Cheese Now in Plentiful Supply
Cheese is one of the most versatile, nutritious and satisfying foods available. It can serve as an appetizer, snack, main dish, or dessert; comes in some 400 varieties; and contains generous supplies of protein, riboflavin and calcium. Moreover, the protein in cheese is of the same high quality as the protein in meat, fish and eggs.

This is the perfect time to try cheese in many different ways because the supply is plentiful just now.

Selecting a cheese is mostly a matter of taste: some prefer them mild, others sharp. Cheese stores well, but should be kept in the refrigerator. If possible, leave it in its original wrapper and cover cut surfaces tightly with waxed paper, foil or plastic wrap to prevent the surface from drying out.

In general, soft cheeses are more perishable than hard ones. Freezing is not recommended for most cheeses because they become crumbly and mealy when frozen. So do not buy in overly large quantities, but buy often.

Looking for some unusual ways to serve cheese? Why not try it in rolls, bread and bread sticks. It adds a distinctive flavor to these favorites:

Cheese Flumps

Yeast roll dough (not sweet to make rolls)
1 1/2 cups shredded Cheddar Cheese
2 tbs. melted butter
nutmeg as desired
parmesan as desired

Prepare yeast dough according to directions; let rise in a bowl in a warm place until double in size. This should take 45 minutes. Grease muffin pans. Punch down dough to remove air bubbles and knead on a lightly floured surface until dough is smooth, elastic and easy to handle. Roll out into an 18 by 12 inch rectangle. Sprinkle cheese over the entire top of the dough and roll as for a jelly roll, starting at the long side; pinch edges together. Cut into 1 inch slices. Flatten rolls, cut side up, in greased muffin tins and brush with melted butter. Sprinkle with spices. Bake rolls for 20 minutes in preheated 375 degree oven.

Cheese Bread

5 to 5 1/2 cups unsifted flour
1/4 cup sugar
1 pkg. active dry yeast
2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. dry mustard
2 cups milk
1/4 cup shortening
2 cups shredded, sharp Cheddar cheese

Mix two cups of the flour with the sugar, yeast, salt and dry mustard. Warm milk and fat together over low heat and stir into flour mixture. Mix

cheese with the remaining flour; gradually stir into the mixture to make a soft dough that leaves the sides of the bowl. With some flours it may be necessary to add a little extra flour to make a soft dough. Knead on a lightly floured surface until dough is smooth and elastic; this should take about 10 minutes. Place in a greased bowl and turn once to grease upper side of the dough. Use a wire rack to place until double in size. Grease two 9 x 5 x 2 1/2 inch loaf pans. Press down dough to remove air bubbles. Divide in half and shape into loaves; put into loaf pans. Let rise in a warm place until double in size. Bake in a 375 degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Remove bread from pans and allow to cool on a rack.

1 1/2 cups unsifted flour
2 tsp. baking powder

Rockcastle Rural Dev. Committee Seeds 33 Acres for Wildlife

The key to increasing wildlife population is to create food. The area so wild animals can hunt food and have a place to hide in the same general area. That is what the Rockcastle Rural Development Committee helped to create by seeding 33 acres beneath Jackson Co. RECC power transmission lines.

As part of the RECC line maintenance the land beneath the power line is bulldozed and cleared to grasses for erosion control. The Rockcastle Rural Development Committee saw this as an excellent opportunity to create food and cover areas for wildlife as well as control erosion. Contacts were made with the Jackson Co. RECC and they too thought

that this was an excellent opportunity to help wildlife and agreed to seed 33 acres with Lespedeza with tressure on right-of-ways to be cleared in the future. But there was already work started on several power line routes on which no wildlife plants had been sown. With permission from Jackson Co. RECC the Rockcastle Rural Development Committee volunteered to seed these areas and permission was granted.

The committee then went to work contacting local seed dealers for donations of seed to be used for this purpose and the work resulted in the following list of donations:

Wayne Stewart, Wayne Jasper, Kenneth Stewart, Mt. Vernon Women's Club and Rockcastle Fish and Game Club, all donated 470 lbs. Korean Lespedeza seed; Tommy H. Mink, 8 bushels wheat, and Ky. Div. of Forestry, 250 Bicolor Lespedeza seedlings.

