should be approved and no suitable existing structure could be located than an amendment could later be filed asking HUD to allow the funds to be spent for building a new center.

The committee allocated \$125,000 for the center and asked for \$75,000 for rehabilitation of older homes in the county. Of course, either, both or neither of the projects could be approved by HUD but something should be known by July 15th as to whether the grants have been approved.

## Hardwick Announces Senate Candidacy

Three sub-committees were also set up Monday night for the purposes of spearheading the fund-raising drive, seeking out existing structures which might be available for a senior citizens center and beginning a review of houses in the county which might qualify for rehabilitation money.

In this report, the grand jury reported that many of the previous conditions concerning the courthouse facility had been corrected and it also commended Jailer Billy Kirby and his wife for their fine job on the jail section of the courthouse.

There were still some items which the Grand Jury felt needed attention such as the plumbing, the hot water in

the jail, ceiling leaks in the Health Dept. the glass doors in the front of the courthouse and the doors to the circuit courtroom and the report recommended that at least one trash container be placed on each floor.

## Court Costs To Increase Effective June 19th by \$15

Don't try any funny business with stop signs or with the speedometer because if you do and you get caught, it's going to be very expensive.

Under a new schedule released recently by the state and which goes into effect June 19th, the fine for running your common everyday stop sign will be \$32.50. This includes a \$10 fine and \$42.50 in court costs which represents a \$15.00 increase in costs over the existing

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## Legislative News

Perhaps you have heard the term Legislative Research Commission or LRC. Today we would like to explain what the Legislative Research Commission is and outline some of its duties.

The Legislative Research Commission is a statutory agency of the Kentucky government, created and maintained since 1948 as the service arm of the General Assembly. Its membership is bipartisan, being composed of the President Pro Tem of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who alternate as chairman, and the Speaker Pro Tem of the House, the House and Senate majority and minority floor leaders, caucus chairmen, and whips, all ex officio (by virtue of office).

The commission holds regular monthly meetings, and may meet on call of the chairman or on the written request of any three members. It performs various functions and services for the General Assembly, assigned to it by statute, the rules of each house, and by its own motion or policy.

LRC is directed by law to make or cause to be made special investigations into statute law, legislation, government agencies and institutions, and matters of public policy as referred to the General Assembly in performing its duties in the most efficient and economical manner. It may also undertake research on its own initiative as it may or may not be requested to do so, but must assign priority to those subjects requested by the General Assembly.

In accordance with this mandate, the LRC is authorized access to the records of all state agencies or institutions, any private agency or institution which has been the recipient of public funds, with subpoena power if necessary.

Biannually, the LRC staff conducts 20 to 30 major research assignments, in addition to providing spot research as requested by interim and standing committees of the General Assembly, individual legislators, other state agencies and the public.

The LRC must afford to any member of the General Assembly or any committee of either house such information and assistance as may be practicable in the preparation of bills, memorials, resolutions, amendments, alterations and changes thereto and revisions and substitutes thereof, proposed to be introduced into the General Assembly. Further, the commission must advise and assist the members of the General Assembly in the preparation and revision of legislation and other matters of concern.

Members elect and hold over senators are authorized to pre file bills and resolutions for an ensuing session with the LRC. The commission receives these, assigns numbers in sequence and arranges for immediate printing and distribution to the members and the

public. These pre-filed bills then are introduced on the first legislative day of the forthcoming session.

Also, the LRC as the Kentucky Commission on Interstate Cooperation is required to encourage and assist the legislative, executive and judicial officials and employees of the Commonwealth to develop and maintain personal contact with departments, agencies, officials and employees of other states of the federal government and of local units of government.

As you can see, the LRC is the good right arm of the General Assembly. Its duties are numerous and varied but in 1978 it has done a commendable job. At this writing, the LRC has just held its monthly meeting to set guidelines and procedure for interim meetings.

And how important is math if modern math when the old way of adding, subtracting, dividing and multiplying is less complex.

You see now is not always best.

You can't even find a tutor to tutor in the county?

It's not the teachers place to teach a child everything they know but it is their responsibility to teach a child to read, write, spell and do arithmetic. But with all the other frills they don't have time.

I've called several times trying to get some special classes started in Rockcastle County and was told we don't have the money to finance. We have the

reading trailer. Is that really enough?

We parents have a right, a responsibility and obligation to see our children have a good education. But I don't think the children are getting it. So it's time we got together and made some changes. Keep after the school board, superintendent and other wheels and maybe before it's too late, something will be done.

## Kentucky Afield

"We are making more arrests for underbass than we did last year," says Steve Yontz, assistant director of the department of fish and wildlife's law-enforcement division, "but so far the difference doesn't appear to be significant."

"Obviously, the majority of anglers know about and are observing the new size limit on black bass," Yontz says. The legal length for keeper largemouth, smallmouth, and Kentucky (spotted) bass was increased from 10 to 12 inches Jan. 1, 1978.

