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## Former President Nixon To Visit Leslie County

By Tim Lee Carter

Former President Richard M. Nixon has accepted an invitation to attend the dedication on July 2 of a recreational complex being named in his honor in Leslie County.

Rep. Tim Lee Carter, R-Thompsonville, announced May 16, that President Nixon had called him at his home to let him know he would accept the invitation extended by Leslie County Judge-Executive C. Allen Muncy.

Details about the dedication, which is part of the county's centennial celebration, are to be announced later. The recreational complex is a \$2,147,000 project under construction at the county seat in Hyden. The 22 acre site will have a 25 meter swimming pool with bathroom, a community building and 2,500 seat gymnasium.

The complex itself has been named for former President Nixon along with the gymnasium. The Fiscal Court has named the community building for Rep. Carter. The pool will bear the name of Willie T. Sandlin, a Leslie County native who was the only Kentuckian awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor in World War I.

Rep. Carter, in his announcement of the former president's visit, said, "It is an honor for our area for President Nixon to come to Kentucky. After all, Kentucky in 1972 gave him one of the largest majorities a presidential candidate has ever been given. He was re-elected president with a 75,000 vote majority in the Fifth District alone."

Judge-Executive Muncy had written to the former chief executive in San Clemente, Calif., on behalf of the people of Leslie County, the Fiscal Court and the County Republican Committee.

Responding to the news the former President Nixon had accepted their invitation, Judge-Executive Muncy said, "We think it is the best thing that has ever happened."

In his letter to the former president, the Judge-Executive said in part, "The Fiscal Court feels that you were the only President of the United States in our county's 100 year history who did something that helped not only the County but every local government in the nation; you, of all presidents, had faith in the ability of local governments to meet their needs, and you helped us as no other President did by enacting the general revenue-sharing law.

Revenue sharing made the building

of the recreational complex possible. We wish to honor you for what you did for us.

"It would be the greatest honor in our history, Mr. President, for you to come to our dedication on July 2, 1978," Judge-Executive Muncy wrote.

The complex at Hyden is being paid for with a combination of local, state and federal funds, according to Muncy. The bulk of the cost will be paid with state cost-allocation tax payments to the county. Federal funds include a \$300,000 U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) community-development block grant, a \$100,000 Appalachian Regional Commission grant and a \$94,000 Economic Development Administration grant used for putting in sewage service to the site. The remainder of the cost is being paid from federal revenue-sharing payments and from local funds, Judge-Executive Muncy said.

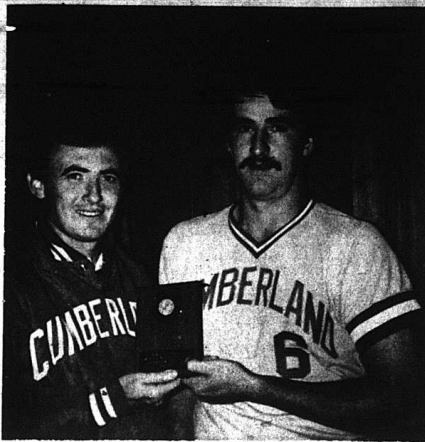



## Judge Aker Wins Primary, Also Carter, Huddleston

District Court Judge John Calvin Aker of Somerset was elected Tuesday's primary election both in Rockcastle County and all other areas.

Judge Aker will run against Court of Appeals Judge John White of Manchester next fall for the state Supreme Court. Boyd F. Taylor of London is now eliminated from the three-way race.

Judge Aker, who is 38, made age an issue in the campaign, saying it was time for a younger man to serve in the high court.

Only about 900 people voted in the primary. Irene Bales, County Clerk, said, "It was a very light turn-out."

Rockcastle has 6,908 registered voters, with 5,341 of them Republican.

Two incumbents were the biggest vote getters in the county. They are U.S. Rep. Tim Lee Carter and U.S. Senator Walter "Doc" Huddleston.

Rep. Carter defeated his opponent, Charles Hardwick, 459 to 28 in Rockcastle County, and he also won, decisively in other areas.

Sen. Huddleston beat his three opponents here and in other areas also.

In the race for Republican nominee for Senate, Louie Guenther, Jr. of Northfield won in Rockcastle county and appears to be the general winner against Thurman Hamlin of London, and Oline Carmical, Jr. of Williamsburg. He will face Sen. Huddleston next fall.