Then for two days in early April several members of the committee drove around the county and spread this seed on about 33 1/2 acres beneath RECC transmission lines. The Bicolor Lespedeza seedlings were distributed and planted throughout the county also. And finally about 10 acres of Korean Lespedeza were sown by various individuals on their privately owned lands.

The success of this project will hopefully be increased wildlife populations from one end of the county to the other for everyone to enjoy. The Rockcastle Rural Development Committee would like to thank the businessmen and organizations listed above, the Ky. Div. of Forestry and the Jackson Co. RECC for the co-operation and support to make this project a success.

Rockcastle County to Receive Road Funds

State Transportation Secretary Calvin Grayson has announced that Rockcastle County will receive \$249,576 to support its 1978-79 program for rural secondary roads.

Similar allocations to other counties are also being announced locally.

According to Grayson, the Rockcastle County program for the fiscal year beginning July 1, will provide for maintenance along 75.5 miles of local county roads.

Specific improvement projects also included in that program are: blacktop resurfacing along 2.6 miles of Ky. 1250, Brodhead-Spire Wabed Road and

four-tenths of a mile of Old Gum Sulphur-Copper Creek Road (CR 1830), and initial blacktopping along one mile of Lewis road (CR 1930).

The rural secondary roads program established under a 1968 law to help maintain and improve the farm-to-market and other essential rural roads.

It is financed under a formula which provides that two cents of the tax collected on each gallon of motor fuels sold in Kentucky be set aside for "secondary roads to support rural road programs."

The allocations are announced once annually on a fiscal-year basis.

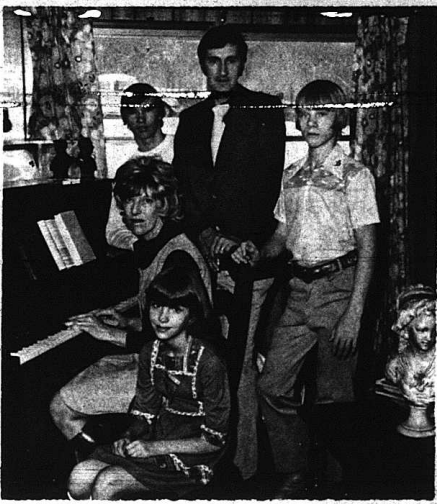

in May. Mrs. Mason has already completed her work and will finish at Eastern Kentucky University.

During his first year of schooling at Clear Creek he served as interim pastor at his home church in Mayslick. His chance came when a vacancy occurred at the Scaffold Cane, through the Clear Creek School for a trail sermon on Eastern Sunday on April 1976. He made

a big hit. For just a couple of weeks later, May 5, 1976, Rev. Mason was called as Pastor and Moderator of the church.

When Mason came to Scaffold Cane, the Sunday School was averaging 35 to 40 people. By the end of his first year in ministry, an average of one hundred was coming to Sunday School. The congregation began to wonder where they were going to put the people if the growth continued.

The first move was to make the

Pastor full time, and procure a Parsonage. They voted to purchase a large lot, and when school was finished in May the preacher and his family moved in nearby the church.

In Spring 1977, two members of the congregation gave the church the Old Scaffold Cane School House, which is on the same grounds as the parsonage. The old school house was in a bad state of repair, but the men in the church pitched in. The windows and doors were done, the building was leveled, the roof replaced, and the building generally showed signs of falling down. By late spring the men in the church "pitched in." The building got new siding, carpeting, a kitchen, bathroom, drywall and lighting, leveling and paint. Now the church had a new building to be used for all church functions.

The congregation of Scaffold Cane Baptist Church voted to enlarge the century-old building to double the seating capacity for about 300 people.

The remodeled and expanded church is now finished inside with a Baptist, new walls, carpeting and a vestibule (hall). The exterior bedford stone work has been finished. This church is probably the oldest Baptist church in Kentucky.

Buildings and new members are not the only new additions to the Scaffold Cane Church. Last summer it was decided that the church would reach out via radio. Every Saturday at 12:00 noon the pastor sends out a message through the facilities of radio W.R.V.K., Renfro Valley, to many more people.