A check of citations written so far this year by conservation officers shows that 77 arrests have been made for possession of bass under the

legal 12 inch limit, Yontz says. Through the end of April, 1977, the CO's made 63 arrests.

"Of these 77 citations 37 of them did not indicate what size the bass were, only that they were under 12 inches," Yontz says. "But of the other 40, more than half (22) were for bass that would have been illegal even before the limit was raised." The remaining 18 were for bass between 10 and 12 inches.

"To determine legal size, fish may be measured from the terminal point of the lower jaw to the longest point of the tail," Yontz says. The law requires that all bass under 12 inches be returned to the water immediately and in the best possible condition.

Yontz reminds anglers that it is illegal to remove the head or tail from a bass or other game fish before the end of the day's fishing. \*\*\*\*\*

Fisheries biologists believe that the increased size limit will be a very effective management tool and will improve the quality of bass fishing throughout Kentucky. But much of this effectiveness will be lost if anglers don't observe the new limit, says Fisheries Division Director Charlie Bowers.

"Our officers will certainly enforce this regulation along with all other fish and wildlife laws," Yontz says. "But it's obvious that they can't be everywhere at once. We must depend upon the fisherman's own personal sense of honor and his knowledge that obeying the law is protecting both the resource and his sport. The individual who does keep 'short' bass and doesn't get caught isn't getting away with something—he's only hurting his own chances for quality fishing in the future." \*\*\*\*\*

### No-Fat Dry Milk Plentiful

Weight watchers, convenience product fans, budget stretchers, culinary artists—all these are among the many enthusiastic users of nonfat dry milk. Nonfat dry milk is actually a form of whole milk with most of the fat removed. This powdered form of skim milk is convenient to store on the pantry shelf safe to tote on warm weather outings, easy to use at a woman's notice and a wise choice of economy-minded shoppers. When reconstituted with water, it can also be used in place of whole milk. Or, the powder may be added to a recipe along with the other dry ingredients while the water is added with the other liquid ingredients. For this reason,

nonfat dry milk is ideal when used in homemade mixes.

It appeals to weight watchers looking for high nutrition and low calorie count; also to those requiring protein or other nutritive boosts. It can be added to fluid milk and other food to increase protein, mineral and vitamin count.

You can buy it by the box, mix it by the quart or gallon and drink it by the glass. Whatever your milk requirements, you mix only what you need, when you need it. However, once it has been reconstituted, freezing is not recommended. It should be refrigerated, though.

Proper storage requires only that nonfat dry milk be kept in a dry, cool spot. It should be tightly covered to avoid absorption of any moisture. Shelf life is about 6 months.

It also has uses other than as a beverage. For instance, nonfat dry milk can be substituted for fluid milk in baking. When used this way, it should be added to the dry ingredients of the recipe. It should not be sifted. To fill liquid measure, use given recipe amount in water.

Mixed with equal amounts of ice water, nonfat dry milk can be whipped up to the consistency of whipped cream and served as a low-calorie dessert topping. It can also be whipped with frozen juice concentrates for a dessert in itself.

Transfer nonfat dry milk into a white sauce for tuna, chicken and turkey dishes or casseroles and gravies using this handy recipe:

### White Sauce

3 cups instant nonfat dry milk  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1 cup (2 sticks) butter  
3 teaspoons salt

Combine dry milk, flour, butter and salt. Blend thoroughly with fork or pastry blender until it looks like corn meal. Store in tightly covered container in refrigerator. Add amount of liquid required for desired sauce thickness.

For this white sauce, use 1/2 cup mix plus 1 cup liquid. For thick white sauce, use 1/2 cup mix plus 1 cup liquid. Blend mix and liquid in heavy saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until smooth and thickened. Season to suit your taste or to harmonize with the recipe in which sauce is being used. This recipe has pleased appetites over the years.

### Crunch Apple Muffins

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
4 teaspoons double-action baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 cup finely chopped peeled apples  
1/2 cup water  
1/4 cup vegetable oil  
1 egg

Sift flour, add nonfat dry milk, sugar, baking powder, salt and cinnamon in bowl. Mix in apples. Combine water, oil and eggs. Stir into flour mixture. Do not overmix. Spoon into 12 well-greased muffin cups. Combine ingredients for topping. Sprinkle topping over batter in each cup-bake in preheated 400 degree oven 18 to 20 minutes. Serve warm.

The process of teaching a new skill in a step-by-step manner can be successful with all types of people including the emotionally disturbed and retarded. First-break the task into small parts. Require the learner to do only the first part. Reward him for

attempting or accomplishing it; then move on to the next step. In shaping behavior the most important ingredients are small steps, followed by generous amounts of praise for even minute successes. Learning requires an abundance of practice and teaching demands patience. The adult who teaches children must keep these facts in mind.