Jesse Ramey of Wayneburg appears to have won the Democratic nomination to run against Rep. Carter. He also won in Rockcastle County.

## Double Shooting in Brodhead Saturday: Man Shoots Ex-Wife, Kills Himself

A Brodhead man shot and killed his ex-wife, and then killed himself Saturday, May 20, in front of two small children, who later told police what happened.

The man was Glenn Edward Bishop, 38, and the woman was Deborah Ann Bishop, 28.

According to Kentucky State Trooper Danny Coleman, Mr. Bishop had been seeing his former wife on and off since their divorce in 1976. He was visiting her Saturday while their two-year-old son, Michael Wayne, played with a neighbor boy.

This playmate, age six, later told officer Coleman that Mr. and Mrs. Bishop were getting ready to go to the house about 9:30 p.m. when they started to quarrel. Mr. Bishop went out to his car and came back with a gun. He then shot, Mrs. Bishop and himself.

The boy went home and told his father that something had happened in the neighbor's trailer involving a "flash" and "people falling down." Officer Coleman said, but apparently the father did not understand.

However, the next morning, the boy explained it to his older brothers, who convinced the father to go to the neighbor's home, where they discovered the bodies and Michael Wayne, who had been alone the entire time.

County Coroner Bill Dowell said the cause of death in both cases was gunshot wounds from a .25-caliber pistol.

## Policeman Arrested In Livingston Assault

Livingston police officer Eugene Sellers appeared before District Court Judge Calvin Aker Monday on charges of assault in the second degree, stemming from a complaint brought by Jerry Thomas of Brodhead.

Mr. Thomas was arrested April 8, the day of the alleged assault, for being drunk in a public place, standing in police officer, disorderly conduct, and resisting arrest. He pleaded not guilty to all four charges May 22, and will be tried June 16 in District Court before Judge Aker.

Judge Aker referred Officer Sellers' case to the Circuit Court. A Grand Jury, which will form July 17, will investigate the charge, and if it finds enough evidence, it can indict Officer Sellers.

Officer Sellers was arrested May 13 by Sheriff Henry Abney under a warrant issued by County Attorney James Lambert.

Funeral services were arranged through Cox Funeral Home in Mt. Vernon, and held Tuesday at Ottawa Baptist Church. He was buried in the Ottawa Cemetery.

## Kindergarten to Return Next September

Kindergarten came to Rockcastle County for the first time this year, and it will definitely be available next September. Charles Parsons, superintendent of the Rockcastle County Schools said.

Although attendance was not required, of the 158 children who enrolled last September, 153 were still in the program, which ends this month.

"We feel we will have some very fine first graders next year," Mr. Parsons said. The children have learned the routine of school-how to ride the bus, how to listen to the teacher. Many now know their reading fundamentals. Our teachers are well pleased."

Mr. Parsons said the school board could have set up kindergarten on a limited basis a few years ago, but decided to wait until enough money was available so that every eligible child could attend.

"If we would just offer it in one school, we would have had to choose between children and we did not want to do that," Mr. Parsons said.

The kindergarten program was funded through the State of Kentucky, Title I federal money, and local funds which were spent mostly on supplies.

The major problem that Rockcastle had in setting up the kindergarten was

in transportation. Kindergarten is traditionally a half-day program, because it is thought that very young children cannot concentrate for a long period. But in a half-day program, parents would have had to pick up their youngsters at noon or drive them to school for an afternoon session.

Instead, Rockcastle found a unique solution. Kindergarten classes were divided in half at the four elementary schools, with half the class attending every other day.

"It's worked out very well," Mr. Parsons said. "The children have one day in between to play at home, and they seem to be able to attend the full day without problems."

Besides learning the school routine, the children are learning reading fundamentals in a program called "Alpha-time." The lessons are continued in first grade in the "Alpha-One" program. Before kindergarten was established, first graders had to go through both in one year.

Alpha-Time is a system of teaching letters and numbers. Stuffed dolls are used to illustrate certain letters. For example, there is a short-i doll with an i-h.

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## Legislative Report

In a little over 200 years, the United States of America has become an influential leader of world development. One source of our country's rapid growth can be attributed to the multiplicity of natural resources. We are a nation blessed with large forests, a bountiful water supply and an abundance of minerals.

Today there is a commitment in our national conscience to promote the use of natural resources in a manner which will be efficient as well as ecologically prudent. So that future generations of Americans may also reap the benefits of their use.