Success was not to stop here for just recently an anonymous donor gave \$500 for a year's ministry on the Berea Radio W.X.K.O. which is broadcast at 4:40 p.m. every Sunday.

It is hard to say what is in store for the future of the Scaffold Cane Baptist Church with Lowell Mason at the helm. When asked this question, Rev. Mason attributed the growth "to people being willing to let the Lord use them." For the future he says, "I'd like to see the Church double again next year."

"We have 10 new Sunday School rooms and a double seating capacity in the sanctuary."

He also credits the growth of the Church to its being a "people church." "The Church is a People oriented Church," Mason goes on, "everybody

pitches in." Yes, everyone does "pitch in" as on the remodeling of both buildings. One Sunday, Steve Bullen, a local Forest Ranger, will lead the singing. Another Sunday, it may be Richard Thomas or Jimmy Dean, who will lead. Dean also does a solo occasionally on may join in with Lewis Linville and wife in a special. The singing is made up of several different groups. Some usually sing a quartet number. Some Sundays the men of the church may make up the choir-unrehearsed. Jennifer and Sammy Spires usually play the piano but if they can't get out from Berea, Margaret Neesley or Joann Mason can fill in. Deacon Clyde Linville even played the piano one Sunday.

Any week is a busy schedule out there at this church—especially for Rev. Mason.

He prepares a message for Sunday morning and a different one for Sunday night. Heads back to Clear Creek, 70 or 80 miles. Monday morning for classes, the back to Scaffold Cane for the Wednesday night services and the Bible Study Course, or Business meeting, and the weather hasn't caused him to be absent or late. He again goes to Clear Creek Thursday morning and returns home for a Friday night Study Course "The Acts." Why all this schedule of classes, sermons and study courses? "Nobody teaches anything in the area," says Mason, "and I see a need. People are hungry for this in fact a woman is planning to drive all the way from Richmond, just to attend the Study Course."

The children are also busy when school is in session. Sixteen year old Jimmy has surrendered his life and is planning to be an evangelist when he finishes at Rockcastle Co. High School. Tommy is a freshman there, while Tony goes to school at Roundstone. If things go as in the past, the children are probably witnessing to a lot of people.

It will be interesting to see what the future has in store for the Masons probably a larger church somewhere. Rev. Mason says, "The money doesn't matter or interest me. I'll let the Lord do his will."

Critics are hailing the current movie "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" as the most successful venture in years. They say it will make more money than any recent movie. This science fiction picture highlights close encounters of inhabitants on planet earth with inhabitants of other planets. It is evident that the producers are capitalizing on all the current interest in UFO's and our unrelenting quest for "knowing the known."

Meanwhile, back on earth, we have some "close encounters of the physical kind." Frequently we hear about those who had a "close encounter" ("to come face to face with" Webster) with death because of poor health, fire, highway accidents, etc. Some survive; others do not.

The Bible provides many examples of "close encounters of the physical kind." David, the shepherd boy, had a close encounter with the giant Goliath in battle. As he stood face to face with the big bully, all the odds were against him, yet he prevailed because he came in the name of the Lord. (1 Sam. 17). Patient Job, his body covered from head to toe with boils, had a "close encounter" with death, but survived. He said, "My bone cleaveth to my skin and my flesh, and I am encased with the skin of my teeth" (Job 19:20). The peerless apostle Paul had some "close encounters" with death—he preached the gospel of Christ. He was beaten eight times, stoned, shipwrecked and imprisoned; but survived these and continued his great work for many years (2 Cor. 11:23-33).

Now, consider carefully some "close encounters of the heavenly kind." These are the encounters we need to be most concerned about. During His ministry on earth, Christ had "close encounters" with multitudes. In His mission to save the lost He healed the sick, cast out devils, and spoke as no man had spoken before. Undeniable, evidence

was given that He is the Son of God (John 3:2, 8:58). Many believed on Jesus, obeyed His words and were thereby saved. The majority, however, rejected Him and would "not come to Him that they might have life" (John 5:40); these "close encounters" with Christ notwithstanding.