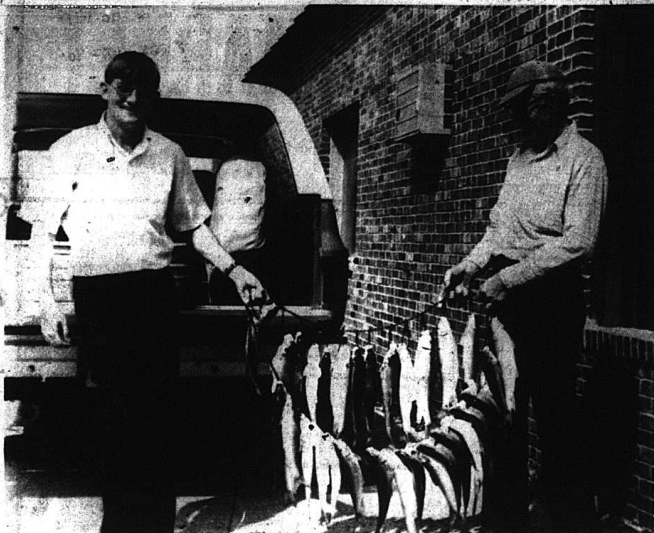

approaching, and Extension forage specialist in the UK College of Agriculture suggests ways to obtain maximum yield of digestible nutrients per acre.

Although there are many factors which affect this, Gary Larefield says that the most important is stage of maturity when hay crop plants are harvested. For the first cutting crop, he recommends a compromise between quality and quantity.

For established alfalfa, the forage specialist advises cutting in the late bud stage for the first harvest, and waiting until the one-tenth bloom stage for succeeding harvests. For fescue, orchardgrass, and timothy, take the first cutting when plants are in the boot to early head stage, then continue to harvest at 4-6 week intervals. All cuttings of red clover should be made at the early bloom stage.

"As grass and legume plants advance from the vegetative to the reproductive (seed) stage, they become lower in protein, digestibility and acceptability to livestock," explains Larefield.

Research shows that delaying harvest from early flowering stage to seed stage can result in more than a 45% loss in protein. Digestibility drops approximately 1.5% for each day delay in harvest.

"The best indicator of hay quality is how well it is accepted by livestock," says Larefield. Research indicates that forage intake decreases about 2% each day that cutting is delayed.

Rainy weather at haymaking time takes its toll on the yield of high quality hay every year, especially the first cutting. Although some of the weather losses can't be avoided, Larefield says they can be reduced by paying attention to weather forecasts and by using a hay conditioner to decrease the drying time.

"However, more or less equal quality and quantity is lost by delayed harvest than by rainy weather," Larefield says.

He points to research that proves his point. Hay cut at the proper stage of maturity, but either rained on or sprinkled with one inch of wet daily while it was curing in the field, had a

digestibility of 57%. The weathering caused a 10% loss in digestibility, compared with hay cut the same day and heat dried to eliminate weather damage. Delaying cutting one month and heat-drying the crop resulted in hay with only a 52% digestibility.

From a quality standpoint, it was better to cut early and take a chance on rain than to delay cutting in an attempt to avoid rain.

In addition to the quality loss, delayed cutting also caused a loss in quantity or yield because regrowth did not begin until the hay was cut. In other words, 30 days of regrowth for the second cutting was lost by taking the first cutting a month late.

Ideally, you want to get the hay cut at the proper stage, cured and stored without weather damage. You can improve your chances by planning now and getting equipment ready to go. Pay close attention to weather advisories as cutting time approaches and use a conditioner to try to beat the rain.

**Use Dust Bags to Control Flies On Pasturing Cattle**

Farmers with cattle on pasture can take action this spring to prevent summertime buildups of horn fly and face fly populations.

"Control of horn flies and face flies should be started early in the spring before their populations can grow," advises Chris Christensen, Extension entomologist in the UK College of Agriculture.

"Regular use of insecticides is the only practical way to control these flies, whether a dust bag or some other device is used to apply the insecticides."

Dust bags are the most effective tool against these pests, providing the bags are placed in areas where cattle have no choice but to use them.

Hanging large canvas-covered dust bags across entrances to watering troughs or ponds is the best way to achieve forced use. The farmer will get best results by using a little "cow psychology" in placement of the bags.


If cows have been avoiding a bag, then reposition it so they have to use it. Fenced-off areas surrounding water troughs or mineral feeders are logical places to put the bags.

Christensen also has these suggestions: hang a dust bag to swing freely. Place it low enough so that cattle will have to bump it with their faces to get it out of their way. Make it large enough to cover the width of the runway or chf opening. Use a rope instead of a wire to hang it, since rope is easier on the bag and not as likely to tear grommets out of holes.