The National Environmental Protection Agency "EPA" works through state agencies to see that the federal regulations which provide for the protection of our environment are enforced. In Kentucky the bureau agent agency through which the EPA administers federal regulations is the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection "DNR". The DNR aids in the enforcement of the federal Water Pollution Control Act. The primary aim of this act is to restore and maintain the chemical, physical and biological integrity of American waters. Among the goals of the Act are that, whenever possible, water quality is to be suitable for recreational contact and for the protection and propagation of fish and wildlife. To achieve this goal an expanded system of federal grants has been developed to plan and construct publicly owned water treatment plants.

Additionally, the Act provides for a permit program geared to reducing pollutants from point sources such as factories, municipalities and large agriculture operations where pollutants enter the nation's waters. The Act also authorizes major resource demonstration programs to work toward the goal of eliminating pollutants from runoff, acid mine drainage and other non-point sources.

The DNR with the federal EPA enforce the National Forest Management Act of 1976. Through this Act we have the funds of timber management, watershed management, forest range management, forest fire protection, forest insect and disease protection and control.

Through the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976, the DNR is the Commonwealth's solid waste manager; authority for the implementation of programs to provide solid waste management, resource recovery, resource conservation services, and hazardous waste management.

The EPA makes grants to Kentucky to provide assistance for solid waste management facilities necessary to meet the Act's prohibition against open dumping and restrictions against open burning.

DNR is the state's agency responsible for hazardous waste disposal management. Because of the potential of the use of nuclear energy, there are radioactive waste disposal sites, located across America, one of which is Maxey Flats in Kentucky. The 1976 General Assembly enacted a law which requires approval by the General Assembly and the Governor before another nuclear waste disposal site can be located in Kentucky.

In 1977, Congress enacted the Federal Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act. This new federal law regulates the surface mining of coal for the first time from the national level. If a state does not enforce the federal standards, the law provides for enforcement by the U.S. Department of Interior. In order to exercise exclusive jurisdiction in the enforcement of the new program, Kentucky law and regulations must be made to conform with the new federal law.

The DNR will be responsible for the enforcement of the laws that the 1978 General Assembly passed to conform with the Federal Strip Mine regulations. An example of Kentucky's new strip

mine laws is Senate Bill 273. This bill requires that stripped mountains be restored to their original contour. Topsoil which has been stripped away must be reused and the dumping of dirt or rock spoil down hillsides is forbidden. The Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection is Kentucky's bureaucratic agency responsible for the enforcement of Kentucky laws that conform with federal regulations which provide for clean air, clean water and a flourishing landscape.

The free shots are offered to all children at the county health department in the courthouse.

### Immunizations are Necessary

Before a child can enter school, he must have the proper immunizations. Kentucky law requires children must be tested for tuberculosis and immunized for polio, diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, rubella and rabies.

Children are also required to have a physical examination before they may enter school.

**Christian Appalachian Project:** Runs "The Attic" at the Our Lady of Mt. Vernon Catholic Church where clothing and household items can be purchased very inexpensively.

**Alcoholics Anonymous Meets Mondays:** at 7:30 p.m. in the Sears Building in Mt. Vernon. The only requirement to join is his desire to stop drinking.

**Weatherization Project:** This year-id agency can help you get free insulation for your home or pay overdue fuel bills. It's in the courthouse.

**Home Health Agency:** Its "visiting nurse" will come only through doctors' directions. They provide all kinds of therapy and any care that can be done in the home.

**Citizens Center:** Has a project going about home repair and improvement throughout the county. Also conducts lunch program, transportation and other services for the elderly.

**Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center:** Helps mentally ill and retarded of all ages. There are not waiting lists to see a marriage counselor or other therapist if you need help. All these services are free or based on ability to pay.

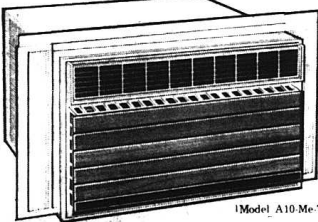

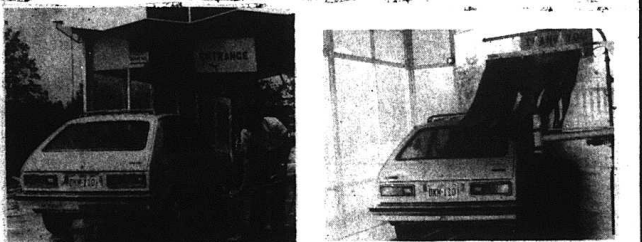

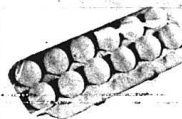

# Family Care Home Program Supplies Very Real Need for the Elderly

When you are very old, you want to be at home with family. And these days, some old folks are staying with an "adopted" family rather than go into nursing homes.