Then ponder the "close encounters" people had with the gospel. The Book of Acts gives a panoramic view of the gospel being preached to "every creature under heaven" (Col. 1:23). Jude, in referring to those living under the power and dominion of sin spoke of "pulling them out of the fire" (Jude 23). This small word "fire," circulated through a crowd or building usually causes great panic and fear. People jump out of windows, trample others under foot, etc., in order to escape the fire. Those preachers sounded the "hell fire alarm" and warned people to obey the gospel or suffer everlasting punishment in hell (2 Thess. 1:7-9); the results of such "close encounters" with the gospel were phenomenal. Multiplied thousands accepted the facts of the gospel, obeyed its commands, and enjoyed its promises. The Lord saved them and added them to His church (Acts 2:38, 41, 47).

There will be another "close encounter" at the judgement. There each one will stand face to face with the Son of God. The books will be opened, and we will be judged according to that which is written in the New Testament, and by how we reacted to the "CLOSE ENCOUNTERS OF THE HEAVENLY KIND" (Revelation 20:12-15).

THE BIBLE SAYS:

"All things therefore, that you want men to do to you, you also must likewise do to them." Matthew 7:12, New World Translation.

When it comes to human relations, Christians follow the guiding principles as set forth by the Bible. In the realm of human relations there are sharp differences of opinion as to the matter of apology. Some persons view it as weakness. But how does God view this matter of admitting that one had been in the wrong, when it comes to human relations? What God approves is the right course.

As noted in the scripture above, we would want to do what we would want others to do. When we have been wronged, how much we appreciate the offender's coming to us and apologizing. How such apology restores peaceful relations? How we feel even more friendly toward the repentant person than before the offense or transgression took place.

Seeing, then, what course of action we appreciate, should we not extend this same kindness to others? It is a matter of love and humility. If we love our neighbor, we will do to him what we want done to ourselves. If one is in the

wrong, his love should prompt him to take the course Jesus recommended as the right one. (Matt. 7:12).

Another scripture Jesus indicated that apology on the part of the offender is the proper course: "If your brother commits a sin give him a reproof, and if he repents forgive him. Even if he sins seven times a day against you and he comes back to you seven times, saying, 'I repent', you must forgive him." (Luke 17:34). When one is in the wrong and comes to his offended brother and apologizes, as indicated by the words, "I Repent", he is to be forgiven. Just as the offended should be forgiving out of love for the sake of peace and unity, so for these very reasons also should apology be made.

Far from being weakness, sincere apology is a power, a power that can remove the barrier to friendly relationships put up by the offended one. Of the offended one's barrier God's word says: "A brother transgressed against is more than a strong town, and there are contentions that are like the bar of a wall." (Prov. 18:19) What is it that is powerful enough to remove these barriers to the restoration of friendliness that are like iron bars to be found in a fortress apology.

Contrary to the opinion of many, apology is not a sign of weakness. It is a power that can shatter barriers to unity. It is a sign of the true Christian spirit.

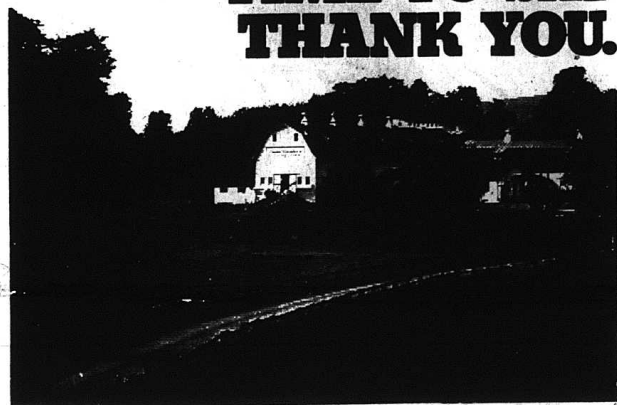

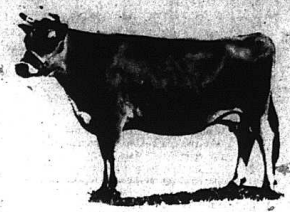

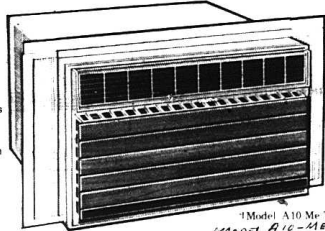
A Consumer Tip from Extension Specialists at the UK College of Agriculture