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# Fishing Report

The overall fishing picture across the state's 15 major lakes is now fair, but some "hot spots" have good to excellent angling for black bass, crappie, trout and even walleye. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**Barren:** black bass excellent with some limits on the upper lake on spinner baits and dollies with pork rind trailers baited to good on the lower lake on artificial nightcrawlers and crank baits off deep rocky points and banks; crappie good and improving at the first riffle on the upper lake and over submerged cover; in tailwaters, trout fair to good, white bass fair; clear to murky, rising slowly, nine feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

**Laurel:** crappie good around stick-ups; black bass good on surface lures and spinner baits in inlets and bays and timbered covers; clear, stable, two feet below power pool and 57 degrees.

**Dewey:** crappie fair to good over submerged cover and creek channel drop-offs; black bass fair still fishing nightcrawlers at run-ins in inlets and bays; clear to murky, rising slowly, four feet below summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** crappie fair and improving over submerged cover; black bass good on medium runners off deep mud banks; in tailwaters, trout good with some limits; clear to murky, stable, eight feet below summer pool and 62 degrees.

**Cumberland:** black bass fair on artificial nightcrawlers on the upper lake and casting spinner baits and surface lures and jigging minnows on the lower lake in the heads of inlets and bays; crappie fair drifting minnows on the lower lake over submerged cover; in headwaters, white bass fair on Rockcastle River and creek on Laurel River and Main Cumberland; in tailwaters, sauger and trout fair to good; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, eight feet below the timberline and 55 degrees.

**Herrington:** black bass fair on crank baits off deep banks; crappie fair around stick-ups; in headwaters, white bass slow; clear to murky, stable, eight feet below summer pool and 59 degrees.

**Nolin:** crappie fair over creek channel drop-offs; black bass slow on crank baits off shallow banks; in tailwaters, walleye good to excellent with some limits on dollies and minnows; clear, rising slowly, three feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

**Rough River:** Black bass slow to fair on medium runners off points; crappie slow to fair casting do-jigs and still fishing minnows around stick-ups; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear to murky, rising slowly, one foot below summer pool and 60 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** crappie fair in inlets and bays and around stick-ups; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear (trash in lake), rising slowly, 14 feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass and walleye slow still and drift fishing big minnows over medium mud banks; clear, stable, 4 1/2 feet below summer pool and 61 degrees.

**Green:** Black bass slow to fair on crank and spinner baits off points and over drop-offs; crappie slow over

submerged cover; in headwaters, white bass slow; in tailwaters, trout fair, clear to murky, rising slowly at summer pool and 56 degrees.

**Kentucky:** crappie slow and improving over submerged cover; black bass slow on crank and spinner baits off points and in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish good; clear to murky, stable, one foot below summer pool and 62 degrees.

**Barkley:** crappie slow and improving along brush line in inlets and bays and over submerged cover; black bass slow on crank and spinner baits off points and in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, crappie and white bass slow; clear to murky, stable, one foot below summer pool and 62 degrees.

**Cave Run:** Muddy slow to fair casting crank and spinner baits off shallow banks; black bass slow to fair on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers around stick-ups; in tailwaters, crappie slow; clear to murky, rising slowly, 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 59 degrees.

**Grayson:** black bass slow on spinner baits over drop-offs, crappie slow around stick-ups; in tailwaters, trout fair to good; clear to murky, rising slowly, two feet below summer pool and 58 degrees.

## Tobacco Report

Pounds, price and percentage since the 1977-78 marketing season just concluded has topped any year since 1970 in the operations of the Burley

Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association.

In administering the price-support system the Burley Co-op took under loan for farmers a total of 37,004,746 pounds, and advanced \$42,779,404.31 in loans, it was announced by Alvin R. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer of the association.

This represents 7.87 percent of the total 470,339,578 pounds marketed from the 1977 crop in Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Missouri—the states in which the Burley Co-op handles the price-support program.

"The year-to-year figures over the past decade show the strength and value of the farmer's price protection and loan program," said David J. Williams, president of the Association. He noted that although the recent market was highest in pool receipts since the 4 1/2% million take in 1970, there has been no excessive amount on hand at any time during the period.

As usual the tobacco consignments from the 1977 crop have been processed

"The fly control program you use should be tailored to your situation," the specialist notes. "Watch your cattle to determine where control devices can be placed most effectively."

Outlook for 1978 remains favorable in the opinion of burley leaders, with slightly reduced production quotas, a small loan inventory of loan stocks, and a proposed 6.3 percent hike in price support levels.

Tobacco plant beds throughout the belt are considerably later than normal, with only 15 pct., showing plants up and growing, compared with 52 pct. last year and 48 pct. for the five-year period.

The USDA crop reporting service this week announced prospective plantings for the burley belt at 264,900 acres, 4 pct. below the 275,500 acres harvested in 1977.