Mr. and Mrs. Billy Bussell of Brodhead have opened their home to three women, all over age 85, as part of the State of Kentucky's Family Care Home Program.

"Some people would be very unhappy in a nursing home adjusting wonderfully in a family setting," Mrs. Bussell said.

Mrs. Bussell worked for two years at the Sowder Nursing Home before she and her husband opened their house as a licensed home for the elderly in 1968.

Since then at least three people have been under their care. They receive about \$240 per month for each person from the Social Security Administration and the State of Kentucky.

"We have a family operation," Mr. Bussell said. His daughter and two sons help with the running of the large household, and two married daughters take over when the Bussells need a vacation.

The three women eat with the family and help with dishes, if they want. The Bussells never ask anyone to help with chores, but they have found that the older people enjoy working a little. They also go on picnics, out for ice cream, and so on together.

Mrs. Bussell said it does not take long to see if a person will adjust to their home, and so far, they have had only one who couldn't. She said that certain ones were supposed to have been "problems" but that with the right treatment, everything was solved.

"You can't force an older person to do something," she said. "We had one lady who didn't want a bath. It took

time, but she came around. We had another who thought she was an employee here, and told everyone she worked here. We didn't hurt her feelings by correcting her story."

"Sometimes they are slow at things, and you have to hear the same story over and over," Mr. Bussell said. He said one lady told him she could make bread. "There's nothing I like better than homemade bread, so we decided to make some," he said. "It took us all day. But I did learn how."

The Bussells live in a beautifully renovated house, perhaps 75 years old. It has five bedrooms, sitting rooms and parlors. The women have their own bedrooms.

Mrs. Bussell keeps records for the State of all her menus. She also takes temperatures and blood pressure readings, and administers medicine, which she records on hospital charts.

"The State requires that you have so much soap, so many bed sheets, and all this," Mrs. Bussell said. "But it is not as complicated as you might think. The rules do scare people off—they think it might be too much trouble."

Mrs. Bussell would like to see more people open their homes and become licensed, because she thinks it would be good for more old people to get the personal attention of a family setting.

At the Certificate of Need and Licensure Board of the State of Kentucky May 15, another three-bed family care home in Brodhead—owned by the Dyehouse Family—was licensed. Others with three or less patients were licensed in Fritz, Beaver, Barbourville, Ashland and other Kentucky towns. A proposal from Uptown Nursing Home, Inc. in Somerset to construct a 45-bed facility at \$321,500 was turned down. Instead, the Somerset Center and Crestview Care Home in Somerset will add 26 and 22 more beds, at a total cost of about \$1.7 million.

Mrs. Bussell said that in the smaller nursing home, you become very attached to people under your care. "They are family," she said, showing a picture of one of her former patients who died recently. "It's really hard when you have a death. Very hard."

She also thinks that an "adopted" family can sometimes be better than the natural family. "Times have changed," she said. "Women are outside the home more these days. Also sometimes the old folks do not get along with their children, or become too bossy. You don't have that this way."

Mrs. Bussell intends to stay in nursing home care, and has a waiting list.

"Some of my friends tell me they want me to take care of them," she laughed. "They are my same age, too. Well, we'll see about it."

## INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

#### Don't Let Termites Cause You To Panic

This is the time of year when you may see termites swarming around your house. Termites may quietly eat away at your home throughout the year without giving much notice of their activity. However, around this time of year, larger colonies will give away their presence by sending large numbers of their winged brothers and sisters to start new colonies.

The winged termites resemble flying ants, which are also swarming at this time of year. The easiest way to tell the difference between flying ants and termites is to check their waistlines. If the insect has a constricted or narrow waist—which is the area of the body just behind where the wings are attached—it's a flying ant. If there is not constriction at the waist, it's a termite.

Termites are social insects that live in colonies which may contain thousands of individuals. The colony is a complex society made up of workers, soldiers and reproductives. Workers and soldiers are wingless and stay within the colony; they are only seen when the colony is broken into. Winged termites are mature males and females.

The swarming of termites indicates they have been present for some time. However, this does not mean there is a termite problem in your home. If you sight a termite swarm, that doesn't mean that you need to get an exterminator in the next day. Termites work slowly, so there is time to investigate the extent of damage and plan a course of action. You may be able to treat the problem yourself or you may need the help of a pest control operator. Since pest control companies offer different guarantees, price and service programs, call several to get the one that best suits your needs.

If termites are a common problem in your neighborhood, it would be wise to inspect for them even if you haven't seen swarms nearby. Probe timbers and other wood near the ground with an ice pick or screwdriver to see that the wood is solid. If the wood is easily probed, you will probably see the cream-colored wingless termites at work. Dirt-like chimneys plastered against the sides of basement or crawl-space walls for another sign of termites.

For detailed information on controlling termites yourself, pick up a copy of University of Kentucky Misc. 375—Termites and Their Control from the Rockcastle County Extension office. And if you need outside help, don't panic, but investigate the firm and purchase the service wisely.

#### Blue Mold May Insect Tobacco Loss

Blue mold was a widespread problem in tobacco beds last year, and is likely to cause damage to some beds this year. Blue mold is a fungus disease which is spread by wind-blown spores, according to J.H. Smiley, Extension Tobacco Specialist at the UK College of Agriculture.

Smiley says that during dry weather, the first sign of the disease is likely to be the yellowing and stunting of a group of half-grown plants. No other symptoms will appear unless the weather becomes wet. When that happens, the disease may spread to other parts of the bed, causing large yellow blotches on the leaves of plants about ready to be set.

During the cool, damp periods, the leaves may collapse rapidly so that plants appear to be scalded: A dense, downy, bluish mold appears on the lower surface of the leaves in the scalded areas. In severe cases, during wet weather, the leaves rot and make a stinking mass of plant material. However, if the infection is mild and there are no dark areas on the stems near the ground, the plants may be set in the field with little danger of their dying.

Smiley says control measures for blue mold are usually not necessary in Kentucky. However, in areas where severe outbreaks are occurring, blue mold can be prevented by spraying or diskling with maneb, zinc or ferbam. Directions for treatment and these materials are available from local county extension agents.

### Questions and Answers About Strawberries

Q. Is canning strawberries worth the effort?

A. Probably not. People used to can strawberries, but the product is disappointing. The color is very faded and the flavor is not too good. It's better to spend your time and effort in freezing strawberries, or in making jam or jelly or preserves.

Q. The strawberries I froze last year were a disappointment. How can I get better results this year?

A. Handle strawberries in small quantities and freeze them at the peak of their quality. To help hold color and flavor, add ascorbic acid to the sugar or syrup when you freeze the berries. If you use ascorbic acid in crystalline form, use 1/4 teaspoon for each quart of berries. If you use an ascorbic acid mixture, follow the directions on the label.

Q. Is it a good idea to freeze strawberries without sugar for pies?

A. No. It's possible, of course, but I think you'll be disappointed in the product. Sugar or syrup helps retain the flavor and color of strawberries. When using your frozen berries for pie, make allowance for the sugar already added.

Q. What strength syrup is recommended for strawberries?

A. A 50 percent syrup gives good results. To make it, dissolve 4 cups of sugar in 4 cups of water. You can use either hot or cold water. You can make it the day before and keep it cool in the refrigerator. Add ascorbic acid to syrup before packing with strawberries.

Q. What's the best way to prepare frozen strawberries for eating?

A. That package in refrigerator for several hours and open just before serving. Frozen strawberries are at their best while there are still some ice crystals. You can use frozen berries just the way you would use them fresh in most recipes. Remember to allow for any sugar or syrup that was added in freezing.

#### Strawberries High in Vitamin C

One cup of fresh strawberries provides more vitamin C than you actually need for the day and can take

the place of your usual grapefruit half or glass of orange juice. Without sugar added, strawberries are low in calories—55 per cup. So sweeten them lightly, or not at all.

Do include them in your meals while they are plentiful. If there's a "pick-your-own" commercial berry patch in the area, it might be fun to patronize it. You pay less, you select your own red-ripe-berries and know exactly how fresh they are.

Strawberries are good on breakfast cereal and easy to work into lunch and dinner menus, too. For an easy and different way to serve them, wash them under cold running water, leave the caps on, provide sour cream or plain yogurt to dunk them in.

#### Handle With Care

In the berry patch or at the food market, avoid berries with large seedy or uncolored area. These will be poor in flavor and texture, while costing just as much as the rest. Also avoid berries that are soft or have a dull, shrunken look. They're not fresh and they're ready to decay. Berries are very perishable and spoilage spreads quickly.

For more than a few hours' storage time, spread strawberries on a cookie sheet or other shallow container and refrigerate them. To keep nutrients, flavor and a natural protective outer layer, don't cap or wash strawberries until just before serving. If they're fresh to start with and are properly refrigerated, they'll keep bright and fresh for several days.

Strawberries picked at the right stage are quite a treat when frozen. Be sure to add ascorbic acid to help hold both flavor and color.

Strawberry Parfait—here's an easy but elegant dessert to serve. Slightly crush clean, fresh strawberries. Sweeten them if you wish, then alternate them with layers of vanilla ice cream in a parfait glass. Top with whipped cream and a big berry with the top still on.

**Jackson County RECC Rates**  
**Reduced as of May 17, 1978**

The flow-through rate increase which was granted to East Kentucky Power Cooperative on February 13, 1978 has been reduced to approximately 53% of the original amount by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky. This latest and final order in the case was issued on May-17, 1978.

When the emergency increase was granted by the Commission on February 13, the member cooperatives of East Kentucky Power were ordered to increase their rates by an amount sufficient to pay for the added cost of wholesale power. This was necessary for them to maintain financial stability. This flow-through concept of a reduced amount still prevails in the latest order. Jackson County R.E.C.C. and the 17 other cooperatives served by East Kentucky Power will reduce rates effective May 17, 1978 in accordance with the latest order. This means that the proposed rates in the application of Jackson County R.E.C.C. now before the Commission will be smaller by the amount of the reduced flow-through according to Roy Cole, President and General Manager of Jackson County R.E.C.C.

Tammy was among hundreds who lost their lives in the tragic Beverly Hills fire. She was a member of the Lebanon Church of God, and the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Kincer of Mt. Vernon.

**Somewhere in the City of God  
 May 28, 1977**

Dear Mom and Dad:  
 Thanks for all the years I spent with you since January 7, 1959, when you welcomed me, your first child, and loved me every minute of my life, which has been a pure delight!

You encouraged me to love music and singing, and I have been playing the piano now for three years. I did encourage myself in the Lord to sing my first public solo this past month, "I'll Never Walk Alone."

I loved school and all my school days were spent in Lebanon, Ohio. You know, I planned to enter college this summer to begin training to be an Executive Secretary for I wanted to be with people! I really loved the House of the Lord; the Lebanon Church of God was my church and favorite place of worship. I could truthfully say with the Psalmist David, "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord. I never expected the church to keep me in tune with my Maker, for every night before retiring, no matter what hour, I felt I owed it to my Lord and Savior to let Him speak to me through His Word and I always found Him near to me.

Life has been so beautiful: my dear brothers, Craig and Kevin, and my darling sister Paulita, have been real pals to me. I always enjoyed good sports. I really like to play tennis! Now, to celebrate this milestone, Jim and I, with others of our friends planned a night out, but circumstances prevented their going, and we decided to go alone. We selected the finest place we knew to celebrate this very special occasion.

In God's mysterious way, instead of a white cap and gown, diploma, and rose with my Lebanon High School graduation class, I was ushered into the presence of God by Holy Angels.

You should see me in my beautiful white robe; and I have read that a crown of life is waiting for me, because I loved Him and I was faithful unto death.

Mom and Dad, Craig, Kevin and Paulita, I love you. Say thanks for me to my teachers, my schoolmates, classmates, my friends, my pastor, and church friends, and all the other members of my family, for loving me and helping me through these wonderful 18 years, 4 months and 9 weeks.

I know I left you rather unexpectedly, but the Bible says, "Our Joy is the Salvation of the Lord." And you know, in the Lamb's Book of Life, there is registered my name.

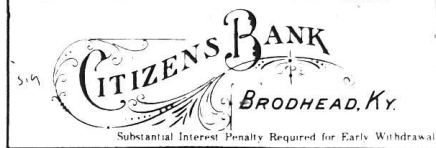
